



To the Indiana High School Athletic Association

The Indiana High School Athletic Association is now in its tenth year. With this fact in mind, a retiring officer naturally grows retrospective and disposed to make inventory. This pleasing privilege and this duty belongs to our retiring Permanent Secretary, whose term of service extends over the entire period of the Association's history.

Secretary J. T. Giles, who was a leading spirit out of the darkness and chaos of unorganized and unendurable inter-school athletics into the Canaan of present day righteousness, insists upon being relieved from the duties which the growing Association has imposed. The splendid service which the Association has rendered in the direction of pure athletics and proper inter-scholastic relations, is due in very large degree to the efficiency of the retiring Permanent Secretary. No one who has not served on the Board can realize how great are the demands upon the secretary, or how faithful to the highest ideals of the Association Mr. Giles has always been. He has been the unrelenting foe of all forms of shiftless management and crooked athletics. The retirement of Mr. Giles is much to be regretted, though it is a well earned freedom.

The condition of the Association was never better than at present. The past year has been remarkably free from any serious litigation, though the membership is at high-water mark. Good feeling is prevalent among the schools, and the disposition to be neighborly and square seems to prevail throughout the state. The schools seem to have acted in the spirit of the principles of the Association as well as being obedient to its laws. The cases before the Board show some lack of understanding and some failure to adhere strictly to the rules of the Association, but fortunately little unfairness or bitterness has been noted between members.

Basket ball has become the major game of High School athletics. It is a game worthy of the place now accorded to it. It is an outdoor and indoor game adapted to the whole school year. The very best feature of the game is that it encourages the formation of many teams in the same school, and offers the finest kind of exercise and recreation to both the skilled and un-

skilled, to girls as well as to boys. The game calls for a room of correct type for a general gymnasium, and the fact that many schools have turned their basket ball room into a school gymnasium, equipped for physical training classes, should be credited to an interest in basket ball.

The State Championship Series in basket ball was worked out as outlined in the Manual of last year. Comparatively few disagreeable features were encountered by the Board. Every effort was made by the Board to safeguard the conditions of the Local, District, Section and State Contests, and to arrive at an undisputed championship. Lebanon won a remarkable series of games, and its masterful playing at Bloomington put it clearly in the lead. The State University, under whose auspices the final series was played, could not have been surpassed in courtesy or in efficient service.

Whether or not the plan should ever be revived rests with the Association. Many forecasted objections have failed to develop under last year's experiences, and on later consideration State Championship Series in basket ball may be thought worthy of a place, on a par with field and track athletics.

Without doubt the greatest inter-scholastic event ever held in Indiana was the Baseball and Field and Track Tournament held at Purdue in May. Nearly 500 athletes, representing two scores of schools, contended for supremacy in baseball and track events. Twelve teams of baseball were playing at one time on the superb diamonds on Stuart Field. Interest in the outcome was intense. South Bend, under the captaincy of Louie Wolf, playing University-class ball, won the cup and the admiration of all spectators. The final game with M. T. H. S., of Indianapolis, was a revelation in amateur ball.

The Field and Track events were equally interesting. The track was ideal and the management could not have been better. The outcome was in doubt throughout the entire contest, Fairmount Academy winning by a small margin.

Director Nicol and his associates rendered a great service to the Association. Every courtesy and every possible kindness were shown the Board and the visiting teams. Our hats are off! "Bully for Old Purdue!"

Lack of field space for a State Baseball Tournament among the colleges argues that such an event cannot be repeated under the plan used last spring. The increasing interest in baseball as the best of all outdoor sports, we hope may continue. It should become the great spring and fall game among High Schools.

Football is all but dead in Indiana High Schools. Only 20 schools among our 250 had teams on the field for inter-scholastic games. The decadence makes possible a new fall sport which the Association will welcome. Soccer is gaining and may secure a general hold, though as long as there is any life in American football progress will be slow. Prejudice and unfamiliarity must both be overcome before soccer can take the old place of football.

As the retiring member of the Board, I should like to urge more home athletics. Our interest should be first and last in the development of the High School youth who can't make the team. The school gymnasium has as clear a title to a place in the school building as does the boiler-room or the laboratory. The curiculum is not complete without physical training, and credits earned in such training should be given par value. Intra-school sport can serve a greater number, and return greater dividends to any school and community than inter-scholastics can ever accomplish, however grand the record of its representative teams. If a waxing of the interest in home athletics means a waning of inter-scholastics, and a final dissolution of the State Association, there can be no cause to mourn, for its mission shall have been fulfilled.

I would further urge that all forms of inter-scholastics, and all inter-school activities, be brought under the constitution of the Association. Debating and oratorical leagues have sprung up all over the state, and the same rules and qualifications should be adhered to as are enforced in athletics. Evidently, restrictions should be uniform in all school teams, whether they be athletic or forensic.



The Next Step

No one can deny that in the ten years of its existence the Indiana High School Athletic Association has been an active force in promoting a higher class of athletic ideals among its members, as well as an agent to promote justice and harmony where otherwise strife and discord would have existed. Not always have we upheld the highest ideal. Neither has our practice kept pace with our theories. It is the purpose of this article to set forth anew a well recognized ideal of high school athletics, in the hope that thereby its realization may be brought somewhat nearer.

The ideal of which I speak is athletics for all, and especially for those who need them, instead of for the few who are naturally well endowed physically. It must be admitted that this view of athletics is not very generally accepted by educators, or if so, that very little effort is made to put it


into practice.

One reason for this is the domination of the high schools by the colleges. In the latter, traditions are such in America that no president or board of trustees would dare to oppose the existing system of representative teams of trained specialists. So long as this is true, the education to be derived from play in those games which have been found best adapted to healthy, vigorous young manhood must be largely limited in our high schools and colleges to a few students, chosen for their fitness to represent the school in spectacular contests.

It is true that in all schools supporting a gymnasium there are classes for physical training. This work is pretty largely formal and does not utilize the play motive. I do not wish to depreciate its value wherever it can be done, but only to advocate an extension of the participation in games to a


larger per cent of the student body.

So long as the energies of the school are devoted to the development of one representative team general participation in that game is impossible, for the two ideas are antagonistic. While the former practice is permitted in the colleges it is exceedingly difficult to alter the system in the high schools. Tradition and custom are so well established in the colleges that reform is

exceedingly slow. It, therefore, remains for the high schools, where tradition is less strong, to push forward as rapidly as possible toward the recognized better.

A few schools in the state, including the two Indianapolis high schools, have taken advanced ground by declaring for intra-school as opposed to inter-school athletics. Still others have made an approach to this stand by limiting the number of inter-school games. These experiments have been successful. The I. H. S. A. A. now limits interscholastic football games to six. Is it not time to place a similar limit on other inter-school contests?

The practice of developing one team of trained specialists for the high school cannot be successfully defended on any ground. The members of the team are usually over-trained from the standpoint of hygiene, and the hero worship accorded them is not in proportion to the intrinsic value of their achievement. It creates an erroneous standard of values.

The remainder of the school are not only deprived of the joys and benefits of actual participation, but they are led to accept the grandstand attitude toward sport as proper and sufficient.

There is little education to be derived from watching a basketball game. There is much to be learned if one is to be a successful player. The training for England's military victories was on her cricket fields, not on their bleachers.

I am not arguing against professional sport as such. I am seriously objecting to its virtual introduction into our high schools. Athletics, mainly within the school, by all the pupils and for all the pupils, is surely much more to be desired.

In the light of this discussion, I propose the following resolution:-

Whereas, we believe that the natural evils of organized athletics, such as the exclusion of those individuals who need it most from participation, the over indulgence and over specialization of those who do participate, the danger of injury through accident and of bad manners in play, are increased and exaggerated by the prevalent high school system where teacher coaches are employed, representative teams are trained, intense school rivalry encouraged and the players permitted to win at any cost,

Resolved, that it is the sense of this Association that we encourage in the high schools of Indiana:—

Play athletics as opposed to spectacular athletics, Co-operative athletics as opposed to partisan athletics, Intra-school athletics as opposed to inter-school athletics,

Play habits as opposed to bleacher habits,

Play habits as opposed to trophy-hunting habits, Group teams as opposed to representative teams,

The substitution of a state system embodying these ideals instead of those now prevailing.

Ninth Annual Track and Field Meet---Announcement

The Ninth Annual Track and Field Meet of the Indiana High School Athletic Association will be held at Purdue University, Lafayette, May 18, 1912, in the afternoon. Entries for the Meet will close May 8, and all schools desiring to participate in the Meet must become members of the Association before that time.

Eligibility

Every contestant in this Meet must have previously made in a fair test a record equal to the following in every event in which he is entered:

100 Yard Dash	11 s.
220 Yard Dash	
440 Yard Dash	
Half Mile Run	2 m. 20 s.
Mile Run	5 m. 15 s.
120 Yard High Hurdles	19 s.
220 Yard Low Hurdles	29 s.
Running High Jump	5 ft.
Running Broad Jump	
Pole Vault	8 ft. 9 in.
Putting Shot (12 lb)	36 ft.
Throwing Discus	90 ft.

The above, together with a mile relay, will constitute the events of the Meet. Winning first place in any event counts five points; second place, three points; and third place, one point. Points in the relay will not be counted in determining the winning team.

The order of events is as follows:

Track Events—100 yards dash trial; 120 yards hurdle trial; 100 yards dash final; one mile run; 440 yards run; 120 yards hurdle final; 220 yards dash trial; 220 yards hurdle trial; 880 yards run; 220 yards dash final; 220 yards hurdle final; relay.

Field Events—Discus; running high jump; shot put; pole vault; running broad jump.

Recent Board Rulings

 The hammer throw shall hereafter be excluded from the events of the State Field Meet, and the Board recommends that it be excluded from local Meets. 2. In case of a tie in any event the points shall be divided and the place awarded by lot.

Entries

The entries in each event are limited to three, and the contestants in each to two from any school, except in the relay race, where entries will be limited to six, and the number placed in competition to four, each running one-fourth mile.

All schools, in order to enter the contests of the State Meet, will be required to certify that all athletic contests in which they have taken part since becoming members of the Association have been conducted in accordance with the rules of the Indiana High School Athletic Association, and that all their contestants in such contests have been qualified according to rules.

Principals will be required to certify in writing that the contestants from their respective schools have all qualified in every event in which they are entered in the State Meet. Each Principal must fill out entry blanks with the names of the contestants from his school, and all required data, and send to J. T. Giles, Permanent Secretary, on or before May 8, 1912. **These requirements must be strictly complied with.** Special blanks for this purpose will be furnished to all members of the Association.

Protests

All protests and complaints against members of the Association for violation of the rules must be made in writing and filed with the Permanent Secretary on or before May 8. Protests as to the eligibility of individual contestants under the constitution are to be decided by the Board of Control, and may be filed with the Secretary at any time.

Management

The management of this Meet rests solely with the Board of Control. The selection of officials, to be approved by the Board, has been delegated to the athletic management of Purdue University. The referee and starter are to be chosen from the A. A. U., in order that records made at the Meet may be recognized by that body. The Board will arrange a program, assigning place on the track by lot, and the printed program will indicate the order in which the men will be called upon the track. The rules governing the Meet correspond to those of the Western Inter-Collegiate Amateur Athletic Association except where these have been modified by the Board of Control. These rules, as adopted by the Board, are printed in the I. H. S. A. A. Hand Book of Athletics and Annual Report of the Board of Control. Copies may be had of the Permanent Secretary for 10 cents each, postpaid.

Prizes

No prizes will be awarded except a cup to the winning team, a pennant to the winning relay team, and badges for point winners. Admission to all high school pupils, 25 cents. Contestants and one rubber from each school admitted free.

Entertainment

Purdue University will furnish free board and rooms to all contestants during the Meet.

Fees

A fee of fifty cents for each contestant must accompany the entries. This fee will be returned to the Principal of the school for all entries who actually participate in the Meet.

Report of the Meet

The Ninth Annual Track and Field Meet held under the auspices of the I. H. S. A. A. was in many ways the most successful of all. The day was fine and the crowd was large and enthusiastic. The number of entries was the largest in the history of the Meet.

The Purdue Exponent Gave the Following Account of the Meet:

The Ninth Annual Track and Field Meet held on Stuart field this afternoon was a success in every sense of the word. With the exception of a stiff wind which blew across the field from the southwest, the day was ideal for such an event. The warm sun of the last two days had completely dried up the track and placed it in first-class condition.

LARGE CROWD PRESENT

A large part of the crowd that witnessed the championship ball game remained on the field for the Track Meet, and this number was rapidly increased until the west bleachers and grandstand and part of the south bleachers were filled with an enthusiastic audience.

Manual Training was represented by their band and about two hundred loyal rooters. The Shortridge supporters were much in evidence and rivaled their sister school with yells for their team. The crowd was estimated at 5,000.

STUDENT PARADE

The Purdue student parade was a big feature of the afternoon. Promptly at 1:15 o'clock the four University classes marched onto the field through the east gate, led by yell-leader Hayne and the Purdue band. The classes marched in their respective order, four abreast, and made a very imposing spectacle. The Seniors' corduroys and Juniors' white hats were much in evidence. After marching around the field the men gathered in the center and gave the Purdue series, bull dog, etc., in spirited fashion. An animated scene followed when all the fellows made a break for the section reserved for them in the west bleachers.

The Hon. William Jennings Bryan appeared on the field near the close of the Meet, and was given a royal welcome by the crowd. He made a neat five-minute speech that was greatly appreciated by all.

FAIRMOUNT ACADEMY WON

The Meet was won by Fairmount Academy, by a margin of one-third of a point. Winslow was their main point getter, making a total of 10 1-3 points.

Noblesville came second with a one-man team, getting 13 points. Short-ridge beat out Manual by three points.

WALTON STAR OF THE MEET

Walton, of Noblesville, was the individual point-winner, making a total of 13 points. He made a first in the 100 and 220 yard dashes, and second in broad jump. His performance in the Meet was rather remarkable, being the only man entered by his school; he came within one-third of a point of carrying off the Meet by himself.

Winslow, of Fairmount Academy, was second highest individual winner, with 10 1-3 points.

The only state record broken during the Meet was the pole vault record held by Winslow, of Fairmount Academy, at 10 feet 8¼ inches. Wicks, of Gary, cleared the bar at 10 feet 11¼ inches. Other records would no doubt have been broken but for the stiff wind that blew across the field in the face of the dash men.

The mile run was a pretty race between Hefferman, of Washington, and Good, of Crawfordsville, the former forging ahead at the finish and winning by a few feet.

Darrow, of Wolcott, was disqualified in the first heat of the 440 yard dash. He struck C. Espey, of Manual Training, in the back of the head, knocking him to the ground just in front of the tape. The latter was given third in this heat.

Winslow, of Fairmount, won the 120 yard hurdles easily in the final by a margin of 10 yards.

The Indianapolis Star Also Reported the Meet as Follows:

LAFAYETTE, Ind., May 18.—Until the final event in the State High School Athletic Association's Ninth Annual Meet, Shortridge High School, of Indianapolis, had the leadership of points, but inability to place in the broad jump and high jump gave the victory to Fairmount Academy, with 13½ points. Noblesville, through the work of Walton, their only representative, scored 13 points. Shortridge was third with 12 points, and Washington fourth with 10 points. Manual Training H. S. took fifth with 9 points.

Fifty-eight hundred people were gathered on Stuart Field this afternoon when the first event on the program was called. Every available bleacher seat was taken, and crowds were gathered around the track. A stiff wind blew directly down the course and made fast time in any of the running events impossible, especially in the dashes, which were run the entire distance against it. Only a single record gave way to the prowess of the athletes—in the pole vault, Wicks, of Gary, succeeded in clearing the bar at 10 feet 11¾ inches. Simmons, of Hartford City, gave a pretty exhibition in the high jump, falling only a fraction of an inch below the state record.

WALTON THE INDIVIDUAL STAR

Individual honors went to Walton, of Noblesville, who scored thirteen points, firsts in the 100-yard dash and the 220-yard dash and second in the running broad jump. Winslow, of Fairmount, was second all-around leader, corralling first place in the high hurdles, second in the 220-yard dash, third in the running broad jump, and tieing for second in the pole vault. Greenwood won the relay race.

The final contest in the state championship battle for the baseball title saw Manual Training High School of Indianapolis defeated in the tenth inning by South Bend, 3 to 2. It has been a long time since such spectacular ball was played on Stuart Field and these two teams, after unquestionably showing their supremacy over every other competitor, were about evenly matched when they took the field.

The result of today's battles gave the undisputed championship to South Bend, with Manual Training High School as a runnerup and Fort Wayne and Huntington in the third and fourth places, respectively.

The tournament closed tonight with a presentation of trophies and a mammoth dance in the Memorial Gymnasium, at which every member of the Purdue faculty was in the receiving line, and Dean Coulter made the presentation of the trophies. Three thousand people crowded the gymnasium at the presentation of the trophies.

VISITORS AT MEET HEAR WILLIAM JENNINGS BRYAN

Great Commoner is Guest of University at Annual State Track and Field Meet

HIGHLY PRAISES SCHOOL ATHLETICS

Says Baseball Is Good Because It Is Democratic—Prize Is

Nothing—Preparation Is Everything

Mr. Bryan, being a guest of the University, was escorted to Stuart Field by President Stone and Athletic Director Nicol, who has charge of the games. He arrived at Lafayette on the 3:43 p. m. Monon train from Chicago, and expects to remain here to-morrow, when he is to give an address at the Dryfus theater.

The speaker began with an apt story of Senator Blackburn's congres-

sional campaign, where the senator was invited by the sheriff to speak from the scaffold at a public hanging. The hanging was to have taken place after the address; but, after the senator had started, the condemned man said to the sheriff: "If it is just the same to you, go on with the execution and let him finish his speech after I am through." Mr. Bryan likened his audience's position to that of the prisoner.

Was an Athlete in Youth

While Mr. Bryan was in school he said that he had taken many prizes for jumping—"not running," he explained. He was an expert on the standing broad jump. He said that his record was 12 feet 4 inches, after he was told that the Purdue record is 11 feet 5 inches. The speaker played baseball in his youth, although he had great difficulty in running bases, often being left on second.

Baseball was much praised by Mr. Bryan, because he thinks it is a democratic game and gives a big field for practice in co-operation. It requires much skill and has a very small element of danger.

Gymnasium Next to Farm

Next to farm work comes exercise in the gymnasium, Although of subordinate importance to the head and heart, the body, fitted to endure fatigue and resist disease, is a very great factor in human life. Therefore Mr. Bryan claimed that high school students were justified in giving the time necessary for the attainment of physical perfection.—From Purdue Exponent.

First Annual Baseball Tournament---Announcement

The First Annual Baseball Tournament of the Indiana High School Athletic Association will be held at Purdue University, Friday and Saturday, May 17 and 18, 1912. Entries for the tournament will close May 8, and all schools desiring to participate in the Tournament must become members of the Association before that time.

Eligibility

The eligibility of each player on each team must be certified to by the Principal of the school sending the team. This certification must be made on the regular blank used for the Track and Field Meet, and all the information called for on that blank, except the last column, must be carefully filled in by the Principal.

Entries

Each school may send one team of twelve members.

Protests

All protests and complaints against members of the Association for violation of the rules must be made in writing and filed with the Permanent Secretary on or before May 8. Protests as to the eligibility of individual contestants under the constitution are to be decided by the Board of Control, and may be filed with the Secretary at any time.

Management

The management of this Tournament rests solely with the Board of Control. The selection of officials, to be approved by the Board; has been delegated to the athletic management of Purdue University. The umpires are to be selected by the Purdue management and approved by the Board of Control.

A schedule indicating teams, times, diamonds and umpires, will be arranged by the Board of Control and announced Saturday, May 11.

Prizes

Purdue University announces the following trophies:

"The management has arranged a number of suitable and appropriate prizes to the teams winning in their respective rounds. To all teams winning their first games, a pennant will be given; to all nines thereafter winning their contests until the final is reached, banners will be given; to the runner up for championship honors, a silver loving cup will be presented; and to

the undefeated team, and the winner of the First Annual State High School Baseball Tournament, a beautiful silver loving cup will also be awarded, together with an individual gold medal for each player on the team."

No prizes are offered by the State Board of Control for baseball winners.

Entertainment

All contestants, allowing twelve men to each team, will be the guests of the Purdue Athletic Association, faculty and students of Purdue University, and quarters will be provided for them in fraternity and club houses and homes of the students. A number of entertainments have been arranged for the week.

Fees

An entry fee of \$3.00 for each team must accompany the list of entries. This fee will be returned to the Principal of the school later, providing the team actually participates in the tournament.

Report of the Tournament

Purdue University deserves great credit for the unqualified success of the First Annual Baseball Tournament. The Purdue Exponent gave the following excellent account:

Before a large and enthusiastic, though partisan crowd, the South Bend team defeated the strong Manual Training team in the finals for the State High School baseball championship, in a contest that went into the extra innings. Taking the lead in the first inning by a one point advantage, South Bend held the M. T. team scoreless until the fifth round, when the Indianapolis boys evened up things and put renewed hopes into the breasts of the shouting throng of Indianapolis rooters filling the east bleachers. In the sixth inning each team managed to bring in one more run, after which the score was unchanged until the end of the ninth.

In the beginning of the tenth Manual made a desperate attempt to bring in another run, but were unable to make the play. With South Bend at bat, Cassidy got to third and then came home, with two out, on an error

and took the game for South Bend.

Both teams played excellent ball, and the rival pitchers put up a brand of pitching seldom equalled in inter-collegiate ball. Becker, of Manual, struck out eleven men, but gave free passes to two of the South Bend batters, while Cassidy fanned only nine, but donated only one unearned trip to first. The victors outclassed their opponents in accurate playing, being charged with but two errors to Manual's four; one of the four being directly responsible for the loss of the game in the fatal tenth.

The excitement of the rooters in the opposing sections was kept keyed to the highest pitch by the closeness of the scores and the intense rivalry for the first place. Manual Training was represented by a large body of rooters and a band of about thirty pieces. The south bleachers were filled with South Bend partisans, who vied with the M. T. H. S. rooters in yelling and cheering for each good play made or run scored.

Semi-Final Games

Neither of the contestants in the final game had any difficulty in taking the big end of the earlier games. In an eight-inning game the Manual Training boys easily demonstrated their superiority over the team representing the Huntington high school; defeating them by a 12 to 5 score.

Taking scores in big bunches, the South Bend team ran all over their opponents from Fort Wayne in their curtain-raiser, and snowed them under to

the tune of 16 to 2 in a six-inning batfest.

State Basket Ball Tournament

On September 23, 1911, the Board of Control issued the following announcement:

In response to a questionare directed by the Board of Control to members of the I. H. S. A. A., a considerable majority of those replying indicated their desire that a Basketball Tournament should be held during the coming year to determine the state championship. In accordance with this demand from the membership of the Association, the Board of Control approves a plan for determining the Basketball championship of the state, as follows:

- The championship of each congressional district will be determined by the Board on the basis of games played in the district. A school to be considered for championship honors must have played at least four other schools in the district, provided the membership of the district contains that many members of the Association.
- 2. The Board will proceed at once to divide the state into four sections. Three of which will contain three congressional districts each and the fourth to contain four congressional districts. This division will be made as equitable as possible on the basis of geographical location and the distribution of membership.
- 3. The Board of Control will meet on the 2nd of March, 1912, to determine district championships. All scores of games must be in the hands of the Permanent Secretary by noon of Friday, March 1, to receive consideration. On Saturday, March 9th, 1912, the district championship teams will meet at a section center, to be previously determined and announced by the Board of Control, to decide the sectional championships. Each of the sectional contests will be in control of an I. H. S. A. A. official. On Saturday, March 16th, the four section champions will meet at a center to be designated by the Board, to determine the state championship. A more detailed statement of arrangements will be issued by the Board at a later date.

On November 11th, 1911, the following statement was issued by the Board in regard to the State Basketball Tournament previously announced by the Board:

- (1) The Board will manage only one Basketball Tournament, as previously announced by the Board to members of the Association.
- (2) The question of the Board's authority over tournaments under outside management will be referred to the Association at its next annual meeting.
- (3) The Board will entertain an invitation from any institution in the state to hold the finals of the State Basketball Tournament on March 16.

- (4) The state will be divided into four sections, as follows:

 Section A will be composed of congressional districts 1, 2 and 3.

 Section B will be composed of congressional districts 4, 5 and 6.

 Section C will be composed of congressional districts 8, 9 and 11.

 Section D will be composed of congressional districts 10, 12 and 13.
- (5) The method of selecting championship teams will be as follows: The championship of each congressional district will be determined by the Board on the basis of games played in the district. A school to be considered for championship honors must have played at least four other schools in the district, provided the district contains that many members of the Association.

A report of all the games played by any member of the Association must be in the hands of the Permanent Secretary by noon of Friday, March 1st, in order to receive consideration.

On Saturday, March 2nd, the Board of Control will be in session to determine from the scores made in the various congressional districts the championship team in each district.

On Saturday, March 9th, 1912, the three championship teams in each of the sections named above will meet at a section center to be previously determined and announced by the Board of Control, to decide the sectional championship of the state. Each of these sectional contests will be under direct management of an I. H. S. A. A. official.

On Saturday, March 16th, 1912, the four winners of the sectional meets will meet at a center to be designated by the Board of Control, to determine the state championship team.

The net proceeds of all the above meets will be prorated to the various teams competing up to the amount of their actual expenses in attending the meet. Further details will be announced later by the Board.

Lebanon Wins the Final Game

Contrary to the expectations of most of those who had seen the afternoon games, the quintette representing the Lebanon High School ran away with the Franklin High School in the final game for the state championship at the Gym Saturday night and administered a crushing defeat by a score of 51 to 11. At no time were the Franklin lads able to cope with the superb team work and effective guarding of Whitney's proteges, and with the exception of the opening moments of the first half, the Lebanon machine was able to score almost at will.

As a result of the victory, the Lebanon team was presented, between the halves of the Wisconsin game, with a beautiful shield as a trophy, and each of the players received watch fobs with the title of "State Champions" inscribed on a small gold basketball. The presentation was made by Registrar John W. Cravens for the Boosters' Club, and Coach Claude Whitney and Captain Porter of the Lebanon team responded.

The work of the Lebanon team in the two games it played was on a par with the work of Crawfordsville here last year, and the team clearly demonstrated that it had a right to be called the champions of the state. The work of Porter at forward and of L. Dale at center would gain them a place on most college teams. Sicks at guard won the admiration of critics by his cool-headed incisive playing, The team work of the Lebanon quintette was developed to a high point. Time and again the ball would be brought down the floor and passed to Porter or Dale, who caged it in spite of the most desperate efforts of the Franklin players. The work of Purdue and Goodwin, while good, did not quite reach the class of the otler three players, Goodwin, in particular, showing a tendency to "grandstand." As a whole, however, the Lebanon team must be regarded as the best High School aggregation in the state, collectively if not individually.


For Franklin, the work of Pruitt at center stood out above the rest of the team head and shoulders. Particularly was this true in the Whiting game. In the final contests he was up against a high-grade guard and was unable to score as in the preceding contest. The floor work of Hammer was fast and clever, and Cover put up a good fight at guard.

The game itself was too one-sided to be very interesting. The Lebanon team accumulated 18 points before Franklin even got a foul goal, and the fact that Whitney's team more than quadrupled the score shows that they were clearly superior all through the battle.

Constitution of the Indiana High School Athletic Association

(Revised December 23, 1911)

Administration

Section 1. A Board of Control, composed of three members (principals, members of the faculty, or superintendents) shall be elected by the Association December 29, 1903, as follows: One for one year, one for two years and one for three years, the chairman each year to be the one whose term expires at the end of that year. Thereafter each member of the Board shall be elected for three years. This election to take place at the annual meeting of the Indiana State Teachers' Association. In case of vacancy, the remaining members of the Board may appoint a person to fill the vacancy until the next annual meeting of the Association.

Sec. 2. The Board of Control shall have the following powers and duties:
(a) It shall have general control over all athletic contests between secondary schools in this Association; (b) It shall have exclusive control of the annual Interscholastic Meet; (c) It shall give interpretations of the rules of the Association; (d) It shall determine forfeitures under Sec. 11; (e) The Board of Control, at the end of any athletic season may, at its discretion, issue a statement of its official opinion as to the relative standing of teams. No school which has violated the rules of the Association in regard to the qualifications of players shall be awarded special honors in that particular branch of athletics.

Sec. 3. (a) When charges are made in writing by a member of the Association against another member for violation of rules of the Association, the Board of Control, after giving due notice of the place and time for the school so charged to be heard, shall consider such charges, and may suspend the offending school for a period of not exceeding one year. (b) The Board of Control shall decide on all protests brought before it with reference to qualifications of contestants in the Interscholastic Meet. (c) When any matter comes before the Board for decision which is of special interest to a school of which a member of the Board is a representative, the remaining members shall appoint another person to act in his place in that matter.

Sec. 4. Membership in this Association shall be limited to public high schools of the state, and each school shall have one vote. The annual dues shall be \$1.50, payable when the school becomes a member, and thereafter by December 1 of each year in advance.

Academies with commissioned high school standing shall be eligible to membership in the Association, and wherever the word "high school" appears in this constituction it shall be understood to apply equally to these academies.

- Sec. 5. The principal of the school, or high school teachers authorized by him, shall be manager or managers of the teams representing the school.
 - Sec. 6. No games shall be played without the sanction of the principal.
- Sec. 7. No game shall be played with high schools of this state not belonging to the Association.

This rule does not prevent a member of the Association from playing high school teams outside of the State, nor from playing non-high school teams within the State except as follows:

It is a violation of the constitution for schools in the Association to play non-high school teams including high school boys, unless the latter are certified as eligible by the principal of the school to which they belong.

- Sec. 8. Non-playing student officials or assistants shall conform to the same rules as the players.
- Sec. 9. The principal or his authorized representative shall accompany his team to all contests.
- Sec. 10. In all football contests held under these rules, the length of each half shall be twenty-five minutes, unless changed by mutual consent.
- Sec. 11. It is recommended that principals, in arranging for games, provide a forfeit of \$10, to be exacted should there be a failure on the part of either party to carry out the arrangements made. Should such forfeitures be stipulated and not be paid during the same season, the Board of Control after hearing both sides, shall have authority to expel the delinquent school from the Association. Notification of such expulsion shall be published in the papers, with cause therefor.
- Sec. 12. No retiring member of the Board of Control, having served three years, shall be eligible for re-election for a period of one year after date of retirement.
- Sec. 13. At the annual meeting of 1906 a permanent secretary shall be elected, who shall have charge of the property and records of the Association; shall receive all money for dues and the sale of publications of the Association; shall issue all circulars authorized by the Board of Control; shall attend meetings of the Board when requested to do so by the Board; shall turn over to the treasurer of the Board all moneys in his possession when called upon to do so; shall perform such other duties as the growth and needs of the Association as determined by the Board may require; and shall receive as compensation the sum of \$50 annually, and such allowance for expenses as the Board may approve. Vacancies in the office may be declared by the Board for cause, and a successor appointed by the Board to act until the next annual meeting.
- Sec. 14. Each school in the Association shall report to the Permanent Secretary a list of the pupils representing that school in athletic contests during

the year. Each school is asked to report also the kind of treatment accorded them to, from and on the field, while guests of another school.

Sec. 15. On and after the adoption of this amendment every newly elected member of the Board of Control shall assume the duties of his office on the first day of January, next following.

Sec. 16. The games recognized by the I. H. S. A. A. shall be: Football, Rugby Football, Soccer, Basketball, Track Work and Baseball. Further, all forms of inter-school athletic games shall be subject to the rules of the I. H. S. A. A.

Rules

Rule 1. To represent a school in any interscholastic contest, a person must be under twenty-one years of age; must have entered some public high school within the first twenty school days of the semester in which the contest occurs, and must be an amateur as defined by the A. A. U. Eighth grade pupils are not eligible. A semester is one-half of a school year.

Rule 2. Each contestant must have and be maintaining for the current semester a passing grade in each of three or more studies requiring a minimum of fifteen regular high school recitations per week exclusive of rhetoricals, physical culture, military drill and deportment; in his last preceding semester in school he must also have met the same requirements throughout the entire term.

Pupils enrolled for the first time must comply with the requirements of the rules, the average standing required for the preceding semester being obtained from the records in the last secondary school attended.

Back work may be made up, providing that it be done in accordance with the regular rules of the school and becomes a matter of final record before the opening of the next semester.

Interpretation. In each of the studies representing the minimum requirement of work specified above: (a) For the current semester the average of the monthly grades up to the time of certification must be passing; (b) for the current school month the average of the daily or weekly grades must be passing; (c) if the average of the monthly grades at the beginning of any month is below passing in any study, the pupil is ineligible so far as that study is concerned for the entire month.

Rule 3. The eligibility of all the contestants shall be certified to by the principal of the school in accordance with the rules hereby adopted. Such statements shall be presented in writing within ten days before any contest. In case of disputes the principal must furnish the Board of Control the following data in regard to each contestant: The date of last enrollment; the number of years he has been a member of a secondary school athletic team, date and place of birth; average mark in each study for the last preceding term in school; average mark in each study from the beginning of the current term or semester. A school which does not furnish this data shall be

denied championship honors, and may be excluded from the annual Interscholastic meet.

Rule 4. No pupil shall be allowed the opportunity of taking part in high school athletics for more than four school years or eight semesters, nor shall he have the opportunity of taking part in any form of athletics for more than four seasons.

A pupil withdrawing permanently from school within the first twenty school days of the semester shall not be regarded as having an opportunity to engage in athletics that semester unless he has already played in one or more Interscholastic games, in which case he shall be regarded as having engaged in athletics for that season.

Post graduates are not eligible, but pupils graduating from regular three year courses shall not be deemed post graduates.

Time spent in athletic sport by pupils while in grades below the high school shall not be counted as part of the four years.

Rule 5. No person shall enter a contest under an assumed name.

Rule 6. The principal shall have power and is advised to exclude any contestant who, because of bad habits or improper conduct, would not represent his school in a becoming manner.

Rule 7. Any member of a high school athletic team who participates in an athletic contest as a member of any other similar team the same season, shall be ineligible to compete under these rules for the remainder of that season.

An exception is hereby made for basketball and basketball players in those towns and cities whose schools have no gymnasium and whose students are forced by necessity to use a Y. M. C. A. or some other gymnasium for their practice games. It is a well known fact that the use of such gymnasium by high school students under such circumstances will likely require that such students play on the teams of the organizations maintaining such gymnasiums. No student, however, will be permitted to play on any other team than that representing the organization controling the gymnasium, and no student will be allowed to play in the teams of the latter without the knowledge and consent of his principal.

Rule 8. The number of Interscholastic football games played by any team in one season is limited to six.

Rule 9. Paid coaches, other than those regularly employed as teachers by the trustees of the school, are prohibited. By paid coach is meant any person who receives, directly or indirectly, remuneration of any kind, money, traveling expenses, gifts, etc., in return for services rendered in instructing or coaching any high school athletic team.

Rule 10. The basketball rules as published in Spalding's official basketball rule book, shall be the official rules governing all contests between members of the I. H. S. A. A. However, the rule governing the selection of officials in the above rules shall be void, and unless otherwise agreed by mutual

consent, each school shall furnish one official, and these officials shall alternate their duties, each acting as referee and each acting as umpire one half.

Rule 11. No person who has been enrolled as a student in an institution of college standing, and has done work which may be counted toward a degree in that institution shall be eligible as a member of any athletic team under I. H. S. A. A. rules in any game with any other team, either within or without the State of Indiana.

Rule 12. On and after January 1, 1910, all the major officials in all athletic contests participated in by teams connected with schools in the I. H. S. A. A. shall be regularly licensed teachers in the public schools of Indiana, or shall be persons whose names have been furnished and approved by the Board of Control. It is recommended that these officials shall be disinterested, and it is required that when a school demands disinterested officials at the time of scheduling the game, such officials shall be furnished. The Board shall drop from its list of approved officials any person who is palpably unfair and biased in his decision in games.

Rule 13. The eligibility rules of this Association shall apply to students taking part in all contests, whether with schools inside or outside the State of Indiana.

Rule 14. On and after January 1, 1911, no student shall be eligible to play football unless he has been examined by a regular physician and his physical condition has been pronounced satisfactory. Further, such student shall not be eligible until the physician's certificate has been filed with the Permanent Secretary of the Association. Said certificate shall be good from September 1 to December 1, only.

Rule 15. On and after January 1, 1911, no student shall be eligible to play football without the written consent of his father, mother or guardian. Said written consent shall be attested by the Principal or Faculty manager, and shall be filed with the Permanent Secretary of this Association. The copy of said written consent shall be attached to the physician's certificate when filed with the Permanent Secretary.

Rule 16. After December 1, 1912, members of the I. H. S. A. A. shall not be permitted to participate in any state meet or tournament except the arnual Track and Field Meet

Rule 17. During the year 1912, no member of the I. H. S. A. A. shall participate in any state meet or tournament not managed by the Board of Control.

Interpretations

First. A game is any athletic contest where an admission fee is charged or where any collection or contribution is received from spectators.

Second. The football season is defined as beginning with the opening of school and closing with November 30.

Third. No student who violates the rules of the Association will be rein stated by the Board.

Fourth. When a member or members of any team are protested, the game should be played as scheduled and the protest filed with the Board for settlement later.

Fifth. By mutual consent of both teams, pupils over the age limit may be allowed to enter the contests played under I. H. S. A. A. rules.

Sixth. Pupils under twenty-one at the time of registration in school shall be so regarded until the time of their next registration.

Seventh. A student is a post graduate of a school after he has completed the work required for graduation by that school, irrespective of the time of granting the diploma.

Eighth. A pupil who has played in one or more Interscholastic games in any season shall be regarded as having engaged in athletics for that season.

Ninth. Students finishing four years in high school at the mid-year promotion shall be eligible for basketball for the remainder of the basketball season, provided they conform to rules 1 and 2 of the constitution.

- 2. Copies of the constitution may be had of the Permanent Secretary at the rate of fifty cents per hundred, postpaid.
- 3. Printed blanks for reporting the data of all games will be sent by the Permanent Secretary on application. Reports on basketball, baseball and track athletics should be in the hands of the Secretary by June 1; football reports are due December 1.
- 4. The annual dues are payable to the Permanent Secretary on or before December 1 of each year.
- 5. Any high school in Indiana may become a member of the Association by a payment of one dollar and fifty cents to the Permanent Secretary. (See Section 4.)
- 6. All correspondence and remittance from members of the Association to the Board of Control or the Permanent Secretary must be indorsed by the principal or a member of the faculty.
- 7. The term "amateur" is defined and fully explained on pages 80 and 160 of Spalding's "Official Rules of the Amateur Athletic Union of the United States," and on page 80 of Spalding's "Official Y. M. C. A. Athletic League Handbook."
- 8. Official blank forms will be issued by the Board, which must be used in securing a physician's certificate and parents' consent to play football.
- The Board of Control for 1912 is as follows: I. E. Neff, Richmond, President; A. L. Trester, Alexandria; E. W. Montgomery, Mt. Vernon; J. T. Giles, Marion, Permanent Secretary.

Athletic Rules of the Indiana High School Athletic Association

Based on the Rules of the Intercollegiate Conference
Athletic Association.

RULE I.

Officials

Section 1. All meetings must be under the direction of

The Board of Control.

One referee.

Two or more inspectors.

Three or more field judges.

Three judges at finish.

Three or more timekeepers.

One starter.

One clerk of the course.

One scorer.

One marshal.

Sec. 2. If deemed necessary, assistants may be provided for the clerk of the course, the scorer and the marshal, and an official announcer may be appointed.

RULE II.

The Board of Control

Shall have jurisdiction of all matters not assigned by these rules to the referee or other game officials.

RULE III.

The Referee

Must decide all questions relating to the actual conduct of the Meet, whose final settlement is not otherwise covered by these rules, and shall have the power to add to or alter the announced arrangements of heats in any event. A referee has no authority, after heats have been drawn and published in a program, to transfer a contestant from one heat to another.

When in any but the final heat of a race a claim of foul or interference is made, he shall have the power to disqualify the competitor who was at fault, if he considers the foul intentional or due to culpable carelessness, and shall also have power to allow the hindered competitor to start in the next round of heats, just as if he had been placed in his trial.

When in a final heat a claim of foul or interference is made, he shall have

the power to disqualify the competitor who was at fault, if he considers the foul intentional or due to his carelessness or conduct, and he shall also have the power to order a new race between such of the competitors as he thinks entitled to such a privilege.

If during an athletic contest under the rules of the I. H. S. A. A. a competitor shall conduct himself in a manner unbecoming a gentleman or offensive to the officials, spectators or competitors, the referee shall have the power to disqualify him from further competition at the Meet; and if he thinks the offense worthy of additional punishment, must promptly make a detailed statement of the facts to the Board of Control.

Power to change the order of events as laid down in the official program is reserved to the Board of Control, which shall, through its chairman, exercise this authority, unless it sees fit to expressly delegate this power to the referee.

The referee shall not have authority to disqualify any competitor for violation of the eligibility rule of the I. H. S. A. A. All protests as to eligibility made on the field must be referred to the Board of Control, and the protested competitor must be allowed to compete until disqualified by the arbitrator of the I. H. S. A. A.

RULE IV.

The Inspectors

It shall be the duty of an inspector to stand at such point as the referee may designate, to watch the competition closely, and, in case of a claim of foul, to report to the referee what he saw of the incident. Such inspectors are merely assistants to the referee, to whom they must report, and have no power to make any decision.

RULE V.

The Judges at the Finish

Must determine the order of finishing of contestants and must arrange among themselves as to noting the winner, second, third and fourth, etc., as the case may require, and there must always be two judges, whose duty must be to choose the winner.

Their decision in this respect must be without appeal, and, in case of a disagreement a majority must govern.

RULE VI.

The Field Judges

Must make an accurate measurement and keep a tally of all trials of competitors in the high and broad jumps, the pole vaults, the weight competitions, and the discus throws.

They must act as judges in these events, and their decisions must like-

wise be without appeal. In case of disagreement, a majority must govern. There must be at least three judges for every event.

RULE VII.

The Timekeepers

Must be three in number, and must individually time all events where time record is called for. At the conclusion of each heat, each timekeeper must present his watch to the referee for inspection, and he must decide the official time. Should two of the three watches mark the same time and the third disagree, the time marked by said two watches must be accepted. Should all three disagree, the time marked by the intermediate watch must be accepted.

The flash of the pistol must denote the actual time of starting.

If, for any reason, only two watches are held on an event, and they fail to agree, the longer time of the two must be accepted.

RULE VIII.

The Starter

Must have sole jurisdiction over the competitors after the clerk of the course has properly placed them in their positions for the start.

The method of starting must be by pistol report, except that in time handicap races the word "go" must be used.

An actual start is not effected until the pistol has been purposely discharged after the competitors have been warned to get ready.

In case the pistol was not purposely discharged, the competitors shall be called back by the starter by pistol fire.

Note.—The starter must have at least two good cartridges in his pistol before starting a heat.

When any part of the person of a competitor touches the ground in front of his mark before the signal is given, it must be considered a false start.

Penalties for false starting must be inflicted by the starter, as follows: In all races to and including 125 yards, the competitor must be put back one yard for the first and another yard for the second attempt; in races over 125 yards and including 300 yards, two yards for the first and two more for the second attempt; in races over 300 yards and including 600 yards, three yards for the first and three more for the second attempt; in races over 600 yards and including 1,000 yards, four yards for the first and four more for the second attempt; in races over 1,000 yards and including one mile, five yards for the first and five more for the second attempt; in all races over one mile, ten yards for the first attempt and ten more for the second attempt.

In all cases, the third false start must prevent his competing in that event. The starter must rule out of that event any competitor who attempts to advance himself from his mark, as prescribed in the official program, after he has been given the warning to "get ready."

RULE IX.

The Clerk of Course

Must be provided with the names and the numbers of all entered competitors, and he must notify them to appear at the starting line before the start in each event in which they are entered.

RULE X.

The Scorer

Must record the order in which each competitor finishes his event, together with the time furnished by the referee.

He must keep a tally of the laps made by each competitor in races covering more than one lap, and must announce, by means of a bell or otherwise, when the leading man enters the last lap.

He must draw up a list of the actual competitors in each event, which shall be filed with the papers of the Association, and shall be the official record of competing entrants, and shall be final evidence in the enforcement of Rule III, of the rules of eligibility.

He must control his assistants and assign to them such of his duties as he may deem proper.

RULE XI.

The Marshal

Must have police charge of the enclosure, and must prevent any but officials and actual competitors from entering or remaining therein.

He must control his assistants and assign to them their duties.

RULE XII.

The Official Announcer

Must receive from the scorer and field judges the result of each event, and announce the same by voice or by means of a bulletin board.

RULE XIII.

Competitors

Must report to the clerk of the course immediately upon their arrival at the place of meeting, and must be provided by that official with their proper numbers, which must be worn conspicuously by the competitors when competing, and without which they must not be allowed to start.

Each competitor must inform himself of the time of starting, and must be promptly at the starting point of each competition in which he is entered, and there report to the clerk of the course.

Under no condition shall attendants be allowed to accompany competitors at the start or during any competition.

RULE XIV.

Track Measurement

All distances run or walked must be measured upon a line eighteen inches outward from the inner edge of the track, except that in races on straightaway tracks the distance must be measured in a direct line from the starting mark to the finishing line.

RULE XV.

The Course

Each competitor must keep in his respective position from start to finish in all races on straightaway tracks, and in all races on tracks with one or more turns he must not cross to the inner edge of the track, except when he is at least six feet in advance of his nearest competitor. After turning the last corner into the straight in any race, each competitor must run a straight course to the finish line, and must not cross to either the outside or inside from such straight course in front of his opponents.

In all races of the I. H. S. A. A. up to and including 220 yards, each competitor must have a separate course marked out and measured, whether races are run straightaway or with turns.

The referee must disqualify from that event any competitor who willfully pushes against, impedes, crosses the course of, or in any way interferes with another competitor.

The referee must disqualify from further participation in the Meet any contestant competing to lose, to coach, or in any way impede the chances of another competitor, either in a trial or a final contest.

RULE XVI.

The Finish

Of the course must be represented by a line between two finishing posts, drawn across and at right angles to the sides of the track, and four feet above which line must be stretched a tape, attached at either end to the finishing posts. A finish must be counted when any part of the winner's body, except his hands or arms, touches the tape at the finishing line. The tape must be considered the finishing line for the winners, but their order of finishing across the track line must determine the position of the other competitors.

RULE XVII.


Hurdles

In the 120 yards hurdle race, ten hurdles must be used, each hurdle to be three feet six inches high. They must be placed ten yards apart, with the

first hurdle fifteen yards distant from the starting point, and the last hurdle fifteen yards before the finishing line.

In the 220 yards hurdle race, ten hurdles must be used, each hurdle to be two feet six inches high. They must be placed twenty yards apart, with the first hurdle twenty yards distant from the starting mark, and the last hurdle twenty yards before the finishing line.

In making a record, it must be necessary for the competitor to jump every hurdle in its proper position.

In all hurdle races of the I. H. S. A. A. up to and including 220 yards, each competitor must have separate hurdles and a separate course marked out and measured, whether races are run straight away or with turns.

A competitor knocking down three or more hurdles, or any portion of three or more hurdles, in any race shall be disqualified.

RULE XVIII.

Jumping

Section 1. A fair jump must be one that is made without the assistance of weights, diving, somersaults, or handsprings of any kind.

In scratch events competitors must jump in order as placed on the program.

Sec. 2. The running high jump. The field judges must decide the height at which the jump shall commence, and must regulate the succeeding elevations.

Each competitor must be allowed three trial jumps at each height, and if on the third trial he shall fail, he must be declared out of the competition.

Competitors must jump in order, as provided in Sec. 1; then those failing, if any, must have their second trial jump in a like order, after which those who have failed twice must make their third trial jump.

The jump must be made over a bar resting on pins projecting not more than three inches from the uprights, and when this bar is removed from its place by the competitor when trying, it must be counted as a trial jump.

Running under the bar in making an attempt to jump must be counted as a "balk," and three successive "balks" must be counted as a trial jump.

The distance of the run before the jump must be unlimited. A competitor may decline to jump at any height in his turn, and by so doing forfeits his rights to again jump at the height declined.

Sec. 4. The running broad jump. When jumped on earth, a joist five inches wide must be sunk flush with it. The outer edges of this joist must be called the scratch line, and the measurement of all jumps must be made from it, at right angles, to the nearest break in the ground made by any part of the person of the competitor.

In front of the scratch line the ground must be removed to the depth of three and the width of twelve inches outward.

A foul jump must be one where the competitor, in jumping off the scratch

A board similar to the one in front may be used at the back of the circle. The order of competing and the number of trials shall be the same as for the running broad jump. Shots must be furnished by the managing committee. Any contestant may use his own private shot, if correct in weight and shape; in which case the other contestants must also be allowed to use it if they wish.

RULE XX.

Throwing the Discus

The discuss shall be made of smooth hardwood body, without finger holes, weighted in center with lead discs and capped with polished brass discs, with steel ring on the outside. The weight of the discuss shall be four and one-half pounds; outside diameter, eight inches; thickness in center, two inches.

All throws shall be made from a seven-foot circle, with four-foot lapboards, and similar in all respects to the circle for putting the shot. In making his throws, a competitor may assume any position he chooses. Foul throws and letting go of the discus in attempts shall count as trials without result. A fair throw shall be one in which no part of the person of the competitor touches the ground outside the front half of the circle, and the competitor leaving the circle by its rear half. A throw shall be foul if any part of the person touches the ground outside of the front half of the circle before the throw is measured.

The order of competing and number of trials shall be the same as for the running broad jump.

A discuss shall be furnished by the managing committee.

RULE XXI.

Ties

In case of a tie in any event, the points shall be divided and the place awarded by lot.

RULE XXII.

Relay Racing

- 1. A line must be drawn twenty feet in front of each starting line. Between these two lines each runner must touch the succeeding runner. Failure to do this disqualifies the team in that event. The judges must see that all touches are properly made.
- 2. The same rules with reference to fouls, coaching or impeding a runner in any way; apply to relay racing as to other events.
- 3. No member of a relay team can run back of the line, nor can one man run two relays in any team-
 - 4. The positions of the team must be drawn for.

Minutes of the Meetings of the Board of Control

Dec. 1, I911, to Dec. 1, 1912

Minutes of the Annual Meeting of the I. H. S. A. A., Room 12, State House, Indianapolis, Dec. 27, 1911.

The Meeting was called to order by President E. E. Ramsey. The minutes of the last annual meeting of the Association were read and approved. The report of the treasurer, A. L. Trester, was read and approved.

On motion, duly supported, the membership fee of the Association was re-

duced from \$2.00 to \$1.50, beginning December 1, 1912.

The Association then proceeded to the election of a member of the Board of Control to succeed E. E. Ramsey, whose term of office expires January I, 1912. Prin. E. W. Montgomery, of Mt. Vernon, having received a majority of the votes cast on the fourth ballot, was declared elected.

Rule 4 amended:—A motion was carried to amend Rule 4 of the Constitution by re-inserting the word "opportunity" as follows:

Rule 4. No pupil shall be allowed the opportunity of taking part in high school athletics for more than four school years or eight semesters, nor shall he have the opportunity of taking part in any form of athletics for more than four seasons.

A pupil withdrawing permanently from school within the first twenty school days of the semester shall not be regarded as having an opportunity to engage in athletics that semester unless he has already played in one or more interscholastic games, in which case he shall be regarded as having engaged in athletics for that season.

The following rule of the Board of Control was endorsed by the Association:—Students finishing four years in High school at the mid-year promotion shall be eligible for basketball for the remainder of the basketball season, provided they conform to rules 1 and 2 of the Constitution.

State Meets and Tournaments: The following amendments to the Constitution were then adopted.

After December 1, 1912, members of the I. H. S. A. A. shall not be permitted to participate in any state meet or tournament except the Annual Track and Field Meet.

During the year 1912, no member of the I. H. S. A. A. shall participate in any state meet or tournament not managed by the Board of Control.

A motion was carried to reaffirm Rules 14 and 15 of the Constitution.

There being no further business, the meeting was duly adjourned.

Minutes of Board of Control Meeting

The Board of Control of the I. H. S. A. A. met in called session at the Claypool Hotel, Indianapolis, Dec. 27, 1911, all members present.

A representative of the Wingate High School appeared before the Board, asking for a reconsideration of the case of Forest Crane, a pupil of the Wingate High School, who was declared ineligible by the Board. After due deliberation, the Board declined to take further action in the matter.

Warren vs. Petroleum:—The Warren High School protested a game of basketball between the above schools at Petroleum, Nov. 17, 1911, on the ground that the floor was not as represented in the contract, and that a different official was substituted for the one named in the contract. After a full consideration of the evidence submitted by both sides, the protest was sustained and the game was forfeited to Warren; score 1-0.

There being no further business the Board adjourned.

I. H. S. A. A. Notice-January 8, 1912

At the last annual meeting of the Association, Rule 4 of the Constitution was amended by inserting the word "opportunity," as follows:

Rule 4. No pupil shall be allowed the opportunity of taking part in high school athletics for more than four school years or eight semesters, nor shall he have the opportunity of taking part in any form of athletics for more than four seasons.

A pupil withdrawing permanently from school within the first twenty school days of the semester shall not be regarded as having an opportunity to engage in athletics that semester unless he has already played in one or more interscholastic games, in which case he shall be regarded as having engaged in athletics for that season.

Owing to the fact that all basketball teams were organized under the old rule, the sudden taking effect of this rule is working a hardship on some teams. For this reason the Board rules that the above amendment to the Constitution shall not be effective until Feb. 1, 1912.

Minutes of Board of Control Meeting

Board of Control met at the Claypool Hotel, Indianapolis, Feb. 3, 1912. The Board proceeded to reorganize for the year, with Prin. I. E. Neff as President and the election of E. W. Montgomery as Treasurer.

On recommendation of the prosecuting school, Forest Crane of Wingate was reinstated under I. H. S. A. A. rules.

Mr. Demming of Franklin, Indiana, appeared before the Board and extended an invitation to hold the State Basketball Tournament in Franklin, as the guest of Franklin College and the Franklin High School.

Bicknell vs. Marco:—Representatives of these two high schools appeared before the Board, asking for a decision on a disagreement between the two schools concerning an alleged violation of contract.

Decision: It is the opinion of the Board that the management of each of the teams is equally at fault, and that the dispute has arisen from the loose management of the teams in both schools. No award is made to either school, and the Principals are advised to observe more closely the rules of the Association hereafter, and to contract more definitely in writing for all games.

Covington vs. Williamsport:—Covington protested a basketball game with Williamsport, claiming an erroneous decision of the officials. The protest was not sustained. The Board decided that the game was won by Williamsport by a score of 16 to 15.

Andrews vs. Chester:—Andrews High School protested a basketball game with Chester, charging a violation of contract. Decision: The charges were not sustained and the protest was dismissed.

Lagro vs. Warren:—Charge was made of violation of verbal contract to play a game of basketball. Owing to conflicting statements concerning an alleged verbal contract, the Board was unable to make any award in the case.

Basketball Ruling: - Owing to the fact that some congressional districts, although containing more than four members of the Association, have not that many schools supporting basketball teams, the Board has found it necessary to revise its previous ruling concerning the number of games played in the district to read as follows: The championship of each congressional district will be determined by the Board on the basis of games played in the district. A school to be considered for championship honors must have played at least four other schools in the district, provided the district contains that many members of the Association aspiring for championship honors. Principals are warned to hold their teams in readiness to play an additional game during the first week in March, to decide the district championship, provided the data furnished is not sufficient to warrant the Board in making a decision as to the winning team in any district. Note that the report of all games played must be in the hands of the Permanent Secretary by Friday, March 1, in order to receive consideration. These reports should be made on the official blank, which will be furnished on application to the Permanent Secretary.

There being no further business, the Board adjourned, to meet in Indianapolis, Saturday morning, March 2, 1912.

Minutes of Board of Control Meeting

The Board of Control met in called session at the Claypool Hotel, Nov. 9, 1912. All members of the Board were present.

A contract was awarded to the Art Printing Company of Alexandria, Indiana, to print 2,100 copies of the forthcoming Handbook, at a cost of \$2.00

per page, their bid being the lowest and best.

Royal Center High School entered a protest against the Star City High School concerning a baseball game at Star City, Saturday, October 5th. The protest grew out of a disagreement between the score-keepers as to the correctness of the score. After a consideration of all the evidence presented, because of a lack of evidence to sustain the protest, the case was dismissed.

The Rensselaer High School protested a game of football between the Rensselaer and Morocco High Schools on Saturday, Nov. 2nd, on the ground that the referee had made a wrong decision. In this case the Board decided that the referee is final authority in all matters over which he has jurisdic-

tion in the game and that, thererefore, his decision in this game should be sustained.

The Batesville High school asked for an interpretation of the basketball rule on dribbling. The Board referred this inquiry to Section 13, Rule XI, of Spalding's Official Basketball Guide for 1910–11.

Bloomfield High School entered a protest against the Worthington High School for playing Frank Taylor, an ineligible pupil of the Worthington High School. Worthington submitted evidence showing that Frank Taylor entered the Worthington High school in his freshman year, during the second month of school. He, therefore, had no opportunity of engaging in athletics during his first semester in school, and for this reason is eligible during the present semester, which is his ninth semester in school. The protest against Worthington, therefore, was not sustained.

A dispute between the Linton and Jasonville High Schools concerning an interpretation of the football rules, was referred by the two schools and the official in charge to the Board of Control for a decision. The question was concerning the legality of a play after both teams had been called off side by the official. The Board decided that a play made under such conditions was illegal.

The Permanent Secretary was instructed to print a list of officials recommended by the members of the Association.

There being no further business, the Board adjourned.


