





## To the Indiana High School Athletic Association

For eleven years the I. H. S. A. A. has been striving to improve all branches of High School athletics. That it has succeeded no one who knew the conditions before the Association was organized will question. Just how well it has succeeded, can be told in a few words. Professionalism has been eliminated, more competent officials have been secured. Unnecessary roughness and "slugging" are no longer tolerated. Foot ball has been put under the ban. A greater number of students take part in the games. A better feeling has been engendered among the different schools. In fact, it has standardized High School athletics to the extent that very few if any objections can be offered.

The present year perhaps has been the most successful in the history of the Association. It has been free from any serious accidents among the contestants. A greater number of schools have become members of the Association than of any previous year. There have been but few cases of litigation, none of a serious nature, and all could have been avoided if the rules of the Association had been followed by all parties concerned. Not a little has been written in the past relative to student management, which seems to cause the majority of the disputes. Perhaps a word of advice here will not be out of place. All arrangements for games should be made by the faculty manager. As soon as games are scheduled, contracts should be signed, so there can be no misunderstanding between the contending schools.

Very few schools are playing foot ball. Soccer, base ball and out-door basket ball are taking its place.

Inter-school base ball has not proven a financial success, but it is very popular and bids fair to become the chief game to be played between teams in the same school.

Both the Track Meet, held under the auspices of Earlham College, and the Basket Ball Tournament, under the auspices of Indiana University, were very successful. Much credit is due both schools for their loyal support and courteous treatment. The local management of each school did all in their power to make both Track Meet and Tournament a success. The Noblesville High School won the Track Meet.

Special mention should be made of the Basket Ball Tournament, which was held at Bloomington. Invitations were extended to all High Schools of the state belonging to the Association. As a result more than thirty schools responded. The schedule was so arranged that no team would have to play more than three games in any one day. With six teams playing at one time all the games were played, without a hitch, as originally planned. The plan of permitting any Association team to participate in the Tournament eliminated many of the objectionable features of Tournaments held heretofore. The final game was won by Wingate High School.

It seems that athletics is a necessary adjunct to all good High Schools. If this assumption be true, athletics should be placed on the highest possible plane. A high standard cannot be brought about by a few schools, but all who are interested must stand together for clean athletics.



## Second Annual Basket Ball Tournament Announcement

In accordance with the vote of the Association at its annual meeting, Dec. 26, the Board of Control has made provision for a Championship Basket Ball Tournament, and announces the plan.

**Invitation**—An invitation from the University of Indiana to hold the tournament at Bloomington, under the auspices of the University, Friday and Saturday, March 14 and 15, was accepted. Entries for the tournament will close Wednesday, March 5, and all schools desiring to participate in the contest must hold membership in the Association before that date.

Open Contest—The tournament is open to all schools of the Association, irrespective of their season's record.

Entertainment—Teams are limited to seven men, and no more men should be certified to. The societies of the University agree to entertain eight men—which must include the faculty manager—from each competing school. Entertainment is offered from 6 p. m. March 13, to 8 a. m. March 16.

Expenses—Traveling is at the expense of the competing schools. An entrance fee of \$3.50 for each team must accompany the entry lists, the full amount returnable to the principal whose team actually participates in the Meet.

**Protests**—All protests against members of the Association or against individuals in the teams must be made in writing and filed with the Permanent Secretary on or before March 8 at 11 a. m.

**Privileges**—All competing teams and faculty managers are admitted to all games free of charge, including the Indiana-Purdue game on Saturday evening, for which the final game of the series is a curtain-raiser.

Eligibility—The eligibility of each player must be certified to by the principal of the school sending the team. Certificates must be on the regular blank provided by the Permanent Secretary, and all data must be given as indicated.

**Prizes**—Indiana University will award the winning school a shield or similar trophy, and each member of its team an individual trophy.

Management—The management of the tournament rests solely with the Board of Control, which may delegate local arrangements to the University managers. The officials will be selected by the Board, and none but disinterested men will be chosen.

A schedule indicating teams, hours, floors and officials, will be arranged by the Board Saturday, March 8, and all competing schools will be furnished with detail instruction early in the tournament week.

### Entries will close Wednesday, March 5.

After a heroic struggle which went overtime, WINGATE won the Third Annual Basket Ball Tournament by defeating South Bend to the tune of 15 to 14. The long, lean athletes from Montgomery County went through one of the fiercest struggles ever seen here and gathered the honors on sheer pluck.

Although outclassed in teamwork, the husky Wingate quintet fought hard until the final whistle blew. They do not have the finish and smoothness of the South Bend team but depend mostly on strength and aggressiveness. Stonebraker, the big center, was in the game for blood and was responsible for a large number of the scores made by this team. Crane, the speedy forward, was of much assistance to Stonebraker and caged two pretty field goals. Considering the fact that the Wingate players have not the advantages of a good floor and daily practice they made an excellent showing. Wingate is a small town and there is no basketball court at the high school building, making it necessary for them to travel seven miles one night each week to a neighboring hall for practice. The other practices are held outdoors when the weather permits. In the game with Lafayette, Wingate surprised the other contestants, as the boys from the Purdue town were picked to win with ease.

#### SOUTH BEND-WINGATE

The first half opened with a great burst of spectacular playing on each side. The excitement was terrific and the players were evidently nervous. Spectators encroached on the floor on all sides.

Wingate scored first. Referee Guedel called a foul on the South Benders and Stonebreaker shot the penalty. Encouraged in this way Wingate tried

several field goals almost immediately afterward but the aim was poor. South Bend shot into the lead after five minutes of playing when Kirby heaved a pretty basket from the floor. Brug followed with another field goal. The Wingate center then shot a field goal and the half ended with the score 4 to 3.

The tournament just ended was one of the largest and most successful affairs ever staged at Indiana University. For the past few days the town has been filled with students from all over the State, either as participants in the basket ball games or as visitors. Nothing was overlooked or left undone which would in any way add to the success of the event. According to the referees it was one of the cleanest series of games they have ever officiated in, and all of the games went off without a hitch. No kicks were registered and the best of sportsmanship prevailed.

After the final contest in which the championship was given to Wingate Robert S. Payton, President of the Booster's Club, in presenting the trophies to the team said:

"The Constitution of the State of Indiana set forth the idea that the State University should be the foster mother of our public school system. Therefore it is proper and altogether fitting that the University should aid the development of the physical side as well as the mental side of our high school students.

We had with us this week-end high schools representing every section of the State from Centerville and Decatur on the east to Sullivan and Rockville on the west; from Gary and South Bend on the north to Vincennes and Orleans on the south.

The faculty and student body of Indiana University and the good citizens of Bloomington have welcomed all of you with open arms. From you they ask nothing. They only hope that in your sojourn here at the University you have become imbued with the spirit that so fills the student body and alumni of Indiana.

Men and women this institution is as much yours as ours. It is your money that the last legislature has so generously given us. Do not forget after you leave this place so dear to those who now frequent it and those who have frequented it in the past, that it is a place to which you are always welcome. Always bear in mind wherever you go and whatever you do that this Institution has an interest in you and your welfare.

The Boosters' Club wishes to thank the Board of Control of the Indiana High School Athletic Association; particularly professors I. E. Neff, of Richmond; E. W. Montgomery, of Mount Vernon; A. L. Trester, of Alexandria, and C. V. Haworth, of Kokomo. I want to say that the high schools of Indiana owe to these men a duty of support for the privilege of competing in this Tournament. The Boosters' Club wishes to thank the fraternities and clubs for the entertainment which they have provided the visitors of

the University. The Boosters' Club wishes to thank the faculty of the University for the recess granted the student body yesterday thus making it possible for them to become better acquainted with our visitors from over the state.

You boys on your respective teams have battled and fought hard. You have done all that boys can do. You have been spurred on by that zeal which ever prompts boys to attain that which is the highest. Whether you have won or have lost you have fought and done credit to yourselves and credit to those back home.

Now to you, members of the Wingate school team, you have attained the honor which you have just won by your manly playing and by defeating men just as manly. You have met and defeated skillful opponents and because of this I wish to present to each of you on behalf of the Boosters Club of Indiana University a medal which you justly merit and a cup for the high school which you have so nobly defended."

An editorial in the same issue on "Playing The Game" is very complimentary to High School students:

"The students of the University have had a rare treat yesterday and today in the basket ball games. Throughout the series every team has been a credit to its school. They have, without exception, displayed splendid spirit, both in victory and defeat. The games were well played, and many of them were exhibitions of much skill. The winner of the championship is to be congratulated. They won it fairly and squarely, and their right of possession is uncontested by those who witnessed the events.

It was an interesting sight to watch the High School boys when their team was losing. They did not let up for a minute; their enthusiasm was only increased and their trust in the goals that were yet to be won was unshaken. It did not matter a great deal to them if their team did not win the trophies. They knew what the team could do and they would not have their faith shaken by one mere defeat. Their loyalty was made of sterner stuff.

Their attitude was all the more clearly brought out when contrasted with that of some men who claim to be educated; who claim the right to belong to the great fraternity of college students; they do not know how to endure defeat. Even when a mere personal defeat, justly deserved, is administered they forget that they are gentlemen, and that as gentlemen there are certain broad rules of conduct that they are bound to recognize and obey. These men have a lesson to learn, and they would do well to follow the practice of the High School students. But there are and always will be such men with us, and the sooner society ignores their snarls and whines the better it will be for all concerned. It is only natural for a person to be

happy when he wins, but to show consideration for others when he is losing is the task of a gentleman. It requires a broadness of vision that unfortunately some of us do not possess."

The Board of Control arranged the floors and teams by lot and the following information was distributed among those attending the Tourney. The schedule was carried out exactly as arranged and printed:

Of the Indiana High School Athletic Association, University of Indiana, Bloomington, March 14 and 15, 1913

Teams must be on designated floors as scheduled, under penalty of forfeiture for delay of same.

Each team of seven men must be accompanied by a faculty manager, who shall be responsible for his team to the entertaining society and to the management.

Eight complimentary tickets will be issued to each team, admitting to all sessions, including the Indiana-Purdue game, Saturday evening at 8.

Season tickets for 50 cents for the entire series in the High School Tournament have been issued. Single admission to each session will be 25 cents.

Visitors desiring to attend the Indiana-Purdue game should apply by mail for reservation to U. H. Smith, in the Bursar's office at the University, before 9 o'clock Friday morning. Single admission 50 cents.

The faculty managers of all teams are urged to notify R. S. Payton on which trains the teams will arrive in Bloomington.

Entertainment is provided for teams, including faculty manager, from 7 p. m. Thursday, to Sunday 9 a. m.

## Tenth Annual Track and Field Meet Announcement

The Tenth Annual Track and Field Meet of the Indiana High School Athletic Association will be held at Earlham College, Richmond, May 17, 1913, in the afternoon. Entries for the Meet will close May 7, and all schools desiring to participate in the Meet must become members of the association before that time

#### ELIGIBILITY

Every contestant in this Meet must have previously made in a fair test a record equal to the following in every event in which he is entered:

100 Yard Dash	11 s.
220 Yard Dash	
440 Yard Dash	58 s.
Half Mile Run	2 m. 20 s.
Mile Run	5 m. 15 s.
120 Yard High Hurdles	19 s.
220 Yard Low Hurdles	
Running High Jump	
Running Broad Jump	19 ft.
Pole Vault	8 ft. 9 in.
Putting Shot (12 lb.)	36 ft.
Throwing Discus	90 ft.

The above, together with a mile relay, will constitute the events of the Meet. Winning first place in any event counts five points; second place, three points; and third place, one point. Points in the relay will not be counted in determining the winning team.

The order of events is as follows:

Track Events—100-yard dash trial; 120-yard hurdle trial; 100yard dash final; one mile run; 440-yard run; 120-yard hurdle final; 220-yard dash trial; 220-yard hurdle trial; 880-yard run; 220-yard dash final; 220-yard hurdle final; relay.

Field Events—Discus; running high jump; shot put; pole vault; running broad jump.

#### RECENT BOARD RULINGS

- The hammer throw shall hereafter be excluded from the events of the State Field Meet, and the Board recommends that it be excluded from local meets.
- 2. In case of a tie in any event the points shall be divided and the place awarded by lot.

#### ENTRIES

The entries in each event are limited to three, and the contestants in each to two from any school; except in the relay race, in which entries will be limited to six, and the number placed in competition to four, each running one-fourth mile.

All schools, in order to enter the contests of the State Meet, will be required to certify that all athletic contests in which they have taken part since becoming members of the Association have been conducted in accordance with the rules of the Indiana High School Athletic Association, and that all their contestants in such contests have been qualified according to rules.

Principals will be required to certify in writing that the contestants from their respective schools have all qualified in every event in which they are entered in the State Meet. Each Principal must fill out entry blanks with the names of the contestants from his school, and all required data, and send to A. L. Trester, Permanent Secretary, on or before May 7, 1913. These requirements must be strictly complied with. Special blanks for this purpose will be furnished to all members of the Association.

#### PROTESTS

All protests and complaints against members of the Association for violation of the rules must be made in writing and filed with the Permanent Secretary on or before May 7. Protests as to the eligibility of individual contestants under the constitution are to be decided by the Board of Control, and may be filed with the Secretary at any time.

#### MANAGEMENT

The management of this Meet rests solely with the Board of Control. The selection of officials to be approved by the Board, has been delegated to the Athletic management of Earlham College. The referee and starter are to be chosen from A. A. U. in order that records made at the Meet may be recognized by that body. The Board will arrange a program, assigning places on the track by lot, and the printed program will indicate the order in which the men will be called upon the track. The rules governing the Meet correspond to those of the Western Inter-Collegiate Amateur Athletic Association, except where these have been modified by the Board of Con-

## Report of the Meet

The Tenth Annual Track and Field Meet held under the auspices of the L.H.S. A. A. was the largest yet held in the history of the Association in the number of schools participating and the number of contestants entering. There were 39 schools represented and 197 entries. Twenty-two schools shared in the point-getting. This made the Meet a very interesting one and kept the enthusiasm at high pitch until the last event was decided. Earlham College is to be congratulated on the management of the Meet and the entertainment shown to visitors.

The Earlham Press gave the following accurate account of the Meet:

## NOBLESVILLE HIGH SCHOOL WINS HONORS IN STATE MEET

Walton Secures Meet by Three Firsts—Two Hundred Athletes Make Great Showing in Events Hotly Contested. Six Heats Required in Dashes.

Crawfordsville Takes Relay and Fairmount Breaks Shot Put Record Four Inches.

Upon a fast track and in the best of weather, the Tenth Annual Track and Field Meet of the Indiana High School Athletic Association on Reid Field this afternoon was won by Noblesville High School by the narrow margin of two points over Fairmount Academy, which took second with 14½ points, and Manual Training High School, which took third with 12 points. The relay race was won in the fast time of three minutes and 43 seconds by Crawfordsville High School.

#### TIE IN POLE VAULT

Gaddis, of Fairmount Academy, and Cook, of Boswell, tied for first in the pole vault, at ten feet. Both men showed good form, but were unable to approach the record mark. The little man from Boswell looked like a sure winner early in the event, but was unable to go beyond the husky Fairmount man. Mittank, of Fairmount Academy and Dixon. of Linton, tied for third place.

#### SHOT RECORD BROKEN

In the shot put, Morrison, of Fairmount Academy, broke the state record of 43 feet, 9½ inches by 4½ inches, putting the ball 44 feet 2 inches. He

easily outclassed his competitors. Haworth, of Amo, took second place and Roney, of Fairmount High School, took third. The record was held by Kern, of Salem.

#### CRAWFORDSVILLE WINS RELAY

Crawfordsville won the relay from Evansville by inches. The Crawfordsville team led the entire race, Jones taking a lead of twenty yards and holding it until the last lap. Evansville ran second the last two laps, but Lindsay could not overcome the lead of the Crawfordsville man.

#### 880-YARD RUN

In the half mile run, Milholland, of M. T. H. S., led the bunch of twenty runners up to the last 100 yards, when Sheets, of Frankfort, passed him, winning first place. Milholland came in third, Kelly, of South Bend, beating him out for second honors at the finish. The race was close from start to finish, the runners sparring for every inch of ground gained and all finishing within a few yards of the winners. The time of 2:09 was only two seconds under the state record.

#### MC'ALVEY WINS LOW HURDLES

The low hurdles were run in two heats and a final. In the first heat McAlvey, of Crawfordsville, came in first, with Clover, of Noblesville, a close second. In the second heat Brug, of South Bend, easily outstripped all his competitors, making the race in 28 2-5 seconds. Richter, of Plymouth, and L. Armstrong, of Westfield, were tied for second place in this heat.

The final was an excellent race, South Bend was eager for more points and Noblesville, not coming up to expectations, was working hard for points.

In the finals, McAlvey, of Crawfordsville, took first place in 28 seconds flat, in a very exciting race. Brug, of South Bend, took second and Richter, of Plymouth, third.

#### 100-YARD DASH EASY

In one of the prettiest races of the meet, Walton, of Noblesville, beat out Cornelius, of M. T. H. S., by a few feet in the 100 yard dash. All of the heats were close, Walton, of Noblesville, taking the first in easy style, and Cornelius winning his heat in faster time than Walton. Both took easy firsts in the semi finals. The Training School lad ran a faster race than Walton to win his event, but the sprinter from Noblesville lowered the time in the final, winning in 10 3-5 seconds. Cornelius was right behind him at the tape and deserves praise for his work. Lindsey, of Evansville, took a go d third in the event. In the heats Walton, Winter of Manual, Roach of Linton and Cordier, of South Bend, each won their races in 11 seconds flat.

#### WALTON REPEATS TRICK

Easily repeating his trick of the 100 yard dash, Walton, of Noblesville, ran away from his contestants and without any great effort, annexed first place for Noblesville in the 220 yard dash, making the sprint in the fast time of 24 flat, with Armstrong, of Westfield, second.

The race was run in three heats, the first going to Cordier, of South Bend, in 24 4-5, the second to Roach, of Linton, who made the best time of 24 3-5 seconds in the preliminary heats. Walton took his heat in 24 4-5. All of the heats were close, the seconds and thirds finishing in blanket bunches. The time of the final was only one second slower than the record held by Blair, of Hammond. By taking the event, Walton repeated his feat of last year of taking first place in both the dashes.

#### MONAHAN TAKES HIGH

Jumping against a small field, Monahan, of Fairmount, took the high jump at 5 feet 6 inches. The lanky man from Grant county, cleared every height on his first trial. He took his three trials at the state record of 5 feet 9½ inches, but failed by a fraction of an inch. Coffman, of M. T. H. S. took second with Wishard, of Greenwood, and H. Cottingham, of Noblesville, tying for the third place.

#### MANUAL WINS MILE

Brown, of M. T. H. S., took the mile in easy fashion with Good, of New Augusta, second. Clement, of M. T. H. S., led the first two laps, but his team-mate took the lead just before the start of the last lap and was never headed. Congdon, of Elkhart, was a close third and was pushed hard by Dages, of Muncie. The time of 4:48 4-5 was faster than most college races.

#### SIMS SCORES A FIRST

The 440 yard dash, run in two heats was won on time, by D. Sims, of Bloomfield, in the last 100 yards of the first heat, Grimes of Crawfordsville, leading up to that time. Sims showed good head work, laying back and depending on his ability to make a strong sprint to win the race. Espy of of M. T. H. S., led in the second heat, but was passed near the close of the race by Lindsey, of Evansville, who did the same trick that Sims had pulled off. His time was under the 54 2-5 of Sims, and he was given second place H. Cottingham, of Noblesville, taking third.

#### HURDLES TO ANDERSON

Although by no means approaching the state record of 16 1-5 seconds in the low hurdles, the race was a pretty one, there being so many evenly contesting candidates. The first heat was won in 19 1-5 by Vermillion, of Anderson, Brug, of South Bend, having been disqualified for knocking over

three hurdles. L. Armstrong, of Westfield, ran a fine race in 172-5 in the second heat, with Thomas, of Seymour, a close second.

In the finals L. Armstrong, of Westfield, and Thomas, of Seymour, were disqualified, and Vermillion, of Anderson, took first in 17 2-5 seconds. Hoskins, of Carmel was second.

#### DISCUS GOES TO GADDIS

Gaddis, of Fairmount Academy, threw the discus 107 feet, the State record being 117 ft. 6 in. It was thought the distance would have been greater, but Gaddis was not pushed. Vater, of Whiting, took second and Wisehart, of Crawfordsville, third. Gaddis showed good form and made easy throws in every trial.

#### ARTICLES OF CONTRACT

The following Articles of Agreement are subscribed to by the Indiana High School Athletic Association Board of Control through A. L. Trester, Permanent Secretary, and Glenn Thistlethwaite, representing Earlham College.

#### SECTION I

The date of the Indiana High School Track and Field Meet shall be Saturday P. M., May 17, 1913, at Richmond, Ind., on the Earlham College track and field.

#### SECTION II

The High School Board of Control through A. L. Trester, Permanent Secretary, shall furnish Glenn Thistlethwaite with lists of qualified teams, and the names of the men on the respective teams, on or before Monday, May 12, 1913.

#### SECTION III

Earlham College shall provide free entertainment for the respective teams, including one rubber and one Faculty manager for each team, between the hours of 6 P. M. Friday, May 16, and 9 A. M. Sunday, May 18.

#### SECTION IV

The Earlham College representative shall provide tickets, gate-men, announcers, scorers, time-keepers, judges, and all necessary equipment for the Meet. He shall further provide a suitable cup for the school winning the Meet, and a pennant for the winning relay team, and badges for point winners.

#### SECTION V

The matter of complimentary tickets shall be in the hands of the College representative, who shall issue them to the representatives of the Press, the College officials, and to the helping students. All men of the competing teams, one rubber and one Faculty Manager for each team, are to be admitted free to the Meet. The members of the Board of Control and the Permanent Secretary shall be furnished with official badges.

#### SECTION VI

The High School Board of Control shall sanction the choice of Referee and Starter.

#### SECTION VII

The admission fee shall be fifty (50) cents to all.

#### SECTION VIII

The Earlham College representative, Glenn Thistlethwaite, shall pay one hundred (100) dollars to Treasurer E. W. Montgomery of the High School Board of Control at the close of the Meet.

# Minutes of the Meetings of the Board of Control—Dec. 1, 1912, to Dec. 1, 1913.

## TENTH ANNUAL MEETING

#### MINUTES

The tenth annual meeting of the Indiana High School Athletic Association was called to order by President I. E. Neff at 2 p. m., December 26th, 1912, at the Y. M. C. A., Indianapolis.

The reading of the minutes of the previous meeting was dispensed with, owing to the fact that the minutes, together with the reports of the Permanent Secretary and Treasurer are contained in the hand book, copies of which are distributed to all members of the Association.

The following amendments to the Constitution were then discussed and adopted by a majority vote of those present:

1.—Section 16 of the Constitution is hereby repealed and the Board of Control is instructed to arrange for a basketball tournament in 1913. This tournament shall be open for entry to all members of the Association.

2.—Any pupil who has been enrolled twenty (20) or more days from September 1 to December 1 of same year for each of four semesters will be ineligible to play football a fifth semester.

Any pupil who has been enrolled for a period of twenty (20) or more days from December 1 to March 1 of the next year for each of four semesters shall be ineligible to play basketball a fifth semester.

Any pupil who has been enrolled for a period of twenty (20) or more days from March 1 to June 1 of the same year for each of four semesters shall be ineligible to play baseball a fifth semester.

All other rules in conflict with this amendment are hereby repealed.

It was moved, seconded and carried that the Permanent Secretary furnish a badge to members of the Association for identification in voting at the next annual meeting.

The following resolutions were then adopted by the Association:

1.—That the members of the I. H. S. A. A. wish to go on record as uncompromisingly opposed to the use of tobacco by high school boys, and we recommend that each school, acting independently, debar from athletics any boy known to the Principal to use tobacco in any form.

2.—The resolution proposed by Retiring Secretary Giles, found on page 7 of the Handbook, was unanimously adopted.

The Association then proceded to the election of officers as follows:

After balloting upon the persons nominated, Prin. C. V. Haworth, of Kokomo, was elected a member of the Board of Control to succeed Prin. I. E. Neff, whose term of office expires January 1, 1913. The resignation of J. T. Giles as Permanent Secretary of the Association was accepted and Prin. I. E. Neff, of Richmond, was unanimously elected to fill this position.

There being no further business before the Association, the meeting duly adjourned.

Owing to the fact that the charges had not been made in writing and that the Flora High School had not been notified of the charges, the case was postponed until these matters could be attended to.

#### KEYSTONE HIGH SCHOOL VS. PENNVILLE HIGH SCHOOL

A representative of the Keystone High School appeared before the Board asking for a forfeiture of \$10 from the Pennville High School for a violation of contract. After reviewing the evidence submitted, the Board decided that Pennville High School should pay \$10 to the Keystone High School in accordance with the terms of the contract.

#### ROCHESTER HIGH SCHOOL VS. CULVER HIGH SCHOOL

Principal C. R. Johnson, of the Rochester High School, appeared before the Board asking for a decision in regard to a basket ball game between the Rochester and Culver High Schools. The Board decided that since the game stopped when the score stood 27-27, the game could not be counted for either school.

#### FISHERS HIGH SCHOOL VS. ATLANTA HIGH SCHOOL

A representative of the Fishers High School appeared before the Board, asking a decision of the Board in regard to a basket ball game between the Fishers High School and the Atlanta H. S. on Dec. 6th. After reviewing the evidence submitted, the Board awarded the game to the Fishers High School.

Mr. L. B. Webster of the Wiley High School, Terre Haute, appeared before the Board in response to a call from the Board to explain why that High School had played its football schedule without sending in to the Permanent Secretary the Parents' and Physicians' certificates as required in the rules. The Board decided that all games won by Wiley High School are forfeited to the opposing schools.

In the case of Player Hill of the Wiley High School the decision was that he was ineligible, because the present semester is his fifth opportunity for

foot ball.

The Board adjourned to meet at 11 a. m., March 8, at the Claypool Hotel for the purpose of passing on the entries for, and arranging the details of the Basket Ball Tournament and attending to such other business as may come before the Board.

Sunday, provided train schedules make such a stay necessary. Mr. Thistlethwaite was given permission to offer any individual trophies in the Meet he was willing to offer.

#### PENNVILLE VS. KEYSTONE.

The Board decided to reopen the case, the Pennville Principal not having received notice of the meeting on previous date. Principal Buckles of Pennville was present and stated defense. Decision of Board was that since both schools were blameworthy, Pennville should pay Keystone \$5.00 or half the forfeiture previously awarded.

#### MORRISTOWN VS. PLAINFIELD.

Principal Edwards of Plainfield appeared before the Board in defense of his school, charged by Morristown of failure to pay expenses of a trip of the team of basket ball players Dec. 12, 1912. Board decided that managers of both schools were equally guilty of dealing through a student in arranging a game. Plainfield was ordered to pay Morristown half the expenses of the team on above date. Board decided "No game."

Mr. Trester was asked by the Board to complete the list of officials for the Bloomington meet and report at the Board meeting March 8.

A case of possible professionalism reported at Noblesville by Principal Bradshaw was deferred until the next meeting.

The status of Interlaken school not having been determined, it was declared ineligible to become a member of the Association. I. E. Supt. C. S. Miller of Nappanee stated the case of Bremen vs. Nappanee, both parties claiming two games of basket ball. Board awarded one game to each team.

The case of Fay Smith of Greencastle protested for recceiving pay for coaching: Charge not sustained on evidence submitted by Principal at Greencastle.

#### BUNKER HILL VS. SHARPSVILLE.

Action deferred to next meeting.

#### KEYSTONE VS. PENNVILLE.

Keystone ordered to make settlement within ten days or forfeit membership in the I. H. S. A. A. Suspended pending settlement to Jan. 1, 1914.

Principals Stewart and Buck. of the Indianapolis High Schools, were present to qualify their tournament teams, in answer to charges of ineligible

players. Board decided the men in question eligible, on the ground of connection with the Y. M. C. A.

The entries for the Track and Field Meet at Earlham, May 17, were examined and approved. Chester Reagan was present as Earlham's representative, and final arrangements were completed for the Meet. A. S. Wengierski was sanctioned by the Board as Referee and Starter for Meet.

The Bunker Hill High School asked a forfeit of \$10.00 from Sharpsville High School for failure to play a game of basket ball at Bunker Hill on February 14. The case was dismissed because there was no written contract between the schools.

Ligonier High School asked a forfeit of \$10.00 from Warsaw High School for failure to play a game of basket ball March 8. Due to conflicting statements in the correspondence, the Permanent Secretary was instructed to call for the presence of the parties to the controversy at the Board meeting in Richmond, May 17, if they desired to carry the controversy further.

Plymouth High School asked concerning the eligibility of a boy who had taken some High School subjects while he was still carrying some subjects in the eighth grade. The Board decided upon the following interpretation regarding the definition of a High School student:

"Any student who carries at least fifteen hours regular High School work, is a High School student."

Vincennes High School asked concerning the eligibility of a boy who had entered Vincennes High School during the first twenty days of the term, had attended twenty days, then entered an institution outside of the state with High School standing, and afterwards re-entered Vincennes High School. The boy was declared eligible.

There being no further business the Board adjourned to meet at Richmond, May 17.

#### Minutes of Board Meeting, October 25, 1913.

The Board of Control of the I. H. S. A. A. met in call session at the Claypool Hotel, Indianapolis, October 25, 1913, all members being present. The contract for printing the 1913 Hand Book was given to the Art Printing Company, of Alexandria. Mr. Haworth was asked to write an article covering the year's work. The advisability of having a Basket Ball Tourney was discussed, but final decision regarding it was left for the State Meeting.

The following order of business was adopted for the next Annual meeting:

- 1. Reading of minutes of previous meeting.
- 2. Election of Permanent Secretary.
- 2. Election of one member to Board of Control.
- 4. Amendments.
- 5. Basket Ball Tournament:
  - (a). Does the Association desire a Tourney?
  - (b). Does the Association desire an open or sectional Tourney?
- 6. Miscellaneous.

Weidner Institute was refused admission into the Association on the ground that the College students and the High School students were not clearly differentiated in the student body of the institution.

The Amendment to the Constitution December 26, 1912, was interpreted to cover any form of athletics whatever.

Authority was voted the Permanent Secretary to secure a filing cabinet or desk suitable for filing the correspondence of the Association and for storing the forms recommended by the Board of Control.

## Rules of the Indiana High School Athletic Association Regarding Track and Field Events

## Based on the Rules of the Intercollegiate Conference Athletic Association.

RULE 1.

#### **Officials**

Section 1. All meetings must be under the direction of

The Board of Control.

One referee.

Two or more inspectors.

Three or more field judges.

Three judges at finish.

Three or more timekeepers.

One starter.

One clerk of the course.

One scorer.

One marshal.

Sec 2. If deemed necessary, assistants may be provided for the clerk of the course, the scorer and the marshal, and an official announcer may be appointed.

RULE II.

#### The Board of Control

Shall have jurisdiction of all matters not assigned by these rules to the referee or other game officials.

RULE III.

#### The Referee

Must decide all questions relating to the actual conduct of the Meet, whose final settlement is not otherwise covered by these rules, and shall have the power to add to or alter the announced arrangements of heats in any event. A referee has no authority, after heats have been drawn and published in a program, to transfer a contestant from one heat to another.

When in any but the final heat of a race a claim of foul or interference is made, he shall have the power to disqualify the competitor who was at fault, if he considers the foul intentional or due to culpable carelessness, and shall also have power to allow the hindered competitor to start in the next round of heats, just as if he had been placed in his trial.

When in a final heat a claim of foul or interference is made, he shall have the power to disqualify the competitor who was at fault, if he considers the foul intentional or due to his carelessness or conduct, and he shall also have the power to order a new race between such of the competitors as he thinks entitled to such a privilege.

If during an athletic contest under the rules of the I. H. S. A. A. a competitor shall conduct himself in a manner unbecoming a gentleman or offensive to the officials, spectators or competitors, the referee shall have the power to disqualify him from further competition at the Meet; and if he thinks the offense worthy of additional punishment, must promptly make a detailed statement of the facts to the Board of Control.

Power to change the order of events as laid down in the official program is reserved to the Board of Control, which shall, through its chairman, exercise this authority, unless it sees fit to expressly delegate this power to the referee.

The referee shall not have authority to disqualify any competitor for violation of the eligibility rule of the I. H. S. A. A. All protests as to eligibility made on the field must be referred to the Board of Control, and the protested competitor must be allowed to compete until disqualified by the arbitrator of the I. H. S. A. A.

#### RULE IV.

#### The Inspectors

It shall be the duty of the inspector to stand at such point as the referee may designate, to watch the competition closely, and, in case of a claim of foul, to report to the referee what he saw of the incident. Such inspectors are merely assistants to the referee, to whom they must report, and have no power to make any decision.

#### RULE V.

#### The Judges of the Finish

Must determine the order of finishing of contestants, and must arrange among themselves as to noting the winner, second, third and fourth, etc., as the case may require, and there must always be two judges, whose duty must be to chose the winner.

Their decision in this respect must be without appeal, and in case of a disagreement a majority must govern.

#### RULE VI.

#### The Field Judges

Must make an accurate measurement and keep a tally of all trials of competitors in the high and broad jumps, the pole vaults, the weight competitions and the discus throws.

They must act as judges in these events, and their decisions must likewise be without appeal. In case of disagreement, a majority must govern. There must be at least three judges for every event.

#### RULE VII.

#### The Timekeepers

Must be three in number, and must be individually time all events where time record is called for. At the conclusion of each heat, each timekeeper must present his watch to the referee for inspection, and he must decide the official time. Should two of the three watches mark the same time and the third disagree, the time marked by said two watches must be accepted. Should all three disagree, the time marked by the intermediate watch must be accepted.

The flash of the pistol must denote the actual time of starting.

If, for any reason, only two watches are held on an event, and they fail to agree, the longer time of the two must be accepted.

#### RULE VIII.

#### The Starter

Must have sole jurisdiction over the competitors after the clerk of the course has properly placed them in their positions for the start.

The method of starting must be by pistol report, except that in time handicap races the word "go" must be used.

An actual start is not effected until the pistol has been purposely discharged after the competitors have been warned to get ready.

In case the pistol was not purposely discharged, the competitors shall be called back by the starter by pistol fire.

Note.—The starter must have at least two good cartridges in his pistol before starting a heat.

When any part of the person of a competitor touches the ground in front of his mark before the signal is given, it must be considered a false start.

Penalties for false starting must be inflicted by the starter, as follows: In all races to and including 125 yards, the competitor must be put back one yard for the first and another yard for the second attempt; in races over 125, yards and including 300 yards, two yards for the first and two more for

the second attempt; in races over 300 yards and including 600 yards, three yards for the first and three more for the second attempt; in races over 600 yards and including 1,000 yards, four yards for the first and four more for the second attempt; in races over 1,000 yards and including one mile, five yards for the first and five more for the second attempt; in all races over one mile, ten yards for the first attempt and ten more for the second attempt.

In all cases, the third false start must prevent his competing in that event. The starter must rule out of that event any competitor who attempts to advance himself from his mark, as prescribed in the official program, after he has been given the warning to "get ready."

#### RULE IX

#### Clerk of the Course

Must be provided with the names and the numbers of all entered competitors, and he must notify them to appear at the starting line before the start in each event in which they are entered.

#### RULE X.

#### The Scorer

Must record the order in which each competitor finishes his event, together with the time furnished by the referee.

He must keep a tally of the laps made by each competitor in races covering more than one lap, and must announce, by means of a bell or otherwise, when the leading man enters the last lap.

He must draw up a list of the actual competitors in each event, which shall be filed with the papers of the Association, and shall be the official record of competing entrants, and shall be final evidence in the enforcement of Rule III, of the rules of eligibility.

He must control his assistants and assign to them such of his duties as he may deem proper.

#### RULE XI

#### The Marshal

Must have police charge of the enclosure, and must prevent any but officials and actual competitors from entering or remaining therein.

He must control his assistants and assign to them their duties.

#### RULE XII

#### The Official Announcer

Must receive from the scorer and field judges the result of each event, and announce the same by voice or by means of a bulletin board.

#### RULE XIII

#### Competitors

Must report to the Clerk of the Course immediately upon their arrival at the place of meeting, and must be provided by that official with their proper numbers, which must be worn conspicuously by the competitors when competing, and without which they must not be allowed to start.

Each competitor must inform himself of the time of starting, and must be promptly at the starting point of each competition in which he is entered, and there report to the Clerk of the Course.

Under no condition shall attendants be allowed to accompany competitors at the start or during any competition.

#### RULE XIV.

#### Track Measurement

All distances run or walked must be measured upon a line eighteen inches outward from the inner edge of the track, except that in races on straightaway tracks the distance must be measured in a direct line from the starting mark to the finishing line.

#### RULE XV.

#### The Course

Each competitor must keep in his respective position from start to finish in all races on straightaway tracks, and in all races on tracks with one or more turns he must not cross to the inner edge of the track, except when he is at least six feet in advance of his nearest competitor. After turning the last corner into the straight in any race, each competitor must run a straight course to the finish line, and must not cross to either the outside or inside from such straight course in front of his opponents.

In all races of the I. H. S. A. A. up to and including 220 yards, each competitor must have a separate course marked out and measured, whether races are run straightaway or with turns.


The referee must disqualify from that event any competitor who willfully pushes against, impedes, crosses the course of, or in any way interferes with another competitor.

The referee must disqualify from further participation in the Meet any contestant competing to lose, to coach, or in any way impede the chances of another competitor, either in a trial or a final contest.


#### RULE XVI.

#### The Finish

Of the course must be represented by a line between two finishing posts, drawn across and at right angles to the sides of the track, and four feet

above which line must be stretched a tape, attached at either end to the finishing posts. A finish must be counted when any part of the winner's body, except his hands or arms, touches the tape at the finishing line. The tape must be considered the finishing line for the winners, but their order of finishing across the track line must determine the position of the other competitors.

#### RULE XVII.

#### Hurdles

In the 120 yards hurdle race, ten hurdles must be used, each hurdle to be three feet six inches high. They must be placed ten yards apart, with the first hurdle fifteen yards distant from the starting point, and the last hurdle fifteen yards before the finishing line.

In the 220 yards hurdle race, ten hurdles must be used, each hurdle to be two feet six inches high. They must be placed twenty yards apart, with the first hurdle twenty yards distant from the starting mark, and the last hurdle twenty yards before the finishing line.

In making a record it must be necessary for the competitor to jump every hurdle in its proper position.

In all hurdle races of the I. H. S. A. A. up to and including 220 yards, each competitor must have separate hurdles and a separate course marked out and measured, whether races are run straight away or with turns.

A competitor knocking down three or more hurdles, or any portion of three or more hurdles, in any race shall be disqualified.

#### RULE XVIII.

#### Jumping

Section 1. A tair jump must be one that is made without the assistance of weights, diving, somersaults, or handsprings of any kind.

In scratch events competitors must jump in order as placed on program.

Sec. 2. The running high jump.—The field judges must decide the height at which the jump shall commence, and must regulate the succeeding elevations.

Each competitor must be allowed three trial jumps at each height, and if on the third trial he shall fail, he must be declared out of the competition.

Competitors must jump in order, as provided in section 1; then those failing, if any, must have their second trial jump in a like order, after which those who have failed twice must make their third trial jump.

The jump must be made over a bar resting on pins projecting not more than three inches from the uprights, and when this bar is removed from its place by the competitor when trying, it must be counted as a trial jump,

Running under the bar in making an attempt to jump must be counted as a "balk," and three successive "balks" must be counted as a trial jump.

The distance of the run before the jump must be unlimited. A competitor may decline to jump at any height in his turn, and by so doing forfeits his rights to again jump at the height declined.

Sec. 4. The running broad jump.—When jumped on earth, a joist five inches wide must be sunk flush with it. The outer edges of this joist must be called the scratch line, and the measurement of all jumps must be made from it, at right angles, to the nearest break in the ground made by any part of the person of the competitor.

In front of the scratch line the ground must be removed to the depth of three and the width of twelve inches outward.

A foul jump must be one where the competitor, in jumping off the scratch line, makes a mark on the ground immediately in front of it, or runs over the line without jumping, and must count as a trial jump without results.

Each competitor must have three trial jumps, and the best three must have three more trial jumps.

The competition must be decided by the best of all the jumps of the competitors.

The distance of the run before the scratch line must be unlimited.

Sec. 5. The pole vault. A pole must be furnished by the managing committee, but contestants may use their own private poles if they so desire, and no contestant shall be allowed to use any of these private poles except by the consent of their owners. The poles must be unlimited as to size and weight, but must have no assisting devices, except that they may be wrapped or covered with any substance (to obtain a firmer grip,) and may have one prong at the end.

No competitor shall, during his vault, raise the hand which was uppermost when he left the ground to a higher point of the pole, nor shall he raise the hand which was undermost when he left the ground to any point on the pole above the other hand.

The rules governing the running high jump must also govern the pole vault for height, except that when the man leaves the ground in an attempt it shall be counted a trial.

#### RULE XIX.

#### Putting the Shot

The shot must be a solid sphere, made of metal, and must weigh twelve pounds.

It must be put with one hand, and in making the attempt it must be above, and not behind, the shoulder.

The competitor must stand in a circle seven feet in diameter. The circumference of the circle must be divided into halves by a line drawn through the center of the circle. On four feet of the front half of the circumference a board four inches high must be placed, the edge of which must be equally distant from the intersection of the line with the circumference, and at which the competitor must stand when the shot leaves his hand.

A fair put shall be one where no part of the person of the competitor touches in front of the circle, or on the board, in making the attempt.

A put must be counted as a foul if the competitor steps outside the circle or on the board. A competitor must leave the circle by the rear half. Leaving by the front half must be declared a foul.

The measurement of all puts must be made from the nearest mark by the shot to a point on the circumference of the circle on a line with the object mark and the center of the circle.

Foul puts and letting go to the shot in making an attempt must be counted as trial puts without results.

A board similar to the one in front may be used at the back of the circle. The order of competing and the number of trials shall be the same as for the running broad jump. Shots must be furnished by the managing committee. Any contestant may use his own private shot, if correct in weight and shape; in which case the other contestants must also be allowed to use it if they wish.

#### RULE XX.

#### Throwing the Discus

The discus shall be made of smooth hardwood body, without finger holes, weighted in center with lead discs and capped with polished brass discs, with steel ring on the outside. The weight of the discus shall be four and one-half pounds; outside diameter, eight inches; thickness in center, two inches.

All throws shall be made from a seven-foot circle, with four-foot lapboards, and similar in all respects to the circle for putting the shot. In making his throws, a competitor may assume any position he chooses. Foul throws and letting go of the discus in attempts shall count as trials without result. A fair throw shall be one in which no part of the person of the competitor touches the ground outside the front half of the circle, and the competitor leaving the circle by its rear half. A throw shall be foul if any part of the person touches the ground outside of the front half of the circle before the throw is measured.

The order of competing and number of trials shall be the same as for the running broad jump.

A discus shall be furnished by the managing committee,

#### RULE XXI.


#### Ties

In case of a tie in any event, the points shall be divided and the place awarded by lot.

#### RULE XXII.

#### **Relay Racing**

- 1. A line must be drawn twenty feet in front of each starting line. Between these two lines each runner must touch the succeeding runner. Failure to do this disqualifies the team in that event. The judges must see that all touches are properly made.
- The same rules with reference to fouls, coaching or impeding a runner in any way, apply to relay racing as to other events.
- 3. No member of a relay team can run back of the line, nor can one man run two relays in any team.
  - 4. The positions of the team must be drawn for.



## Constitution of the Indiana High School Athletic Association

Revised December 22, 1913)

#### Administration

#### Officers:

Section 1. A Board of Control, composed of three members (principals, members of the faculty or superintendents) shall be elected by the Association December 29, 1903, as follows: One for one year, one for two years and one for three years, the chairman each year to be the one whose term expires at the end of that year. Thereafter each member of the Board shall be elected for three years. This election is to take place at the annual meeting of the Indiana State Teachers' Association. In case of vacancy, the remaining members of the Board may appoint a person to fill the vacancy until the next annual meeting of the Association.

Sec. 2. On and after the adoption of this amendment every newly elected member of the Board of Control shall assume the duties of his office on the first day of January, next following.

Sec. 3. No retiring member of the board of Control, having served three years shall be eligible for re-election for a period of one year after date of retirement.

Sec. 4. The Board of Control shall have the following powers and duties:
(a) It shall have general control over all athletic contests between secondary schools in this Association; (b) It shall have exclusive control of the annual Inter-scholastic Meet; (c) It shall give interpretations of the rules of the Association; (d) It shall determine forfeitures under Sec. 11; (e) The Board of Control, at the end of any athletic season may, at its discretion, issue a statement of its official opinion as to the relative standing of teams. No school which has violated the rules of the Association in regard to the qualifications of players shall be awarded special honors in that particular branch of athletics.

- Sec. 5. (a) When charges are made in writing by a member of the Association against another member for violation of the rules of the Association, the Board of Control, after giving due notice of the place and time for the school so charged to be heard, shall consider such charges, and may suspend the offending school for a period of not exceeding one year. (b) The Board of Control shall decide on all protests brought before it with reference to qualifications of contestants in the Inter-scholastic Meet. (c) When any matter comes before the board for decision which is of special interest to a school of which a member of the Board is a representative, the remaining members shall appoint another person to act in his place in that matter:
- Sec. 6. At the annual meeting of 1906 a **Permanent Secretary** shall be elected, who shall have charge of the property and records of the Association; shall receive all money for dues and the sale of publications of the Association; shall issue all circulars authorized by the Board of Control; shall attend meetings of the Board when requested to do so by the Board; shall turn over to the Treasurer of the Board all moneys in his possession when called upon to do so; shall perform such other duties as the growth of the Association as determined by the Board may require; and shall receive as compensation the sum of \$50 annually, and such allowance for expenses as the Board may approve. Vacancies in the office may be declared by the Board for cause, and a successor appointed by the Board to act until the next annual meeting.

#### Local Management:

- Sec. 7. The **Principal** or his authorized representative shall accompany his team to all contests.
- Sec. 8. The principal of the school, or high school teachers authorized by him, shall be manager or managers of the teams representing the school.
  - Sec. 9. No games shall be played without the sanction of the principal.
- Sec. 10. The eligibility of all the contestants shall be certified to by the principal of the school in accordance with the rules hereby adopted. Such statements shall be presented in writing within ten days before any contest. In case of disputes the principal must furnish the Board of Control the following data in regard to each contestant: The date of last enrollment; the number of years he has been a member of a secondary school athletic team; date and place of birth; average mark in each study for the last preceding term in school; average mark in each study from the beginning of the current term or semester. A school which does not furnish this data shall be denied championship honors, and may be excluded from the annual Interscholastic meet.

- Sec. 11. The principal shall have power and is advised to exclude any contestant who, because of bad habits or improper conduct, would not represent his school in a becoming manner.
- Sec. 12. It is recommended that principals, in arranging for games, provide a forfeit of \$10, to be exacted should there be a failure on the part of either party to carry out the arrangements made. Should such forfeitures be stipulated and not be paid during the same season, the Board of Control after hearing both sides, shall have authority to expel the delinquent school from the Association. Notification of such expulsion shall be published in the papers, with cause therefor.
- Sec. 13. **Paid Coaches,** other than those regularly employed as teachers by the trustees of the school, are prohibited. By paid coach is meant any person who receives, directly or indirectly, remuneration of any kind, money, traveling expenses, gifts, etc., in return for services rendered in instructing or coaching any high school athletic team.
- Sec. 14. Each school in the Association shall report to the Permanent Secretary a list of the pupils representing the school in athletic contests during the year. Each school is asked to report also the kind of treatment accorded them to, from and on the field, while guests of another school.

#### Officials:

Sec. 15. On and after January 1, 1910, all the **Major Officials** in all athletic contests participated in by teams connected with schools in the I. H. S. A. A. shall be regularly licensed teachers in the public schools of Indiana or shall be persons whose names have been furnished and approved by the Board of Control. It is recommended that these officials shall be disinterested, and it is required that when a school demands disinterested officials at the time of scheduling the game, such officials shall be furnished. The Board shall drop from its list of approved officials any person who is palpably unfair and biased in his decision in games.

Sec. 16. Non-playing student officials or assistants shall conform to the same rules as the players.

#### Membership:

Sec. 17. Membership in this Association shall be limited to public High Schools of the state, and each school shall have one vote. The annual dues shall be \$1.50, payable when the school becomes a member, and thereafter by December 1 of each year, in advance.

Academies with commissioned high school standing shall be eligible to membership in the Association, and wherever the word "high school" appears in this Constitution it shall be understood to apply equally to these academies.

#### Games and Game Rules:

Sec. 18. No game shall be played with high schools of this state not belonging to the Association.

This rule does not prevent a member of the Association from playing high school teams outside of the state, nor from playing non-high school teams within the state, except as follows:

It is a violation of the Constitution for schools in the Association to play non-high school teams including high school boys, unless the latter are certified as eligible by the Principal of the school to which they belong.

Sec. 19. The games recognized by the I. H. S. A. A. shall be: Foot Ball, Rugby Foot Ball, Soccer, Basket Ball, Track Work and Base Ball- Further, all forms of inter-school athletic games shall be subject to the rules of the I. H. S. A. A.

Sec. 20. The number of interscholastic foot ball games played by any team in one season is limited to six.

Sec. 21. In all foot ball contests held under these rules, the length of each half shall be twenty-five minutes, unless changed by mutual consent.

Sec. 22. The basket ball rules as published in Spalding's Official Basket-ball rule book, shall be the official rules governing all contests between members of the I. H. S. A. A. However, the rule governing the selection of officials in the above rules shall be void, and unless otherwise agreed by mutual consent, each school shall furnish one official, and these officials shall alternate their duties, each acting as referee and each acting as umpire one half.

#### Rules

#### Eligibility

Rule 1. To represent a school in any interscholastic contest, a person must be under twenty-one years of age; must have entered some public high school within the first twenty school days of the semester in which the contest occurs, and must be an amateur as defined by the A. A. U. Eighth grade pupils are not eligible. A semester is one-half of a school year.

The term "amateur" is defined and fully explained on pages 80 and 160 of Spalding's "Official Rules of the Amateur Athletic Union of the United States," and on page 80 of Spalding's "Official Y. M. C. A. Athletic League Handbook."

Rule 2. Any pupil who has been enrolled twenty (20) or more days from September 1 to December 1 of same year for each of four semesters will be ineligible to play foot ball a fifth semester.

Any pupil who has been enrolled for a period of twenty (20) or more days from December 1 to March 1 of the next year for each of four semesters shall be ineligible to play basket ball a fifth semester.

Any pupil who has been enrolled for a period of twenty (20) or more days from March 1 to June 1 of the same year for each of four semesters shall be ineligible to play base ball a fifth semester.

All other rules in conflict with this amendment are hereby repealed.

Interpretation—This section covers all branches of athletics.

- Rule 3. A pupil withdrawing permanently from school within the first twenty school days of the semester shall not be regarded as having an opportunity to engage in athletics that semester unless he has already played in one or more Interscholastic games, in which case he shall be regarded as having engaged in Athletics for that season.
- Rule 4. Post Graduates are not eligible, but pupils graduating from regular three year courses shall not be deemed post graduates.
- Rule 5. A student is a post graduate of a school after he has completed the work required for graduation by that school, irrespective of the time of granting the diploma.
- Rule 6. Time spent in athletic sport by pupils while in grades below the high school shall not be counted as part of the four years.
  - Rule 7. No person shall enter a contest under an assumed name.
- Rule 8. Any member of a high school athletic team who participates in an athletic contest as a member of any other similar team the same season, shall be ineligible to compete under these rules for the remainder of that season.

An exception is hereby made for basket ball and basket ball players in those towns and cities whose schools have no gymnasium and whose students are forced by necessity to use a Y. M. C. A. or some other gymnasium for their practice games. It is a well known fact that the use of such gymnasium by high school students under such circumstances will likely require that such students play on the teams of the organizations maintaining such gymnasiums. No student, however, will be permitted to play on any other team than that representing the organization controling the gymnasium, and no student will be allowed to play in the teams of the latter without the knowledge and consent of his principal.

Rule 8. Each contestant must have and be maintaining for the current semester, a passing grade in each of three or more studies requiring a minimum of fifteen regular high school recitations per week, exclusive of rhetoricals, physical culture, military drill and deportment; in his last preceding semester in school he must also have met the same requirements throughout the entire term.

Pupils enrolled for the first time must comply with the requirements of the rules, the average standing required for the preceding semester being obtained from the records in the last secondary school attended.

Back work may be made up, providing that it be done in accordance with the regular rules of the school and becomes a matter of final record before the next semester.

Interpretation: In each of the studies representing the minimum requirement of work specified above: (a) For the current semester the average of the monthly grades up to the time of certification must be passing; (b) for the current or school month the average of the daily or weekly grades must be passing; (c) if the average of the monthly grades at the beginning of any month is below passing in any study, the pupil is ineligible so far as that study is concerned for the entire month.

Rule 10. No person who has been enrolled as a student in an institution of college standing, and has done work which may be counted toward a degree in that institution, shall be eligible as a member of any athletic team under I. H. S. A. A. rules in any game with any other team, either within or without the State of Indiana.

Rule 11. The eligibility rules of this Association shall apply to students taking part in all contests, whether with schools inside or outside the State of Indiana.

Rule 12. On and after January 1, 1911, no student shall be eligible to play foot ball unless he has been examined by a regular physician and his physical condition has been pronounced satisfactory. Further, such student shall not be eligible until the physician's certificate has been filed with the Permanent Secretary of the Association. Said certificate shall be good from September 1 to December 1, only.

Rule 13. On and after January 1, 1911, no student shall be eligible to play foot ball without the written consent of his father, mother or guardian. Said written consent shall be attested by the Principal or Faculty Manager, and shall be filed with the Permanent Secretary of the Association. The copy of said written consent shall be attached to the physician's certificate when filed with the Permanent Secretary.

#### Interpretations

First. A game is any athletic contest where an admission fee is charged, or where any collection or contribution is received from spectators.

Second. The football season is defined as beginning with the opening of school and closing with November 30.

Third. No student who violates the rules of the Association will be reinstated by the Board.

Fourth. A pupil who has played in one or more Interscholastic games in any season shall be regarded as having engaged in athletics for that season.

Fifth: When a member or members of any team are protested, the game should be played as scheduled and the protest filed with the Board for settlement later.

Sixth. By mutual consent of both teams, pupils over the age limit may be allowed to enter the contests played under I. H. S. A. A. rules.

Seventh. Pupils under twenty-one at the time of registration in school shall be so regarded until the time of their next registration.

Eighth. Any student, who carries at least 15 hours of regular High School work, is a High School student.

- 1. Parents' and Physician's certificates, contracts for all contests, eligibility certificates, blanks for certification of officials, and blanks for reporting contests will be furnished in quantities upon application to the Permanent Secretary. Please state definitely the kind and number of each wanted.
  - 2. The Annual Handbook will be sent upon receipt of ten cents.
- 3. Copies of the Constitution will be furnished at fifty cents per hundred.
- 4. All correspondence and remittances from members of the Association to the Board of Control or to the Permanent Secretary must be indorsed by the principal or a member of the faculty.


