## ADDRESS OF THE RETIRING PRESIDENT

## F. L. BUSENBURG

TO THE INDIANA HIGH SCHOOL ATHLETIC ASSOCIATION
Not many years ago a few principals and coaches seeing the need of a closer relation and better understanding of rules for the interschool contests bound themselves together in an athletic association. By this the present day I. H. S. A. A. was brought into existence. Growing from a few schools to over seven hundred has made it one of the ing from a few schools to over seven hundred has made it one of the
largest voluntary athletic associations in the United States today. largest voluntary athletic associations in the United States today.
This growth has been steady but sure, because it was built on a solid This growth has been steady but sure, because it was built on a solid
foundation of right ideas and was purely democratic in its organifoundation of right ideas and was purely democratic in its organi-
zation. It has not only lifted athletics to a higher plane, but it also set the standard with scholarship as well. True it is that there has been many a set back and discouraging proposition which had to be settled by those in authority. Many of the perplexing problems have been brought up by schools or individuals (and very often by fans who think athletics is to win at any cost rather than for the school) who have had a misunderstanding of some rule, or by some trying to make the rule fit their own individual cases. But with all of these difficulties I. H. S. A. A. has emerged into a bigger and better organization because back of these men, were both coaches and principals, who believed in the standards of this organization.

Our standards are high and three-fold. 1. The association has striven for cleaner athletics and truer sportsmanship. And this is being realized more and more as the years go by. Those who attended the State Basket Ball Tourney at Indianapolis last year will agree, I believe, when I say that never before in the history of basket ball was there a better feeling of fair play and a display of truer sportsmanship as was shown at that meeting. 2. It not only means that the boy or girl be clean cut in their athletics, but must be good in their scholarship as well. I believe our aim in scholarship should be higher than it is at the present time, making the student pass in all subjects he is taking rather than just passing in three. No other activity in school has as high a standard unless the local school makes such a rule. No questions are asked if the students are passing in their subjects who represent the school as yell leader, in the discussion league, or in the debating team. 3. We believe in physical development for all girls and boys and by this aim many schools are equipping their play grounds with suitable apparatus for games and sports and building gymnasiums so as to give the students the physical training which rightly belongs to them.

## I. H. S. A. A. PROGRAM

## (We believe in boys and girls.)

1. Real physical training for all boys and all girls built around drills, rythms, games, contests, competitive activities and legitimate sports rather than around formal gymnastic exercises or around highly organized military training.
2. Incorporation and use of the valuable elements in formal gymnastic exercises and in military training as contributory measures to a materialization of real physical training.
3. Physical training as an integral and vital part of the school curriculum and athletics as an integral and vital part of physical training.
4. Belief in games and contests between schools and just as ing belief in games and contests between classes, groups, clubs and leagues within the schols so that all boys and all girls may secure their physical chances

6. Physical training and athletics as elements only in the proper aining of boys and girls. These things are extremely valuable but must be considered as contributory to scholarship, high ideals, real surtsmanship and to the building of the proper habits of real iving in a democracy. A proper sense of relative values will save us.
7. General recognition of the possibilities for real training for ys, girls and adults in athletic contests and in the many competitive , geal situations filled activities in a real physical traings preal citiwith real opportunities for real traing adeate and competent perzenship arise in athletic activities. An adequabits that will function right thinking and in right acting
8. Clean amateur athletics, fair competition, honest dealings, nd real sportsmanship at all times. These things bar the recruiting of players and remove the money-changers from our gymnasiums and of playfields.

FUNDAMENTAL PRINCIPLES AND BELIEFS OF THE I. H. S. A. A.
I. Commercialism is antagonistic to the best interests of clean amateur athletics.
II. Professionalism should play no part in school athletic activities.
III. Athletics and physical training should be managed in accord with other educational aims and values.
IV. School athletic activities are educational activities and should be managed by school authorities.
V. The training of all and the exploitation of none should be considered fundamental in physical education.
VI. Provision for spectators, as well as participants, is highly desirable, as the educational values in moral, civic and social ways gained by having men, women and children interested in clean sport are valuable.
VII. Physical training and athletic activities should be dignified by being assigned a prominence in the curriculum on a par with other work.
VIII. Intelligent leadership and sympathetically efficient management will do much more than critical denunciation.
IX. Athletics is one of the greatest of forces for the development of school morale and school spirit, when properly handled.
X. Athletics should have its proper setting in physical training activities. Physical training shọuld have its proper setting in physical education, and physical education should have its proper setting in the whole health program.
XI. Games, contests, competitive activities, sports, drills, folk dances, rythms and marches are basic in physical training work, because such are natural and free and furnish real genuine interest without which the highest development does not take place.
XII. Artificial exercises have a certain value, but such value is not comparable to the values secured in free play, organized play and in well conducted contests, sports and games.

## Basket Ball

Practically all of the High Schools in the I. H. S. A. A. had varsity teams in boys' basket ball and most of the schools had class teams, league teams and second teams. In some schools the league teams provided an opportunity for most of the boys in school to participate. There were a number of varsity teams in girls' basket ball, but most of the girls' teams participated in intra-mural games only.

Sectional, Regional and Final Tourneys
The sectional tourneys ended with the following winners: A derson, Garrett, Brookville, Bedford, Bloomington, Brazil, Brook, Perrysville, Columbus, Crawfordsville, Culver, Liberty Center, Evansville, South Side (Fort Wayne), Frankfort, Franklin, Bainbridge, Mt. Comfort, Emerson (Gary), Hanover, Huntington, Manual (Indianapolis), Kendallville, Greentown, Lafayette, Lebanon, Logansport, Lyons, Marion, Martinsville, Muncie, Mooreland, Wabash, Owensville, Hartford City, Richmond, Rochester, Connersville, Seymour, Shelbyville, South Bend, Sullivan, Losantville, Michigan City, Covington, Vincennes, Warsaw and Wolcott.

There were forty-eight (48) centers with five hundred ninetysix (596) teams playing. Ten schools were barred by the Board, due to late entrance. Last year there were thirty-two (32) centers with five hundred sixty-four (564) teams playing, and year before last there were thirty-two (32) centers with four hundred ninety-five (495) teams playing. No tourney this year had less than eight (8) teams (eams Only six tourneys had as many as norten (16) teams

The regional tourneys ended with the following winners: At Purdue-Crawfordsville, Martinsville, Frankfort, Perrsyville, Anderson; at Indiana-Franklin, Bedford, Sullivan, Columbus, Vincennes, Son; at Indiana-Frankin, Muncie, Warsaw, South Bend, Richmond, Huntington.

There were eighteen (18) teams at Fort Wayne and Purdue, and twelve (12) teams at Indiana. The decision for this assignment was made by lot by the Board of Control. Two rounds were played at Fort Wayne and Purdue, and one round was played at Indiana.

The Vincennes team won the final tourney at Indianapolis and this team in the State Champion Basketball Team in the I. H. S. A. A. for $19 ?^{\circ}$

Al games in all tourneys were played in fifteen-minute halves and no team played more than four (4) games or more than one
hundred twenty (120) minutes in any tourney within a period of two days. The limitation of the playing time in the games and in the tourneys together with better trained boys on the teams eliminated many criticisms. Evidently more attention is being paid to the training and the physical condition of the players than in the past This needs to be continued as only the trained and physically fit should participate in competitive activities under any conditions. A few errors here will be very difficult to erase or correct

Maurice (Red) Robinson, of Anderson, won the Gimbel medal for "mental attitude." The Board delegated the appointment of the awarding committee to the Indianapolis authorities and no member of the Board served on the committee.

The sectional, regional and final tourneys were successes financially and otherwise. In the main, better basketball was played, cleaner playing was done, better officiating was evident, and more rea sportsmansh was shown than in any of our tourneys through the years. The sportsmanship at the final tourney was excellent on the part of everybody,-teams, officials, coaches, students, fans and newspapers. This tourney was as fine an example of clean amateur athletics as was ever seen. The I. H. S. A. A. put itself before the public in a way that made friends and in a way that will be a life long benefit to thousands of boys and girls. Everybody won because sportsmanship won. Our gymnasiums and our playfields will never be big enough for the crowds if we keep our athletics clean and sportsmanlike. They will never be too small if we are dirty and unsportsmanlike.

## THE TWELFTH ANNUAL

The Board of Control has completed the details for the State Championship Basketball Tourneys and announces the scheme in full: Sectional Tourneys, March 2 and 3
(1) Location-geographical with reference to schools desiring to participate. (2) Railway and interurban facilities. (3) General conditions-attitude of local authorities, floors, entertaining facilities

Schools have been assigned by counties with the intention of having no more than 16 teams in each Tourney. The following scheme gives the Centers and also the counties assigned to each center. The name of your county locates your center. The Board reserves the right to readjust the scheme if conditions make it advis able and necessary. The numbers indicate the schools from each county that have expressed their desire to enter at the present time.

Whenever the name of a county is given under two centers the schools of the said county will be apportioned later on the basis of nearness to centers, transportation and other facilities.

Management-The management of these Tourneys rests solely with the Board of Control. Local arrangements have been delegated to the Center Principals. Two officials for each Tourney will be selected by the Board and none but fair, disinterested and competent men will be chosen. All schedules of hours, floors, teams and officials will be made out and printed by the Board. All schedules will be drawn by lot and no changes will be made in them.

Open Contest-The Tourneys are open to all members of the Association, irrespective of their season's record.

Protests-All protests against teams or individuals must be made in writing by the Principal and filed with the Permanent Secretary on or before 11 a. m., February 21. Protests must be accompanied by evidence.

Entertainment-Teams are limited to eight men, but ten men can be certified. The Center Principals have contracted with the Board to entertain nine men (which MUST include the faculty manager) from each competing school. Entertainment will begin, if necessary, at $7 \mathrm{a} . \mathrm{m}$. Friday, March 2 and continue, if necessary, to $8 \mathrm{a} . \mathrm{m}$. Sunday, March 4. Printed schedules will be sent to each competing school in plenty of time to arrange for making the trip. All competing schools are requested to ask for no longer entertainment than is necessary, but all schools are entitled to entertainment throughout the Tourney.

Expenses-An entrance fee of one (1) dollar for each team must accompany the entry blank, which money will go into the treasury of the I. H. S. A. A. to defray expenses of the Tourneys incurred by the Board of Control. The Center Principals have contracted to pay transportation expenses of the competing schools according to the following scheme:

First, all legitimate expenses except for travel shall be paid from the gross receipts.

Second, the Center High School shall receive one hundred (100) dollars.

Third, the I. H. S. A. A. shall receive ten (10) per cent.
Fourth, the transportation shall be paid.
Fifth, the Center High School shall receive one hundred (100) dollars.

Sixth, the balance shall be divided among the competing schools on the basis of season tickets sold and paid for.

Privileges-All competing teams, one attendant, and one faculty manager for each team are to be admitted free to all games.

Eligibility-The eligibility of each player must be certified to by the Principal of the school sending the team. Certificates must be made on the regular blanks furnished by the Permanent Secretary, and all data must be given as indicated. Entries will close Monday,

February 19. This means that they must be in the hands of the Permanent Secretary complete in every detail on that date. All students must be eligible when they participate as well as when they are certified.

Admission Fee-The admission fee to all Tourney games shall be forty (40) cents for single session tickets and one (1) dollar and fifty (50) cents for season tickets and no more shall be received for said tickets. No more tickets shall be sold than the capacity of the house will justify.

Prizes-No prizes of any kind are to be awarded to any school or individual from any source.

Distribution of Tickets-An equitable distribution of tickets shall be made among the competing schools based on distance, enrollment in High School, and probable attendance from the competing schools, due consideration being given to the stipulations outlined under expenses above. Any unfair methods or prices higher than those mentioned in this announcement should be reported to the Board of Control with evidence.

Warnings-Entries close Monday, February 19 and can not be changed afterwards. An entrance fee of $\$ 1.00$ must accompany each entry blank. Special privileges will not be granted to any one. Send all entry blanks and money to Arthur L. Trester, Anderson, Indiana. All data must be given on entry blank.

All sectional tourney reports were made as follows: Ont of the gross receipts legitimate expenses other than transportation were paid first; the center school received $\$ 100.00$ second; the I. H. A received $10 \%$ of the second balance third; the transportation of the teams was paid fourth; the center school received $\$ 100.00$ fifth; and the balance was divided among the competing schools on the basis of season tickets sold prior to March 1. The final tourney report was made as follows: All expenses were paid and the balance was divided on the basis of sixty percen $(60 \%)$ ) and forty percent ( $40 \%$ ) to the center schools.

## GIMBEL PRIZE FOR MENTAL ATTITUDE

In 1917 Jake Gimbel of Vincennes presented to the I. H. S. A. A. Board of Control a proposal to give a prize each year at the State Basketball tourney to the boy among the teams represented that showed the best mental attitude throughout the tourney. Mr. Gimbel did not have in mind the quality of the playing of any boy on any team, but did have in mind the qualities that belong to a real gentleman. He clearly recognized the mental and moral strain under which the players play during the tourney and he also recognized the numerous opportunities for the players to lose control of them. selves and to do something not conducive to true sportsmanship.

The Board of Control accepted the proposal of Mr. Gimbel and the awarding of this prize known as the "Gimbel Prize for Mental Attitude" has been an annual affair, calling for much favorable comment. The prize and the things it represents are cherished by the players and schools of Indiana. This prize has meant much to real sportsmanship and self-control in the High Schools of the State and it is a prize sought for by all schools. The school to which the winner of this prize belongs claims the winner as their own and accordingly the whole school and the whole community are proud. In a number of cities similar prizes are being given to the players who show the best mental attitude within their own schools. The Gimbel prize and these other similar prizes have exalted in a very real sense the qualities belonging to a gentleman in the minds of our boys and girls.

The following articles of agreement are subscribed to by the Board of Control of the Indiana High School Athletic Association, through Arthur L. Trester, Permanent Secretary, and $\qquad$ representing
University or High Schdol.

## SECTION I.

The date of the Indiana High School Semi-Final Basket Ball Series shall be Friday and Saturday, March 9 and 10, 1923.

> SECTION II.

The State High School Board of Control, through Arthur L. Trester, Permanent Secretary, shall furnish the University or High School representative with lists of qualified teams and the names of the men on the respective teams, on or before Tuesday, March 6.

## SECTION III.

The University or High School representative shall provide free entertainment for the respective teams of nine men, which shall include one Faculty Manager for each team, between the hours of 10 a. m. Friday, March 9, and 8 a. m. Sunday, March 11. If possible this period of entertainment will be shortened by the Board of Control. All teams are entitled to entertainment throughout the series.

SECTION IV.
The University or High School representative shall provide tickets, door-men, ushers, announcers, scorers, timekeepers, basket balls, and all necessary equipment for the game. No prizes whatever are to be given by any one.

SECTION V.
The matter of complimentary tickets shall be in the hands of the University or High School representative, who shall issue them to the Press, the officials, and to the helping students. All men of the competing teams and one Faculty Manager for each team are to be admitted to the Series.

SECTION VI.
The I. H. S. A. A. Board of Control shall select and assign the officials for the games not included in Section IV.

## SECTION VII.

The admission fee to all Tourney games shall be forty (40) cents for single session tickets and one dollar fifty cents (\$1.50) for
season tickets, if two rounds are played; and fifty (50) cents for season tickets, if two rounds are played; and fifty ( 50 cents for
single session tickets and one dollar ( $\$ 1.00$ ) for season tickets if only one round is played.

## SECTION VIII

The University or High School representative shall pay to each Referee at the close of his work the sum of fifty dollars ( $\$ 50.00$ ) only. There will be two referees and their entertainment is to be paid by the officials.

## SECTION IX.

All legitimate expenses other than traveling expenses shall be paid by the University or High School representative. If there should be a deficit in doing this the I. H. S. A. A. shall reimburse the University or High School to the extent of fifty per cent ( $50 \%$ ) of the deficit. If there shall be a balance, such shall be divided pro rata among the competing schools for traveling expenses only. Any further balance shall be divided fifty-fifty between the two parties to this contract.

## SECTION X.

The University or High School, under whose auspices the series is held promises hearty co-operation with the State Board of Control and the State Board promises as much to the University or High School conducting the Tourney.

## SECTION XI.

The details of the series, such as protests, eligibility lists, schedules, etc., are to be cared for by the State Board of Control.

## SECTION XII.

The University or High School representative shall send by telegram the name of the winning schools to Arthur L. Trester, Anderson, Indiana, as soon as the series is complete. The University or High School representative shall also send to Arthur L. Trester on or before Monday, March 12, the complete scores of all games and all entry blanks. A complete and itemized statement of receipts and disbursements shall be sent on or before Thursday, March 15 .

> SECTION I

The dates of the Indiana High School Basket Basket Ball Tourney shall be March 16 and 17, 1923, at Indianapolis, Indiana, on the Coliseum Floor.

> SECTION II

The High School Board of Control, through Arthur L. Trester, Permanent Secretary, shall furnish. ists of qualified teams and the names of the me........................................................ teams, on or before March 14, 1923.

## SECTION III

The Indianapolis High Schools' representative shall provide free entertainment for the respective teams of eight men each, together with one attendant and one Faculty Manager for each team, between the hours of 4:00 p. m., Thursday, March 15, and 8:00 a. m., Sunday, March 18.

SECTION IV
The Indianapolis High Schools' representative shall provide tickets, gate men, announcers, scorers, timekeepers and all necessary equipment for the Tourney. He shall further provide a suitable shield for the school winning the Tourney and badges for the individual members of the winning team. The standard design of the I. H. S. A. A. shall be used.
SECTION V

The matter of complimentary tickets shall be in the hands of the Indianapolis High Schools' representative, who shall issue them to the representatives of the Press, the High School officials, and to the helping students. ## TRACK AND FIELD

More interesta and enthusiasm was displayed in track and field work this year than had been displayed for years. There were more dual meets, triangular meets and sectional meets than during any previous season, and there were more boys taking part in these meets than ever before. The half-mile relay race was introduced in the meets for the first time in the I. H. S. A. A. and proved to be a very popular event. The same runners were not permitted to run in the mile relay and the half-mile relay. This scheme made provision for more runners.

Efforts were made to run off all meets in less time than formerly, and full and complete information was furnished the crowds during all of the meets. More attention was given to the organization and management of meets, and the meets became increasingly popular as a result.

There were one hundred eighteen (118) teams entered in fourteen (14) sectional meets, and there were eleven hundred eighty (1180) boys entered in these meets. White of Union City tied the I. H. S. A. A. record in the half-mile run, and set a new record of $4: 33: 4$ in the mile run in the State Meet. Twenty-nine (29) schools shared in point getting, out of seventy-eight (78) schools entered. Of the one hundred eighteen (118) teams entered in the sectional meets, seventyeight (78) were entitled to enter the final meet by winning a first or second place in a sectional meet. A number of schools have been training their track and field men in the fall so that they will be ready early in the spring.

The following schools were sectional track winners: Noblesville, Auburn, Bedford, Wiley (Terre Haute), Seymour, Connersville, Reitz (Evansville), Fairmount Academy, Central (Ft. Wayne), Emerson (Gary), Technical (Indianapolis), Kokomo, South Bend and Otterbein.

Schools have been assigned by counties, and the following scheme gives the Centers and the counties, assigned to each Center. The name of your county locates your Center. The Board reserves the right to readjust the scheme, if necessary. The numbers indicate the schools from each county that have expressed a desire to enter. Entry blanks are necessary, however.

Management-The management of these meets rests solely with the Board of Control. Local arrangements have been delegated to the Center Principals. All officials will be selected by the Center Principal.

The Center Principal shall arrange a program for his Meet from the list of entries sent to him by the Permanent Secretary. All Meets shall begin at 1:00 o'clock, and follow the order of events here given Places on the track must be assigned by lot. The rules of the Western Inter-Collegiate Amateur Athletic Association, published by Spalding, shall govern except in cases of modification by the Board of control. Open Contest-These Meets are open to all members of the Association irrespective of their season's record.

Entertainment-Two men for each event, four men for each relay team and a faculty manager from each competing school will be entertained by the Center Principal. Entertainment will begin, if necessary, at 9 a. m. Saturday, May 12, and continue, if necessary, to 8 p. m. Saturday, May 12 . All competing schools are requested and expected to ask for no longer entertainment than is necessary. Only actual contestants and the faculty manager from each school will be entertained.

Expenses-An entrance fee of One Dollar ( $\$ 1.00$ ) for each team must accompany the entry blank to be retained by the I. H. S. A. A. Traveling expenses must be paid by the competing schools.

Privileges-All competing teams, one rubber and one faculty manager for each team, are to be admitted free to the Meets.

Eligibility-The eligibility of each player must be certified to by the Principal of the school sending the team. The regular blank of the I. H. S. A. A. must be used and all data must be given. Entries positively will close Wednesday, May 2. This means that they must be in the hands of the Permanent Secretary, complete in every detail, on that date.

Admission Fee-The admission fee to all meets shall be fifty (50) cents.

Prizes-Suitable ribbons shall be given to the winners of first, second and third places in each event, and to each member of the winning relay teams.

Warnings-Entries close Wednesday, May 2, and cannot be changed afterwards. An entry fee of One Dollar ( $\$ 1.00$ ) for each team must accompany the entry blank. Special privileges will be granted to no one. Send all entry blanks and money to the Permanent Secretary.

Traveling will be at the expense of the competing schools.

Trial Events-Trials will be held beginning at 10:00 o'clock Saturday morning in the following events: 100 -yard dash, 220 -yard dash, 120 -yard hurdle, 220-yard hurdle, pole vault, shot put, broad jump, and high jump.

Races-The following events will be run in two races in the afternoon: 440 -yard run, 880 -yard run and one mile run. Points and medals will be given for first, second and third place winners in each of the two races for each event. The afternoon events will begin at $1: 30$ o'clock.

Admission Fee-The admission to the Meet shall be fifty cents (50c).

Management-The management, protests and privileges will be governed according to the regulations pertaining to the Sectional Meets.

Prizes-The Indianapolis High Schools will award the winning school a shield or cup; the winning relay teams, placques; and medals of gold, silver and bronze to the winners of 1st, 2nd and 3rd places respectively in each event.

## SECTION I.

The date of the Indiana Sectional High School Track and Field Meets shall be Saturday, May 12, 1923.

## SECTION II.

The State High School Board of Control, through Arthur L. Trester, Permanent Secretary, shall furnish the High School representative with lists of qualified teams and the names of the men on the respective teams on or before Monday, May 7.

## SECTION III.

The High School representative shall provide free entertainment for the respective teams of tour men each, for two relay teams two men for each event, and a faculty manager for each competing school between the hours of $9: 00 \mathrm{a} . \mathrm{m}$. Saturday, May 12, and 8:00 p. m. Saturday, May 12. If possible this period of entertainment will be shortened by the Board of Control.

## SECTION IV.

## MINUTES OF MEETINGS OF BOARD OF CONTROL

## November 25, 1922.

The Board of Control of the I. H. S. A. A. met at the Lahr House, Lafayette, Indiana, at 9:00 a. m. All members of the Board and Permanent Secretary were present.

The decisions of the Board follow.
Salary of Sectional and Regional Tourney officials placed at fifty dollars ( $\$ 50.00$ ) each, and the salary of Final Tourney officials placed at seventy-five dollars ( $\$ 75.00$ ) each,-each official to furnish his own transportation and entertainment.

Selection of officials for Tourneys by the Board of Control to be ade after receiving and studying the recommendations of the Principals. Blanks will be sent out soon for this purpose.

Reaffirmation of the ruling that "parts of two semesters do not enstitute a semester" under Rule 15 .

Fowler vs. Goodland
Due to a small floor at Goodland and to the referee, Mr. Lyons, whose relations with the Goodland team had been of such intimacy that his work as an official might have given reason to think him a favorite at Goodland, the game there was declared a game in which poor sportsmanship was displayed. Goodland was instructed to make all arrangements for games in the future so fair that real sportsmanship would have a chance to assert itseif. The Board recommended that athletic relations between the two schools take a rest until conditions improved.

North Manchester
A student, who attended the Academy there last year, but who enrolled in the High School this semester, was declared ineligible until he had been enrolled one entire semester. Another student, who carried three regular High School subjects during Semester I of the school year 1918-1919, but who returned to the grades for Semester 11, was considered as being a High School student for that year in Baswas considered as ineligible at present.

## Kirklin

It was found that Paul Payne is a five-year man in football. Due extenuating circumstances the Board accepted in good faith the explanation of Principal McBride, and also accepted his voluntary explan to make a satisfactory settlement with all of the schools concerned.

Vevay
Edwin Ross, of Vevay, declared ineligible at Vevay and Rising Sun until he has been enrolled one entire Semester, unless evidence clearly shows that he did not withdraw from the Vevay High School this year and enter the Rising Sun High School.

## Bippus

Vincent Kiser declared ineligible as a five-year man, due to the fact that he played on the High School team when he was an eighth grade student. As to penalty of Bippus, the case was continued.

## Corydon vs. Huntingburg

The Permanent Secretary was instructed to investigate further and to handle the case according to the results of the investigation. Junior High School Question
It was decided to wait for additional developments in different sections of the State before attempting to decide definitely. The Board appreciates the recommendations of the Northern Indiana Junior High Schools.

## New Castle

Raymond Jolly was declared ineligible for all High School athletics, due to his registration and matriculation in Indiana University. The Contracts for the Sectional, Regional and Final Tourneys were discussed, and all details of these Tourneys were considered at length.

The Board decided that on and after January 1, 1923, all major officials in the contests of the I. H. S. A. A. shall be on the approved list of the I. H. S. A. A., and also recommended that only approved officials be used before that date. (All approved officials in the I. H. S. A. A. have approval cards signed by the Permanent Secretary. Principals should call for these when in doubt.1

The Board adjourned to meet at the Bowles Hotel, Bloomington, on Saturday morning, December 9th, at 10 o'clock.

## Waynetown

John Dwiggins of the Waynetown High School was declared ineligible for any inter-school athletics, due to conviction in the Montomery circuit court on a serious charge. The spirit of the I. H. S. A. A. rules governs in this case

## Decatur

Unsportsmanlike conduct was evident in a game of football at Decatur, between Decatur and Hicksville, Ohio, on November 30th. The decisions of Umpire Rippe, of Bluffton, were upheld, and upon satisfactory statements by Supt. Worthman of Decatur, to the effect that genuine sportsmanship would prevail at Decatur in the future, the Decatur High School was placed on probation until January 1, the wecatur instructions to Supt. Worthman to read the following statement to his High School, and to have the statement printed in the local papers of Decatur during the week beginning January 1, 1923:
"The Indiana High School Athletic Association has investigated the conduct of Coach Moore and a number of the spectators at a game of football in Decatur on November 30 th between Decatur and Hicksville, and has found it to be 30 th between Decatur and Hicksvile, and control upholds the very unsportsmanlike. decisions of Umpire Rippe, of Bluffton, and firmiy be Decathat he did not deserve the treatment accorded him by Deca-
tur. Furthermore, the Decatur High School is placed on tur. Furthermore, the Decatur High School is placed on probation in the I. H. S. A. A. until January 1, 1924. Any
violation of the rules of the Association or of the rules of violation of the rules of the Association or of the rules of
genuine sportsmanship by the High School or the community genuine sportsmanship by the High School or will mean expulsion from the I. H. S. A."

## Fulton-Lucerne

The Board found no fault at all with the sportsmanship of Fulton but suggests to Lucerne that they learn and practice more the rules of the game and the rules of genuine sportsmanship. Referee Crowder was placed on probation for the present Basketball season, because of his argumentative attitude toward the players and toward the coach of Lucerne.

Paol-West Baden
The date of birth of Paul Wilson of Paoli was established as of February 20, 1902, thereby making him eligible under the rules of the I. H. S. A. A. The decisions of the referee were declared fair and impartial, and West Baden was given a clean slate regarding a game played at Paoli recently.

The Board recommends that the principals and coaches of both schools have a "get-together" meeting soon and make all arrangements for good sportsmanship at their games.

Bippus
The Board instructed Principal Murford to assume control of his athletics at once, as he, and not the coach, is the responsible party in the I. H. S. A. A. It was decided to write to the County Superintendent and to the Township Trustee, stating the desires and rules of the I. H. S. A. A. as to the responsibility of the Principal in the I. H. S. A. A.

## Franklin-Shelbyville

In a recent game between these two schools at Franklin, Mr Wallace Reiman, a spectator from Shelbyville, "razzed" both major officials, but directed his remarks to Referee Stanley Feezle in par ticular. Referee Feezle, toward the end of the game, requested Principal Vandiver of Franklin to eject Mr. Reiman from the Gym. Principal Vandiver did not comply with this request, neither did he take the necessary steps to stop the "razzing" by Mr. Reiman. Referee Feezle finally struck Mr. Reiman in the face. These are the facts according to a careful investigation by the Board of Control. The Board of Control finds and states, therefore, as follows

1. The "razzing" by Mr. Reiman was not justifiable in any way, as the officiating was good, and Mr. Reiman, being a spectator only, had no right to try to adjust the work of the officials. The I. H. S A. A. recognizes the authority and responsibility of the Principals and Coaches in such matters. If spectators have suggestions they should be given to these school officials and not to the officials of the game.
2. Principal Hugh Vandiver should have taken immediate steps to stop the "razzing" when Referee Feezle requested that Mr. Reiman be ejected from the Gym. The steps that he, as Principal in his own Gym., and therefore responsible, should have taken are: First-A firm request of Mr . Reiman that he be seated and remain quiet; S ond-Ejection of Mr. Reiman from the Gym, in case he did not do requested.
3. Referee Feezle should not have requested that Mr. Reiman be ejected from the Gym. until he had been requested and refused to be seated and to remain quiet. The I. H. S. A. A. denounces the slapping of Mr. Reiman by Referee Feezle, even if provoked.
4. The school authorities present from Shelbyville can not escape their responsibility. Some steps should have been taken by them to show Mr. Reiman the error of his actions prior to the climax.

The Board of Control deplores the whole situation, but has every reason to believe that the parties concerned will always work for the good of the I. H. S. A. A. in the future. Future violations of the spirit of the I. H. S. A. A. will be considered in the light of this case as far as these parties are concerned. Education of all of us along the lines of genuine sportsmanship is the final remedy for such conditions. This case shows how far-reaching for good or evil the activi ties of the I. H. S. A. A. are.

## Lewisville-Raleigh

The decisions of the referee were sustained. The board in tions between the two schools cancelled for this school year, except in Tourneys and Meets under direct control of the I. H. S. A. A. Hoyt Vanderbeck and Robert Ware, of Lewisville, declared ineligible for all athletics during this school year for poor sportsmanship shown at Raleigh.

## South Side High School-Ft. Wayne

Daniel Sprang declared ineligible as a five-year man, and footbal games forfeited by the South Side School to Garrett, Columbia City and Central High School, Fort Wayne, in which the boy participated.

## Gentryville-Chrisney

This case continued until next Board meeting.
In the reorganization of the Board of Control for 1923, Mr. F. L Busenburg was unanimously elected President. It was decided to elect no Treasurer, but to give the Permanent Secretary authority to hold all funds of the I. H. S. A. A.

The details of the contract for the State Final Basketball Tourney were gone over, and it was decided to pay all legitimate expenses of the Tourney from the gross receipts, then divide the balance on the basis of sixty per cent $(60 \%)$ to the I. H, S. A. A., and forty per cent $(40 \%)$ to the Indianapolis High Schools.

The details of the contracts for the Sectional Tourneys were decided as follows

1. All legitimate expenses except for travel shall be paid from gross receipts.
2. The Center High School shall receive $\$ 100.00$.
3. The I. H. S. A. A. shall receive ten per cent $(10 \%)$.
4. The transportation shall be paid.
5. The Center High School shall receive $\$ 100.00$
6. The balance shall be divided among the competing schools on the basis of season tickets sold.
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It was decided to leave the contracts for the Regional series as they were last year, the I. H. S. A. A. sharing fifty-fifty in the balance or deficit after legitimate expenses were paid.

The recommendations of officials for the several Tourneys were studied and the Permanent Secretary was instructed to secure a sui-

## ficient number for all Tourneys

The Tourney invitations were studied carefully in the light of all information, and it was decided to hold more Sectional Tourneys than last year, the number of schools desiring to participate to be the determining factor. It was decided to send out an announcement determinigs the She in detail for all Tourneys. Schools are oon, requested to send in their cards, indicating their desires to participate or to not participate at once.

## Muncie Tourney

The Board decided to hold a sectional tourney at Muncie, cording to the assignments as announced and to sanction the winner

according to the rules for all tourneys giving consideration to the schools participating in the tourney

Greensburg Question
The Board decided that a student who passed in three regular High School subjects for semester one, but who had previously received credit for one or three subjects, is ineligible for semester two.

## Lewisville

The Board of Control refused to re-instate Robert Hall and Hoyt Vanderbeck of Lewisville.

## Walton

Walton High School was suspended until June 1, 1923, for playing ineligible boys on their second team.

## Gentryville-Chrisney

Case dropped, as charges made were light and not supported by evidence.

## Huntington-Wabash

The decisions of the referee were sustained.
The Board instructed the Permanent Secretary to write a letter to Coach Stenger, of Wabash, to the effect that the I. H. S. A. A., does not approve of coaching from the sidelines and considers such unethical and unsportsmanlike.

## Medora, Freetown-Clearspring

Rule 15, page 105, in the 1922 Handbook was held to be valid and binding in this case.

## Montpelier-Marion

The case was continued

The three boys, Fred Braun, Orville Hayes and Ross Williams were declared ineligible for the current semester, and the High School was placed on probation until June 1, 1924. Principal Kendall, of Marion, was present, and gave evidence regarding the game of basket ball played by his High School boys after the State Tourney. It was decided to declare all of the participants ineligible for the current semester and to place the High School on probation until January 1, 1924. Mr. Kendall was instructed to read the decision to his High School and to have it printed in both local papers.

The North Manchester Tourney was considered, representatives being present from North Manchester and Wabash. The following constitutes the settlement:

1. The North Manchester school authorities endeavored to have a clean, sportsmanlike tourney and also endeavored to treat everybody in a fair and courteous manner.
2. The student body of the North Manchester HighSchool, and the large majority of the patrons and fans of North Manchester subscribed to the attitude of the school authorities as given above.
3. Some of the fans and some of the spectators in North Manchester prevented the tourney from being the type of tourney desired in the Indiana High School Athletic Association.
4. No proof was submitted by any representative at the meeting that intentional roughness characterized the players of the Wabash team.
5. Proof was sufficient to show that one of the North Manchester players struck one of the Wabash players inside the dressing room and that the Wabash player did not strike back. This boy should be declared ineligible for future athletics by the North Manchester principal.
6. One of the North Manchester teachers wrote a letter giving his opinion of each player on the Wabash team to groch whose team was scheduled to play Wabash in the a coach whose team was scheduled to playions intentional "dirty" playing to two players and a number of things are "dirty" playing to two players and a number of things are
said about the coach. The board considers this letter very said about the coach. The board
unsportsmanlike, to say the least.
7. The officiating was a little loose, according to all reports, but unfairness was not proved at all for any game. This looseness could have been remedied early if those in authority had presented the matter to both officials. Light
from the principals, instead of heat from the fans would have settled this matter satisfactorily.
8. Games and tourneys in the I. H. S. A. A. must be handled by school officials and not by fans.
The agreement submitted by Mr. Ramsey, of the State Department of Public Instruction, was considered at length, and it was the consensus of opinion that the principals should consider this question and decide upon it.

There being no further business, the meeting adjourned.

The Board of Control of the I. H. S. A. A. met in the Lincoln Hotel at ten o'clock Saturday, June 16th. All members and the permanent secretary were present.

The eligibility of Ray Russell and Herschel Hinman, of the Lyons High Șchool, was considered. The superintendent, J. K. McCarter, was instructed to decide on their eligibility, according as the boys had received remuneration directly or indirectly, for their services as players or coaches.

In answer to the question by Principal Zimmerman, of the Garfield High School, Terre Haute, as to the paying of a coach in part from the athletic funds of a school, the board stated that the salary of a coach in high school athletics should come direct from the Board of Education.

The board re-affirmed the decision as to the suspension of the Silver Lake High School until January 1, 1924, for failure to comply with the stipulations of a contract which Silver Lake made with Bippus.

The board considered all the evidence in the Moores Hill-Aurora controversy for the second time and decided to suspend the Aurora High School until January 1, 1924, for playing boys who were ineligible on account of scholarship.

The board decided to act as a board for the selection of the Gimbel prize winner at the next state basketball tourney.

The board also decided to request all schools to hold their county basketball tourneys prior to February 1 of each year.

Several proposals to be made to the next annual meeting of the I. H. S. A. A. were discussed and it was decided to print and distribute such proposals prior to the annual meeting.

It was also decided to hold a meeting for coaches during the State Teachers Association, if possible,

The plan for holding some sectional basket ball conferences next year was also sanctioned.

It was decided to re-word and re-clasify the constitution and track rules for presentation to the next annual meeting, as some of the rules and regulations are out of date and others are conflicting.

The proposal of an alliance with the State Department of Public Instruction, sanctioned by the American Legion of Indiana, the Indiana League of Women Voters and the State Parent-Teacher Association, was discussed and it was decided that such an alliance should be presented to the annual meeting for disposition.

It was decided to have basket ball tourneys,-sectional, regional and final as usual with the understanding that all tourneys have sixteen (16) teams if possible to arrange such. (Suggestions are desired.)

It was decided to have sectional and final track and field meets as usual.

The following proposals were passed:
V The constitution of the I. H. S. A. A. shall be reworded and re-classified by the Board of Control, omitting such rules and parts of rules as are dead or conflicting, but keeping intact the meaning of all rules and regulations. (Suggestions are desired.)
VI. The Track and Field rules shall be so worded and arranged as to conform to current practice and to the National Collegiate Athletic Association Track and Field Rules.
VII. All basket ball tourneys other than the State Tourneys shall be held prior to February 1 of each year. (It is understood that this rule shall be effective in 1925.)
VIII. Students shall be ineligible for any athletic competition upon reaching twenty-one years of age. (Effective at once.)
X. The Board of Control, through its Permanent Secretary, shall secure data and opinions from all sources regarding exorbitant prices charged by officials and report its findings with suggestions as soon as possible. (Study and return the card accompanying this bulletin.)

The other proposals in Bulletin III were either tabled or voted down.

It was decided that the Board of Control should exercise no
control over intra-school activities or athletic activities within the school.

The rule passed last year regarding the playing season in basket ball was interpreted to permit practice and gymnasium work in basket ball at an ytime during the year, but to limit inter-games to the period between October 1 and the last day of the State Final Tourney.

Spalding's Official Basket Ball Rules for boys for 1923-24 were adopted with the folowing execptions:

1. Paragraph two, section 1, rule 8 shall be stricken out and paragraph 1, section 1, rule 8 shall govern in all games other than tourney games.
2. In all tourney games there shall be two halves of 15 minutes each with an intermission of ten minutes between the halves.

## TRACK AND FIELD RULES

The following proposal was passed at the last annual meeting. "The Track and Field Rules shall be so worded and arranged as to conform to current practice and to the National Collegiate Athletic Track and Field Rules."

The Board of Control has studied the rules of the I. H. S. A. A. and the rules of the National Collegiate Athletic Association and in and all track and field meets in the I. H. S. A. A.:

The National Collegiate Athletic Association Track and Field Rules, published by Spalding shall govern with the following exceptions:
I. Rule 2, regarding a Games Committee shall be void.
II. Scoring-

Three places shall be counted in all meets and the places shall count 5, 3 and 1 . Places in the relay races will not count for points. In case of a tie in any event the points shall be divided and the place awarded by lot.
III. Events---

The events in all meets shall be 100 -yard dash, $220-$ yord dash 440-yard dash, half-mile run, mile run, 120yard high hurdle, 220 -yard low hurdle, running high high jump, running broad jump, pole vault, putting 12 high shot, mile relay and half-mile relay.
IV. Order of Events-

Track-100-yard dash trial; 120-yard hurdle trial; 100yard dash final; one mile run; 440-yard run; 120-yard hurdle final; 220-yard dash trial; 220-yard hurdle trial; half-mile run; 220-yard dash final; 220-yard hurdle final mile relay; half-mile relay.
Field-Running high jump; shot put; pole vault; running broad jump.
V. Eligibility

# CONSTITUTION OF THE INDIANA HIGH SCHOOL ATHLETIC ASSOCIATION 

Officers:
Administration
Section 1. Board of Control.
a. The Board of Control shall consist of five members (principals, members of the faculty or superintendents) to represent the five districts into which the State is divided for administration purposes only.
b. Elections shall take place each year between December 1 and December 10, all votes being mailed to the permanent secretary on ballots prepared by him.
c. Each member of the I. H. S. A. A. in a district shall have ne vote for a board member from his district
d. Beginning with December, 1916, members shall be elected as follows: First District, to serve until January 1, 1918; Second District, to serve until January 1, 1919; Third District, to serve until January 1, 1920. The Fourth District will have an election in December, 1917, the member to serve three years and the Fifth District will have an election in December, 1918, the member to serve three years
e. After the initial elections each member shall be elected for three years.
f. All newly elected officers shall assume the duties of their offices on the first day of January next following his election.
$g$. The person receiving the highest number of votes in his district shall be elected.
h. In case of a tie the vote shall be taken again, the votes beng cast for the men who are tied for first place
i. Three members of the board shall constitute a quorum at any meeting.
j. Removal from the district or withdrawal from the teaching profession shall constitute a vacancy and in such cases the remaining members on the board shall choose a person from the district wherein the vacancy exists to serve until the next election only
k . No retiring member of the board, having served three years, shall be eligible for re-election in any district for a period of one year after date of retirement

Section 2. I. H. S. A. A. Districts.
For the purposes of administration only the state shall be divided by Counties into the following districts

First District-Benton, Carroll, Cass, Fulton, Jasper, Lake, Laporte, Marshall, Newton, Porter, Pulaski, Starke, St. Joseph

Fouth District-Bartholomew, Dearborn, Decatur, Delaware, Fayette, Franklin, Hancock, Henry, Jay, Jefferson, Jennings, Johnson, Madison, Ohio, Randolph, Ripley, Rush, Shelby, Switzerland, Union, Wayne.
Fifth District-Brown, Clark, Crawford, Daviess, Dubois, Floyd, Gibson, Green, Harrison, Jackson, Knox, Lawrence, Martin, Monroe, Orange, Perry, Pike, Posey, Scott, Spencer, Sullivan, Vanderburg, Warrick, Washington.
Sec. 3. The Board of Control shall have the following powers and duties: (a) It shall have general control over all athletic contests between secondary schools in this Asociation. (b) It shall have exclusive control of the annual inter-scholastic Meet; (c) It shall give interpretations of the rules of the Association; (d) It shall determine forfeitures under Sec. 11; (e) The Board of Control, at the end of any athletic season may, at its discretion, issue a statement of its official opinion as to the relative standing of teams. No school which has violated the rules of the Association in regard to the qualifications of players shall be awarded special honors in that particular branch of athletics. (f) It was voted in the 1923 annual meeting that the Board of Control should exercise no control over intra-school activities or athletic activities within the school.

Sec. 4. (a) When charges are made in writing by a member of the Association against another member for violation of the rules of the Association, the Board of Control, after giving due notice of the place and time for the school so charged to be heard, shall consider such charges, and may suspend the offending school for a period not exceeding' one year. (b) The Board of Control shall decide upon all protests brought before it with reference to qualifications contestants in the inter-scholastic meet. (c) When any matter comes before the board for decision which is of special interest to a school of which a member of the board is a representative, the remaining members shall appoint another person to act in his place in that matter.

Sec. 5. At the annual meeting of 1906 a Permanent Secretary shall be elected, who shall have charge of the property and records of the Association; shall receive all money for dues and the sale of publications of the Association; shall issue all circulars authorized by Board of Control, shall attend meetings of the Board when rethe Board of Control the Bord shall turn of to quested to do so by the Board; shall turn over to the moard all money in his possession when called upon to do so; the Board all money in his possession when called upon to do so; shall perform such other duties as the growth of the Association as
determined by the Board may require; and shall receive as com-- 110-
pensation the sum of $\$ 150$ annually, and such allowances for expenses and clerical help as the board may approve. Vacancies in the office may be declared by the board for cause, and a successor appointed by the board to act until the next annual meeting. A referendum vote was taken by President K. V. Ammerman in May, 1922, in regard to placing the permanent secretary on a full-time basis. The vote showed conclusively that such was desired by the principals. On May 27, 1922, the Board of Control submitted a contract to the permanent secretary offering him a salary of five thousand $(\$ 5,000)$ a year with clerical help, office rent and legitimate expenses to conduct the work of the I. H. S. A. A. About the middle of July this offer was accepted and he began work on August 1, 1922.

It shall be the duty of the Permanent Secretary to publish the I, H. S. A. A. Year Book immediately following the annual meeting of the Association.

## Local Management:-

Sec. 6. The Principal or his authorized representative shall accompany his team to all contests.

Sec. 7. The principal of the school, or high school teachers authorized by him, shall be manager or managers of the teams representing the school.

Sec. 8. No games shall be played without the sanction of the principal.

Sec. 9. The eligibility of all the contestants shall be certified to by the principal of the school in accordance with the rules hereby adopted. Such statements shall be presented in writing within ten days before any contest. In case of disputes the principal must furnish the Board of Control the following data in regard to each contestant: The date of last enrollment; the number of years he has been a member of a secondary school athletic team; date and place of birth; average mark in each study for the last preceding term in school; average mark in each study from the beginning of the current term or semester. A school which does not furnish this data shall be denied championship honors, and may be excluded from the Annual Inter-scholastic meet.

Sec. 10. The principal has power and is advised to exclude any contestant who, because of bad habits or improper conduct, would not represent his school in a becoming manner.

Sec. 11. It is recommended that principals, in arranging for games, provide a forfeit of $\$ 10$, to be exacted should there be a failure on the part of either party to carry out the arrangements made. Should such forfeitures be stipulated and not be paid during the same season, the Board of Control, after hearing both sides, shall have authority to expel the delinquent school from the Association. Noti fication of such expulsionshall be published in the papers, with cause therefor.

Sec. 12. Paid Coaches, other than those regularly employed as teachers by the trustees of the school, are prohibited. By paid coach is meant any person who receives, directly or indirectly, remunera-
tion of any kind, money, traveling expenses, gifts, etc., in return for services rendered in instructing or coaching any high school athletic team. No High School shall be permitted to employ a coach or athetic director who receives any extra pay, salary, gifts, trophies, athletic director who receives any extra

Sec. 14. On and after January 1, 1910, all the Major Officials in all athletic contests participated in by teams connected with schools in the I. H. S. A. A. shall be regularly licensed teachers in the public schools of Indiana or shall be persons whose names have been furnished and approved by the Board of Control. It is recommended that these officials shall be disinterested, and it is required that when a school demands disinterested officials at the time of scheduling the ame, such officials shall be furnisned. Games and Game Rules:
Sec. 17. No games shall be played with public high schools of this state not belonging to the Association.

This rule does not prevent a member of the Association from
 high school teams within the state, except as follows:

It is a violation of the Constitution for schools in the Associaion to play non-high school teams including high school boys, unless the later are certified as eligible by the Principal of the school to which they belong.

Sec. 18. The games recognized by the I. H. S. A. A. shall be: Football, Rugby Football, Soccer, Basket Ball, Track Work and Base Ball. Further, all forms of intei-school aihetic games shall be subject to the rules of the I. H. S. A. A.

Sec. 19. In all football contests held under these rules, the length of each half shall be twenty-five minutes, unless changed by mutual consent.

Sec. 20. The basketball rules for boys and girls, as published in Spalding's Official Basket Ball rule books shall be the official rules roverning all contests between members of the I. H. S. A. A. The three-court plan shall be used by girls, except as mutually agreed three-court plase. Under no conditions may girls play according to upon, otherwise. Under no cond roverning the selection of officials in the above rules shall be void, and unless otherwise agreed by mutual consent each school shall furnish one official, and these officials shall alternate their duties, each acting as referee and each acting as umpire one half.
sec. 21. a. No basket bail games shall be played by players or schools prior to October 1st of each school year.
b. No basketball games shall be played by players or schools after the State Final Tourney.
c. The maximum number of games for the regular schedule for any team shall be twenty.
d. Teams may play in two tourneys in addition to the S'ate Tourneys and in addition to the twenty games on the regular schedule. The number of games in ore of these "two tourneys" shall be counted in the twenty games permitted for the regular schedule.)
e. Schools violating any of these rules- shall be suspended. (This resolution was passed without discussion and without a dissenting vote showing clearly that the principals desire to abide by their own rules and regulations. The essence of democracy is that good government is secured by and with the consent of the governed.) Eligibility:

Rule 1. To represent a school in any interscholastic contest, a person must be under twenty-one years of age, must have entered some public high school within the first twenty school days of the semester in which the contest occurs, and must be an amateur. Fighth orade pupils are not eligible. A semester is one-haif a school year.

Rule 2. Any pupil who has been enrolled twenty (20) or more days from September 1 to December 1 of same year for each of four semesters will be ineligible to play football a fifth semester.
"Any pupil who has been enrolled for a period of twenty (20) or more days from December 1 to March 1 of the next year for each of four semesters shall be eligible to play a fifth semester, provided he meets the requirements of the onier elig.b.ilty rules; piovided further that no pupil shall represent his school longer than four years.

Interpretation-This rule applies only to students entering schoo for the first time during the second semester of the school year,
and enrollment in school rather than participation in athletics shall determine the eligibility of all students.

Any pupil who has been enrolled for a period of twenty (20) or more days from March 1 to June 1 of the same year for each of four semesters shall be ineligible to play base ball a fifth semester. Any pupil who meets all other eligibility requirements and who enrolls in High School for the first time during the second semester of the school year shall be eligibile to participate in base ball and track a fifth semester, providing that no pupil shall represent his school longer than four years. (This means that students, who enter High School for the first time in the middle of the year, may have the opportunity to participate in base ball and track and field four spring: semesters thereafter, providing they do not participate the first semester.)

Rule 3. A pupil withdrawing permanently from school within the first twenty school days of the semester shall not be regarded as having an onportunity to engage in athletics that semester unless he has already played in one or more interscholastic games, in which case he shall be regarded as having engaged in athletics for that season.

Rule 4. Post Graduates are not eligible, but pupils graduating from regular three-year courses shall not be deemed post graduates. Rule 5. A student is a post graduate of a school after he has completed the work required for graduation by that school, irrespective of the time of granting the diploma.

Rule 6. Pupils meeting requirements for graduation in three and one-half years in high school with regular four years course shall be eligibile to participate in school athletics the last half of the fourth year, provided they meet all other eligiblity rules of the I. H. S. A. A.

Rule 7. Time spent in athletic sport by pupils while in grades below the high school shall not be counted as part of the four years.

Rule 8. No person shall enter a contest under an assumed name.

Rule 9. Any member of a high school athletic team who participates in an athletic contest as a member of any other similar team the same season, shall be ineligible to compete under these rules for the remainder of that season.

Rule 10. Each contestant must have and be maintaining for the current semester, a passing grade in each of three or more studies requiring a minimum of fifteen regular high school recitations per week, exclusive of rhetoricals, physical culture, military drill and deportment; in his last preceding semester in school he must also have met the same requirements throughout the entire term.

Pupils enrolled for the first time must comply with the requirements of the rules, the average standing required for the preceding: semester being obtained from the records in the last secondary school attended.

Back work may be made up, providing that it is done in accordance with the regular rules of the school and becomes a matter of
final record before the next semester.
Interpretation-In each of the studies representing the minimum requirement of work specified above: (a) For the current semester the average of the monthiy grades up to the time of certification must be passing; (b) for the current or school month the average of the daily or weekly grades must be passing; (c) if the average of the monthly grades at the beginning of any month is below passing in any study, the pupil is ineligible as far as that study is concerned for the entire month.

Rule 11. No person who has been enrolled as a student in an institution of college standing, and has done work which may be counted toward a degree in that institution, shall be eligible as a member of any athletic team under I. H. S. A. A. rules in any game with any other team, either within or without the State of Indiana.

Rule 12. The eligibility rules of this Association shall apply to students taking part in all contests, whether with schools inside or outside the State of Indiana.

Rule 13. On and after January 1, 1911, no student shall be eligibile to play football unless he has been examined by a regular physician and his physical condition has been pronounced satisfactory. Further, such student shall not be eligible until the physician's certificate has been filed with the permanent secretary of the Association. Said certificate shall be good from September 1 to December 1 , only

Rule 14. On and after January 1, 1911, no pupil shall be eligible to play football without the written consent of his father, mother or guardian. Said written consent shall be attested by the principal or faculty manager, and shall be filed with the permanent secretary of the Association. The copy of said written consent shall be attached to the physician's certificate when filed with the permanent secretary.

Rule 15. No student, who has been enrolled as a High School student in any High School shall be permitted to participate in any inter-high school contest as a member of another high school until he has been enrolled in such high school for one full semester, unless the parents of such student actually change their residence to the second school district. In the latter case the student will be as eligible as he was in the school from which he withdrew.

The resolution is interpreted as follows:

1. Students finishing the courses offered in schools maintaining less than four years of high school work are not bound by the resolution.
2. The fact that a transfer has or has not been issued or that the student pays or does not pay his tuition has no bearing on the resolution.
3. A student enrolled in one High School of a city or school corporation shall not be eligible in another High School of the same city or school corporation until he has been enrolled in the other High School for one full semester.

Rule 16. No High School pupil shall be eligible to participate in any inter-school contest under the rules of the Indiana High School Athletic Association, if it shall be shown that he, or any member of his family is receiving any remuneration, either directly or indirectly, to influence hm or hs family to reside in a given school distrct $n$ order to establish eligibility on the team of said school, and any school permitting such participation shall, upon satisfactory evidence submitted to the State High School Board of Control, be suspended by them from membership in the I. H. S. A. A. for a term of not less than one year. This rule shall not interfere with the right of High School pupils to work during vacations or during out of school hours in ordeur to earn their way through High School. It shall apply to the use of any funds created by gift or by subscription with the intent offering them or parts of them for the free use of the player or any member of his family as an inducement to get them to change their residence to the district of said school and to maintain resident thereresidence the district of said school and covers the ground regarding in. (This rule is rather inclusive and covers the ground regarding the securing of players by one school or by the fans from another school. The penalty is clear and heavy. The board will place the
responsibility of proving that this rule has not been violated upon the responsibility of proving that this rule has
principals in case of question or protest.)
Interpretations.

First. A game is an Inter-High School athletic contest.
Second. The footbal season is defined as beginning with the opening of school and closing with November 30 .

Third. No student who violates the rules of the Association will be reinstated by the Board.

Fourth. A pupil who has played in one or more inter-scholastic games in any season shall be regarded as having engaged in athletics for that season.

Fifth. When a member or members of any team are protested, the game should be played as scheduled and the protest filed with the board for settlement later.

Sixth-The basket ball season is defined as lasting from October 1 st of each year to the closing evening of the State Tourney.

Seventh. Section 21, paragraphs "a" and " $b$ " was interpreted at the 1923 annual meeting to permit practice and gymnasium work in basket ball at any time during the year, but to limit inter-games to the period between October 1 and the last day of the State Final Tourney.

Eighth. Any student, who carries at least 15 hours of regular High School work, is a High School student.

Ninth. It is recommended that principals take proper measures to control the crowd and the players in all contests. Failure to do so shall be considered sufficient grounds for expulsion from the Asociation.

Tenth. Rule 1, under eligibility regarding the age require tepnt was changed at the 1923 annual meeting so that students are ineligible for any athletic competition upon reaching twenty-one years of age.

Eleventh. An amateur in the I. H. S. A. A. is a person who has never played or officiated in athletic contests for money or under an assumed name. Reasonable meals, lodging and travelling expenses may be met providing such is done in services and tickets, rather than in money.

Notes.

1. Parents' and physician's certificates, contracts for all contests, eligibility certificates, blanks for certification of officials, and blanks for reporting contests will be furnished in quantities upon application to the permanent secretary. Please state definitely the kind and number of each wanted.
2. The Annual Hand-Book will be sent upon receipt of twentyfive cents.
3. All correspondence and remittances, from members of the Association to the Board of Control or to the permanent secretary must be indorsed by the principal. THE PRINCIPAL IS THE RESPONSIBLE PARTY.

The rules of the game have undergone numerous changes since 1903, and the changes have been along lines to lessen the actual danger to players and to make the game not merely a game of brute strength. Football paraphernalia has been somewhat improved, so that it serves as protection to the wearers, rather than as an instrument of torture to the opponents.

Football games were better managed and better officiated this year than in past years. The players have been better trained and better equipped. The I. H. S. A. A. needs many more good officials in football, however. There were seventy-six (76) football teams in the I. H. S. A. A. during the past season, making a gain of twenty (20) for this year over last year, or a gain of forty-five per cent.

No attempt has ever been made by the Board of Control to determine the State championship in football. Any claim to the championship is not official in character, although made by a good team. It is the opinion of the Board that there is no feasible scheme of determining such a championship. All football games scheduled as State championship games have no sanction as such by the Board of Control. The best interests of the I. H. S. A. A. are not served by scheduling and advertising such contests as State championship games. The Board of Control has never determined the State championship team in football.

## Base Ball

This sport suffers as a High School sport because the fall season is short and the spring season is short. Then, too, professional baseball has the front seat usually. In the fall the professional baseball season is coming to a close, and in the spring the High School has difficulty in competing with the professional playing.

The game was played, however, by many schools last spring, and also this fall. In several counties there were baseball leagues that scheduled games to be played during the week after school hours. Much interest was shown in these games.

The I. H. S. A. A. recognizes that High School boys have many opportunities and desires to play on independent teams during the summer months, so the following statements have been made:

High School students may play on independent baseball teams during the summer months, when school is not in session, without jeopardizing their standing in the I. H. S. A. A., providing they do not play under assumed names, and also providing they do not accept remuneration, directly or indirectly, for their playing.

Reasonable meals, lodging and transportation may be accepted by the students, if such are accepted in service rather than in money, or in some other material form. The I. H. S. A. A. expects all High School students to conduct themselves at all times in a way that will honor their High School, the I. H. S. A. A., and themselves.

These statements will enable principals to know the eligibility of their students, as a professional in one sport is a professional in all sports, as far eligibility in the I. H. S. A. A. is concerned.

## Approval of Officials

The scheme introduced during the year to use approved officials only has increased the quality of our officiating many fold. At present there are 1,370 approved officials in the I. H. S. A. A., scattered over the whole state and certified for the different sports. While approval for the most part has had to be made from recommendations yet continued approval in the I. H. S. A. A. is dependent upon the work of the official. The fact that an official has been approved does not mean that he will remain approved. Disbarment cards will be issued to officials for cause and their names will be published in our bulletins. Reports on the work of officials are wanted by the Board of Control, as it is only in this way that a good list of officials can be secured. The I. H. S. A. A. now has a list to work from, and it will take the concerted efforts of all Principals to make the list as it should be.

A number of "clinics" or conferences have been held over the state in which discussions were held regarding the rules of the games, the officiating, the rules of the I. H. S. A. A., the handling and the control of the crowds, and the rules of real sportsmanship. The results have been very encouraging. In all probability a blank contract form for officials, the amount to be supplied by the parties concerned, would assist materially in this work.

As the scheme for approval now stands, an approved official remains approved as long as his work is good. There is no annual certification nor annual fee for officials. The initial fee is one dollar (\$1.00). The following cards are now used:

The enclosed approval card is word proof that you have allied yourself with one of the biggest and best State High School Athletic Associations in the United States. A sense of modesty prevents us from claiming more for the I. H. S. A. A. We sincerely trust that you have also allied yourself with the spirit and the high ideals of this Association of nearly seven hundred High Schools. We sincerely congratulate you, therefore, on belonging, as you now do, to an Athletic Association that was founded and has been nourished on the principles of fair competition and clean amateur sportsmanship for High School boys and girls. In a very vital sense you have accepted the role of teaching young people and adults the ideals, standards and values of clean sportsmanship. You have signed a statement saying that you know the rules of the games and the rules of the I. H. S. A A You have also said that you will officiate according to these rules and these ideals.

Scandals have been numerous and widespread in collegiate and professional circles during the years, but the old I. H. S. A. A. has a record that is clean and untarnished. The small irregularities that have arisen have been handled as golden opportunities to spread our gospel of right relationships and clean competition. Evils have been used as stepping stones to better things. In order, therefore, that you may know and appreciate the responsibility that you have assumed, our ideals and standards with a few suggestions are here given:

1. The I. H. S. A. A. stands for a real physical training program for all boys and all girls, built around drills, games, competitive activities and legitimate sports, rather than around formal gymnastics or organized military training.
2. The I. H. S. A. A. stands for physical training as an integral part of the school curriculum, and athletics as an integral part of physical training.
3. The I. H. S. A. A. stands for fair competition, clean sportsmanship, real amateurism, honest dealings, no gambling, no commercialism, no proselyting, and no recruiting.
4. The I. H. S. A. A. stands for scholarship and behavior, believing that athletics and nhysical training should ever be secondary and contributory to these things.
5. The I. H. S. A. A. stands for the training of boys and girls in such a way that will make for real citizenship in a real democracy.

## SUGGESTIONS

1. The main duty of an official is to officiate in a fair, courteous, and competent manner, according to the rules of the game, and the rules of the I. H. S. A. A. Officials who lecture, pay compliments, accept and render favors, pursue salesmanship campaigns, proselyte and recruit players cover too much territory.
2. Gambling or arranging conditions so that gambling may take place has no place in the make-up of a real official.
3. The officiating of a contest in such a manner that future contracts may be secured because of favors shown, is a record that I. H. S. A. A. officials must not possess.
4. Contracts should be binding on both parties, whether verbal or in writing, but written contracts are recommended.
5. Incompetence has no place whatever in the I. H. S. A. A. officiating. All officials have signed statements saying that they know the rules of the games and the rules of the I. H. S. A. A.
6. Officials receive respect by being clean, respectful, courteous, fair-minded, courageous and competent; and genuine continued respect can be secured in no other way.
7. Officials should not place themselves under obligations by accepting hospitality and favors from either side of the contest. It is wise to eliminate every argument, real and otherwise, regarding your fairness.

Your work will be watched with interest, and we trust that you will work for the best interests of the I. H. S. A. A., an Association which stands firmly for the highest ideals of clean sportsmanship. You have promised as much on your application card, and all officials will stand or fall on the basis of their records. School officials will be urged to inform us about your work, and we solicit information from you about school officials. We believe in fair dealing, and in cases of dissatisfaction officials and school authorities will be given a fair hearing.

## BRIEF HISTORY OF I. H.S. A. A.

The first attempt to organize the High Schools of Indiana in a ingle organization for the purpose of handling athletic activities was ingle in a morthern Indiana Teachers' Association, , 1903. At this time there was a conferof High School Principals, and the conference ended with a body f surgested rules and regulations; called the Richmond Agreement. Due to Dive power, the Richmond Agreement did little more than point the way toward something better.

Principal J. B. Pearcy, of Anderson, issued a call for a meeting of High School Principals interested in a State Athletic organization for December 5, 1903. At this meeting a provisional constitution was adopted. At a similar meeting on December 29, 1903, a final constitution was adopted and a Board of Control of three members was chosen to administer the affairs of the I. H. S. A. A.

The first Board of Control was made up of Principal George W, Benton, Shortridge High School, Indianapolis; Superintendent Lotus D. Coffman, Salem, and Principal J. T. Giles, Marion. These men thought and planned well, and we are enjoying the fruits of their vision.

There were fifteen (15) High Schools belonging to the I. H. S. A A., March 1, 1904, and now there are seven hundred twenty-one (721) High Schools belonging. The membership has had a gradual growth through the years, and now the limit is recognized as the limit in the number of High Schools in the State.

A study of the men who have served on the Board of Control through the years will show clearly that the activities of the I. H.S. A. A. have been in good hands. In the beginning, one member of the Board of Control served as Secretary, but it soon became very evident that this office furnished enough work for a special man. It was also seen that the future of the organization demanded that the office of Secretary be made more permanent than the office of Board Member. Accordingly, at the annual meeting in 1906 the office of Permanent Secretary was established, and Principal J. T. Giles was chosen by the Principals to be the first Permanent Secretary. Principal Giles resigned on December 26,1912 , and Principal Isaac E. Neff was chosen by the Principals to succeed him. Principal Neff resigned March 15, 1913, and the Board succeed him. The primary purpose of the organizers of the I. H. S. A. A. to manage and to foster High School athletics on a high plane has been held up as an ideal by the Association through the twenty years of
the life of the I. H. S. A. A. New and advanced steps have been taken whenever conditions made them necessary. It became increasingly evident as time went on that the I. H. S. A. A. should assume a larger and larger initiative in real physical education for all boys and all girls, and that physical education should be interpreted in the light of other educational aims and ideals.
