ADDRESS BY RETIRING PRESIDENT, ROY B. JULIAN TO THE INDIANA HIGH SCHOOL ATHLETIC ASSOCIATION

We are making progress. This year marks the beginning of a new era in the life of the I.H.S.A.A. The principals of the I.H.S.A.A. voted to place the legislation of the organization in the hands of a representative body elected by them. This new body has been chosen and is now functioning. The confidence we manifested by selecting them must now be supported by loyalty to them as they try to serve us.

The people of Indiana are proud of the I. H. S. A. A. and point with pride to it and its accomplishments. The affairs of the body have always been conducted on a high plane. There have been contention and strife but in the end the impartial and just rulings to all have welded the group together as a strong body.

The administration of the atheltic affairs has always been in able hands. A review of the personnel of the officers of the organization will reveal a list of leaders in Indiana High Schools.

The policy now accepted of maintaining a Permanent Secretary on a full-time basis is a wise one. For many years the Permanent Secretary was a part-time official. Three years ago this office had become sufficiently important to merit a full-time official. Only a few of the state associations have been able to provide for their schools in this efficient way but are planning this step in the future. The services this secretary may give to you are many. He stands ready and willing to help you solve your problems at any time. Call upon him when you can use him.

The criticism is often made that many of the High Schools in Indiana are giving too much time to one sport,—rasketball. It is not my purpose here to give the reasons for this existing condition but to present a plan for a better balanced program of athletics. When we recognize the various sports,—football, basketball, baseball, track, etc., the problem will be half solved. It is not possible nor feasible that every school participate in all the above mentioned sports. However, it is both wise and possible that the field and value of each sport be recognized and provided for. For example all schools can not play football, but all schools can arrange some outside sport where the benefit of playing out of doors is reaped by the students. Neither is it possible for all schools to have a baseball nine or a track team, but a program arranged with care will provide for the benefits accruing from these games.

The popularity of High School contests forces many problems into the hands of High School administrators. School officials must be alert to see the situations as they are to be met. The wonderful opportunities to sell the school, not the athletics solely, by means of the contacts with the public thus afforded can not be overlooked. There are many fine schools in Indiana today that are realizing upon this situation. The revenues derived from contests in many places finance the physical education program for the entire school. Also the training provided for the special group that makes the team is of fine type and will transfer to the entire student body. Lessons in character building are no place so well learned as in the heat of a contest. It is my belief that men and women of better metal are developed because of these high school contests.

Now, on the other side, unless the proper guidance is exercised an athletic program presents more opportunities for the boy to go wrong, both morally and physically than any other school activity. Too much unhealthful competition exists, feuds are perpetuated, bitterness is stimulated, boys physically unfit are allowed to compete and harm is done. How is all this to be avoided? By the proper leadership and supervision on the part of school authorities.

The next generation expects much from us. We will not disappoint them. To the end that a better type of citizenship shall be developed we carry on our various activities. No doubt some mistakes are made, but with the open mindedness which has characterized our past and which will be ours in the future, the I. H. S. A. A. will carry on to a bigger and better service than ever before.

I. H. S. A. A. PROGRAM

(We believe in boys and girls.)

- 1. Real physical training for all boys and all girls built around drills, rythms, games, contests, competitive activities and legitimate sports rather than around formal gymnastic exercises or around highly organized military training.
- 2. Incorporation and use of the valuable elements in formal gymnastic exercises and in military training as contributory measures to a materialization of real physical training.
- 3. Physical training as an integral and vital part of the school curriculum and athletics as an integral and vital part of physical training.
- 4. Belief in games and contests between schools and just as strong belief in games and contests between classes, groups, clubs and leagues within the schools so that all boys and all girls may secure their physical chances.
- 5. Education of the public regarding the ideals, program and policy of the I. H. S. A. A., and also in the idea that an opportunity furnished by facilities in the way of gymnasiums, playfields, equipment and a competent personnel in adequate numbers to direct is all that is necessary to secure general and voluntary participation in this program by boys and girls.
- 6. Physical training and athletics as elements only in the proper training of boys and girls. These things are extremely valuable but must be considered as contributory to scholarship, high ideals, real sportsmanship and to the building of the proper habits of real living in a democracy. A proper sense of relative values will save us.
- 7. General recognition of the possibilities for real training for boys, girls and adults in athletic contests and in the many competitive activities in a real physical training program. Real situations filled with real opportunities for real training in the elements of real citizenship arise in athletic activities. An adequate and competent personnel to direct will turn these situations into habits that will function in right thinking and in right acting.
- 8. Clean amateur athletics, fair competition, honest dealings; and real sportsmanship at all times. These things bar the recruiting of players and remove the money-changers from our gymnasiums and playfields.
- 9. Elimination of the "win at any cost" ideal and substitution of the "play hard and win by fair means only" ideal. The former ideal is far too low for boys and girls, too low for communities and too low for our country.
- 10. Clean, competent and fair-minded coaches, physical directors, managers, teachers and officials who are vitally interested in the welfare of boys and girls and who have backbone enough and of sufficient rigidity to stand firmly at all times for the best interests of boys and girls.

FUNDAMENTAL PRINCIPLES AND BELIEFS OF THE I.H.S.A.A.

I. Commercialism is antagonistic to the best interests of clean amateur athletics.

II. Professionalism should play no part in school athletic activities.

III. Athletics and physical training should be managed in accord with other educational aims and values.

IV. School athletic activities are educational activities and

should be managed by school authorities. V. The training of all and the exploitation of none should be

considered fundamental in physical education. VI. Provision for spectators, as well as participants, is highly

desirable, as the educational values in moral, civic and social ways gained by having men, women and children interested in clean sport are valuable.

VII. Physical training and athletic activities should be dignified by being assigned a prominence in the curriculum on a par with other work.

VIII. Intelligent leadership and sympathetically efficient management will do much more than critical denunciation.

IX. Athletics is one of the greatest of forces for the development

of school morale and school spirit, when properly handled.

X. Athletics should have its proper setting in physical training activities. Physical training should have its proper setting in physical education, and physical education should have its proper setting in the whole health program.

XI. Games, contests, competitive activities, sports, drills. folk dances, rythms and marches are basic in physical training work, because such are natural and free and furnish real genuine interest without which the highest development does not take place.

XII. Artificial exercises have a certain value, but such value is not comparable to the values secured in free play, organized play and in well conducted contests, sports and games.

LIABILITY AND RESPONSIBILITY

According to the rules and regulations of the I.H.S.A.A., the High School Principal is the responsible party in all athletic activities and relations. This association was formed largely by High School Principals, was fostered by High School Principals and the constitution places the responsibility on the High School Principals. For the most part these men and women have shouldered the responsibility of athletic activities and relations in a fine way. Sometimes authority commensurate with the responsibility has not been given to these High School Principals and of course difficulties have arisen. In some cases High School Principals have evaded or neglected to exercise the direct responsibility of athletic activities and affairs have not been satisfactory.

The only true basis of any responsibility is liability. To be responsible in the strictest sense means to be liable and really there is no responsibility when there is no liability. In saying, therefore, that the High School Principal is responsible in all athletic activities,

it is said that the High School Principal and his school are liable under the rules and regulations of the I. H. S. A. A. for any infractions or violations of these rules and regulations. When a school joins the I. H. S. A. A. the Principal assumes the responsibility of knowing the rules and regulations of the I. H. S. A. A., of acquainting his students, teachers and community with these rules and regulations and his responsibility of a strict observance of them and of supporting the ideals of the I. H. S. A. A. in a constructive way at all times. In assuming this responsibility a sense of liability presents itself to every Principal who takes his work as Principal seriously. It is hoped that the responsibility of belonging to the I. H. S. A. A. will be assumed by High School Principals in a larger way and that this responsibility will be supported by a clean-cut liability. It is also hoped that High School Principals will be given willingly authority commensurate with their responsibility in athletic affairs. A keen sense of responsibility backed up by a felt sense of liability and coupled with the right degree and quality of authority will work wonders in our I. H. S. A. A.

Basket Ball

The game of basketball continues to be the leading game in the I.H.S.A.A. as far as the number of games played and the number of teams and players are concerned. Intra-mural basketball games were played in practically all of the High Schools by the boys and in many High Schools by the girls as well. Inter-school basketball playing was largely confined to games by the boys although several schools had inter-school games by the girls. Spalding's Basketball Guides for Men and Women were the official guides with the exceptions of the time of halves for the boys in tourney games and the three-court plan for girls unless mutual agreement existed for the two-court plan. Under no conditions were girls permitted to play according to boys' rules.

Several county and invitational tourneys were held prior to February 1 and under the auspices of the High Schools concerned. The scheme of holding these tourneys early in the year proved advisable as it gave an interval of several weeks between these tourneys and the State sectional tourneys. In all of the sectional, regional and final tourney games the halves were fifteen minutes each.

Sectional, Regional and Final Tourneys.

The sectional tourneys ended by the elimination method with 64 winning schools. The scores and results of these tourneys may be found elsewhere in this book. There were sixty-four (64) sectional tourney centers with 674 teams participating. In 1924 there were 52 centers and 665 teams; in 1923 there were 48 centers and 596 teams; and in 1922 there were 32 centers and 564 teams. All tourneys had 16 teams or less participating.

The regional tourneys were eight (8) in number and ended with sixteen (16) winning teams by playing to the semi-finals. The scores and results of these tourneys may be found elsewhere in this book.

The sixteen (16) winners of the eight (8) regional tourneys met in a final tourney at Indianapolis and the Frankfort High School team won the tourney and the State Championship in I.H.S.A.A. Basketball for 1925 by the elimination method. All schedules for all tourneys were drawn by lot by the Board of Control.

Russell Walter of Kokomo won the Gimbel Prize for Mental Attitude. The five members of the Board of Control served as a committee to make the choice and such was made after careful consideration and numerous conferences. The elements that contribute to the making of a real gentleman were the ones considered in the selection.

Dr. James Naismith of the University of Kansas, the founder of the game of basketball, was an invited guest of the I.H.S.A.A. at the final tourney and presented the prizes at the close of the tourney. He makes the following statements in Spalding's Basketball Guide for 1995, 1996.

"As a guest of the Indiana State Athletic Association I had an opportunity to watch the effects of their state basketball tournament. The possibilities of basketball as seen there were a revelation to me. The striking features were the grade of basketball, the splendid spirit

of the players and the unbounded enthusiasm of the fifteen thousand spectators who crowded the Exposition Building. Many were being turned away for lack of room.

It was a spectacle long to be remembered, especially for the way in which it was conducted and the spirit of sportsmanship shown to de officials and the other players. One incident shows what can be done with High School boys.

A player on one of the teams was taken out for four personal fouls. Immediately four of the opposing players shook hands with him and expressed their condolences. This exhibition of true sportsmanship produced a profound impression not only on myself but upon the whole audience.

Such results cannot be produced by the game itself, but are the result of careful and judicious supervision by some responsible parties. The work of Arthur Trester cannot be too highly commended, as it is showing results throughout the whole state. It would be impossible for him to accomplish these results without the loyal backing and support of the Board of Control. This support enables him to exert a wonderful influence on the 762 High Schools belonging to their association."

Dr. Walter E. Meanwell, varsity basketball Coach at the University of Wisconsin paid a high compliment to the Indiana High School Athletic Association in a statement published in "The Daily Cardinal" following his return from attending the Indiana High School Basketball Tournament. "The Daily Cardinal" story follows:


"It was the greatest exhibition of athletics in the United States that I have ever seen. I don't understand how we have ever beaten any Indiana basketball teams. Those boys shoot better than any man on our varsity, and they begin to play basketball where we leave off. I wish our high school tournament could in any way compare with that one and hope the people support ours as the one I saw was supported. I went there expecting big things but it astonished me. The game has been developed to the highest degree in Indiana and has become the ideal high school game for any size school can have a good basketball team. The result of this high state of perfection of the cage game is that all of the boys were the finest type of muscular build, tall, manly, strong, fast athletes who might be developed to perfection in any sport."

MANAGEMENT—The general management of these Tourneys rests solely with the Board of Control. Local arrangements have been delegated to the Center Principals. Two officials for each tourney will be selected by the Board and none but fair disinterested and competent men will be chosen. All schedules of hours, floor, teams, and officials will be made out and printed by the Board. All schedules will be drawn by lot by the Board of Control and no changes will be made in them.

OPEN CONTEST—The tourneys are open to all members of the Association, irrespective of their season's record.

PROTESTS—All protests against teams or individuals must be made in writing by the Principal and filed with the Permanent Secretary on or before 11 a. m. February 25. Protests must be accompanied by evidence. Eleventh hour protests are usually unfair.

ENTERTAINMENT—Teams are limited to eight men, but ten men can be certified. The Center Principals have contracted with the Board to entertain nine men (which MUST include the faculty manager) from each competing school. Entertainment will begin, if necessary, at 7 a. m. Friday, March 6, and continue, if necessary, to 8 a. m. Sunday, March 8. Printed schedules will be sent to each competing school in plenty of time to arrange for making the trip. All competing schools are requested to ask for no longer entertainment than is necessary, but all schools are entitled to entertainment throughout the tourney. Fairness must prevail in this matter.

EXPENSES—An entrance fee of one dollar (\$1.00) for each team must accompany the entry blank, which money will go into the treasury of the I. H. S. A. A. to defray expenses of the tourneys incurred by the Board of Control. The Center Principals have contracted to make settlement according to the following scheme:

1. All legitimate expenses except for transportation shall be

paid from the gross receipts.

2. The Center High School shall receive one hundred dollars

(\$100).
3. The transportation shall be paid.(The Board of Control has decided on four (4) cents per mile per man for the round trip.)

4. The Center High School shall receive one hundred dollars (\$100.)

5. The I. H. S. A. A. shall receive five percent (5%).

6. One-half of the balance shall be divided pro rata among the participating schools.

7. One-half of the balance shall be divided on the basis of season

ticket sales in the local communities.

8. The Board of Control shall pass on all reports by the Center

School and all reports by the participating schools.

9. The Center School shall furnish a complete financial report to the I. H. S. A.A. and to each participating school soon after the tourney.

PRIVILEGES—All competing teams, one attendant, and one faculty manager for each team are to be admitted free to all games.

ELIGIBILITY—The eligibility of each player must be certified to by the Principal of the school sending the team. Certificates must be made on the regular blanks furnished by the Permanent Secretary and all data must be given as indicated. Entries will close Monday, February 23. It is recommended that these be sent by registered mail between February 10 and 21. All students must be eligible when they participate as well as when they are certified.

ADMISSION FEE—The admission fee to all tourney games shall be forty (40) cents for single session tickets and one dollar fifty cents (\$1,50) for season tickets and no more shall be received for said tickets. No more tickets shall be sold than the capacity of the house will justify.

PRIZES—No prizes of any kind are to be awarded to any school or individual from any source.

The division on season ticket sales shall be made on the basis of such tickets being sold and paid for on or before Thursday, March 5. All schools must observe this provision.

SECTION III.

The High School representative shall provide free entertainment for the respective teams of nine men, which shall include one Faculty Manager for each team, between the hours of 7 a. m., Friday, March 6, and 8 a. m., Sunday, March 8. If possible this period of entertainment will be shortened by the Board of Control. All teams are entitled to entertainment throughout the tourney.

SECTION IV.

The High School representative shall provide tickets, door men, ushers, announcers, scorers, timekeepers, basketballs, and all necessary equipment for the games. No prizes whatever are to be given.

· SECTION V.

The matter of complimentary tickets shall be in the hands of the High School representative, who shall issue them to the Press, the officials, and to the helping students. All men of the competing teams, one attendant, and one Faculty Manager for each team, are to be admitted to the tourney.

SECTION VI.

The I. H. S. A. A. Board of Control shall select and assign the officials for the games not included in Section 4.

SECTION VII.

The admission fee to all Tourney games shall be forty (40) cents for single session tickets and one dollar and fifty (\$1.50) cents for season tickets.

SECTION VIII.

The High School representative shall pay to each Referee at the close of his work the sum of fifty (\$50) dollars only. There will be two referees assigned to each Tourney. Officials will work in alternate games unless it seems advisable to use both in some games and then they shall work as referee and umpire. Entertainment, traveling and hotel expenses are to be paid by the officials. No one connected with the tourney shall offer or give entertainment to the officials. of season ticket sales in the local communities.

Eighth. The Board of Control shall pass on all reports by the

Ninth. The Center School shall furnish a complete financial report to the I. H. S. A. A. and to each participating school soon after the tourney.

SECTION X.

The High School under whose auspices the Tourney is, held promises hearty co-operation with the State Board of Control and the State Board of Control promises as much to the High School conducting the Tourney.

SECTION XI.

The details of all Tourneys, such as protests, eligibility lists, schedules, etc., are to be cared for by the State Board of Control through the Permanent Secretary.

SECTION XII.

The State Board of Control shall manage all Tourneys and the High Schools are to work under this direction.

SECTION XIII

The High School representative shall send by telegram the name of the winning school to Arthur L. Trester, Anderson, Indiana, as soon as the Tournament is completed. All entry blanks must be sent to Arthur L. Trester by special delivery Saturday evening, March 7. The High School representative shall send to Arthur L. Trester on or before Tuesday, March 10, the complete scores of all games, a complete and itemized statement of receipts and disbursements and a check as called for in Section IX.





INTERPRETATION OF ITEMS

"Expenditures" covers the legitimate expenses of the tourneys other than transportation. "Participating Schools" covers the amounts divided on the basis of season tickets sold and on the pro rata basis. The amount on basis of tickets sold by center school is included under "center." "I. H. S. A. A." covers five (5) per cent of the balance after the legitimate expenses were paid, after the center school received two hundred dollars (\$200) and after the transportation was paid. "Center" covers the amounts received by the center schools for holding the tourneys and from the division on the basis of season tickets sold.

GIMBEL PRIZE FOR MENTAL ATTITUDE

In 1917 Jake Gimbel of Vincennes presented to the I. H. S. A. A. Board of Control a proposal to give a prize each year at the State Basketball tourney to the boy among the teams represented that showed the best mental attitude throughout the tourney. Mr. Gimbel did not have in mind the quality of the playing of any boy on any team, but did have in mind the qualities that belong to a real gentleman. He clearly recognized the mental and moral strain under which the players play during the tourney and he also recognized the numerous opportunities for the players to lose control of themselves and to do something not conducive to true sportsmanship.

The Board of Control accepted the proposal of Mr. Gimbel and the awarding of this prize known as the "Gimbel Prize for Mental Attitude" has been an annual affair, calling for much favorable comment. The prize and the things it represents are cherished by the players and schools of Indiana. The prize has meant much to real sportsmanship and self-control in the High Schools of the State and it is a prize sought for by all schools. The school to which the winner of this prize belongs claims the winner as their own and accordingly the whole school and the whole community are proud. In a number of cities similar prizes are being given to the players who show the best mental attitude within their own schools. The Gimbel prize and these other similar prizes have exalted in a very real sense the qualities belonging to a gentleman in the minds of our boys and girls.

I. H. S. A. A. BASKET BALL SEMI-FINAL SERIES CONTRACT

ARTICLES OF CONTRACT

Anderson, Ind., Jan., 1925.

SECTION I.

The date of the Indiana High School Semi-Final Basketball Series shall be Saturday, March 14, 1925.

SECTION II

The State High School Roard of Control through Arthur L. Trester, Permanent Secretary, shall furnish the High School representative with lists of qualified teams and the names of the men on the respective teams on or before Monday, March 9.

SECTION III.

The High School representative shall provide free entertainment for the respective teams of eleven men, which shall include one Faculty Manager for each team, between the hours of 5:00 p. m. Friday, March 13 and 8:00 a. m. Sunday, March 15. If possible this period of entertainment will be shortened by the Board of Control. All teams are entitled to entertainment throughout the series, however.

SECTION IV.

The High School representative shall provide tickets, door-men, ushers, announcers, scorers, timekeepers, basketballs and all necessary equipment for the game. No prizes whatever are to be given by any one.

SECTION V.

The matter of complimentary tickets shall be in the hands of the High School representative, who shall issue them to the Press, the officials, and to the helping students. All men of the competing teams and one Faculty Manager for each team are to be admitted to the Series.

SECTION VI.

The I. H. S. A. A. Board of Control shall select and assign the officials for the games not included in Section IV.

SECTION VII.

The admission fee to all Tourney games shall be forty (40) cents for single session tickets and one dollar (\$1.00) for season tickets.

SECTION VIII.

The High School representative shall pay to each Referee at the close of his work the sum of fifty dollars (\$50.00) only. There will be three referees and their entertainment is to be paid by the officials. Their contract forbids the acceptance of entertainment.

SECTION IX.

The financial settlement of all tourneys shall be made as follows:
1st. All legitimate expenses except for travel shall be paid
from the gross receipts.

2nd. The center High School shall receive two hundred fifty

dollars (\$250.00).

3rd. The I. H. S. A. A. shall receive ten per cent.

4th. The transportation shall be paid.

5th. The center High School shall receive two hundred fifty dollars (\$250.00).

6th. The I. H. S. A. A. shall receive fifty per cent of the balance.
7th. The remainder shall be divided equally among the compet.

ing schools.

8th. Ticket sellers, ticket takers, ushers, janitors and water carriers to be furnished by the local school and such remuneration as they receive to come from the treasury of the local school and not charged to the association as tourney expense.

9th. The Board shall pass on all reports by the Center School

and all reports by the participating schools.

10th. The Center School shall furnish a complete financial report to the I. H. S. A. A. and to each participating school soon after the tourney.

SECTION X.

The High School under whose auspices the series is held promises hearty co-operation with the State Board of Control and the State Board of Control promises as much to the High School conducting the Tourney.

SECTION XI.


The details of the series, such as protests, eligibility lists, schedules, etc., are to be cared for by the State Board of Control.

SECTION XII.

The High School representative shall send by telegram the names of the winning schools to Arthur L. Trester, Anderson, Indiana, as soon as the series is completed. The High School representative shall also send to Arthur L. Trester on Saturday evening, March 14 the complete scores of all games and all entry blanks. A complete and itemized statement of receipts and disbursements shall be sent on or before Tuesday, March 17.







The following Articles of Agreement are subscribed to by the Indiana High School Athletic Association, through Arthur L. Trester, Permanent Secretary, and representing the "Indianapolis High Schools."

SECTION I

The dates of the contests covered by this contract shall be as follows:

Sectional Basketball Tourney—March 6 and 7, 1925. Final State Basketball Tourney—March 20 and 21, 1925. State Final Track and Field Meet—May 23, 1925.

The Indianapolis Representative shall provide free entertainment as follows:

- 1. Sectional Tourney—For eight (8) players and a faculty manager for each team between the hours of 7:00 a.m. Friday, March 6 and 8:00 a.m. Sunday, March 8.
- 2. Final Tourney—For ten (10) players and a faculty manager for each team between the hours of 4:00 p.m. Thursday, March 19 and 8:00 a.m. Sunday, March 22.
- 3. Final Meet—For all men in the first and second places in each sectional meet; for five (5) men constituting the two winning relay teams in each sectional meet and; for a faculty manager for each school represented between the hours of 6:00 p. m. Friday, May 22 and 8:00 a. m. Sunday, May 24.

If possible these periods of entertainment will be shortened by the Board of Control.

SECTION IV.

The Indianapolis Representative shall provide tickets, policemen, gate men, announcers, scorers, timekeepers, judges, other minor official and all necessary equipment for the contests. They shall further provide a suitable shield for the school winning the final tourney and badges for the ten (10) individual members of the winning team; and a cup or shield for the winning school in the final meet, a placque

for each of the two (2) winning relay teams, and medals for the winners in each event. The standard design of the I.H.S.A.A. shall be used. No other prizes shall be given by anyone.

SECTION V.

The matter of complimentary tickets shall be left to the Indianapolis Representative, who shall issue them to the Press and to the helping teachers and students. All men of the competing teams, one attendant and one faculty manager shall be admitted free to the contests. The members of the Board of Control and the Permanent Secretary shall be furnished with badges and reserved seats.

SECTION VI.

The High School Board of Control shall choose and assign the officials other than those mentioned in Section IV for the basketball tourneys and shall sanction the major officials for the track meet.

SECTION VII.

The admission fee shall be as follows:

1. Sectional Tourney—\$1.50 for season tickets and forty cents (40c) for session tickets.

2. Final tourney—\$1.00 for Day tickets and fifty cents (50c) for session tickets.

3. Final meet-Fifty cents (50c) for all tickets.

SECTION VIII.

The Indianapolis Representative shall pay fifty dollars (\$50) each to the two (2) major officials in the sectional tourney; seventy-five dollars (\$75) each to the four (4) major officials in the final tourney and; reasonable amounts to the major officials in the final meet.

SECTION IX.

The financial settlement with the Board of Control shall be made as follows:

- 1. Sectional tourney—According to "Compromise Plan" with the understanding that reasonable help will be included under legitimate expenses and with the further understanding that the Indianapolis Representative shall pay one-fourth of the total cost of the court, bleachers and equipment for the tourneys.
- 2. Final Tourney—All legitimate expenses shall be paid from the gross receipts; one hundred dollars (\$100) above meals, lodging and transportation shall be given each competing school; and the balance shall be divided on the basis of sixty percent (60%) to the I.H.S.A.A. and forty percent (40%) to the Indianapolis High Schools.
- 3. Final meet—All legitimate expenses except transportation shall be paid and any balance or deficit shall be divided sixty percent (60%) to the I.H.S.A.A. and forty percent (40%) to the Indianapolis High Schools.

SECTION X.

The Indianapolis Representative shall send complete reports of the results and itemized financial reports of all contests to the Permanent Secretary immediately after the contests are held.

SECTION XI.

Both parties to this contract shall strive to co-operate in every way to have satisfactory contests held with reasonable expenses.

STATE FINAL BASKET BALL TOURNAMENT OF THE I.H.S.A.A. INFORMATION

The sixteen teams in the final tourney have survived the elimination games in 64 sectional and 8 regional tourneys. All schedules for all tourneys were drawn by lot.

Teams must be on the floor as scheduled under penalty of f_{0r} feiture of game.

No changes will be made in the schedule and no substitution of non-entered players will be permitted. The ten players on the certified entry blank must constitute the team for the tourney.

The official entry list will be in the hands of Fred R. Gorman during the tourney and shall constitute final evidence in all cases, Players will be subject to identification at any time.

Teams must be in charge of a faculty manager who will be held responsible for the students and their conduct.

Spalding's Official Guide for 1925-1926 shall govern with the exception that all games shall be played in 15-minute halves.

The Officials have been assigned by the Board of Control and n_0 changes will be made. Their decisions will be final.

The admission fee for each evening session shall be fifty (50c) cents and for a day season ticket one dollar (\$1.00).

A bronze shield will be presented to the winning team and gold watch fobs will be presented to each of the ten members of the winning team at the close of the tourney. This team will be considered the State Championship Basketball Team in the I.H.S.A.A. for 1925.

A medal, known as the "Gimbel Prize for Mental Attitude" will be given to the player showing the best mental attitude during the tourney.

No other prizes shall be awarded by any one.

The trophies will be presented immediately following the final game.



TRACK AND FIELD

Numerous dual meets, invitational meets and county meets we held under the auspices of the High Schools concerned. Sectional as final meets were held on May 16 and May 23 to determine the ners in the several events, the winners of the relay races and state team winner. In all probability there was more and better tra and field work this year than in any previous year of the I.H.S.A. Meets were run off in less time than formerly due to better manage ment and a higher type of officiating. The state final meet with teams was completed at four o'clock in the afternoon due to efficient in management and preparations. Track and Field work was med more interesting to everybody concerned by the speed with which meets were held and by the complete information given to the specific tators during the progress of the meets. Many High Schools ph pared their students and spectators for real enjoyment at the meet by giving them advance information regarding the events, the part cipants and their records. The past records of the I. H. S. A. were given to the press so that all might have standards to judge the work as they saw it.

There were 156 teams entered in 15 sectional meets and then were 1,549 boys composing these teams. Russell Walter of Kokom set a record of 26.6 seconds in the 220-yard dash and a record of seconds in the 440-yard dash. Hutton of Manual Training, Indianglis, set a record of 25.8 seconds in the 220-yard low hurdle race. The of Wabash set a record of 51 feet 5 inches in the shot put event.

Of the 156 teams entered in the sectional meets 90 were entitled to enter the final meet by winning a first or a second place in a sectional meet. Forty-three (43) teams representing the same number of schools won points in the State Final Meet. First place counts 5 points; second place, 4 points; third place, 3 points; fourth place 2 points and fifth place, one point in the final meet. In all other meets first place counted 5 points; second place, 3 points; and this place, one point.

The winning schools and the points made by individuals at schools may be found in the results of these meets as printed elsewhere in this book.

Kokomo won the final track and field meet held at Technical High School, Indianapolis, with 27 points and therefore won the I.H.S.A.I. State Championship in Track and Field for 1925.

Each contestant in these meets must have previously made, in fair test, a record equal to the following in every event in which he is entered:

The above, together with a mile relay and a half-mile relay, will constitute the events of the Meets. Winning first place in any event in the final Meet counts five points; second place four points; third place, three points; fourth place, two points; and fifth place, one point. Winning first place in any event in a sectional meet counts five points: second place, three points; and third place, one point, Points in the relays will not be counted in determining the winning team. In case of a tie in any event the points shall be divided and the place awarded by lot. No contestant will be permitted to run in both relay races.

The order of events is as follows:

Track Events-100 yard dash trial; 120 yard hurdle trial; 100 yard 'dash final; one mile run; 440 yard run; 120 yard hurdle final; 220 vard dash trial; 220 vard hurdle trial; 880 vard run; 220 yard dash final; 220 yard hurdle final; mile relay; half-mile relay.

Field Events-Running high jump; shot put; pole vault; running broad jump.

SECTIONAL TRACK AND FIELD MEETS, MAY 16.

The following bases were used in selecting centers:

(1) Location—geographical with reference to schools desiring to participate. (2) Transportation accommodations. (3) General to participate titude of local authorities, tracks, fields, entertaining facilities, etc. (4) Existing organizations.

Schools have been assigned by counties, and the accompanying scheme gives the Centers and the counties assigned to each Center. The name of your county locates your Center. The Board reserves the right to readjust the scheme, if necessary. The numbers indicate the schools from each county that have expressed a desire to enter. Entry blanks are necessary, however.

Management—The management of these meets rests solely with the Board of Control. Local arrangements have been delegated to the Center Principals. All officials will be selected by the Center Prin-

cipal. The Center Principal shall arrange a program for his Meet from the list of entries sent to him by the Permanent Secretary. All Meets shall begin at 1:00 o'clock, and follow the order of events here given. Places on the track must be assigned by lot. Spalding's National Collegiate Athletic Association Track and Field Rules shall govern except as modified in this announcement regarding scoring, eligibility, events and order of events.

Open Contest-These Meets are open to all members of the Association irrespective of their season's record.

Protests-All protests against teams or individuals must be made in writing and filed with the Permanent Secretary on or before May 7 at 11 a. m. Protests must be accompanied by evidence.

Entertainment-Two men for each event, four men for each relay team and a faculty manager from each competing school will be entertained by the Center Principal. Entertainment will begin if necessary at 9 a. m. Saturday May 16, and continue if necessary to 8 p. m. Saturday, May 16. All competing schools are requested and expected to ask for no longer entertainment than is necessary. Only actual contestants and their faculty manager from each school will be entertained. Since track and field meets usually produce little revenue, all schools are requested to be exceedingly careful in their expenditures.

Expenses-An entrance fee of One Dollar (\$1.00) for each team must accompany the entry blank to be retained by the I. H. S. A. A. Traveling expenses must be paid by the competing schools.

Privileges—All contestants, one rubber and one faculty manager for each team are to be admitted free to the meet.

Eligibility—The eligibility of each player must be certified to by the Principal of the school sending the team. The regular blank of the I. H. S. A. A. must be used and all data must be given. Entries positively will close Thursday, May 7. This means that they must be in the hands of the Permanent Secretary complete in every detail, on that date.

Admission Fee—The admission fee to all Meets shall be not m_{0re} than Forty (40) Cents.

Prizes—Suitable ribbons shall be given to the winners of first second and third places in each event, and to each member of the winning relay teams.

Warnings—Entries close Thursday, May 7, and can not be changed afterwards. An entry fee of One Dollar (\$1.00) for each team must accompany the entry blank. Special privileges will be granted to no one. Send all entry blanks and money to the Permanent Secretary.

FINAL MEET, INDIANAPOLIS, MAY 23

Entrants—The winning relay teams and all men winning first and second places in each event in the Sectional Meets shall constitute the participants in the Final Meet, with the following exceptions: In case of a tie in first place all of the contestants so placed may enter the Final Meet. In case of a tie in second place the right to enter the Final Meet goes to the winner of the badge who is determined by lot. One entry fee and one entry blank covers both the Sectional and Final Meets.

Entertainment—The Indianapolis High Schools have contracted with the Board to entertain all actual contestants according to the plan just given above. Entertainment will begin if necessary at 6 p. m. Friday, May 22, and continue if necessary to 8 a. m. Sunday, May 24. All competing schools are requested and expected to ask for no longer entertainment than is necessary. Traveling will be at the expense of the competing schools. Since track and field meets usually produce little revenue all schools are requested to be exceedingly careful in their expenditures. Only actual contestants and the faculty manager from each school will be entertained.


Trial Events—Trials will be held beginning at 9:00 o'clock Saturday morning in the following events: 100 yard dash, 220 yard dash, 120 yard hurdle, 220 yard hurdle, pole vault, shot put, broad jump and high jump.

Races—The following events will be run in two races in the afternoon: 440 yard run, 880 yard run and one mile run. Points and medals will be given for first, second, third, fourth and fifth place winners in each of the two races for each event. The afternoon events will begin at 1:30 o'clock.

Privileges—All contestants, one rubber and one faculty manager for each team are to be admitted to the Meet.

Admission Fee—The admission fee to the Meet shall be Fifty Cents (50c).

Management—The management, protests and privileges will be governed according to the regulations pertaining to the Sectional Meets.



Prizes—The Indianapolis High Schools will award the winning school a shield or cup; the winning relay teams, placques; and medals of gold, silver and bronze to the winners of first, second, third, fourth and fifth places in each event.

ARTICLES OF AGREEMENT

The following articles of agreement are subscribed to by the Board of Control of the Indiana High School Athletic Association through Arthur L. Trester, Permanent Secretary, and Principal representing the

High School.

SECTION I.

The date of the Indiana Sectional High School Track and Field Meets shall be Saturday, May 16, 1925.

SECTION II.

The State High School Board of Control, through Arthur L. Trester, Permanent Secretary, shall furnish the High School representative with lists of qualified teams and the names of the men on the respective teams on or before Monday, May 11.

SECTION III.

The High School representative shall provide free entertainment for the respective teams of four men each for the two relay teams, two men for each event, and a faculty manager for each competing school between the hours of 9:00 a. m. Saturday, May 16 and 8:00 p. m. Saturday, May 16. If possible this period of entertainment will be shortened by the Board of Control. It is understood that entertainment shall be for contestants and the faculty manager only.

SECTION IV.

The High School representative shall provide tickets, announcers, scorers, timekeepers, judges, a referee, a starter and all necessary equipment and officials for the Meet. He shall select competent men for all positions. The referee and the starter shall be on the approved list of officials in the I. H. S. A. A.

SECTION V.

The matter of complimentary tickets shall be in the hands of the High School representative, who shall issue them to the Press, the officials and to the helping students. All contestants of the competing teams, one rubber and one Faculty Manager for each team are to be admitted free to the Meet.

SECTION VI.

The High School representative shall provide suitable ribbons

for first, second and third winners in each event and for each member of the two winning Relay Teams.

SECTION VII.

The admission fee to all Meets shall be not more than (40) cents.

The proceeds of the Meet, after meeting items mentioned in the several items of this contract, shall belong to the High School holding the Meet.

SECTION IX.

The High School, under whose auspices the Meet is held, promises hearty co-operation with the State Board of Control and the State Board of Control promises as much to the High School conducting the meet.

SECTION X.

The details of the Meets, such as protests, eligibility lists, schedules, etc., are to be cared for by the State Board of Control.

SECTION XI.

The State Board of Control shall manage all Meets and the High Schools are to work under this direction.

SECTION XII.

Rain insurance to the amount of one hundred fifty dollars (\$150) for each meet shall be taken out and paid for by the I. H. S. A. A. In case of an adjustment on this insurance the I. H. S. A. A. shall pay the Center High School enough to cover the deficit of the meet, providing such is not more than one hundred fifty dollars (\$150).

SECTION XIII.

The High School representative shall send a complete program of the Meet containing all winners, records, distances, etc., by special delivery immediately after the close of the Meet, Saturday, May 16 to Principal K. V. Ammerman, Broad Ripple High School, Indianapolis, and also to the Permanent Secretary, Anderson, Ind. This is very necessary for final meet purposes. A complete and itemized statement of receipts and disbursements shall be sent to the Permanent Secretary on or before Wednesday, May 20. Forms will be furnished for making these reports.





## RAIN INSURANCE ON TRACK MEETS

Rain insurance to the amount of \$200.00 between the hours of 10:00 a.m. and 2:00 p.m. covering one-tenth of an inch or more of rainfall was taken out for each sectional track meet by the Board of Control. The contract with the Center Principal read as follows: "Rain insurance to the amount of one hundred fifty dollars (\$150.00 for each meet shall be taken out and paid for by the I.H.S.A.A. shall pay the case of an adjustment on this insurance the I.H.S.A.A. shall pay the Center High School enough to cover the deficit of the meet, providing such is not more than one hundred fifty dollars (\$150.00)." The Board decided to take out insurance in the amount of \$200.00 after the contracts were made with the Center Principals stating that the amount would be one hundred fifty dollars. This explains the discrepancy in the amounts above.

A policy for \$2,000.00 was taken out on the final meet at ladianapolis.

#### FOOTBALL



## MINUTES OF MEETINGS OF BOARD OF CONTROL.

Lafayette, Ind., Nov. 21-22, 1924.

The Board of Control met in the Fowler Hotel at eight (8) o'clock Friday evening, Nov. 21. All members, except Mr. Posey, and the Permanent Secretary were present. The Board also met at nine the relative saturday morning, Nov. 22. All members and the Permanent Secretary were present.

Cases were heard, decisions were made and business was tran-

sacted as follows:

West Lafayette-Principal Gardner reported that Coach Ross had used John Brake a few minutes in a game of football with Monticello when he was not eligible according to scholarship. The Board in structed Principal Gardner to forfeit the game to Monticello, criticised Coach Ross for taking a boy's word regarding eligibility and declared John Brake ineligible for any athletics for the present school year for misrepresenting his eligibility.

Lafayette-Principal Arnett stated that Coach Grosshans had used Ralph Holcomb a few minutes in a game of football at Brazil when not eligible due to residence. The Board criticised Principal Arnett and Coach Grosshans for not determining definitely the residence of the student prior to his certification and declared Ralph Holcomb ineligible for any athletics for the present school year for misrepresenting his place of residence.

Frankfort-Case continued.

Fort Wayne, Central High School-Principal Croninger and Coach Bills were present. It was found that Thurl Todd formerly of Noblesville and Rome Zink formerly of Argos had been used in foothall when both of them were ineligible due to residence. The Board ordered the Central High School to forfeit all the games won by that High School in which these boys played this school year and susnended the Central High School, Fort Wayne from the I. H. S. A. A. until January 15, 1925.

Sheridan-Technical (Indianapolis)—Case continued until the of-

ficial in the game could appear before the Board.

Gerstmeyer (Terre Haute)-Bloomfield-The Board declared the game of football played at Bloomfield on October 4, 1924 "no game" and criticised with a warning both Principals and both Coaches for not using approved officials.

Winslow-Elwood Smith of Winslow declared ineligible for the present semester due to the unusual method of enrollment and of accepting work by Supt. Couts. The status of the boy for Semester

Glenn (Terre Haute)-Eugene Tyler declared ineligible for the present semester due to enrollment. Principal McPherson was instructed to forfeit all games in which the boy has played during this structed to foriest an games in which school was placed on probation in school year, and the Glenn High School was placed on probation in

Track Meets-The Board decided on the following dates for Track Meets: Sectional, May 16. Final, May 23.

Practise Games—The Board reaffirmed former decisions that "practice games" between schools were games.

It was decided that the rule, stating that all tourneys other than the State tourneys should be held prior to February 1, applied to

The Sectional tourney contract situation was discussed at length after considering the tourney invitations and the expressions received from over the State. The Board and the Permanent Secretary unanimously decided to make the following statement to the press at

"It is the unanimous opinion of the Board of Control and the Permanent Secretary of the I. H. S. A. A. that the holding of sectional basketball tourneys according to the contract stipulations passed at the annual meeting on October 16 is neither feasible nor practicable. Invitations to hold tourneys are not sufficient as to number and a number of the invitations cover conditions that are not satisfactory for tourney purposes.

The Board of Control and the Permanent Secretary have made a careful analysis of the invitations extended and have given the whole situation long and careful thought with a view to adjusting the unsatisfactory conditions now surrounding the tourney contract. A number of letters from over the state are in the possession of the Board from schools that have held tourneys and from schools that have not held tourneys. A number of county high school principals' associations have requested that a satisfactory solution be worked out by the Board of Control and the Permanent Secretary as implied in the constitution of the I.H.S.A.A. The general sentiment among the schools and communities is that a happy solution should be and can be worked out by those who have the facts regarding past tourneys, and also the facts concerning the expressions of the principals over the State.

A Bulletin, therefore, of the I.H.S.A.A. will be issued soon and sent to each High School Principal, setting forth the facts as authentic reports and expressions show them. This Bulletin will give the details of a compromise plan that will be fair to all concerned and that will be based on facts and fair dealings to everyone. There are three (3) parties concerned in the division of the net receipts of a sectional tourney-(1) the I. H. S. A. A., (2) the participating schools and (3) the schools holding the tourneys. The scheme that will be proposed by the Board soon will be fair and satisfactory to these three parties, as each party will be requested to grant something to the other two parties in the way of a compromise. The Bulletin will be accompanied by a referendum vote card so that all Principals all over the State may have a vote."

The Board considered several players as candidates for the Gimbel Prize for Mental Attitude and unanimously selected Russell Walter, of the Kokomo Team, as the winner.

The rate of four cents per man per mile for the round trip direct mileage between the participating school building and the tourney gymnasium was affirmed for all sectional tourneys in 1925.

It was decided to confine all prizes given to players, schools and teams to such as have symbolic value only and to recommend in all cases that these prizes be limited as far as possible.

It was also decided to follow section one and section two, article five in the I. H. S. A. A. Constitution about the giving of prizes to Coaches.

Richmond—The officiating in the Richmond sectional tourney was found to be very unsatisfactory to the majority of the Principals and Coaches. It was also found that the results of the games and the tourney would not have been materially changed under satisfactory officiating.

Sandborn-Washington—It was decided that Washington did not violate a contract with Sandborn.

It was decided to take out rain insurance as follows on the track and field meets: One hundred fifty dollars (\$150) on each of the sectional meets and two thousand dollars (\$2,000) on the final meet. The Permanent Secretary was authorized to secure this insurance.

The Permanent Secretary was instructed to select centers, make assignments and send out an announcement covering the sectional and final track meets for this year.

In response to a number of sentiments expressed by High School Principals from High Schools of all sizes favoring a legislative body in the I.H.S.A.A. that would be representative the Board decided to present such a scheme to the Principals at an early date so that a referendum vote could be taken early next September. Details were discussed and the Permanent Secretary was instructed to present the scheme in a bulletin at an early date.

It was decided to charge not more than forty (40) cents for sectional track meet tickets and not more than fifty (50) cents for final track meet tickets.

The qualified entrants for the final track meet shall be the winning relay teams and all contestants in first and second places in the sectional meets with the following exceptions:—In case of a tie in first place all of the contestants so placed may enter the final meet. In case of a tie in second place the right to enter the final meet goes to the winner of the badge who is determined by lot.

It was decided that officials who are debarred from the I. H. S. A. A. must make application for reinstatement in person to the Board of Control at such times and such places as the Board of Control designates.

The Board adjourned to meet in the Claypool Hotel, Indianapolis at ten o'clock Saturday morning, May 2.



The Board went on record to the effect that the joint employment of a Coach by the Public Schools and the Trustees of a College, Normal School or University would be a violation of the rules and regulations as well as the policy of the I.H.S.A.A.

It was decided that the employment of a High School student to supervise playgrounds in the summer would not make the student a professional in the I. H. S. A. A. providing that the student is employed to supervise and direct playground activities and not to play on teams.

### BOARD OF CONTROL MEETING.

The Board of Control of the I.H.S.A.A. met in the Claypool Hotel at ten (10) o'clock Saturday morning, August 8. All members and the Permanent Secretary were present, except Supt. Baird who was sick.

The "Legislative Body Proposal" was discussed in the light of the information and suggestions received during the summer and it was decided to devote all of Bulletin Number 1 for 1925-1926 to a re-statement of the proposal and definite information about the mail vote on it. The Bulletin will carry the proposal as it was printed last spring without any changes and will be sent out as soon as school opens accompanied by a vote card.

The program of the annual meeting was mapped out in a general way with the idea of having some inspirational talks, technical talks on the make-up, purpose and function of the legislative body.

It was agreed by all that the changing of schools by athletes for athletic purposes should receive careful consideration and that ineligibility of the player and penalization of the school should follow in all cases where "undue influences" are at work. It was decided that in cases where "undue influences" were used ineligibility of the player should extend throughout his High School course.


The Board of Control met at six o'clock Monday evening, September 21 in the Claypool Hotel. All members and the Permanent Secretary were present.

According to the Legislative Body scheme the candidate in each district receiving the highest number of votes is elected to serve from now to three years from January 1, 1926; the one receiving the second highest from now to two years from January 1, 1926; and the one receiving the third highest from now to one year from January 1, 1926.

Columbia City-Ross Johnson declared ineligible until his parents actually change their residence to Columbia City. Intention to change a residence does not constitute a change of residence.

Leesburg-Leland Osborn requested to report to C. F. Albaugh, a member of the Board, regarding his request for reinstatement as an approved official in the I.H.S.A.A.

West Middleton-Former decisions of Board affirmed to the effect that participation on a High School team by a student in the grades constitutes not only a violation of I.H.S.A.A. rules, but also that such participation must be counted as High School participation when eligibility is being considered.

Warren Central-Former decisions of Board affirmed to the effect that a student, who changes High Schools without a change of residence by his parents to the new school district, can not secure eligibility until he has been enrolled one entire semester and that a part of a semester or parts of two semesters do not constitute an entire semester in such cases.

Frankfort—Permanent Secretary requested to investigate in person the status of Herman Boots, a student in this High School and to report his findings.

The Board decided that the vote cards for members of the Legislative Body should be open for inspection only upon formal request by justly interested parties asking for a recount or for proof that a recount should not be made.

Franklin-Lawrence J. Tidrick requested to appear before the Board regarding his right to hold a card as an approved official.

Kokomo-Coach Hill granted permission to present a case of eligibility to the Board at an early meeting.

3. Leesburg-Leland Osborn was re-instated as an approved official in the I.H.S.A.A.

4. Reynolds-Enrollment by mail within the first twenty days of school and actual enrollment on the 21st day of school does not constitute legitimate enrollment for athletic eligibility for the semester in question.

5. Warren-Walter Bussard declared ineligible for basketball as he has been enrolled four times of twenty days each between Decem-

ber 1 and March 1.

6. Huntington Township-Hammel, Weschler and Swain were declared ineligible until they have been enrolled and have made passing grades for one entire semester due to a change of schools without a change of residence of their parents.

The Permanent Secretary was authorized to submit some paragraphs on the taking of grades for eligibility by weeks, months, periods, semesters, etc.

### CONSTITUTION OF THE INDIANA HIGH SCHOOL ATHLETIC ASSOCIATION

### ARTICLE I

### NAME

The name of this association shall be the "Indiana High School Athletic Association."

### ARTICLE II.

### MEMBERSHIP

Section 1. Membership in this association shall be limited to the public High Schools of the State and each school shall have one vote.

Section 2. Any public High School in Indiana may become a member of this association by subscribing to these rules and regulations and by paying the annual dues of one dollar fifty cents (\$1.50) to the Permanent Secretary on or before January 1 of each year.

Section 3. All memberships lapse on January 1 of each year unless the annual dues are paid.

### ARTICLE III.

### ADMINISTRATION

Section 1. I. H.S. A. A. Districts.

For the purpose of administration only, the State shall be divided by counties into the following districts:

First District-Benton, Carroll, Cass, Fulton, Jasper, Lake, La-Porte, Marshall, Newton, Porter, Pulaski, Starke, St. Joseph, Tippecanoe and White.

Second District-Adams, Allen, Blackford, DeKalb, Elkhart, Grant, Howard, Huntington, Kosciusko, LaGrange, Miami, Noble, Steuben, Wabash, Wells, and Whitley.

Third District—Boone, Clay, Clinton, Fountain, Hamilton, Hendricks, Marion, Montgomery, Morgan, Owen, Parke, Putnam, Tipton, Vigo, Vermillion and Warren.

Fourth District-Bartholomew, Dearborn, Decatur, Delaware, Fayette, Franklin, Hancock, Henry, Jay, Jefferson, Jennings, Johnson, Madison, Ohio, Randolph, Ripley, Rush, Shelby, Switzerland, Union and Wayne.

Fifth District—Brown, Clark, Crawford, Daviess, Dubois, Floyd, Gibson, Green, Harrison, Jackson, Knox, Lawrence, Martin, Monroe, Orange, Perry, Pike, Posey, Scott, Spencer, Sullivan, Vanderburg, Warrick and Washington. Section 2. Board of Control.

### MEMBERSHIP.

(a.) The Board of Control shall consist of five members, (principals, members of the faculty or superintendents) to represent the five districts into which the State is divided for administration pur-

(b.) Elections shall take place each year between December 1 and December 10, all votes being mailed to the Permanent Secretary

on ballots prepared by him.

(c.) Each member of the I. H. S. A. A. in a district shall have one vote for a Board member from his district.

(d.) Beginning with December, 1916 members shall be elected as follows: First District, to serve until January 1, 1918; Second District, to serve until January 1, 1919; Third District to serve until January 1, 1920; Fourth District will have an election in December, 1917, the member to serve three years; and the Fifth District will have an election in December, 1918, the member to serve three years.

(e.) After the initial elections, each member shall be elected for three years or for the unexpired term in case such is less than

three years.

(f.) All newly elected officers shall assume the duties of their offices on the first day of January next following their election.

- (g.) The person receiving the highest number of votes in a district shall be elected.
- (h.) In case of a tie the vote shall be taken again, the votes being cast for the men who are tied for first place.

(i.) Three members of the Board shall constitute a quorum at any meeting.

- (i.) Removal from the district or withdrawal from the teaching profession shall constitute a vacancy and in such cases the remaining members of the Board shall choose a person from the district wherein the vacancy exists to serve until the member chosen at the next election assumes office.
- (k.) No retiring member of the Board, having served three years, shall be eligible for re-election and service in any district for a period of one year after the date of retirement.

Section 3. Board of Control.

### POWERS AND DUTIES.

The Board of Control shall have the following powers and duties:

- (a.) It shall have general control over all athletic contests between and among the members of this association.
- (b.) It shall have exclusive control of the annual inter-scholastic tourneys and meets.
  - (c.) It shall determine forfeitures as provided for in these rules.


- (d.) It shall give interpretation of the rules of this association.
  (e.) It may at the end of the athletic season and at its discretion issue a statement of its official opinion as to the relative standing of teams.
- (f.) When charges are made in writing by a member of the association against another member for violation of these rules, the Board of Control, after giving due notice of the time and place for the school so charged to be heard, shall consider such charges and may suspend the offending school for a period not exceeding one year.
- (g.) The Board of Control shall decide all protests brought before it with reference to qualifications of contestants in meets and tourneys.
- (h.) When any matter comes before the Board for decision which is of special interest to a school of which a member of the Board is a representative, the remaining members of the Board shall appoint another person to act in his place in that matter.

### Section 4. Permanent Secretary.

At the annual meeting of 1906 a Permanent Secretary shall be elected, who shall have charge of the property and records of the Association; shall receive all money for dues and the sale of publications of the association; shall issue all circulars authorized by the Board of Control; shall attend meetings of the Board when requested to do so by the Board; shall turn over to the Treasurer of the Board all money in his possession when called upon to do so; shall perform such other duties as the growth of the Association, as determined by the Board, may require; shall receive as compensation such sum and such allowance for expenses and clerical help as the Board may approve; and it shall be his duty to publish the I.H.S.A.A. Handbook immediately following the annual meeting of the association. Vacancies in the office may be declared by the Board for cause, and a successor appointed by the Board to act until the next annual meeting.

Section 5-Legislative Body.

- 1. A "legislative body" shall be formed in the I. H. S. A. A. composed of fifteen (15) elected representatives, and the five (5) members of the Board of Control.
- 2. This legislative body shall make the rules governing the I. H. S. A. A.
- 3. The Board of Control shall execute the rules governing the I. H. S. A. A. in the spirit as well as the letter, in which they are made and shall make temporary regulations.
- 4. The President of the Board of Control shall be President of the legislative body.
- 5. The Permanent Secretary shall serve as secretary of the legislative body.
- 6. The fifteen (15) elected representatives shall be elected as follows: Three (3) from each of the five (5) I. H. S. A. A. districts to be chosen by mail vote as Board Members are chosen.



The election of the fifteen (15) representatives shall take place between September 28 and October 3, 1925.

8. The first elected members shall serve as follows:

The member in each district receiving the largest number of votes shall serve from election to three (3) years from January 1, 1926; the member receiving the second largest number of votes shall serve from election to two (2) years from Jannary 1, 1926; and the member receiving the third largest number of votes shall serve from election to one (1) year from January 1, 1926.

9. In case of a tie the vote shall be taken again, the votes being

cast for the men who are tied.

10. After the initial elections, each member shall be elected for

three years or for the unexpired term.

- 11. The annual meeting shall be a meeting for the explanation and interpretations of rules and regulations, for inspirational addresses by recognized leaders, for committee reports and for constructive work.
- 12. The legislative body shall meet prior to the annual meeting each year, at the time of the annual meeting and at such other times as necessary.

13. All expenses of the legislative body shall be paid out of the

I. H. S. A. A. funds.

14. Minor details in connection with the workings of the legislative body shall be handled by the legislative body.

15. A majority (11) of the members shall constitute a quorum.

16. After the initial elections all elections shall take place each year between December 1 and December 10, all votes being mailed to the Permanent Secretary on ballots prepared by him.

17. Withdrawal from the teaching profession or a lapse in membership in the I. H. S. A. A. shall constitute a vacancy and in such cases the remaining members of the legislative body shall choose a member from the district wherein the vacancy exists to serve until the member chosen at the next election assumes office.

### ARTICLE IV.

### LOCAL MANAGEMENT

Section 1. (a) The Principal or his authorized representative shall

accompany his team to all contests.

- (b.) The Principal of the school, or high school teachers authorized by him, shall be manager or managers of the teams representing the school.
- (c.) No games shall be played without the sanction of the Principal.
- (d.) The eligibility of all contestants shall be certified to by the Principal of the school in accordance with the rules hereby adopted. Such statements shall be presented in writing within ten days before

any contest. In case of disputes the principal must furnish the Board of Control the following data in regard to each contestant; the date of last enrollment; the number of years he has been a member of a secondary school athletic team; date and place of birth; average mark in each study for the last preceding semester in school; average mark in each study from the beginning of the current term and semester. A school which does not furnish this data shall be denied championship honors, and may be excluded from all games, tourneys and meets

(e.) The Principal has power and is advised to exclude any contestant who, because of bad habits or improper conduct, would

not represent his school in a becoming manner.

(f.) It is recommended that principals, in arranging for games, provide a forfeit of \$10.00 to be exacted should there be a failure on the part of either party to carry out the arrangements made. Should such forfeitures be stipulated and not be paid during the same season, the Board of Control, after hearing both sides, shall have authority to expel the delinquent school from the association. Notification of such expulsion shall be published in the papers with cause therefor

### ARTICLE V.

### COACHES.

Section 1. Paid Coaches, other than those regularly employed as teachers by the trustees of the school are prohibited. The expression "Paid Coach" refers to any person who receives directly or indirectly remuneration of any kind,—money, traveling expenses, gifts, etc., in return for services rendered in instructing or coaching any High School athletic team.

Section 2. No High School shall be permitted to employ a coach or athletic director who receives any extra pay, salary, gifts, trophies, trips or presents from any outside sources.

### ARTICLE VI.

### **OFFICIALS**

Section 1. The major officials in all inter-contests shall be on

the approved list of officials in the I. H. S. A. A.

Section 2. Approval shall be secured by making application to the Board of Control through the Permanent Secretary, and approved officials shall be given approval cards signed by the Permanent Secretary.

Section 3. The Board of Control shall drop from the approved list of officials any persons who are palpably unfair and incompetent in their officiating or who do not serve the ideals and policies of the I. H. S. A. A. Disbarment cards shall be given to such officials and their names shall be published in the bulletins of the association.

### ARTICLE VII.

Section 1. The games recognized by the I. H. S. A. A. are:—Football, soccer, basketball, track and field, and baseball.

Section 2. All inter-school athletic contests shall be subject to the rules of the I. H. S. A. A. and the Board of Control.

### ARTICLE VIII.

### Rules for Contests.

Section 1. Spalding's Official Football Rules shall govern in foot-

hall.

Section 2. Spalding's Official Basketball rules shall govern in basketball. (For the season of 1923-1924 paragraph 2, section 1, rule 8 shall be void. All tourney games shall have two halves of 15 minutes each.)

Section 3. Spalding's National Collegiate Athletic Association Track and Field Rules shall govern with the following exceptions:

(a.) Rule 2, regarding a Games Committee shall be void.

(b.) Scoring.

Three places shall be counted in all meets and the places shall count 5, 3 and 1. Places in the relay races will not count for points. In case of a tie in any event the points shall be divided and the place awarded by lot.

(c.) Events.

The events in all meets shall be 100 yard dash; 220 yard dash, 440 yard dash, half-mile run, mile run, 120 yard high hurdle, 220 yard low hurdle, running high jump, running broad jump, pole vault, putting 12 lb. shot, mile relay and half-mile relay.

(d.) Order of Events.

Track—100 yard dash trial; 120 yard hurdle trial; 100 yard dash final; one mile run; 440 yard run; 120 yard hurdle final; 220 yard dash trial; 220 yard hurdle trial; half-mile run; 220 yard dash final; 220 yard hurdle final; mile relay; half-mile relay.

Field—Running high jump; shot-put; pole yault; running

Field—Running high jump; shot-put; pole vault; running broad jump.

e.) Eligibility.

Each contestant in a meet must have previously made in a fair test, a record equal to the following in the events in which he is entered:

Section 4. Spalding's Official Basketball Rules for women shall govern girls' games with the following exceptions:

- (a.) The three-court plan shall be used unless there is mutual agreement to use the two-court plan.
- (b.) Under no condition may girls play basketball according to boy's rules.

Section 5. Spalding's Official Rules in Baseball shall govern in baseball.

Section 6. No inter-school basketball games shall be played by players or schools prior to October 1 of each year nor after the last evening session of the State Final Tourney. Intra-mural practice and gymnasium work in basketball may be done prior to October 1 and after the final tourney. (The penalty is suspension).

Section 7. The maximum number of games for the regular schedule of any team or any player in basketball shall be twenty. (The penalty is suspension.)

Section 8. Teams and players may play in two basketball tourneys in addition to the sectional, regional and final tourneys of the State Tourney and in addition to the twenty games on the regular schedule providing the games in one of these "two tourneys" shall be counted in the twenty games permitted for the regular schedule of a team or player. (The penalty is suspension.)

Section 9. The football season shall close on November 30 of each year.

Section 10. No games shall be played with public High Schools of this State not belonging to this association. This rule does not prevent a member of the association from playing High Schools outside of the State nor from playing non-high school teams within the State, providing all players on the I. H. S. A. A. teams are eligible in every way and also providing there are no public High School boys of Indiana on the opposing teams.

Section 11. All basketball tourneys other than the State Tourneys shall be held prior to February 1 of each year.

### ARTICLE IX.

### ELIGIBILITY RULES.

### SCHOLARSHIP.

Section 1. Each contestant must have and be maintaining for the current semester, a passing grade in each of three or more studies requiring a minimum of fifteen regular High School recitations per week, exclusive of rhetoricals, physical training, military drill and deportment; in his last preceding semester in school he must also have met the same requirements throughout the entire semester.

Section 2. Students enrolled for the first time must comply with the requirements of the rules, the average standing required for the preceding semester being obtained from the records in the last secondary school attended. Back work may be made up, providing that it is done in accordance with the regular rules of the school and becomes a matter of final record before the opening day of the next semester.

Interpretation—In each of the studies representing the minimum requirement of work specified above, the following shall govern; (a) For the current semester the average of the period grades up to the time of certification must be passing; (b) for the current or school grading period the average of the daily or weekly grades must be passing; (c) if the average of the period grades at the beginning of any grading period is below passing in any study, the pupil is ineligible as far as that study is concerned for the entire grading period.

### ENROLLMENT.

Section 1. No student, who has been enrolled as a High School student in any High School, shall be permitted to participate in any inter-high school contest as a member of another high school until he has been enrolled in such high school for one full semester, unless the parents of such student actually change their residence to the second school district. In the latter case, the student will be as eligible as he was in the school from which he withdrew.

Interpretation-

Section 3.

- (a.) A student enrolled in one High School of a city or school corporation shall not be eligible in another High School of the same city or school corporation until he has been enrolled in the other High School for one full semester, unless there are definitely marked school districts and his parents actually change their residence to the new district.
- (b.) Students finishing the courses offered in high schools maintaining less than four years of High School work are not bound by this section.
- (c.) The fact that a transfer has or has not been issued or that the student pays or does not pay his tuition, has no bearing on this section.
  - (d.) Parts of two semesters do not make a full semester.

Section 2. No person, who has been enrolled as a student in an institution of college standing, and has done work which may be counted toward a degree in that institution, shall be eligible as a member of any athletic team under I. H. S. A. A. rules in any game with any other team, either within or without the State of Indiana.

- (a.) Any student who has been enrolled twenty (20) or more days between September 1 and December 1 for four times shall be incligible for football.
- (b.) Any student who has been enrolled twenty (20) or more days between December 1 and March 1 for four times shall be ineligible for basketball, except a student who entered high school for the first time during the second semester of a school year and who did not participate in any game during this semester, shall not be ineligible for basketball until he has been enrolled thereafter twenty

- (20) or more days between December 1 and March 1 for four times.
- (c.) Any student who has been enrolled twenty (20) or more days between March 1 and June 1 for four times shall be ineligible for baseball and track, except a student who entered High School for the first time during the second semester of a school year and who did not participate in any game or meet during this second semester shall not be ineligible for baseball and track until he has been enrolled thereafter twenty (20) or more days between March 1 and June 1 for four times.
- Section 4. A student withdrawing permanently from school within the first twenty days of a semester shall not be regarded as having an opportunity to engage in athletics that semester unless he has already played in one or more interscholastic games, in which case he shall be regarded as having engaged in athletics for that season.

section 5. The eligibility rules of this association shall apply to students taking part in all contests, whether with schools inside or outside of the State of Indiana.

Section 6. In order to be eligible for athletic competition during any semester a student must have entered some public High School within the first twenty school days of the semester in which the contest occurs.

### PARTICIPATION.

Section 1. Any member of a High School athletic team who participates in an athletic contest as a member of any other similar team the same season, shall be ineligible to compete under these rules for the remainder of that season.

Section 2. A student, who has played in one or more inter-scholastic games in any season shall be regarded as having engaged in athletics for that season.

### FOOTBALL CERTIFICATES

Section 1. On and after January 1, 1911, no student shall be eligible to play football unless he has been examined by a regular physician and his physical condition has been pronounced satisfactory. Further, such a student shall not be eligible until the physician's certificate has been filed with the Permanent Secretary of the association. Said certificate shall be good from September 1 to December 1 only.

Section 2. On and after January 1, 1911, no student shall be eligible to play football without the written consent of his father, mother or guardian. Said written consent shall be attested by the Principal, and shall be filed with the Permanent Secretary of the association. The copy of said written consent shall be attached to the Physician's certificate when filed with the Permanent Secretary.

### REMUNERATION

Section 1. No High School student shall be eligible to participate in any inter-school contest under the rules of the Indiana High School Athletic Association, if it shall be shown that he, or any member of his family is receiving any remuneration, either directly or indirectily, to influence him or his family to reside in a given school district in order to establish eligibility on the team of said school, and any school permitting such participation shall, upon satisfactory evidence, submitted to the State High School Board of control, be suspended by them from membership in the I. H. S. A. A. for a term of not less than one year. This rule shall not interfere with the right of High School pupils to work during vacation or during out of school hours in order to earn their way through High School. It shall apply to the use of any funds created by gift or by subscription with the intent offering them or parts of them for the free use of the player or any member of his family as an inducement to get them to change their residence to the district of the said school and to maintain residence therein.

### POST GRADUATES

Section 1. Post graduates are not eligible but students graduating from regular courses of less than four years in length shall not be deemed post-graduates.

Section 2. A student is a post graduate of a High School when he has completed the work required for graduation by that school and has received his diploma providing the school offers four years of work.

Section 3. Students meeting requirements for graduation in three and one-half years in a High School with a regular four years course shall be eligible to participate in school athletics the last half of the fourth year, providing they meet all other eligibility rules of the I. H. S. A. A.

### AGE

Section 1. Students shall be ineligible for any athletic competition upon reaching twenty-one years of age.

### AMATEURISM.

Section 1. All contestants in the I. H. S. A. A. must be amateurs. Section 2. Professionalism is defined in the I. H. S. A. A. as accepting remuneration, directly or indirectly, for playing on athletic teams, for officiating in athletic games or for managing athletic teams; or playing, officiating or managing under assumed names. Reasonable meals, lodging and transportation may be accepted, if accepted in service and not in any other way.

### INTERPRETATIONS AND SUGGESTIONS.

First—When a contestant, official, game or decision is protested the game should be played as scheduled and the protest with evidence filed with the Board of Control for settlement later.

Second—Any student who carries at least 15 hours of regular High School work is a High School student.

Third—It is recommended that Principals take the proper measures to control the crowd and the players at all contests. Failure to do so shall be considered sufficient reason for suspension from the association.

Fourth—A game is any athletic contest entered into by a member of this association with players or teams not belonging to the member.

Fifth—As the Principal is the responsible party in High School athletics, it is recommended that he carry on all correspondence with the Board of Control and the Permanent Secretary.

Sixth—By passing work is meant work of such character that credit should be entered on the school records were credit given at the time of certification.

Seventh—Mutual agreements to violate the rules of this association shall result in suspension of all schools concerned.

Eighth—Visiting schools shall be held responsible for the conduct of visitors from their home city regardless of the place of the contest.

Ninth—For athletic purposes the record at the end of a semester shall be final. Deficiencies in one semester can not be made up in a subsequent semester for qualification purposes during that semester. An incomplete or condition at the end of a grading period or semester counts as a failure. Back work may be made up and counted toward eligibility during the summer providing it is done and becomes a matter of final record prior to the opening day of the next semester.

Tenth—The baseball season is defined as beginning and ending with the school year.

Eleventh—The Principal of each school or a teacher in his school delegated by him in writing shall represent such school at all meetings of the Association.

Twelfth—Enrollment for any time is considered enrollment and students who do not pass in three regular High School subjects in any semester in which they are enrolled are ineligible until they have done so.

Thirteenth—Schools may have as many teams in the same sport as they desire, and all rules apply to all teams and all individuals on all teams.


### TRACK AND FIELD RULES.

The following proposal was passed at the 1923 annual meeting "The Track and Field Rules shall be so worded and arranged as to conform to current practice and to the National Collegiate Athletic Track and Field Rules."

The Board of Control has studied the rules of the I. H. S. A. A. and the rules of the National Collegiate Athletic Association and in compliance with the above proposal announces the following to govern all track and field meets in the I. H. S. A. A.:

The National Collegiate Athletic Association Track and Field Rules, published by Spalding shall govern with the following exceptions:

I. Rule 2, regarding a Games Committee shall be void.



II. Scoring.

Three places shall be counted in all meets except the state final meet and the places shall count 5, 3 and 1. In the 1924 annual meeting it was voted to score as follows in the State Final Meet: First, 5 points; Second, 4 points; Third, 3 points; Fourth, 2 points; and Fifth, 1 point. Places in the relay races will not count for points. In case of a tie in any event the points shall be divided and the place awarded by lot.

III. Events-

The events in all meets shall be 100-yard dash, 220-yard dash, 440-yard dash, half-mile run, mile run, 120-yard high hurdle, 220-yard low hurdle, running high jump, running broad jump, pole vault, putting 12 lb. shot, mile relay and half-mile relay.

IV. Order of Events-

Track—100-yard dash trial; 120-yard hurdle trial; 100-yard dash final; one mile run; 440-yard run; 120-yard hurdle final; 220-yard dash trial; 220-yard hurdle trial; half mile run; 220-yard dash final; 220-yard hurdle final; mile relay; half-mile relay. Field—Running high jump; shot put; pole vault; running broad jump.

V. Eligibility.

Each contestant in a meet must have previously made, in a fair test, a record equal to the following in the events in which he is entered:

### I. H. S. A. A. LEGISLATIVE BODY

A proposal regarding the formation of a Legislative Body for the I. H. S. A. A. was sent to the High School Principals, City Superintendents, County Superintendents and the Press on April 8, 1925, and again on September 14, 1925. The bulletin dated April 8, 1925, stated that a referendum vote would be taken by mail early in September, 1925.

Vote ballots were sent to the High School Principals under date of September 14, 1925 and the Board of Control counted the votes on Monday evening, September 21, 1925, declaring the proposal passed by a vote of 326 for it and 145 against it.

Under date of September 24 the result of this vote was sent to High SchoolPrincipals, City Superintendents, County Superintendents and the Press. The bulletin sent to the High School Principals was accompanied by a vote ballot to be used in voting for members of the Legislative Body in the five I. H. S. A. A. districts.

The formation of this "Legislative Body" is considered a decided step in advance in State High School athletic administration.

### LEGISLATIVE BODY ELECTIONS

These were held in all I. H. S. A. A. districts according to the provisions of the proposal passed by a referendum vote of the Principals in the membership. The ballots were counted by the Board of Control on Tuesday, October 6, and are now on file in the office of the I. H. S. A. A.



### I. H. S. A. A. LEGISLATIVE BODY MEETING

Indianapolis, Ind. October 21, 1925

The Legislative Body of the I. H. S. A. A. met in the Claypool Hotel, Indianapolis, Ind., at 8:00 p. m. Wednesday, October 21. All members and the Permanent Secretary were present.

After a brief talk by President Julian regarding the legislative body proposal scheme each member of the body introduced himself and made a short talk. The sentiments expressed by all were decidedly in favor of a bigger and better I. H. S. A. A. and the spirit of the meeting was commendable in every way.

The meeting then resolved itself into an organization meeting for work purposes. It was decided to choose a man from the newly elected members to present the aims, purposes and method of procedure of the legislative body to the annual meeting at 10:00 o'clock Thursday, October 22. Supt. Roy Roudebush of Kentland was chosen for this job and he was then given the benefit of the discussion on what he should say to the annual meeting.

The following scheme of procedure in presenting and in acting on proposals was decided upon for the first meeting of the legislative body in a legislative capacity:

- 1—All proposals shall be signed and submitted in writing by a High School Principal in the I. H. S. A. A. membership to a member of the legislative body or to the Permanent Secretary so that the Permanent Secretary may have them in his hands on or before Thursday, November 12, 1925.
- 2—The Permanent Secretary shall print and distribute all proposals, without any changes, to the High School Principals in the membership immediately after they are received for discussion but not for a referendum vote.
- 3—The Legislative Body will meet in official session at 2:00 o'clock Saturday afternoon, November 28, 1925, in the Claypool Hotel, Indianapolis, to take action on the proposals that have been printed and sent to the High School Principals.
- 4—Arrangements for meetings of the Legislative Body, other than the one on November 28, were left open to be decided later.

No proposals were presented at this meeting as the meeting was purely an organization meeting.

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



This sport suffers as a High School sport because the fall season is short and the spring season is short. Then, too, professional baseball has the front seat usually. In the fall the professional baseball season is coming to a close, and in the spring the High School has difficulty in competing with the professional playing.

The game was played, however, by many schools last spring, and also this fall. In several counties there were baseball leagues that scheduled games to be played during the week after school hours. Much interest was shown in these games.

The I. H. S. A. A. recognizes that High School boys have many opportunities and desires to play on independent teams during the summer months, so the following statements have been made:

High School students may play on independent baseball teams during the summer months, when school is not in session, without jeopardizing their standing in the I. H. S. A. A., providing they do not play under assumed names, and also providing they do not accept remuneration, directly or indirectly, for their playing.

Reasonable meals, lodging and transportation may be accepted by the students, if such are accepted in service rather than in money, or in some other material form. The I. H. S. A. A. expects all High School students to conduct themselves at all times in a way that will honor their High School, the I. H. S. A. A., and themselves.

These statements will enable principals to know the eligibility of their students, as a professional in one sport is a professional in all sports, as far as eligibility in the I. H. S. A. A. is concerned.

### APPROVAL OF OFFICIALS

The scheme introduced during the year to use approved officials only has increased the quality of our officiating many fold. At present there are 2500 approved officials of the I. H. S. A. A., scattered over the whole state and certified for the different sports. While approval for the most part has had to be made from recommendations vet continued approval in the I. H. S. A. A. is dependent upon the work of the official. The fact that an official has been approved does not mean that he will remain approved. Disbarment cards will be issued to officials for cause and their names will be published in our bulletins. Reports on the work of officials are wanted by the Board of Control, as it is only in this way that a good list of officials can he secured. The I. H. S. A. A. now has a list to work from, and it will take the concerted efforts of all Principals to make the list as it should be.

A number of "clinics" or conferences have been held over the state in which discussions were held regarding the rules of the games. the officiating, the rules of the I. H. S. A. A., the handling and the control of the crowds, and the rules of real sportsmanship. The results have been very encouraging. In all probability a blank contract form for officials, the amount to be supplied by the parties concerned, would assist materially in this work. We now have such a blank contract.

As the scheme for approval now stands, an approved official remains approved as long as his work is good. There is no annual certification nor annual fee for officials. The initial fee is one dollar (\$1.00). The following cards are now used:



The following letter has been sent to each approved official: To I. H. S. A. A. Officials:

The enclosed approval card is word proof that you have allied yourself with one of the biggest and best State High School Athletic Associations in the United States. A sense of modesty prevents us from claiming more for the I. H. S. A. A. We sincerely trust that you have also allied yourself with the spirit and the high ideals of this Association of nearly eight hundred High Schools. We sincerely congratulate you, therefore, on belonging, as you now do, to an Athletic Association that was founded and has been nourished on the principles of fair competition and clean amateur sportsmanship for High School boys and girls. In a very vital sense you have accepted the role of teaching young people and adults the ideals, standards and values of clean sportsmanship. You have signed a statement saying that you know the rules of the games and the rules of the I. H. S. A. A. You have also said that you will officiate according to these rules and these ideals.

Scandals have been numerous and widespread in collegiate and professional circles during the years, but the old I. H. S. A. A. has a record that is clean and untarnished. The small irregularities that have arisen have been handled as golden opportunities to spread our gospel of right relationships and clean competition. Evils have been used as stepping stones to better things. In order, therefore, that you may know and appreciate the responsibility that you have assumed, our ideals and standards with a few suggestions are here given:

### IDEALS AND STANDARDS

1. The I. H. S. A. A. stands for a real physical training program for all boys and all girls, built around drills, games, competitive

activities and legitimate sports, rather than around formal gymnastics or organized military training.

2. The I. H. S. A. A. stands for physical training as an integral part of the school curriculum, and athletics as an integral part of physical training.

3. The I. H. S. A. A. stands for fair competition, clean sportsmanship, real amateurism, honest dealings, no gambling, no commer-

cialism, no proselyting, and no recruiting.

4. The I. H. S. A. A. stands for scholarship and behavior, believing that athletics and physical training should ever be secondary and contributory to these things.

5. The I. H. S. A. A. stands for the training of boys and girls in such a way that will make for real citizenship in a real democracy.

### SUGGESTIONS

1. The main duty of an official is to officiate in a fair, courteous, and competent manner, according to the rules of the game, and the rules of the I. H. S. A. A. Officials who lecture, pay compliments, accept and render favors, pursue salesmanship campaigns, proselyte and recruit players cover too much territory.

2. Gambling or arranging conditions so that gambling may take

place has no place in the make-up of a real official.

3. The officiating of a contest in such a manner that future contracts may be secured because of favors shown, is a record that I. H. S. A. A. officials must not possess.

4. Contracts should be binding on both parties, whether verbal or in writing, but written contracts are recommended.

5. Incompetence has no place whatever in the I. H. S. A. A. officiating. All officials have signed statements saying that they know the rules of the games and the rules of the I. H. S. A. A.


6. Officials receive respect by being clean, respectful, courteous,

spect can be secured in no other way.

7. Officials should not place themselves under obligations by accepting hospitality and favors from either side of the contest. It is wise to eliminate every argument, real and otherwise, regarding your fairness.

Your work will be watched with interest, and we trust that you will work for the best interests of the I. H. S. A. A., an Association which stands firmly for the highest ideals of clean sportsmanship. You have promised as much on your application card, and all officials will stand or fall on the basis of their records. School officials will be urged to inform us about your work, and we solicit information from you about school officials. We believe in fair dealing, and in cases of dissatisfaction officials and school authorities will be given a fair hearing.

### BRIEF HISTORY OF I. H. S. A. A.

The first attempt to organize the High Schools of Indiana in a single organization for the purpose of handling athletic activities was made in a metting of the Northern Indiana Teachers' Association held at Richmond, in April, 1903. At this time there was a conference of High School Principals, and the conference ended with a body of sugrested rules and regulations, called the Richmond Agreement. Due to the fact that there was no central organization having executive power, the Richmond Agreement did little more than point the way toward something better.

Principal J. B. Pearcy, of Anderson, issued a call for a meeting of High School Principals interested in a State Athletic organization for December 5, 1903. At this meeting a provisional constitution was adopted. At a similar meeting on December 29, 1903, a final constitution was adopted and a Board of Control of three members was chosen to administer the affairs of the I. H. S. A. A.

The first Board of Control was made up of Principal George W. Benton, Shortridge High School, Indianapolis; Superintendent Lotus D. Coffman, Salem, and Principal J. T. Giles, Marion. These men thought and planned well, and we are enjoying the fruits of their vision.

There were fifteen (15) High Schools belonging to the I. H. S. A. A., March 1, 1904, and now there are seven hundred and eighty-two (782) High Schools belonging. The membership has had a gradual growth through the years, and now the limit is recognized as the limit in the number of High Schools in the State.

A study of the men who have served on the Board of Control through the years will show clearly that the activities of the I. H. S. A. A. have been in good hands. The titles and addresses are given as they were when the men were board of control members. A complete list of the several Board members of the I. H. S. A. A. follows:

In the beginning, one member of the Board of Control served as Secretary, but it soon became very evident that this office furnished enough work for a special man. It was also seen that the future of the organization demanded that the office of Secretary be made more permanent than the office of Board Member. Accordingly, at the annual meeting in 1906 the office of Permanent Secretary was established, and Principal J. T. Giles was chosen by the Principals to be the first Permanent Secretary. Principal Giles resigned on December 26, 1912, and Principal Isaac E. Neff was chosen by the Principals to succeed him. Principal Neff resigned March 15, 1913, and the Board of Control appointed Principal Arthur L. Trester to serve as Permanent Secretary until the next annual meeting in December, 1913. At this meeting, Principal Trester was chosen by the Principals as Permanent Secretary.

The Board of Control consisted of three members, chosen by the Principals in their annual meetings, until the annual meeting of October 27, 1916. At this meeting it was decided to divide the State into five districts for administrative and representative purposes, and that each district should have one representative on the Board of Control, chosen by mail ballot from his own district by the Principals of his district.

In September, 1925, by a referendum vote the Principals passed a legislative body proposal calling for four members from each of the five (5) I. H. S. A. A. districts. The five members of the Board of Control and the fifteen other members elected by the Principals in a mail vote constitute this legislative body. Prior to this scheme all legislation was done at the annual meeting or by referendum voting by mail. This Legislative Body of twenty members passes on all proposals submitted by the High School Principals. It is the law making body of the Association. The scheme is considered a step in advance in state administration and legislation in athletic activities.

The primary purpose of the organizers of the I. H. S. A. A. to manage and to foster High School athletics on a high plane has been held up as an ideal by the Association through the twenty years of the life of the I. H. S. A. A. New and advanced steps have been taken whenever conditions made them necessary. It became increas-

ingly evident as time went on that the I. S. H. A. A. should assume a larger and larger initiative in real physical education for all boys and all girls, and that physical education should be interpreted in the light of other educational aims and ideals. Accordingly, the I. H. S. A. A. now has a program, not only for the managing and fostering of High School athletics, but for the stimulation of communities and schools to the end that real physical education be given all boys and all girls throughout the grades and the High School.

### GYMNASIUMS

For a number of years each successive year has seen a large increase in the number of High School gymnasiums in Indiana. It has not been many years since a gymnasium in a High School in Indiana was considered a fad, a luxury and a misappropriation of money. A few of the larger High Schools had training gymnasiums for boys and girls but very few indeed were the High Schools that had gymnasiums with provisions for spectators. In several cities there were halls, armories and coliseums that were used occasionally by the High Schools in meeting the needs and desires for handling in some adequate way the element of games and sports. Since these facilities were under the direct control of persons outside of schools and since the number present at contests, although small, was usually made of non-school people, conditions were far from satisfactory. The halls were not school property and often were not under school control. The crowds were not crowds that were particularly interested in school control and in school ideals.

In recent years, however, the value of physical education and the large part that the element of play should hold in any system of physical education has made possible the building of hundreds of gymnasiums in our State. Practically all of the more than seven hundred fifty High Schools belonging to the I. H. S. A. A. have gymnasiums of their own or have access to such under their direct control. All new High School buildings in Indiana are provided with gymnasiums and many have been the gymnasiums added to old High School buildings or built separately on the same tracts of land.

The methods of building these gymnasiums in Indiana have been many and varied according to local financial conditions and according to how well the idea of Physical Education for all boys and all girls has been sold. The following schemes have been the most commonly used::

1. The bonding of the school city for an addition to the existing building to include school class-rooms and a gymnasium.

2. The bonding of the school city to cover a part only of the cost, the remainder to be secured by donations without any expectations of a return.

3. Money raised by popular subscription and interest-bearing notes given by the building committee or holding committee to be met out of gate receipts through a series of years.

4. Donations of considerable amounts by one or a few citizens.

Of course, these schemes have taken on different aspects in different communities but in all cases there has been a new and encouraging alignment of the schools and the citizens. Cooperation of a new type has been brought to the front and communities have found perfectly legitimate ways to build gymnasiums to serve as integral units of the school system and of community welfare.

In the building of these gymnasiums in our State their multiple use for school purposes and for community purposes has been kept in mind. As a result we find these buildings should be designated as community buildings rather than school gymnasiums. They serve in a very real and a much needed way the demands of the schools for physical education for auditorium work and for classroom activities and the demands of the community for an auditorium to accommodate meetings of large numbers as well as for play purposes for adults when not used by the schools. A fine spirit of adjustment between the school and the community has been necessary and has been prevalent. The inter-relationships of the school and the community have been brought to the front and good has resulted to both parties. Community and school welfare has been fostered in such a way that the school claims and supports the community and the community claims and supports the school. In truth has the school been shown to be what it was intended to be, a part of society set aside to do some of the work necessary for society but which society can not do as a whole. Furthermore, it has been shown that school is not something aside from society but the school is an integral part of society.

It is very evident at the present time that the following principles should be kept in mind in the construction and use of gymnasiums and playfields for schools and communities. These principles will not apply in all communities alike as conditions are very different in different communities. Needs in one place would mean luxuries in another place and vice versa, but in the main these principles will be found worth-while for study and planning:

- 1. Provision for buildings, playfields and teaching personnel should be made for all boys and all girls in our schools to the end that physical education of the right type may be given as a regular and an integral part of the school program.
- 2. Provision for the accommodation of spectators should be made in all gymnasiums and on all playfields. Spectatoritis is not a disease but a training medium for the young and the old when properly conceived.
- 3. Gymnasiums and playfields should be considered not only as facilities for physical exertion and maneuvering but as laboratories for mental, moral, physical and social training for the participants and the spectators.
- 4. Gymnasiums and playfields should serve the school population with their numerous needs and demands first of all and then should be opened to the adult population for civic, social and recreational purposes throughout the entire year.
- 5. The teaching personnel should be chosen with the greatest care and should be adequate as to numbers. Physical education for all means not a few but many trained leaders.
- 6. The work of the school during the school year in gymnasiums and on playfields should merge into the recreation and playground

work of the summer and the summer work should dovetail into the work of the school in the fall. In other words an all year program, preferably under the same supervision and administration, is necessary and desirable in all communities.

7. The training of all and the exploitation of none should be the

guiding principle underlying all of this work.

8. The introduction of games and sports rather than the stressing of formal work is highly important. We are rapidly moving from the idea of effort to the idea of interest in all physical education work.

9. The element of competition and the idea of winning are legitimate and should be encouraged but we must stop short of the "win at any cost" ideal because nobody wins and everybody loses under

such an ideal.

10. "Gambling" is not an athletic activity and has no place on the program of physical education. Gymnasiums and playfields must not provide shelter and seats for the money changers. They do not

deserve standing room.

11. Gymnasiums should be arranged for a number of games such as handball, baseball, volleyball, etc., and for the administration and supervision of physical examinations, tests, remedial work and the more meaning-ful elements in the formal types of physical education work. Apparatus and equipment should be such as will be used for actual and worth-while results. Locker rooms, toilet rooms, shower rooms, dressing rooms, inspection rooms, etc., should be carefully planned.


12. Basketball is the game that is played as much or more than any other indoor game and the I. H. S. A. A. has established, by custom and practice, a playing court for this game having dimensions of 50 ft. by 70 ft. between the baskets with from 5 ft. to 10 ft. extra on the ends and sides. Such a floor can be used for a number of team games such as volleyball, tennis and indoor baseball. Some indoor

track and field work can be done also.

In the following paragraphs will be given some information regarding some of the gymnasiums of the State. Pictures of these buildings will be found in this book and detailed information about the buildings, their construction and use may be secured by writing to the High School Principals.

### TIPTON-1925

A very crowded condition in school, and poor facilities for athletics, made necessary the construction of a large addition to the existing school plant of Tipton. The building is 138 feet long and 98 feet wide. The front part is two stories high providing dressing rooms and showers for both boys and girls on the lower floor and recitation rooms on the second floor. The gymnasium is located in the back part of the building and is 97 feet by 98 feet. It is provided with glass back boards and a playing floor 50 x 74. Permanent bleachers have been built in on the South side. The other side and both ends will be equipped with knock down bleachers. The gymnasium will accommodate a crowd of 2700 people for athletic events.

The building was constructed jointly by the school corporation of the City of Tipton and Cicero Township which are consolidated for school purposes. The building is of red brick and the interior is finished in buff-colored glazed tile. The building was erected at a cost of \$65,000.

### EDINBURG-1925

This gymnasium-auditorium is an integral part of the new Senior High School building costing approximately \$60,000.00 and financed entirely by the school trustees. The playing floor is 50' x 68' and the ceiling clearance is 20½'. The seating capacity for games is approximately 1,500. This unit of the building serves for physical education, athletic contests and as a school and community auditorium. Shower baths, dressing rooms and physical directors' rooms are included.

### WASHINGTON-1925

Six hundred interested citizens incorporated as the Washington Public School Athletic Association and arranged with three local Building and Loan Associations to finance this gymnasium building. Each of the 600 stockholders assumed a liability of one hundred dollars. The total cost approximates \$65,000.00 The building is 115 feet by 132 feet, the playing court is 50' x 70' and the seating capacity is 5,200. The gymnasium is controlled by a board of directors consisting of seven members as follows: The three city school trustees, the high school principal and three members elected annually and from the stockholders. When the building is clear of incumbrance the corporation will deed it to the school city. Shower baths, dressing rooms and physical directors' rooms are included.

### ALEXANDRIA—1925

This is a gymnasium-auditorium type of building and is an integral part of the new High School building dedicated October 18, 1925. The gymnasium floor is 55' x 80' and the playing floor is 38½' x 70' with a 26' ceiling. For games the seating capacity is 1,200. There is a stage for auditorium purposes.

### GREENSBURG-1925

This is a building that will be used primarily for physical and vocational education and was built by the school city at a contract cost of \$50,000.00. The outside dimensions of the building are 103 x 143 feet and the seating capacity is between 3,000 and 3,500. Community purposes were kept in mind in planning the building so that it will be used for such purposes, seating 4,000 to 4,500 persons for auditorium events.

### JASPER-1924-1925

This gymnasium and auditorium was dedicated February 26, 1925. The playing floor is 40' x 75' and the stage is 36 feet wide. The

total seating capacity of the room is 1,500. It is considered one of the finest buildings of its type in this section of the state.

### CYNTHIANA-1925.

This gymnasium is included in the addition to the High, School Building and is so constructed that it can be used for Physical Education work by grade students as well as High School students. It is called a Community building.

### RAUB-1925.

This High School building was built at an expense of \$80,000.00 by the school trustee. It is 177 feet long and 90 feet wide, having one story and a basement. The gymnasium is a part of the building, having a playing floor of 40 ft. x 70 ft. with out of bounds on all sides. The capacity for games is about 1,000.

### RUSHVILLE

In providing for this building an auditorium, a gymnasium and quarters for vocational training work were kept in mind. The building is 127 feet wide and 165 feet long with an entrance at each of the four corners. The open floor space is 60 feet by 98 feet and the playing court is 50 feet by 70 feet. Seating of the bleacher type will accommodate 4,000 at games. A stage has been provided at one end of the floor. Ample provision has been made for dressings rooms, showers, locker rooms and toilet rooms.

Season tickets at \$10.00 each were sold to the amount of \$5,000; the Rushville Athletic Corporation raised a non-interest bearing loan of \$26,750.00 to be paid in ten years; and the School Trustees issued bonds to the amount of \$40,000.00. There was \$1,063.80 premium and accrued interest on the bonds. The architect was paid by the School Trustees out of the special fund.

### GREENCASTLE

This building is known as the vocational and physical education unit of the school system and was built by a bond issue for \$85,000.00. It is 103 feet wide and 142 feet long and is constructed of concrete, brick and steel. The seating capacity for games is 3,500. The entire basement is used for manual training, agriculture and the heating system. The gymnasium will be used for physical training for boys, for games and for community meetings. The old gymnasium will be used for physical training for girls.

### HANDLING ATHLETIC FINANCES

One of the most important duties of a High School Principal is the proper handling of the funds of the extra-curricular activities of his High School. Gate receipts must be efficiently collected, honestly accounted for and judiciously expended. It is not only good business to have a definite policy regarding financial affairs in extra-curricular activities but it means much to handle all such affairs in such a way that no cloud of doubt and suspicion has a chance to raise its head. It seems absolutely necessary that all High Schools have a financial accounting system for extra-curricular activities that is adequate in completeness, accuracy and clearness. The High School Principal, as well as others concerned, can form a very good notion of what is being done in extra-curricular activities if the books concerned with the receipts and expenditures are well kept and easily available. Even a hasty examination of the finances sometimes will readily furnish the High School Principal with a guiding control that is valuable in many ways in his administration of the activities within his High School.

The following scheme is outlined with the idea in mind that it may prove helpful in some places. The scheme can be adjusted to suit the peculiar problems of each High School.

In all High Schools of whatever size there should be a member of the faculty chosen and designated by the school authorities as a financial secretary and treasurer to handle all extra-curricular activity funds. This person should be chosen with care, instructed with care and then held to strict account for all receipts, expenditures and reports. In all probability this financial treasurer and secretary should not be an athletic coach as such men have enough to do to coach the athletic teams. Then, too, the salary and expenses of the coach should bear no relation to the gate receipts. He should be employed as a regular teacher in the regular way by the school trustees and should be paid out of school funds as other teachers are paid.

The financial secretary and treasurer should be under bond and the bond should be paid for out of the funds handled. He should be available at certain hours of each day for the work under discussion and he should be given adequate time to do his work well and on time. Lack of time should never be a valid excuse by the financial secretary and treasurer as he should be given time to do his work. An adequate system should be established suitable to the funds, the school and the activities so that all accounts will be available, auditable and ready for report making at any time. The system need not be intricate nor complex. It should be simple yet ample for all needs. The scheme as suggested can be adjusted and modified to suit High Schools of different sizes and having few or many extra-curricular activities. It will work for athletic funds alone.

One book, loose-leaf or otherwise, arranged with columnar sheets so that the proper headings can be written should be provided. All money should be kept in one fund in the bank and the account should be entered in the name of the High School Extra-Curricular Fund. Interest accruing should be distributed according to the activities.

Since there is one fund, it will be necessary to provide space in the first pages of the financial book for a controlling account and spaces for activity accounts such as athletics, class play and orchestra. The controlling account will show at a glance the receipts, expenditures and balances of all funds at any time and will constitute the, amount for checking with the bank each month. The separate activity accounts will show in detail their receipts, expenditures and balances at any time. An index and index tabs should be arranged so that accounts can be easily found. The activity accounts should show information in more detail than the items in the controlling account.

No bills should be paid unless a carefully checked invoice is presented and all invoices should be accurate and complete. Use checks to pay all bills. These invoices should be stamped, giving the date paid and check number. The name of the person submitting the invoice should be written in the stamp enclosure. These should be filed numerically by check number so that returned checks can be attached quickly. If a system of pay-out orders is used, and such is recommended, for the sponsors of the several activities such should be carefully worded, carefully filled out and carefully filed with receipts. Receipts for money should be made in duplicate and the original should be filed. All receipts and pay-out orders can be filed by activities or all together. In sending out checks letters should be enclosed giving the date, amount and items covered by the check. Carbon copies of all letters and orders should be made and properly filed.

Detailed and itemized statements should be made frequently for the information of students, teachers, school officials and the public in general. These statements should be prepared carefully and explanations should be given wherever necessary for a complete understanding of the items whether they are receipts or expenditures. Statements should be given to the public without a request being made for them. Financial information should be given prior to a demand for such or a question about such. In all probability we have no bigger problem before us at the present time than the proper handling of gate receipts. No High School can afford to have any question raised about the finances of athletic activities or about the finances of any extra-curricular activity.

The following forms are suggested for the Controlling Account and an Activity Account:

The heading "Sports" may be sub-divided by columns for Track, Baseball, Basketball, Football, etc., so that information about the several sports in your athletic activities will be available at any time.

All transactions should be completed when made as far as the proper forms are concerned. Receipts should be written in duplicate at the time of the transaction and should be written in full. Checks and stubs should be filled out completely and accurately. Deposits should be made in the bank as soon as the money is received. Invoices, bills, pay-out orders, communications, memoranda, etc., should be checked and filed when received. All entries should be made daily so that there may be no mistakes. Furthermore, this is the easiest way to handle finances.

The job of handling finances looks much smaller when the scheme has been decided upon and when equipment in the way of checks, deposit slips, receipts, pay-out orders, memoranda slips and filing facilities are provided.

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
