TO THE INDIANA HIGH SCHOOL ATHLETIC ASSOCIATION

John L. Adams, President I. H. S. A. A., Jan. 1, 1927, to July 1, 1927.

To have been a member of the Board of Control of the I. H. S. A. A. is but to realize the greatness of the organization with which Indiana High Schools are blessed. Each year it has grown, both in number of schools, and in the respect that it commands from its membership. The I. H. S. A. A. is now an integral part of any high school, and without its supervisory powers and helpful administration, athletics in our schools would be our most difficult problem, instead of a helpful factor a they are today.

There is no question but that I. H. S. A. A. management has done much to stimulate better scholarship in all our High Schools. The Association has fostered clean athletics, high ideals of fair play and better sportsmanship from its beginning, until I believe now there is no organization in America that fulfills its mission better, or does its work more thoroughly than our own I. The finances of the body are in fine shape and the agreement with Butler College and the Board of Control for a home for our State Basketball Tournament will always assure us of sufficient revenue to carry on our work. In all my three years work on the Board, I believe the signing of the lease was one of the most important things we accomplished, and it will mean much to I. H. S. A. A. members in the

future to know they have a permanent home for the State Basketball Tournaments.

In closing I will say that I am ever mindful of the fact that the Principals of our State perfected the organization of the I. H. S. A. A. but the Coaches of the State created the demand for such an organization. Each then is responsible for its great and good growth. I wish it were possible for every Principal and every Coach to serve on the Board of Control of the I. H. S. A. A. I am sure we would all then be better and more enthusiastic members and realize that there is yet plenty of work to do. As for myself, I feel that I have been a faithful and conscientious member of the Board of Control and have done my work conscientiously and for the best interests of the whole State. I tried to serve you well and if I have erred or opposed you in some of your ideas, I was thinking of the entire State and not of any individual case.

TO THE INDIANA HIGH SCHOOL ATHLETIC ASSOCIATION

The fundamental principles and beliefs of the Indiana High School Athletic Association have warranted its success from the beginning. Its growth has been steady and sure, and the year 1927 shows unusual progress and development.

The membership has been extended to include practically every public high school in the state and their athletic programs have grown to include more sports and to reach a larger and larger number of boys and girls.

The Parents' and Physicians' Certificates which were started last January have proved their worth in many instances. These, with the health survey conducted at the last State Tournament, have furnished a definite basis for future development and a more helpful athletic program. The cooperation of the State Medical Association in this matter is worth much in itself. This has also had a tendency to bring about a closer relationship between the Board of Control and the State Department of Education. This is as it should be for all are striving to better conditions for our boys and girls.

Keener interest and a more wholesome attitude is being manifest in most of our inter-school contests, as shown by the fact that fewer cases pertaining to eligibility and controversies between schools are being brought before the Board for review and settlement.

High school Principals, Coaches and Officials are cooperating as is shown by the many clinics held over the State in conjunction with official's associations. All this spells progress and helps strengthen the I. H. S. A. A., which is now one of the strongest associations of its kind and is being copied by many of our sister states.

The high esteem and regard for Indiana High School Athletics was cltarly demonstrated at the national meeting held in St. Louis last spring. Hoosiers can justly be proud of their Athletic Association and it ideals, principles and programs.

The large attendance and intense interest shown at our annual meetings reflect the sane and wholesome attitude of the school men in this field of activity.

Our Legislative Body has proved beyond a doubt that it is well worthy of the confidence of the High School Principals and deserving of their most loyal support. While somewhat conservative in their legislation, they are sincere and are trying to promote the best

interests of all concerned. We need have no fear of any hasty and unwise legislation on their part, for any action whatever comes only after careful study and deliberation.

After weeks of study and investigation by the Permanent Secretary and the Board of Control the Butler College lease was completed, giving the I. H. S. A. A. a new and permanent home. This need has been manifest at our State Tournaments for several years past. Also this will enable us to have a more complete state athletic program. The Legislative Body unanimously approved this contract, and indicated that they considered it the outstanding action of the Board for the year.

While the Board has been more or less aggressive in action, more time should be found for constructive work, instruction and supervising help where desired. Principals, Coaches and Officials can do much to support the Board along this line by setting forth and urging the observance of the ideals and policies of the I. H. S. A. A. Newspaper, too, may and should be a very helpful agent in spreading this gospel of clean athletics and fair play. In the main their influence has been of the right type.

It is very evident, that the outstanding desire of the members of the Board of Control and the Permanent Secretary is the highest welfare of our boys and girls in a clean and wholesome athletic and physical education program, so broad and varied that each individual may have his chance in the game.

May this attitude and spirit continue until our entire state is permeated with the spirit of a "Good Sport" as given in a recent issue of the American Magazine by Grantland Rice in his article, "Ten Commandments of a Good Sport":

- 1. Thou shalt not quit.
- 2. Thou shalt not alibi.
- 3. Thou shalt not gloat over winning.
- 4. Thou shalt not be a rotten loser.
- 5. Thou shalt not take unfair advantage.
- 6. Thou shalt not ask odds thou art not willing to give.
- 7. Thou shalt not always be ready to give thine opponents the shade.
- 8. Thou shalt not underestimate an opponent nor overestimate thyself.
- 9. Remember the game is the thing and that he who thinketh otherwise is a slacker and not a true sportsman.
- 10. Honor the game thou playest for he who playest the game straight and hard, winneth even when he loseth.

Let the motto of the future be: To get on don't merely look on; move on; help on."

LEGISLATIVE BODY HEALTH STUDY COMMITTEE REPORT

The Legislative Body of the I. H. S. A. A. in its meeting of October 20, 1926, provided for a committee of three members of the body to make a study of the physical effects of the 1927 State Basketball Tourney on the individual player, the expenses incurred to be paid out of the funds of the I. H. S. A. A. as approved by the Board of Control.

President Lee O. Baird appointed Principal R. C. Puckett, Evansville, Chairman, Principal C. F. Albaugh, LaFontaine, and Principal L. E. Michael, Clinton, to serve on this committee. The members of the committee consulted several competent physicians, physical directors and coaches in several different states and finally decided on a scheme for making the proposed study.

The study was made and the committee desires at this time and in this manner to present to the High School Principals, the Coaches, the Physicians and to the public in general the purpose, method, results and recommendations connected with the study that was made.

I. PURPOSE OF STUDY:

To find out in as scientific a way as possible the effects of the playing in the 1927 State Basketball Tourney on the individual player in the tourney and to secure all available information for future study, direction and policy regarding players and tourneys.

II. CONDITIONS:

Sixteen basketball teams of ten boys each who had played through a regular basketball season of twenty games and also through a sectional and a regional tourney this season. The boys had played basketball in High School for one, two, three and four years according to their enrollments, and their ages ran from fifteen to twenty years inclusive. The State Final Tourney was played as an elimination series, each team dropping out as defeated. The enthusiasm was high and the situation was tense due to 13,000 spectators and the importance of the games. There were sixteen teams, one hundred sixty boys and fifteen games—eight games on Friday and seven games on Saturday. The winning team and the runners-up played three games on Saturday in the morning, afternoon and evening. Two other teams played two games on Saturday in the morning and afternoon. Four other teams played one game on Saturday morning. Each of the sixteen teams played one game on Friday. All games were played in halves of fifteen minutes each.

The winning team and the runners-up played, therefore, one hundred twenty minutes of basketball,—thirty minutes on Friday and ninety minutes on Saturday. All other teams played a less number of games and minutes.

III. METHOD OF STUDY:

Palpation

I. H. S. A. A. Health Study Blanks were composed, printed and sent to the High School Principals of the schools having teams in the State Final Tourney on Monday, March 14. A letter, requesting these Principals to select and employ competent physicians to carefully examine each of their ten players on Wednesday, March 16 and again on Wednesday, March 23, accompanied these blanks. The composition of the Health Study Blank follows:



NOTE-This blank will have meaning if and only if the examination is made carefully.

Central (Evansville), Central (Fort Wayne), Sharpsville, Kokomo, Waldron, Washington, Connersville, Frankfort, Emerson (Gary), Greencastle, Kendallville, Muncie and Martinsville submitted Health Study Blanks for each boy prior to the tourney and after the tourney,-according to the prearranged schedule. Bedford submitted blanks covering examinations made after the tourney only. Mishawaka submitted their blanks too late for the study and Logansport submitted no blanks at all.

Two reputable physicians, Dr. Gante and Dr. McDonald, both of Anderson, were selected and employed to examine, study and evaluate the 140 Health Study Blanks carefully. A report was made by these men to the committee, and the committee, after studying the examinations and reports of the several physicians carefully, believe that the following statements can be made at this time. It must be clearly understood, however, that the committee does not desire to reach definite and final conclusions on the basis of this one study. The Health Study Blanks for 130 boys in 13 cities, and blanks for ten boys after the tourney, as examined by fourteen reputable physicians before and after the tourney and reviewed by two other reputable physicians are now giving their evidence. This evidence is not conclusive, but it may be directive, diagnostic and provocative of thought and study. Probably this study has brought together in a more scientific way more definite information than has been collected by any other source in our state and it would seem to be safe to say that this information is much more valuable than mere opinion even if expressed by several persons.

1. The two physicians, who examined the Health Study Blanks in order to evaluate them for the committee, stated that the examinations were evidently made in a careful and quite uniform manner by the fourteen physicians in as many cities.



2. These two physicians also stated that, in the main, the boys entering the State Final Tourney were physically fit and in good health.

3. Eleven boys out of the 140 boys examined were given red marks by their examinations. This means that this number of boys were not as physically fit as they should have been for tourney basketball playing. It also means that at least six of these boys should not have played in the tourney at all.

4. The Health Study Blanks do not show that the 1927 State Basketball Tourney had any evil effects on the health and physical fitness of the 140 boys who participated and were examined. At the same time it should be said that the Health Study Blanks do not show that the 1927 State Basketball Tourney had any good effects on the health and physical fitness of the participants.

5. There were no outstanding or common defects found in the examinations of these 140 boys. The heart examinations and the urinalyses were the most significant elements in the study.

It would seem that the study made indicates that we should pay more attention to the physical fitness and health of boys as a requirement for playing basketball in games and in tourneys than to the game or to the tourney. Evidently we are entering boys in games and tourneys who should not participate in games and tourneys. This does not mean that our games and tourneys should not receive careful study and planning to eliminate the strenuosity in them, but it does mean that our immediate attention should be placed on careful examinations of all players prior to games and tourneys and rigorous suspension from participation of all players showing a physical fitness below par and dangerous to future health. Probably the I. H. S. A. A. Parents and Physicians' Certificates now required for football, basketball and track are signed without careful thinking by the parent and careful examination by the physician. At least it is interesting to know that the eleven boys receiving red marks in these Health Study examinations, have on file Parents and Physicians' Certificates entitling them to play basketball during the season just closed. Below is given the wording of these certificates:

RULE OF I. H. S. A. A.—On and after January 1, 1927, a student, who participates in any interscholastic football, basketball or track contest, shall have on file in the Principal's office a certificate of physical fitness and a certificate giving the written consent of the father, mother or guardian for such athletic participation as is specified therein. The physical examination shall be made during the season of each of the three sports by a regularly licensed physician. Previous to participation the Principal shall certify to the I. H. S. A. A. that the certificates required in this rule are on file in his office.

NOTE—The letter of certification to the I. H. S. A. A. shall give the full names of the students and shall specify the sport for which certificates are on file.

Several of the Principals, whose boys showed defects according to the Health Study examinations, have already taken steps to effect remedies, thus showing a fine attitude as well as excellent judgment.

If eleven boys out of 140 boys in the State Final Tourney were in such a physical condition as to receive red marks in health and physical fitness, it is easy to see that probably 500 boys would be found physically unfit among the 7,310 boys entered in the 731 sectional tourneys. The big question for us just now, of course, is not that 7% of the boys in the State Tourney received red marks in physical fitness but that 7% of these boys were permitted to enter a strenuous tourney. It may be that special examinations should be made of all boys during the week prior to the sectional tourneys.

All of us know that physical unfitness abounds, but we should not conduct strenuous tourneys with physically unfit players. The 7% shown here is not alarmingly large as we can readily understand when we recall that about 30% of the men examined for service in the world war were physically unfit, but it is large enough to demand our immedi-

ate attention, study and action. We need to know, then we need courage to act on our knowledge in this matter.

The members of the Committee desire to thank the High School Principals who cooperated in such a fine way in this study and to express their gratitude to the Physicians who assisted in the examinations and their evaluations. The fine and wholesome attitude of the Principals, Coaches and Physicians means much in this Health Study work.

Basket Ball


Basketball playing was the leading sport in practically all of the High Schools in the State during the winter months. Most of the teams played twenty games on their regular schedules and then played in one tourney in addition to the tourney scheme to decide the State Championship. A number of second teams played complete schedules and there were many intra-mural games in all of the schools. Class games and league games were numerous thus providing play for many boys and many girls.

There was no scheme to secure the State Championship for girls in basketball. Most of the playing of girls in basketball took place within the school. Some schools provided for inter-school games and there were a few county tourneys for girls. The need for trained women to coach and manage girls' athletics and to officiate in girls' games is one that faces the High Schools in Indiana. The Board of Control has ruled against state tourneys and national tourneys for girls. All girls' basketball games were played according to girls' rules.

The State Tourney Scheme for boys provided for sixty-four (64) sectional tourneys on March 4 and 5, sixteen (16) regional tourneys on March 12, and a final tourney of sixteen (16) teams on March 18 and 19. There were 731 teams in the 64 sectional tourneys and each team was made up of 10 men, so 7,310 players were certified for the sctional tourneys.

The Martinsville High School (Glenn Curtis, Coach), won the State Final Tourney in Indianapolis and the State Championship in Basketball for 1927. Franklin Prentice of the Kendallville High School team won the Gimbel Prize for Mental Attitude, the five members of the Board of Control making the selection. This prize has been given each year for a number of years.

The following reports will be found interesting to those desiring information about schedules and scores. All schedules were drawn by lot by the Board of Control and the halves in all games were fifteen minutes in length. A Health Study was made of the players in the State Final Tourney. The complete report is given elsewhere in this book.



ANNOUNCEMENT OF I. H. S. A. A. SECTIONAL, REGIONAL AND FINAL BASKETBALL TOURNEYS, 1927

THE SIXTEENTH ANNUAL

The Board of Control has completed the details for the State Championship Basketball Tourneys and announces the scheme in full.

Sectional Tourneys, March 4 and 5

The following bases were used in selecting centers:

(1) Location,—geographical and with reference to schools desiring to participate, (2) Railway, interurban, and automobile facilities, (3) General conditions,—attitude of local authorities, floors and entertaining facilities, (4) Rotation.

Schools have been assigned by counties with a few exceptions and these exceptons are clearly indicated. The name of your county locates your center unless assigned otherwise. The scheme is arranged to have no less than 8 teams and no more than 16 teams in each tourney and the assignment of all schools is given below. The Board of Control reserves the right to readjust the scheme if conditions arise making changes necessary or advisable. The numbers indicate the number of schools that actually entered the tourneys last year. No doubt these numbers will be very nearly correct for this year. Correct information will not be available until the entry blanks have been received and accepted by the Board of Control.

MANAGEMENT—The general management of these tourneys rests solely with the Board of Control. Local arrangements have been delegated to the Center Principals. Two officials for each tourney will be selected by the Board and none but fair, disinterested and competent men will be chosen. All schedules of hours, floors, teams and officials will be made out and printed by the Board. All schedules will be drawn by lot by the Board of Control and no changes will be made in them.

OPEN CONTEST—The tourneys are open to all members of the Association, irrespective of their season's record.

PROTESTS—All protests against teams or individuals must be made in writing by the Principal and filed with the Permanent Secretary on or before 11 A. M. Wednesday, February 23. Protests must be accompanied by evidence. Eleventh hour protests are usually unfair as such do not give the team or individual time to meet the protest.

ENTERTAINMENT—Teams are limited to eight men, but ten men can be certified. The Center Principals have contracted with the Board to entertain nine men (which MUST include the faculty manager) from each competing school. Entertainment will begin, if necessary, at 7 a. m. Friday, March 4 and continue, if necessary, to 8 a. m. Sunday, March 6. Printed schedules will be sent to each competing school by the Center Principal in plenty of time to arrange for making the trip. All competing schools are requested to ask for no longer entertainment than is necessary, but all schools are entitled to entertainment throughout the tourney. Fairness by all parties must prevail in this matter of entertainment.

EXPENSES—An enrance fee of one dollar (\$1.00) for each team must accompany the entry blank, which money will go into the treasury of the I. H. S. A. A. to defray expenses of the tourneys incurred by the Board of Control. The Center Principals have contracted to make settlement according to the following scheme:

- 1. All legitimate expenses except for transportation shall be paid from the gross receipts.
- 2. The Center High School shall receive one hundred dollars (\$100).
- 3. The transportation shall be paid. (The Board of Control has decided on four (4) cents per mile per man for the round trip. Mileage should be considered as the most direct distance between the school building of the participating school and the gymnasium in which the tourney is held.)

- 4. The Center High School shall receive one hundred dollars (\$100).
- 5. The I. H. S. A. A. shall receive five per cent (5%) of the fourth balance.
- 6. One-half of the fifth balance shall be divided pro rata among the participating schools, the center school sharing.
- 7. One-half of the fifth balance shall be divided on the basis of season ticket sales in the local communities on or before Thursday, March 3.
- 8. The Board of Control shall pass on all reports by the Center School and all reports by the participating schools.
- 9. The Center School shall furnish a complete financial report to the I. H. S. A. A. and to each participating school soon after the tourney.

PRIVILEGES—All competing players, one attendant and one faculty manager for each team (ten in all) shall be admitted free to all games.

ELIGIBILITY—The eligibility of each player must be certified to by the Principal of the school sending the team. Certificates must be made on the regular blanks furnished by the Permanent Secretary and all data must be given as indicated. Entries will close Monday, February 21. It is recommended that these be sent between February 10 and 19. Do not mail entry blanks later than February 19, 1927. All students must be eligible when they participate as well as when they are certified so entry blanks should not be sent too early.

ADMISSION FEE—The admission fee to all tourney games shall be forty (40) cents for single session tickets and one dollar fifty cents (\$1.50) for season tickets and no more shall be received for said tickets. No more tickets shall be sold than the capacity of the house will justify. All requirements of the State Fire Marshall shall be met.

PRIZES—No prizes of any kind are to be awarded to any school or individual from any source.

DISTRIBUTION OF TICKETS—An equitable distribution of season tickets shall be made among the competing school based on distance, enrollment in High School, and probable attendance from the competing schools. Season tickets should be ready for distribution on Monday, February 28. Much ticket information can be secured prior to this date. Center Principals and participating Principals should communicate with each other on Monday morning, February 28. This response

Season tickets sold on Friday, March 4, should not be credited to any school in the sharing.







INTERPRETATION OF ITEMS IN REPORT

"Expenditures" covers the legitimate expenses of the tourneys other than transportation, such as lodging, meals, officials, etc. "Visiting Schools" covers the amounts received in the division of the net receipts, on the basis of season tickets sold and on the pro rata basis. "I H. S. A. A." covers five percent (5%) of the balance after the legitimate expenses were paid, after the center school received two hundred dollars (\$200.00) and after the transportation was paid. "Center" covers the amounts received by the center schools for holding the tourneys, from the division on the basis of season tickets sold and from the pro rata division.


- All legitimate expenses except for transportation shall be paid from the gross receipts.
- 2. The Center High School shall receive one hundred dollars
- 3. The transportation shall be paid. (Four cents per man per mile for the round trip).
- 4. The Center High School shall receive one hundred dollars (\$100).
- 5. The I. H. S. A. A. shall receive five percent (5%) of the fourth balance.
- 6. One-half of the balance shall be divided pro rata among the participating schools, the center school sharing.
- 7. One-half of the balance shall be divided on the basis of season ticket sales in the local communities on or before Thursday, March 3.
- 8. The Board of Control shall pass on all reports by the Center School and all reports by the participating schools.
- 9. The Center School shall furnish a complete financial report to the I. H. S. A. A. and to each participating school soon after the tourney.

II. Regional Tourney Contract.

- All legitimate expenses except for transportation shall be paid from the gross receipts.
- 2. The Center High School shall receive one hundred fifty dollars (\$150).
- 3. The I. H. S. A. A. shall receive ten percent (10%).
- 4. The transportation shall be paid. (Four cents per man per mile for the round trip).
- 5. The Center High School shall receive one hundred fifty dollars (\$150).
- 6. The I. H. S. A. A. shall receive fifty percent (50%) of the balance
- 7. The remainder shall be divided equally among the competing schools.
- 8. The Board of Control shall pass on all reports by the Center School and all reports by the participating schools.
- The Center School shall furnish a complete financial report to the I. H. S. A. A. and to each participating school the next week after the tourney.

Winner of Gimbel Prize For Mental Attitude, 1927.

GIMBEL PRIZE FOR MENTAL ATTITUDE

In 1917 Jake Gimbel of Vincennes presented to the I. H. S. A. A. Board of Control a proposal to give a prize each year at the State Basketball tourney to the boy among the teams represented that showed the best mental attitude throughout the tourney. Mr. Gimbel did not have in mind the quality of the playing of any boy on any team, but did have in mind the qualities that belong to a real gentleman. He clearly recognized the mental and moral strain under which the players play during the tourney and he also recognized the numerous opportunities for the players to lose control of themselves and to do something not conducive to true sportsmanship.

The Board of Control accepted the proposal of Mr. Gimbel and the awarding of this prize known as the "Gimbel Prize for Mental Attitude" has been an annual affair, calling for much favorable comment. The prize and the things it represents are cherished by the players and schools of Indiana. The prize has meant much to real sportsmanship and self-control in the High Schools of the State and it is a prize sought for by all schools. The school to which the winner of this prize belongs claims the winner as their own and accordingly the whole school and the whole community are proud. In a number of cities similar prizes are being given to the players who show the best mental attitude within their own schools. The Gimbel prize and these other similar prizes have exalted in a very real sense the qualities belonging to a gentleman in the minds of our boys and girls. The following boys have won the prize:

I. H. S. A. A. CONTRACT FOR SECTIONAL AND FINAL STATE BASKETBALL TOURNEYS AND FINAL STATE TRACK AND FIELD MEET—1927

Anderson, Ind., Jan. 20, 1927.

ARTICLES OF CONTRACT

The following Articles of Agreement are subscribed to by the Indiana High School Athletic Association through Arthur L. Trester, Permanent Secretary, andrepresenting the "Indianapolis High Schools."

SECTION I.

The dates of the contests covered by this contract shall be as follows:

Sectional Basketball Tourney—March 4 and 5, 1927. Final State Basketball Tourney—March 18 and 19, 1927. State Final Track and Field Meet—May 21, 1927.

SECTION II.


SECTION III.

The Indianapolis Representative shall provide free entertainment as follows:

- 1. Sectional Tourney—For eight (8) players and a faculty manager for each team between the hours of 7:00 a.m. Friday, March 4 and 8:00 a.m. Sunday, March 6 if necessary.
- 2. Final Tourney—For ten (10) players and a faculty manager for each team between the hours of 4:00 p.m. Thursday, March 17 and 8:00 a.m. Sunday, March 20 if necessary.
- 3. Final Meet—For all men in the first and second places in each sectional meet; for five (5) men each constituting the two winning relay teams in each sectional meet; and for a faculty manager for each school represented between the hours of 6:00 p. m. Friday, May 20 and 8:00 p. m. Saturday, May 21 if necessary.

SECTION IV.

The Indianapolis Representative shall provide tickets, policemen, gate men, announcers, scorers, timekeepers, judges, other minor officials and all necessary equipment for the contests. They shall further provide a suitable shield for the school winning the final basketball tourney and badges for the (10) individual members of the winning team; and a cup or shield for the winning school in the final track meet, a placque for each of the two (2) winning relay teams and medals for the winners in each event. The standard design of the I. H. S. A. A. shall be used. No other prizes shall be given by anyone.

SECTION V.

The matter of complimentary tickets shall be left to the Indianapolis representative, who shall issue them to the Press and to the helping teachers and students. All men of the competing teams, one attendant and one faculty manager shall be admitted free to the conattendant. The members of the Board of Control, the Legislative Body tests. The members of the Board of Furnished with badges and reserved seats.

SECTION VI.

The High School Board of Control shall choose and assign the officials other than those mentioned in Section IV for the basketball tourneys and shall sanction the major officials for the track meet.

SECTION VII.

The admission fee shall be as follows:

- 1. Sectional Tourney—\$1.50 for season tickets and forty (40) cents for session tickets.
- 2. Final Tourney—\$1.00 for Day Tickets and fifty (50) cents for session tickets.
 - 3. Final Meet-Fifty (50) cents for all tickets.

SECTION VIII.

The Indianapolis Representative shall pay fifty dollars (\$50) each to the two or three major officials in the sectional tourney; seventy-five dollars (\$75.00) each to the four major officials in the final tourney; and reasonable amounts to the major officials in the final track meet.

SECTION IX.

The financial settlement with the I. H. S. A. A. Board of Control shall be made as follows:

- 1. Sectional Tourney—According to the plan given in Bulletin No. VII and this contract with the understanding that the Indianapolis Representative shall pay one-fifth of the total cost of the court, bleachers and equipment for the tourneys. The expense of the installation of the court only shall be considered in this section of this contract as far as the cost of the court is concerned since the Indianapolis Schools furnish the court.
- 2. Final Tourney—All legitimate expenses shall be paid from the gross receipts; one hundred dollars (\$100) above meals, lodging and transportation shall be given each competing school and the balance shall be divided on the basis of sixty per cent (60%) to the I. H. S. A. A. and forty per cent (40%) to the Indianapolis High Schools.

Any rental, other than as specified elsewhere in this contract, received for the use of the Exposition Building during the lease now held by the Indianapolis Schools, shall be placed in the gross amount for the tourneys and thus distributed as provided in this contract.

3. Final Meet—All legitimate expenses except transportation shall be paid and any balance or deficit shall be divided sixty

per cent (60%) to the I. H. S. A. A. and forty per cent (40%) to the Indianapolis High Schools.

SECTION X.

The Indianapolis Representative shall send complete reports of the results and itemized financial reports of all contests to the Permanent Secretary of the I. H. S. A. A. immediately after the contests are held. A complete and itemized report shall be made of the concessions and of the complimentary tickets issued.

SECTION XI.

Both parties to this contract shall strive to cooperate in every way to have satisfactory contests held with reasonable expenses.





TRACK AND FIELD

The Kokomo High School won with thirty points the State Final Track and Field Meet held at Technical High School, Indianapolis on Saturday, May 21 and, therefore, won the I. H. S. A. A. State Championship in Track and Field for 1927. This school has won the State Championship for four consecutive years.

Joe Scully of Noblesville was the individual point winner with 20 points to his credit. He won first in the 100 yard dash, first in the 120 yard hurdle, third in the broad jump, third in the 220 yard hurdle and tied for first with two other boys in the high jump. He tied the I. H. S. A. A. record in the 100 yard dash and ran the 120 yard hurdles in 16 seconds, but the record was not allowed because he knocked down one hurdle.

Emery Parks of Linton lowered the I. H. S. A. A. record in the 220 yard hurdle to 25.6 seconds.

The Brazil team made up of Cassidy, Porter, Levitt and Fuequa, lowered the I. H. S. A. A. record in the mile relay race to 3.29-6/10 minutes.

The Technical Team of Indianapolis, made up of Peel, Jones, Kutchback and Woelfing, lowered the I. H. S. A. A. record in the half mile relay race to 1.33-6/10 minutes.

There were 15 sectional meets held on Saturday, May 14. The winning relay teams and all men winning first and second places in each event in the sectional meets constituted the entrants for the final meet. One hundred forty (140) teams, having a total of fifteen hundred fortyone (1541) boys, entered the sectional meets and close competition was found in all of these meets. Seven (7) schools sent thir entry blanks too late and they were rejected by the Board of Control.

Ninety (90) schools, having three hundred fifty-three (353) boys were eligible for the State Final Meet and the competition here was exceedingly close. Forty (40) schools, having seventy-three (73) boys, won points in the Final Meet. These data show that winners were widely distributed over the state. An increasing number of small schools has been entering the track and field meets and it is hoped that this indication of interest will continue.

A large number of dual meets, invitational meets, county meets and relay races were held over the state. Probably more meets were held this year than in any former year and it is safe to say that the quality of the competition has been raised.

Efficient management, competent officiating, announcing of a high type and a sympathetic attitude toward track and field work by Coaches and Principals made all meets not only more valuable than formerly, but also more popular. Relay races were very popular not only with the students but with the spectators and it may be that more of such events should be scheduled. Several requests have been made, asking that the sectional meets and the final meet be scheduled one week later in order that boys may be better trained. It has been thought that weather conditions would be better also.

The above, together with a mile relay and a half-mile relay, will constitute the events of the meets. Winning first place in any event in the final meet counts five points; second place four points; third place three points; fourth place two points; and fifth place one point. Winning first place in any event in a sectional meet counts five points; second place three points, and third place one point. Points in the relays will not be counted in determining the winning team. In case of a tie in any event the points shall be divided and the places awarded by lot. No contestant will be permitted to run in both relay races.

The order of events is as follows:

TRACK EVENTS—100 yard dash trial; 120 yard hurdle trial; 100 yard dash final; one mile run; 440 yard run; 120 yard hurdle final; 220 yard dash trial; 220 yard hurdle trial; 880 yard run; 220 yard dash final; 220 yard hurdle final; mile relay; half-mile relay.

FIELD EVENTS—Running high jump; shot put; pole vault; running broad jump.

SECTIONAL TRACK AND FIELD MEETS, MAY 14

The following bases were used in selecting centers:

(1) Location—geographical with reference to schools desiring to participate, (2) Transportation accommodations, (3) General conditions—attitude of local authorities, tracks, fields, entertaining facilities, etc.

Schools have been assigned by counties, and the accompanying scheme gives the Centers and the counties assigned to each Center. The name of your county locates your Center. The Board reserves the right to readjust the scheme, if necessary. The numbers indicate the schools from each county that have expressed a desire to enter. Entry blanks are necessary, however.

Management—The management of these meets rests solely with the Board of Control. Local arrangements have been delegated to the Center Principals. All officials will be selected by the Center Principal.

The Center Principal shall arrange a program for his meet from the list of entries sent to him by the Permanent Secretary. All meets shall begin at 1:00 o'clock and follow the order of events here given. Places on the track must be assigned by lot. Spalding's National Collegiate Athletic Association Track and Field Rules shall govern except as modified in this announcement regarding scoring, eligibility, events and order of events.

Open Contest—These meets are open to all members of the Association irrespective of their season's record.

Protests—All protests against teams or individuals must be made in writing and filed with the Permanent Secretary on or before May 5 at 11 a. m. Protests must be accompanied by evidence.

Entertainment—Two men for each event, four men for each relay team and a faculty manager from each competing school will be entertained by the Center Principal. Entertainment will begin if necessary at 9 a. m., Saturday, May 14 and continue if necessary to 8 p. m. Saturday, May 14. All competing schools are requested and expected to ask for no longer entertainment than is necessary. Only actual contestants and their faculty manager from each school will be entertained. Since track and field meets usually produce little revenue, all schools are requested to be exceedingly careful in their expenditures.

Expenses—An entrance fee of One Dollar (\$1.00) for each team must accompany the entry blank to be retained by the I. H. S. A. A. Traveling expenses must be paid by the competing schools.

Privileges—All contestants, one rubber and one faculty manager for each team are to be admitted free to the meet.

Eligibility—The eligibility of each player must be certified to by the Principal of the school sending the team. The regular blank of the I. H. S. A. A. must be used and all data must be given. Entries positively will close Thursday, May 5. This means that they must be in the hands of the Permanent Secretary, complete in every detail, on that date.

Admission Fee—The admission fee to all meets shall be not more than fifty (50) cents.

Prizes—Suitable ribbons shall be given to the winners of first, second and third places in each event, and to each member of the winning relay teams.

Warnings—Entries close Thursday, May 5, and can not be changed afterwards. An entry fee of One Dollar (\$1.00) for each team must accompany the entry blank. Special privileges will be granted to no one. Send all entry blanks and money to the Permanent Secretary.

Entrants—The winning relay teams and all men winning first and second places in each event in the Sectional Meets shall constitute the participants in the Final Meet, with the following exceptions: In case of a tie in first place all of the contestants so placed may enter the Final Meet. In case of a tie in second place the right to enter the Final Meet goes to the winner of the badge who is determined by lot. One entry fee and one entry blank covers both the Sectional and Final Meets.

Entertainment—The Indianapolis High Schools have contracted with the Board to entertain all actual contestants according to the plan just given above. Entertainment will begin if necessary at 8 p. m. Friday, May 20 and continue if necessary to 8 p. m. Saturday, May 21. All competing schools are requested and expected to ask for no longer entertainment than is necessary. Traveling will be at the expense of the competing schools. Since track and field meets usually produce little revenue all schools are requested to be exceedingly careful in their expenditures. Trial Events—Trials will be held beginning at 9:00 o'clock Saturday morning in the following events: 100 yard dash, 220 yard dash, 120 yard hurdle, 220 yard hurdle, pole vault, shot put, broad jump and high jump.

Races—The following events will be run in two races in the afternoon: 440 yard run, 880 yard run and one mile run. Points and medals will be given for first, second, third, fourth and fifth place winners in each of the two races for each event. The afternoon events will begin at 1:30 o'clock.

Privileges—All contestants, one rubber and one faculty manager for each team are to be admitted free to the Meet.

Admission Fee—The admission fee to the meet shall be fifty cents (50c).

Prizes—The Indianapolis High Schools will award the winning school a shield or cup; the winning relay teams, placques; and medals of gold, silver and bronze to the winners of first, second, third, fourth and fifth places in each event.






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FOOTBALL

Ninety-four (94) squads enrolling 3,171 boys played football this season. This number of teams indicates an increase of 50% within the last five years. The number of players has increased a larger percent in this length of time. There is no State Championship in football as there seems to be no satisfactory way of determining such. In all probability more and better football was played among the High Schools of the state this season than for a number of years. The game is growing in popularity each year and most of the schools that are large enough to support the sport financially and with sufficient enrollments are now playing the game.

An increased number of players and teams, better trained players, increased and improved facilities for playing and a growing popularity for the game characterized football playing this year. Several schools are planning football for next year.

BASEBALL

Baseball is becoming a fall sport as much as a spring sport in many of the High Schools of the state. There were a number of leagues over the state that played regular schedules and many schools had baseball as one of their approved games. Probably this game lends itself to intra-mural work as well as any game we now enjoy. Indoor baseball was played by both boys and girls on the playfields more than in the gymnasiums.

Due to the short fall season and the shorter spring season much of the baseball playing of High School boys must be done in the summer when school is not in session. The I. H. S. A. A. believes in baseball for High School boys and has made the following provisions for summer baseball playing:

- 1. High School students may play on independent baseball teams during the summer months when school is not in session without jeopardizing their standing in the state association provided they do not play under assumed names and also provided they do not accept remuneration, directly or indirectly, for their playing.
- 2. Reasonable meals, lodging and transportation may be accepted by such players if such are accepted in service rather than in money or in some other material form.
- 3. The I. H. S. A. A. expects all High School students to conduct themselves at all times in ways that will honor their High School, the state association and themselves.

We believe that all playfields should provide for baseball playing of both the outdoor and indoor types. Schools that do not play football and do not participate in track and field work may profitably introduce and foster baseball playing for both boys and girls.

BRIEF HISTORY OF I. H. S. A. A.

The first attempt to organize the High Schools of Indiana in a single organization for the purpose of handling athletic activities was made in a meeting of the Northern Indiana Teachers' Association held at Richmond, in April, 1903. At this time there was a conference of High School Principals, and the conference ended with a body of suggested rules and regulations, called the Richmond Agreement. Due to the fact that there was no central organization having executive power, the Richmond Agreement did little more than point the way toward something better.

Principal J. B. Pearcy, of Anderson, issued a call for a meeting of High School Principals interested in a State Athletic organization for December 5, 1903. At this meeting a provisional constitution was adopted. At a similar meeting on December 29, 1903, a final constitution was adopted and a Board of Control of three members was chosen to administer the affairs of the I. H. S. A. A.

The first Board of Control was made up of Principal George W. Benton, Shortridge High School, Indianapolis; Superintendent Lotus D. Coffman, Salem, and Principal J. T. Giles, Marion. These men thought and planned well, and we are enjoying the fruits of their vision.

There were fifteen (15) High Schools belonging to the I. H. S. A. A., March 1, 1904, and now there are seven hundred and ninety-seven (797) High Schools belonging. The membership has had a gradual growth through the years, and now the limit is recognized as the limit in the number of High Schools in the State.

A study of the men who have served on the Board of Control through the years will show clearly that the activities of the I. H. S. A. A. have been in good hands. The titles and addresses are given as they were when the men were board of control members. A complete list of the several Board members of the I. H. S. A. A. follows:

In the beginning, one member of the Board of Control served as Secretary, but it soon became very evident that this office furnished enough work for a special man. It was also seen that the future of the organization demanded that the office of Secretary be made more permanent than the office of Board Member. Accordingly, at the annual meeting in 1906 the office of Permanent Secretary was established, and Principal J. T. Giles was chosen by the Principals to be the first Permanent Secretary. Principal Giles resigned on December 26, 1912, and Principal Isaac E. Neff was chosen by the Principals to succeed him. Principal Neff resigned March 15, 1913, and the Board of Control appointed Principal Arthur L. Trester to serve as Permanent Secretary until the next annual meeting in December, 1913. At this meeting, Principal Trester was chosen by the Principals as Permanent Secretary.

The Board of Control consisted of three members, chosen by the Principals in their annual meetings, until the annual meeting of October 27, 1916. At this meeting it was decided to divide the State into five districts for administrative and representative purposes, and that each district should have one representative on the Board of Control, chosen by mail ballot from his own district by the Principals of his district.

In September, 1925, by a referendum vote the Principals passed a legislative body proposal calling for four members from each of the five (5) I. H. S. A. A. districts. The five members of the Board of Control and the fifteen other members elected by the Principals in a mail vote constitute this legislative body. Prior to this scheme all legislation was done at the annual meeting or by referendum voting by mail. This Legislative Body of twenty members passes on all proposals submitted by the High School Principals. It is the law making body of the Association. The scheme is considered a step in advance in state administration and legislation in athletic activities.

The primary purpose of the organizers of the I. H. S. A. A. to manage and to foster High School athletics on a high plane has been held up as an ideal by the Association through the twenty years of the life of the I. H. S. A. A. New and advanced steps have been taken whenever conditions made them necessary. It became increasingly evident as time went on that the I. H. S. A. A. should assume a larger and larger initiative in real physical education for all boys and all girls, and that physical education should be interpreted in the light of other educational aims and ideals. Accordingly, the I. H. S. A. A. now has a program, not only for the managing and fostering of High School athletics, but for the stimulation of communities and schools to the end that real physical education be given all boys and all girls throughout the grades and the High School.

HIGH SCHOOL GYMNASIUMS AND COMMUNITY BUILDINGS

The year has seen the completion of a large number of gymnasiums for High School and community purposes. Among those built are the following: Attica, Bloomfield, Cannelton, Centerville, Dale, Evansville (Central), Fort Wayne (North Side), Frankton, Garrett, Gary, Loogootee, Marion, Mitchell, Monon, New Albany, North Judson, Paoli, Remington, Sullivan, Upland, Winamac, Windfall and Valparaiso.

The Marion Field House will seat 6,200 at games. Evansville, Gary and New Albany gymnasiums will seat about 5,000 each at games. All other buildings have large seating capacities although not so large as those just mentioned. The playing floors for basketball are 50' by 74'. Elsewhere in this handbook you will find views, inside and outside, of some of these buildings and below is given some informational data about a few of them.

SULLIVAN

"Pursuant to an act of the general assembly of the State of Indiana approved March 10, 1927, the Sullivan School Realty Company, a corporation, was organized locally. This company proposed to the School Board that they would build a community gymnasium to be used by the school city provided the school city would enter into a lease for the building covering a period of twenty-five years. This lease was made and signed,—Sullivan School Realty Company, lessor and Sullivan School City, lessee. This arrangement, provided for in the 1927 act, made possible the sale of bonds to the extent of \$75,000 for the erection of the building. The School City has the option of purchasing the building or to renew the lease. The School City agrees to keep the building and improvements insured and pay for all maintenance and janitorial service, etc., as allowed in the statute.

We expect this rental to more than pay for the interest, taxes and upkeep and in addition to this we plan to retire a certain number of the bonds each year through the receipts of games, tournaments, auto shows, entertainments, etc. In addition, we plan to make an annual membership drive to the High School Athletic Association, similar to the plan used by Vincennes. This plan netted us \$1,500 last spring and was the initial impetus for agitation for the new gymnasium.

The new building is of fine quality face brick trimmed in stone, inside walls of salt glazed brick. There are 2,750 permanent seats in addition to some room for chairs. The playing floor is standard size as recommended by the I. H. S. A. A. Dressing rooms are ample and are all equipped with showers and toilet facilities. The playing floor will have two suspended glass backboards. There will be ample out-of-bounds space on all sides."

VALPARAISO

"The Valparaiso gymnasium is a beautiful building of brick and steel construction trimmed with stone. It is 140 feet by 120 feet and stands fifty feet to the rear of the high school building with which it is connected by two covered walks. It has a seating capacity of 2,640 for games and 5,000 when used as an auditorium. For the latter use it is well adapted, as a large stage is built in the west end of the building, and all basketball backs are so constructed as to swing up out of sight. For practice purposes and physical education the main floor is divided into two sections by dropping a heavy canvas curtain. This provides two courts each 77 by 48. The court for interscholastic games is 76 by 55 with three feet out of bounds between court and seating space. During the day natural light floods the room, with no spots of sunshine and no shadows. The artificial lighting is so arranged as to give equally as good results at night. There are no obstructions to shut out the view of spectators. The arched roof is so high that there is no chance of the ball coming in contact with a girder. There are ample basket and permanent locker rooms and showers for both boys and girls, Under the permanent seats on the south side of the building are almost ideal shops for the manual work of the school,

The location of the gymnasium assures its use for physical education and games during the entire day and evening, and for auditorium purposes as the occasion demands.

The building, exclusive of equipment, cost \$100,000 and was financed by a holding company."

REMINGTON

"Remington High School completed a gymnasium-auditorium with a seating capacity of 1,500 for games and of 2,000 for auditorium purposes. The playing floor is 40' by 72' and the ceiling is 24' high. The building is used daily for physical education work including athletic games for the boys and girls in the grades and High School and much use is made of it as a community hall. Equipment will be furnished out of door receipts at athletic contests but the building was constructed as an addition to the new High School building and financed by a township bond issue."

FRANKTON

"The Frankton Gymnasium is 103' by 80' with a stage on one end 25 ft. deep. The basketball playing floor is 68' by 48'. The seating capacity is about 1,130. It is built of brick, cost about \$21,000 and was constructed by the township (Pipe Creek).

In addition to basketball, the gymnasium is used by all pupils from the primary to the seniors in High School for physical education, the grades having five periods per week and the senior High School two. Music classes are conducted in the gym and it is open to the grades for games and special drill work. All school functions are held in the gymnasium as an auditorium and, when used for such occasions, folding chairs are used on the main floor. We were short of finance to install a heating system, but through the assistance of the citizens we put one in and are paying these citizens back out of the net proceeds of school functions we hold in the new building."

MONON

The Monon High School Gymnasium was completed late last spring at a cost of \$80,000. The building has outside dimensions of 89 x 132 feet and the playing court is 42 x 67 feet. The seating capacity for games is 1,000 and 1,600 for auditorium purposes. On one side of the gymnasium is a stage 21 x 36 feet. In addition to the gymnasium the building provides space for manual training, domestic science, the lunchroom and 14 study rooms.


NEW ALBANY HIGH SCHOOL GYMNASIUM

Built by the New Albany High School Gymnasium Corporation working in cooperation with the School Board.

"Probably the inscription which will be placed on the two plaques on the outside of the Gymnasium will describe as completely as possible how this Gymnasium was built. 'To the Chamber of Commerce and the two hundred seventy-six loyal citizens who made this Gymnasium possible.'

The Gymnasium has now been leased to the School City of New Albany for a period of fifteen years at an annual rental of \$4,000.00. This money will pay the five per cent interest on the \$75,000.00 of preferred stock, leaving the receipts from basketball games and other athletic events to retire the preferred stock issued, as quickly as possible.

The interior measurements are 90 ft. x 140 ft. The height of ceiling is 32 ft., the playing floor measures 50 ft x 74 ft. The seating capacity is 4,500. All spectators will be seated on sides of court on the main floor and in the balconies."



LEGISLATIVE BODY COMMITTEE REPORT ON AN ACTIVITIES BOOKKEEPING SYSTEM

A proposal was submitted to the I. H. S. A. A. Legislative Body last October providing for a committee of three to devise a uniform system of financial accounting applicable to athletics and to other extra-curricular activities. The proposal passed and President Baird appointed Superintendent George Reitzel, Danville, Chairman of the committee. Principal Harlie Garver, Union City and the Permanent Secretary were appointed also. The committee held several meetings and an initial report was made in Bulletin No. VI dated January 4, 1927.

A number of Principals indicated by letter or by the return card sent to all Principals that they desired to use the scheme as outlined. A much larger number of Principals stated that they had already in operation a scheme that was very satisfactory and adequate to their needs. The committee studied the reactions and requests of the Principals carefully and decided that the initial orders for the scheme were not enough to justify the printing and distribution by the I. H. S. A. A. The committee felt, however, that the details of the scheme should be printed in full for the use and guidance of any Principals desiring to introduce the scheme in their schools. The detailed statements made here, therefore, constitute the final report of the committee to the Principals of the state.

1. THE SCHEME IN OUTLINE.

Each school should have a permanent loose-leaf, leather binder, letter size, of excellent quality and easily operated. This binder will serve as the holder of the several forms necessary to keep the accounts of the many High School activities such as athletics, class plays, band, orchestra, paper, annual, etc.

II. THE MATERIAL.

1. Activity Account Sheets.

These sheets should be made out of an excellent quality of paper, letter size and punched to fit your binder. The committee recommends a controlling account and an activity account. The controlling account will carry in brief the several activity accounts and will be the account that checks with your activities bank account. The activity account will show completely and definitely regarding each activity in your High School.

Columnar headings will be necessary for the controlling account and each activity account. The following will cover your requirements in a fine way if printed with proper spacing from left to right in the order given below:

...Account Year...

1. Date; 2. Code; 3. Items; 4. Page; 5. Receipts; 6. Total Receipts; 7. Check Number; 8. Disbursements; 9. Total Disbursements; 10. Balance.

The code column is arranged so that you can easily classify the different sports as (a) Football, (b) Basketball, (c) Track, and so that you can easily classify the items in each sport as (1) Officials, (2) Equipment, (3) Guarantee to Teams. A code number of a would then mean a guarantee to a visiting football team. This code arrangement can be easily adjusted and expanded to suit your needs in all High School activities.

The page column provides for cross reference from controlling account to activity account and vice versa.

Receipts and total receipts, disbursements and total disbursements are provided for so that the total for a day may be known at a glance. The balance comes easily when the other items are cared for daily.

2. Requisition and Pay Order Blank.

The committee feels that a combination blank rather than two separate blanks is to be preferred here. These blanks should be printed in duplicate for carbon copy purposes. Schools should always have the original copy of their orders. A requisition order, when filled and checked by the proper sponsor, constitutes a pay order blank as well. These blanks should be printed and punched to fit binder. Two or three blanks can be printed on each page. The following form is recommended:

3. Treasurer's Receipt.

Receipts should be given for all money, tickets, supplies, etc. A duplicate should be kept on file for reference and posting. These receipts should be printed in duplicate for carbon copy purposes. Three or four can be printed on each page and the sheets should be printed and punched to fit the binder. The following form is suggested:

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

III. GENERAL STATEMENTS.

Charle

- 1. An accounting scheme for High School activities is absolutely necessary in order to keep the finance books, in order to supervise the activities and in order to make financial reports quickly and accurately.
- 2. The scheme here outlined is simple, yet adequate for schools of all sizes and activities of all kinds. There is nothing intricate about it and the forms should be kept in one binder.
- 3. The loose-leaf binder makes it easy to use a transfer binder each year or at longer intervals. The letter-size forms can easily be filed when taken out of the binder.
- 4. The scheme provides for one secretary-treasurer for all school activities. There will be one bank book and one High School Activity Fund account in the bank in the name of the Secretary-Treasurer of the High School Activities Fund. This secretary-treasurer will be under bond and will be a teacher. The bond should be provided out of the High School activities Fund.
- 5. One activity account or many activity accounts may be placed in the binder. The one controlling account will take care of all of the activity accounts. You will always know the status of each activity account and of your controlling account.
- 6. Financial reports of extra-curricular activities should be made completely and often. If possible make reports before they are called for. You invite adverse criticism otherwise.

MINUTES OF MEETINGS OF BOARD OF CONTROL

BOARD OF CONTROL MEETING

Lafayette, Ind., Nov. 22, 1926.

The Board of Control held a meeting in the Fowler Hotel, Lafayette at ten o'clock Saturday morning, November 20, 1926. With the exception of Principal Fortner all members and the Permanent Secretary were present.

Thorntown-Crawfordsville—These two schools participated in a partly played game of football at Thorntown on November 5. Profuse swearing was done on the field of play and in the dressing rooms by the Crawfordsville players. The officials ejected two or three of these boys from the game, after warning had been given. Coach Max Kidd of Crawfordsville took his team from the field of play a few minutes before time was up in the fourth quarter. It was stated that the officials made some mistakes in their decisions and that the Thorntown management was somewhat lax in that some spectators rushed onto the field during the arguments.

Decision—Crawfordsville High School placed on probation in the I. H. S. A. A. until November 20, 1927 with instructions to the school authorities of Crawfordsville to declare ineligible for all athletics all boys guilty of the swearing until the end of the football season in 1927, and to take such other steps as may seem necessary to reach the source of the trouble.

Cutler—Robert Primmer withdrew from the Frankfort High School on October 8. During the next week he moved with his parents to Cutler but did not enter the Cutler High School. On October 18 he reentered the Frankfort High School, making his home in Frankfort. He withdrew again from the Frankfort High School on October 29 and entered Cutler High School on November 2.

Decision—Robert Primmer ineligible in the Cutler High School until the end of semester one due to his irregularity in enrollments and withdrawals.

Amboy—J. D. Bradley, a student of the Amboy High School last year, enrolled there this semester, his parents having moved to Somerset during the summer. Coach Ivan Ray of the Amboy High School furnished his car to J. D. Bradley to drive to and from school at Amboy, both the coach and the boy purchasing gasoline for the car. The boy is now enrolled in the Somerset High School.

Decision—Amboy High School placed on probation until June 1, 1927. J. D. Bradley declared ineligible until he has been enrolled in the Somerset High School for one entire semester. This latter condition can not be met until the end of semester two of this school year.

Elnora—Principal Yeoman used Luther Swartz, a non-approved official, to officiate in some second team basketball games, thinking that approved officials were only required for first team games.

Decision—Elnora High School placed on probation until June 1, 1927. Approved officials are required for all inter-school games. The ranking of the teams has no bearing in the case.

Leesburg—Harold Mendell and Charles Miller, who attended the Guilford High School last year, were declared ineligible for semester one by the Board at their last meeting with the understanding that their eligibility for semester two would be decided later. Additional evidence shows that there is a three year High School and a four year High School near the homes of these boys. Absence of transfers and the presence of other irregularities were discovered.

Decision—Harold Mendell and Charles Miller declared ineligible for all of the present school year in Leesburg.

Ossian—Principal Wolf used Curtis Bunn in a baseball game with Pierceton last spring when he had not made a careful and complete search to know his age.

Decision—Ossian High School placed on probation in the I. H. S. A. A. until June 1, 1927 and the game forfeited to Pierceton.

Spencer-Hartford City—The case of Joseph Ellis was reviewed at the request of Superintendent Bourne of Spencer.

Decision-Former decision affirmed.

The Board adjourned to meet at 10:00 o'clock Saturday morning, December 18 in the Claypool Hotel, Indianapolis.

BOARD OF CONTROL MEETING

The Board of Control met at ten o'clock Saturday morning. All members, the Permanent Secretary and the two newly elected members were preent.

Saint Paul—Principal E. B. Jones used Gale Gordon in a game of basketball when he was ineligible due to a change of schools without change of residence of his parents to the new school district.

Decision—Saint Paul High School placed on probation in the I. H. S. A. A. until June 1, 1927 and Gale Gordon declared ineligible for any athletics during this entire school year.

Bainbridge—Coach Frank Pruitt and Principal Elmer Norris used Wayne O'Hair in basketball on the Junior High School team and on the Senior High School team during the present season.

Decision—Bainbridge High School placed on probation in the I. H. S. A. A. until June 1, 1927 and the Junior High School game in which Wayne O'Hair participated forfeited to the opposing school. The boy declared ineligible for all basketball during the present season.

Jasonville—The case concerned the date of birth of Arthur Edwin Woodruff. All known and available evidence was submitted.

Decision—The evidence was conflicting but the weight of the evidence favored the date of birth as October 10, 1906 so this date is considered official as far as the I. H. S. A. A. is concerned.

Otter Creek-Prairie Creek—Case continued with the understanding that Principal H. E. Moore and Coach D. W. Weir be requested to appear at the next meeting of the Board of Control.

Withdrawal of Team From Athletic Contest—The following declaration was made to become effective at once:

"The Board of Control deplores the action of anyone withdrawing a team from an athletic contest and announces that such action in the future will jeopardize the standing of the school taking it in the I. H. S. A. A.

Tourneys Prior to February 1.—Article 8, Section 11 in the constitution covers this question. The policy has been to make this rule applicable to tourneys within the state only. The Board has ruled that the policy after the present basketball season will be to make it apply to tourneys in other states also.

A. A. U. Track and Field Meet—It was decided that High School students should not enter this meet.

Basketball Tourneys—The whole scheme for the sectional, regional and final tourneys was discussed. Tourney invitations and desirable assignments of schools were studied carefully but final decisions were postponed. Officials and officiating were considered.

Girls' Basketball—The Board went on record as being opposed to Inter-State Tourneys and sectional, regional and state basketball tourneys for girls.

Gimbel Prize-It was decided to sanction this prize again this year.

The Permanent Secretary was granted permission to attend the meeting of the National Federation of State High School Athletic Associations in February.

The meeting adjourney to meet in the Claypool Hotel, Indianapolis at ten o'clock Saturday morning, December 29.

Decision—"The Board of Control of the I. H. S. A. A. deplores the action of anyone withdrawing a team from an athletic contest and announces that such action in the future will jeopardize the standing of the school taking such action in the I. H. S. A. A." Principals should manage and act, coaches should coach and act and officials should officiate and act at all times in ways to make the withdrawal of teams unnecessary at all times. All of these parties are responsible.

Otter Creek-Prairie Creek—Coach D. W. Weir of Otter Creek made a number of statements in a letter to the Permanent Secretary regarding a game at Prairie Creek. Some of the statements could not be substantiated and Principal H. E. Moore of Otter Creek did not sanction the letter at the time it was written and does not sanction it at the present time.

Decision—Coach D. W. Weir reprimanded for writing the letter without the knowledge and sanction of his Principal and further for making statements that could not be substantiated. The Board of Control affirms that the High School Principal is the responsible party in all athletic activities and that authority commensurate with this responsibility is assumed.


Advance-Noblesville-Case continued until next meeting.

Carmel-Mt. Comfort—Case continued until next meeting.

Markleville-McCordsville—This case concerned the withdrawal of the Markleville team from the basketball floor by Coach Ewing, due to dissatisfaction with the work of Referee Byron Deakyne of Fortville. Neither High School Principal was present at the game.

Decision—"The Board of Control of the I. H. S. A. A. deplores the action of anyone withdrawing a team from an athletic contest and announces that such action in the future will jeopardize the standing of the school taking such action in the I. H. S. A. A." Principals should manage and act, coaches should coach and act and officials should officiate and act at all times in ways to make the withdrawal of teams unnecessary at all times. All of these parties are responsible.

Austin—Principal Cox and Trustee James used Ernest Polk and Henry Kinney in a game of basketball on December 24. Both boys had



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been declared ineligible for semester one of this school year. The Austin school had 32 weeks of school work and only 13 weeks of school work had elapsed. The evidence pointed toward outside influence.

Decision—A semester is one-half of a school year in the I. H. S. A. A. The time that examinations are given has no bearing at all.

Ernest Polk and Henry Kinney declared ineligible for any athletics for one entire semester of attendance following semester one of this school year. The Austin High School placed on probation in the I. H. S. A. A. until January 1, 1928. The Board affirms that the High School Principal is the responsible party in all High School athletics and that authority commensurate with this responsibility is assumed.

Quincy-Case continued until next meeting.

Foann—Principal H. L. Carmack used Robert Lynn, Fred Petty and Edith Lynn on his High School teams when they were ineligible due to school residence. These students attended the Wabash High School last year and changed High Schools this year without a change of residence of their parents.

Decision—Roann High School placed on probation until January 1, 1928. Robert Lynn, Fred Petty and Edith Lynn declared ineligible for all athletics for one entire semester of attendance following semester one of this school year. Principal H. L. Carmack required to forfeit all games by letter in which these students played requesting the Principals to write to the Permanent Secretary that they had received the letters of forfeiture.

The whole tourney scheme for 1927 was discussed and the Permanent Secretary was instructed to proceed along the following lines:

- 1. Reservation of seats at the final tourney with prices at \$1.25 for day tickets and \$0.75 for single session tickets to be sold after 5:00 P. M. each day.
- 2. Sixty-four sectional tourneys, sixteen regional tourneys and a final tourney in the scheme.
- 3. Regional tourney contract to remain same as last year except center school should be given \$300.00 instead of \$500.00.
- 4. Centers for sectional and regional tourneys selected subject to slight changes in the geography of the tourney regions if necessary or advisable.
- 5. The Permanent Secretary was given authority to make necessary changes in the scheme if not radical to its elements.

The Board adjourned to meet in the Claypool Hotel, Indianapolis at 9:00 o'clock Saturday morning, January 15, 1927.

BOARD OF CONTROL MEETING

Claypool Hotel, Indianapolis, Indiana, 9:00 A. M., Jan. 15, 1927. All Board Members, except Supt. Harry Nixon, and the Permanent Secretary were present.

Advance-Noblesville—The case concerned the alleged lack of hospitality by Advance, the unsportsmanlike conduct of some fans, the theft of some clothing from the Noblesville players and the striking of Benny Whitely, a spectator of Advance, by Coach Hough of Noblesville at a game in Advance.

Decision—Principal Stoner of the Advance High School instructed to pay \$10.00 on or before January 21, 1927 to Principal Griffey of Noblesville for clothing stolen. Principal Stoner warned to manage all games in the future in an efficient and sportsmanlike manner.

Noblesville High School placed on probation in the I. H. S. A. A. until January 1, 1928 due to the conduct of Coach Hough in striking Benny Whitely.

Cicero-Noblesville—The case had to do with the alleged unsportsmanlike conduct of some fans and the striking of Clark Cook, a spectator from Cicero, by Joseph Scully, a player on the Noblesville team at a game in Cicero.

Decision—Principal Hiatt of the Cicero High School warned to take immediate and permanent steps to secure sportsmanlike conduct from his fans at games in the future. Joseph Scully of Noblesville declared ineligible for the remainder of the basketball season of 1926-1927 due to his striking Clark Cook of Cicero.

Mt. Comfort-Carmel—Referee Goett forfeited a partly played game of basketball to Mt. Comfort believing that Coach Fosbrink of Carmel took his team from the floor. Coach Fosbrink stated that he did not intend to take his team from the floor but that he was trying to calm his players after one of them had been removed from the game.

Decision—Referee Goett sustained and the partly played contest forfeited to Mt. Comfort. Principal Weaver of Carmel instructed to pay Principal Good of Mt. Comfort \$10.00 on or before January 21, 1927 for failure to play the game according to contract.

Principal Good of Mt. Comfort commended for making satisfactory settlement with spectators regarding the partly played contest.

Quincy—Principal Dittemore used Howard Bryant in a number of basketball games this season when he was ineligible due to enrollment in High School.

Decision—Principal Dittemore instructed to forfeit at once all games in which this boy played this season, requesting the opposing Principals to notify the Permanent Secretary when such had been done.

Quincy High School placed on probation in the I. H. S. A. A. until January 1, 1928.

Austin—Superintendent Floyd E. James of Scottsburg appeared before the Board regarding the Austin decision made at last meeting.

Decision-Former decision affirmed.

Seymour—Principal Stewart used Charles Henry in a number of games this season when he was ineligible due to change of schools.

Decision—Charles Henry declared ineligible for semester one of the school year 1926-1927. Principal Stewart instructed to forfeit at once all games in which this boy played this school year, requesting the opposing Principals to notify the Permanent Secretary when such had been done.

Richmond—The officiating of L. G. Brown in a game between Greensfork and Richmond in a second team game was reported as unsatisfactory by both High School Principals.

Decision—L. G. Brown placed on probation as an approved official in the I. H. S. A. A. until January 1, 1928 with instructions to improve his officiating or return his approval card.

The Board of Control went on record against any changing of tourney contracts by agreements between Center Principals and participating schools.

Ticket prices for the final tourney were discussed and it was decided to leave these prices as they were last year,—\$1.00 for day tickets and 50c for session tickets.

The Permanent Secretary reported that the Indianapolis High Schools were opposed to the reservation of seats at the final tourney.

The Board considered it wise to give an explanation of the health study to be made at the State Tourney in an early I. H. S. A. A. Bulletin.

Officials for the tourneys were discussed but no definite selections were made.

The schedules for the eight regional tourneys and the final tourney were drawn by lot by the Board of Control.

The Board adjourned to meet at 9:00 o'clock Saturday, February 5 in the Claypool Hotel, Indianapolis.

Clinton Center (Greencastle)—Principal Lawrence Wright played Ralph Lawter in basketball this school year when the boy was carrying only two subjects in High School.

Decision—Ralph Lawter declared ineligible for both semesters of the present school year due to failure to take and pass in three regular High School subjects during semester one of the present school year.

The Clinton Center High School placed on probation in the I. H. S. A. A. until January 1, 1928 and Principal Wright instructed to forfeit all games in which Ralph Lawter has played this school year, requesting the Principals of the opposing schools to notify the Permanent Secretary when they hear from him.

Laurel—Principal Carl Brown played Richard Kelly in Basketball this school year when he was a five-year man due to enrollment. Principal Brown admitted that he and his Coach had been cautioned and advised by a responsible school authority about this ineligibility prior to the playing of the boy.

Decision—Laurel High School suspended from the I. H. S. A. A. until January 1, 1928.

Winchester—Superintendent Baker and Principal Williams reported that they recently discovered that Gerald Lykins, who had played on their basketball team this school year, is a five-year man due to enrollment.

Decision—Gerald Lykins declared ineligible for all High School athletics and Principal Williams instructed to forfeit all games in which the boy played this school year, requesting the Principals of the opposing schools to notify the Permanent Secretary when such forfeiture has been made.

Principal Williams instructed to install an adequate system of keeping the records of students in his High School.

Dunkirk-Hartford City—Referee Everett F. Brown of Muncie, Umpire M. E. Rowland of Redkey and Principal J. E. Dickson of Dunkirk stated that the Hartford City players wrangled about the decisions of the officials during a recent game; and that Coach Gullion of Hartford City wrangled about the decisions and also used profane language during the game.

Decision—Referee Everett Brown placed on probation as an official in the I. H. S. A. A. until January 1, 1928 as evidence showed that his work in the game in question was not satisfactory.

Coach Gullion instructed to Coach his teams not to wrangle about the decisions of officials, and he was cautioned about his own conduct during games.

Columbus-Martinsville—Principal Robert Lambert of Columbus requested the Board of Control to make an investigation of the alleged altercation and bodily engagement between Gelfius, a player on the Columbus team, and Reynolds, a player on the Martinsville team, taking place immediately after the close of the game on Friday, January 21. Principal Lambert requested this investigation for the purpose of having clean athletics.

Principal French, Coach Curtis and Reynolds represented Martinsville and Principal Lambert, Coach Dobbins and Gelfius represented

Columbus at the hearing. Each side had been given permission to bring such witnesses and documents as they desired. All parties concerned and the witnesses were heard for one and one-half hours. All documents presented were filed with the Board. Both parties in the case stated that they received a fair hearing and that they had presented their sides of the case. Both parties stated that the game as played was all right with the exception of the alleged engagement immediately after the close of the game. The Principals and Coaches of both teams stated that they did not see the engagement.

Decision—The shortage of eye witnesses to the alleged engagement and the conflicting evidence submitted made it impossible for the Board of Control to warrant a conclusion of guilt, so the case was dropped with instructions to both Principals and to both Coaches to give their personal attention to their players immediately after games, and with the statement that the whole affair is deplored.

Bainbridge-Greencastle—Coach Pruitt and Principal Elmer Norris requested an investigation of the alleged recruiting of players by the Greencastle High School and the playing of Reeves, an alleged five-year man, by the Greencastle High School.

Reeves entered High School for the first time at the beginning of semester two in the school year 1922-1923 and did not play basketball that semester.

Decision—Reeves declared eligible for basketball for the present school year as he did not participate in basketball during his first semester in High School.

The evidence regarding the recruiting of players, submitted by Principal Norris and Coach Pruitt, was not convincing to the Board.

In the investigation statements were made by Greencastle regarding the recruiting of a player by the Bainbridge High School. Evidence was not convincing in this case.

While the evidence regarding recruiting in both cases was not convincing, enough statements were made to justify a warning to both schools regarding the matter.

Monroe City-Emison-Case postponed.

Purdue University (Lafayette)—Mr. M. L. Clevett, Department of Physical Education, Purdue University, was given permission to conduct a Gymnastic Meet for High School students at Purdue University this spring under the general direction of the I. H. S. A. A. and with the understanding that, should it be desirable to continue the meet, the sanction of the I. H. S. A. A. Board of Control would be required each year. This proposed meet will include competition in the following events: Horizontal Bar, Side Horse, Parallel Bars, Tumbling and Club Slinging.

It is understood that all students in this meet shall be eligible according to the rules of the I. H. S. A. A.

Indiana Boys' School (Plainfield)—The Board of Control considered the application of this school for membership in the I. H. S. A. A. and it was decided to present this application to the Legislative Body of the I. H. S. A. A. at their annual meeting in October, 1927.

State Final Tourney—The Board of Control went on record, as in former years, as being opposed to bands at the State Final Tournament,

Re-assignment of Schools to Centers—The assignment of schools to centers as printed in Bulletin VII was affirmed.

Stalling—Considerable discussion was given to the element of stalling in basketball games, but it was decided to refrain from making any public statement at this time about stalling.

Tourney Insurance—The Permanent Secretary presented the matter of liability insurance for all sectional, regional and final tourneys, and the Board instructed the Permanent Secretary to investigate this whole matter and to secure insurance if such looked advisable.

I. H. S. A. A. Field House—The Permanent Secretary was instructed to investigate the building of a field house to belong to the I. H. S. A. A. and to make a report to the Board of Control soon regarding his findings.

Officials—Officials for the sectional, regional and final tourneys were considered and the recommendations on file with the Permanent Secretary were submitted. The Permanent Secretary was authorized to secure the necessary officials for the tourneys, placing two officials in small sectional tourneys, three officials in large sectional tourneys, two officials in each regional tourney and four officials in the final tourney; the idea being to have two officials work each game.

National Federation—Principal C. F. Albaugh and the Permanent Secretary were given permission to attend the meeting of the National Federation of State High School Athletic Associations at St. Louis on Saturday, February 26.

The Board adjourned to meet at 9:00 o'clock Friday morning, February 25, in the Severin Hotel, Indianapolis.



Decision—Williamsport High School placed on probation in the I. H. S. A. A. until January 1, 1928.

Huntertown—The Permanent Secretary was authorized to require the presence of Principal W. J. Morrison at the next meeting of the Board of Control.

Borden—Case dropped, as all basketball games have been forfeited in which Fred Martin played.

North Bend—Case dropped, as all basketball games have been forfeited in which Milton LaShear played.

Manual Training (Indianapolis)—Case dropped, as all basketball games have been forfeited in which Raymond Brenneman played.

President Adams was selected to investigate further and report to the Board of Control on the cases of Oakland City and Linton.

The Board adjourned to meet at 10:00 o'clock Saturday, April 30, in the I. H. S. A. A. office at Anderson.

BOARD OF CONTROL MEETING

Anderson, Indiana, April 30, 1927.

The Board of Control met at ten o'clock, all members and the Permanent Secretary being present.

Huntington—A request was made by the Huntington Press and the Jefferson Theatre of Huntington that this paper be permitted to give a loving cup to the most popular High School athlete in Huntington County, the selection to be based on the votes of the public as indicated on ballots printed in the Press.

Decision—The Board of Control and the Legislative Body of the I. H. S. A. A. have repeatedly gone on record as being opposed to prizes and awards being given to High School athletes by any persons other than the regularly constituted school authorities; and even then it has been urged that prizes and awards be limited in number and also limited to such as have symbolic value only. Acceptance of the cup in question by a High School athlete, therefore, would make him ineligible for athletics in the I. H. S. A. A.

Adams Township (Carroll County)—Principal E. S. Christen was asked by letter several weeks ago and in person at a Board Meeting the following question,—"Have eighth grade students played on any Adams Township High School basketball team in any inter-school games during the school year 1926-1927." Principal Christen refused to answer this question at all times.

Decision—Adams Township High School, Carroll County, suspended from the I. H. S. A. A. until May 2, 1928.

Huntertown—Principal W. J. Morrison was requested by the Board of Control on March 28, 1927 to be present at a Board Meeting on April 30, 1927 to give evidence regarding some athletic matters in his High School. A letter written by Principal Morrison to one member of the Board of Control was interpreted to mean that he did not intend to atten the hearing by the Board of Control.

Decision—The Huntertown High School suspended from the I. H. S. A. A. until the Principal appears before the Board of Control.

Wingate-Westpoint—Two games of basketball were played by teams after the 1926-1927 basketball season had closed. Coach Harry Ray, three Senior boys and an outsider played on the Wingate team. Coach Kenneth Hauk and four Senior boys played on the Westpoint team. Principal Kohlmeyer of Westpoint was ticket taker at the game in Westpoint. A Westpoint teacher was connected as manager of the Westpoint team. Principal Joe Kirkham of Wingate was opposed to the playing of the games and did what he could to stop the games. The gate receipts were split 60-40, the Westpoint proceeds going to the Junior High School class fund and the Wingate proceeds going to the independent manager. The game at Westpoint was played in the High School building and the game at Wingate was played in the building used by the Wingate High School for games.

Decision—The Wingate High School and the Westpoint High School suspended from the I. H. S. A. A. until January 1, 1928. Principal Joe Kirkham commended for his attitude and actions in trying to observe the rules of the I. H. S. A. A.

Hope-Manilla—The Permanent Secretary was given authority to negotiate a settlement.

Plainfield—A decision was made regarding William Gaddie at the last Board meeting. Additional information since that time shows conclusively that William Gaddie is ineligible for any further High School basketball as he has been enrolled four times of twenty or more days each between December 1 and March 1.

Oakland City—Orace Powers, a former student in the Oakland City High School, played on an independent baseball team during the summer of 1926. He has also played on the Oakland City High School team during the school year 1926-1927.

Decision—The evidence shows that this boy participated in the division of the gate receipts at baseball games played last summer. The boy is declared ineligible for all High School athletics and the Oakland City High School is placed on probation in the I. H. S. A. A. until May 2, 1928.

Linton—Due to lack of convincing evidence this case has been dropped.

Kosciusko County—Principal Albaugh and the Permanent Secretary made a report on the meeting held in Warsaw on March 30, 1927. The Board decided to leave the Kosciusko County question open until basketball tourney time in 1927-1928.

President Adams, Principal Fortner and Principal Hull checked the holdings of the I. H. S. A. A. in the bank vault and found all to be all right.

The Board of Control considered carefully the field of possibilities for holding the State Basketball Tourney through the years and decided to take a lease on the Butler College, Indianapolis, Field House, Stadium, and athletic facilities for a period of years, the amount of rental not to exceed ten thousand dollars per year. The Permanent Secretary was authorized to negotiate a contract covering such a lease.

Note—A lease covering the use of the athletic facilities of Butler College, Indianapolis by the I. H. S. A. A. for ten years beginning in March, 1928 and running to March, 1937 inclusive and calling for \$10,000

rental each year, four years rental to be paid in advance, was signed by the following individuals on May 9, 1927:

Sectional-May 12.


Final-May 19.

A scheme of broadcasting by special microphone was presented by Mr. Paul M. Collins of Manual Training High School, Indianapolis. The Board saw no outstanding objections but indicated that they did not desire to bind themselves by any contract having a financial obligation or for a period longer than one year.

President Hilton U. Brown, Arthur Brown, Arthur Jordan and Mr. Reilly, representing Butler University, met the Board of Control and gave information about progress on the Butler Field House as follows:

- 1. Building operations are in progress.
- 2. The steel order has been placed.
- The minimum capacity of the Field House has been set at 15,000.
- 4. The contractor, the steel men and the Butler representatives state that, with ordinary weather conditions, the building will be completed by March 1, 1928.

Mr. Simon Roache, representing the Indianapolis High Schools, was present and discussion was given to the salvage of the seating material now in storage and to the auspices for the next State Basketball Tourney. It was decided to hold the seating material for the present and it was agreed that the State Basketball Tourney should be held under the auspices of the Indianapolis High Schools, pending suitable contract, next year if held in the Fair Grounds building, but under I. H. S. A. A. auspices if held at the Butler Field House.

By unanimous vote the I. H. S. A. A. Board of Control tendered a contract to Arthur L. Trester to continue as Permanent Secretary of the I. H. S. A. A. for three years beginning August 1, 1928 according to the contract now in force. The Permanent Secretary was instructed to draw up the contract accordingly.

Huntertown—Bulletin No. XVI, dated May 17, 1927, carried the following:

"Huntertown—Principal W. J. Morrison was requested by the Board of Control on March 28, 1927 to be present at a Board meeting on April 30, 1927 to give evidence regarding some athletic matters in his High School. A letter, written by Principal Morrison to one member of the Board of Control, was interpreted to mean that he did not intend to attend the hearing by the Board of Control.

Decision—The Huntertown High School suspended from the I. H. S. A. A. until the Principal appears before the Board of Control."

Decision—(Aug 19, 1927)—The suspension of the Huntertown High School removed due to the appearance of Principal W. J. Morrison before the Board of Control and the High School placed on probation in the I. H. S. A. A. until June 1, 1928 due to the playing of Alfred Foote, a student who was considered eligible by Principal Morrison for athletics during a semester when he was repeating the work of a preceding semester in which he had passed in three regular High School subjects and for the following semester when he should have been considered a failure for the preceding semester in which he was repeating work formerly done.

The Adams Township, Burnettsville case was reviewed in the light of letters sent to the Permanent Secretary and to the members of the Board of Control by Principal E. S. Christen. The Permanent Secretary was authorized to inform Principal Christen that the decision of the Board of Control remained as it was given, with the understanding that certain questions regarding the participation of students in the Adams Township High School be answered by the Permanent Secretary.

The I. H. S. A. A. contract with the Permanent Secretary was submitted and signed according to the motion of the last meeting.

The meeting adjourned to meet at 9:00 o'clock Saturday morning, November 19, 1927 in the Graham Hotel, Bloomington, Indiana.

MINUTES OF I. H. S. A. A. LEGISLATIVE BODY MEETING

The Legislative Body of the I. H. S. A. A. met in the Lincoln Hotel, Indianapolis at 8:00 o'clock Wednesday evening, October 19,1927.

All members and the Permanent Secretary were present on time. The minutes of the last meeting were approved as they appeared in Bulletin Number IV dated October 27, 1926.

Statements were made by the President covering the method of procedure as outlined at previous meetings.

Chairman R. C. Puckett, Principal of Bosse High School, Evansville made a brief report on the Health study made of the physical effects of the 1927 State Basketball Tourney. This report is given in full in Bulletin No. XII dated April 22, 1927. The report was accepted and the committee discharged.

Chairman George Reitzel, Superintendent of Schools in Hendricks County, made a brief report on a uniform system of accounting for High School activities. This report is given in full in Bulletin No. X dated March 24, 1927. The report was accepted and the committee discharged.

Chairman J. Ord Fortner, Principal of Honey Creek High School, Vigo County, made a brief report and submitted a proposal regarding the Junior High School question in athletics. The report was accepted and the committee discharged.

The proposals submitted by the High School Principals and printed in Bulletin Number II dated October 3, 1927 were carefully considered. All proposals, with the following exceptions, failed to pass:

- 1. The President of the Legislative Body was authorized to appoint a committee of three to study the question of summer football training and to report their findings to the Legislative Body at its next meeting. (Note: Superintendent Harry Nixon, Chairman, Portland; Principal Ray Kuhn, Pierceton; and Principal C. Zimmerman of Garfield High School, Terre Haute were appointed by the President to serve on this committee.)
- 2. The proposals having to do with the number of men to be entertained at the sectional, regional and final tourneys were turned over to the Board of Control for action. The Board of Control indicated entire sympathy with the proposals and stated that an additional man would be entertained for each tourney next spring.

President C. F. Albaugh was selected by the Legislative Body to present the actions of this body to the annual meeting at ten o'clock, October 20, 1927.

Upon the request of the President the Permanent Secretary explained somewhat in detail the lease with Butler College held by the


I. H. S. A. A. Several questions were asked and discussion was given to the several elements in the contract. The Legislative Body unanimously approved the stipulations of the lease and commended the action of the Board of Control in securing a contract covering the use of the athletic facilities of Butler College, Indianapolis.

The President was authorized to call a special meeting of the Legislative Body during the year if he thought it advisable and necessary.

The spirit of the meeting was everything that could be desired and the attitude of the members of the Legislative Body was excellent. Proposals were considered carefully and on the basis of good school procedure, there being no desire to pass special legislation.

The meeting adjourned to meet at the time of the State Teachers' Association, Indianapolis in October, 1928.

CONSTITUTION OF THE INDIANA HIGH SCHOOL ATHLETIC ASSOCIATION

ARTICLE I.

NAME

The name of this association shall be the "Indiana High School Athletic Association."

ARTICLE II.

MEMBERSHIP

Section 1. Membership in this association shall be limited to the public High Schools of the State and each school shall have one vote.

Section 2. Any public High School in Indiana may become a member of this association by subscribing to these rules and regulations and by paying the annual dues of one dollar fifty cents (\$1.50) to the Permanent Secretary on or before January 1 of each year.

Section 3. All memberships lapse on January 1 of each year unless the annual dues are paid.

ARTICLE III.

ADMINISTRATION

Section 1. I. H. S. A. A. Districts.

For the purpose of administration only, the State shall be divided by counties into the following districts:


First District-Benton, Carroll, Cass, Fulton, Jasper, Lake, LaPorte, Marshall, Newton, Porter, Pulaski, Starke, St. Joseph, Tippecanoe and White.

Second District-Adams, Allen, Blackford, DeKalb, Elkhart, Grant, Howard, Huntington, Kosciusko, LaGrange, Miami, Noble, Steuben, Wabash, Wells, and Whitley.

Third District—Boone, Clay, Clinton, Fountain, Hamilton, Hendricks, Marion, Montgomery, Morgan, Owen, Parke, Putnam, Tipton, Vigo, Vermillion and Warren.

Fourth District-Bartholomew, Dearborn, Decatur, Delaware, Fayette, Franklin, Hancock, Henry, Jay, Jefferson, Jennings, Johnson, Madison, Ohio, Randolph, Ripley, Rush, Shelby, Switzerland, Union and Wayne.

Fifth District-Brown, Clark, Crawford, Daviess, Dubois, Floyd, Gibson, Green, Harrison, Jackson, Knox, Lawrence, Martin, Monroe, Orange, Perry, Pike, Posey, Scott, Spencer, Sullivan, Vanderburg, Warrick and Washington.



Section 2. Board of Control.

MEMBERSHIP

- (a.) The Board of Control shall consist of five members, (principals, members of the faculty or superintendents) to represent the five districts into which the State is divided for administration purposes only.
- (b.) Elections shall take place each year between December 1 and December 10, all votes being mailed to the Permanent Secretary on ballots prepared by him.
- (c.) Each member of the I. H. S. A. A. in a district shall have one vote for a Board member from his district.
- (d.) Beginning with December, 1916 members shall be elected as follows: First District, to serve until January 1, 1918; Second District, to serve until January 1, 1919; Third District, to serve until January 1, 1920; Fourth District will have an election in December, 1917, the member to serve three years; and the Fifth District will have an election in December, 1918, the member to serve three years.
- (e.) After the initial elections, each member shall be elected for three years or for the unexpired term in case such is less than three years.
- (f.) All newly elected officers shall assume the duties of their offices on the first day of January next following their election.
- (g.) The person receiving the highest number of votes in a district shall be elected.
- (h.) In case of a tie the vote shall be taken again, the votes being cast for the men who are tied for first place.
- (i.) Three members of the Board shall constitute a quorum at any meeting.
- (j.) Removal from the district or withdrawal from the teaching profession shall constitute a vacancy and in such cases the remaining members of the Board shall choose a person from the district wherein the vacancy exists to serve until the member chosen at the next election assumes office.
- (k.) No retiring member of the Board, having served three years, shall be eligible for re-election and service in any district for a period of one year after the date of retirement.

Section 3. Board of Control.

POWERS AND DUTIES

The Board of Control shall have the following powers and duties:

(a.) It shall have general control over all athletic contests between and among the members of this association.

- (b.) It shall have exclusive control of the annual inter-scholastic tourneys and meets.
- (c.) It shall determine forfeitures as provided for in these rules.
- (d.) It shall give interpretations of the rules of this association.
- (e.) It may at the end of the athletic season and at its discretion issue a statement of its official opinion as to the relative standing of teams.
- (f.) When charges are made in writing by a member of the association against another member for violation of these rules, the Board of Control, after giving due notice of the time and place for the school so charged to be heard, shall consider such charges and may suspend the offending school for a period not exceeding one year.
- (g.) The Board of Control shall decide all protests brought before it with reference to qualifications of contestants in meets and tourneys.
- (h.) When any matter comes before the Board for decision which is of special interest to a school of which a member of the Board is a representative, the remaining members of the Board shall appoint another person to act in his place in that matter.

Section 4. Permanent Secretary.

At the annual meeting of 1906 a Permanent Secretary shall be elected, who shall have charge of the property and records of the Association; shall receive all money for dues and the sale of publications of the association; shall issue all circulars authorized by the Board of Control; shall attend meetings of the Board when requested to do so by the Board; shall turn over to the Treasurer of the Board all money in his possession when called upon to do so; shall perform such other duties as the growth of the Association, as determined by the Board, may require; shall receive as compensation such sum and such allowance for expenses and clerical help as the Board may approve; and it shall be his duty to publish the I. H. S. A. A. Handbook immediately following the annual meeting of the association. Vacancies in the office may be declared by the Board for cause, and a successor appointed by the Board to act until the next annual meeting.

Section 5. Legislative Body.

- 1. A "legislative body" shall be formed in the I. H. S. A. A. composed of fifteen (15) elected representatives, and the five (5) members of the Board of Control.
- 2. High School Principals, Faculty Members and Superintendents are eligible for election to a place on the Legislative Body.

- 3. Members of the Legislative Body are eligible for re-election to the Legislative Body and for election to the Board of Control at the expiration of their terms.
- 4. Board of Control members are eligible for election to the Legislative Body at the expiration of their terms.
- 5. No member of the Legislative Body or the Board of Control shall be eligible for a longer term on the Legislative Body than the one he is serving until the expiration of his term.
- 6. This Legislative Body shall make the rules governing the I. H. S. A. A.
- 7. The Board of Control shall execute the rules governing the I. H. S. A. A. in the spirit as well as the letter, in which they are made and shall make temporary regulations.
- 8. The President of the Board of Control shall be President of the Legislative Body.
- The Permanent Secretary shall serve as secretary of the Legislative Body.
- 10. The fifteen (15) elected representatives shall be elected as follows: Three (3) from each of the five (5) I. H. S. A. A. districts to be chosen by mail vote as Board Members are chosen.
- 11. The election of the fifteen (15) representatives shall take place between September 28 and October 3, 1925.
 - 12. The first elected members shall serve as follows:


The member in each district receiving the largest number of votes shall serve from election to three (3) years from January 1, 1926; the member receiving the second largest number of votes shall serve from election to two (2) years from January 1, 1926; and the member receiving the third largest number of votes shall serve from election to one (1) year from January 1, 1926.

- 13. In all elections in a district in which two or more members are to be elected the candidate receiving the largest number of votes shall be elected for the longest term, the one receiving the second largest for the second longest term, and the one receiving the third largest for the third longest term.
- 14. In case of a tie the vote shall be taken again, the votes being cast for the men who are tied.
- 15. After the initial elections, each member shall be elected for three years or for the unexpired term.
- 16. The annual meeting shall be a meeting for the explanation and interpretations of rules and regulations, for inspirational addresses by recognized leaders, for committee reports and for constructive work.

- 17. The Legislative Body shall meet prior to the annual meeting each year, at the time of the annual meeting and at such other times as necessary.
- 18. All expenses of the Legislative Body shall be paid out of the I. H. S. A. A. funds.
- 19. Minor details in connection with the workings of the Legislative Body shall be handled by the Legislative Body.
- 20. A majority (11) of the members shall constitute a quorum.
- 21. After the initial elections all elections shall take place each year between December 1 and December 10, all votes being mailed to the Permanent Secretary on ballot prepared by him.
- 22. Removal from an I. H. S. A. A. District, withdrawal from the teaching profession or a lapse of membership in the I. H. S. A. A. shall constitute a vacancy and in such cases the remaining members of the Legislative Body shall choose a member from the district wherein the vacancy exists to serve until the member chosen at the next election for the unexpired term assumes office.

LOCAL MANAGEMENT

- Section 1. (a.) The Principal or his authorized representative shall accompany his team to all contests.
- (b.) The Principal of the school, or high school teachers authorized by him, shall be manager or managers of the teams representing the school.
- (c.) No games shall be played without the sanction of the Principal.
- (d.) The eligibility of all contestants shall be certified to by the Principal of the school in accordance with the rules hereby adopted. Such statements shall be presented in writing within ten days before any contest. In case of disputes the principal must furnish the Board of Control the following data in regard to each contestant; the date of last enrollment; the number of years he has been a member of a secondary school athletic team; date and place of birth; average mark in each study for the last preceding semester in school; average mark in each study from the beginning of the current term and semester. A school which does not furnish this data shall be denied championship honors, and may be excluded from all games, tourneys and meets.
- (e.) The Principal has power and is advised to exclude any contestant who, because of bad habits or improper conduct, would not represent his school in a becoming manner.
- (f.) It is recommended that principals, in arranging for games, provide a forfeit of \$10.00 to be exacted should there be a failure on the part of either party to carry out the arrangements made. Should such forfeitures be stipulated and not be paid during the same sea-



son, the Board of Control, after hearing both sides, shall have authority to expel the delinquent school from the association. Notification of such expulsion shall be published in the papers with cause therefor.

ARTICLE V

COACHES

Section 1. Paid Coaches, other than those regularly employed as teachers by the trustees of the school are prohibited. The expression "Paid Coach" refers to any person who receives directly or indirectly remuneration of any kind,—money, traveling expenses, gifts, etc., in return for services rendered in instructing or coaching any High School athletic team.

Section 2. No High School shall be permitted to employ a coach or athletic director who receives any extra pay, salary, gifts, trophies, trips or presents from any outside sources.

ARTICLE VI

OFFICIALS

Section 1. The major officials in all inter-contests shall be on the approval list of officials in the I. H. S. A. A.

Section 2. Approval shall be secured by making application to the Board of Control through the Permanent Secretary, and approved officials shall be given approval cards signed by the Permanent Secretary.

Section 3. The Board of Control shall drop from the approved list of officials any persons who are palpably unfair and incompetent in their officiating or who do not serve the ideals and policies of the I. H. S. A. A. Disbarment cards shall be given to such officials and their names shall be published in the bulletins of the association.

ARTICLE VII

CONTESTS

Section 1. The games recognized by the I. H. S. A. A. are:—Football, soccer, basketball, track and field, and baseball.

Section 2. All inter-school athletic contests shall be subject to the rules of the I. H. S. A. A. and the Board of Control.

ARTICLE VIII

RULES FOR CONTESTS

Section 1. Spalding's Official Football Rules shall govern in football.

Section 2. Spalding's Official Basketball rules shall govern in basketball. (For the season of 1923-1924 paragraph 2, section 1, rule

8 shall be void. All tourney games shall have two halves of 15 minutes each.)

Section 3. Spalding's National Collegiate Athletic Association Track and Field Rules shall govern with the following exceptions:

- (a.) Rule 2, regarding a Games Committee shall be void.
- (b.) Scoring.

Three places shall be counted in all meets except the state final meet and the places shall count 5, 3 and 1. In the 1924 annual meeting it was voted to score as follows in the State Final Meet: First, 5 points; Second, 4 points; Third, 3 points; Fourth, 2 points; and Fifth, 1 point. Places in the relay races shall not count for points. In case of a tie in any event the points shall be divided and the place awarded by lot.

(c.) Events.

The events in all meets shall be 100 yard dash; 220 yard dash, 440 yard dash, half-mile run, mile run, 120 yard high hurdle, 220 yard low hurdle, running high jump, running broad jump, pole vault, putting 12 lb. shot, mile relay and half mile relay.

(d.) Order of Events.

Track—100 yard dash trial; 120 yard hurdle trial; 100 yard dash final; one mile run; 440 yard run; 120 yard hurdle final; 220 yard dash trial; 220 yard hurdle trial; half-mile run; 220 yard dash final; 220 yard hurdle final; mile relay; half-mile relay. Field—Running high jump; shot put; pole vault; running broad jump.

(e.) Eligibility.

Each contestant in a meet must have previously made in a fair test, a record equal to the following in the events in which he is entered:

Section 4. Spalding's Official Basketball Rules for women shall govern girls' games with the following exceptions:

- (a.) The three court plan shall be used unless there is mutual agreement to use the two-court plan.
- (b.) Under no condition may girls play basketball according to boys' rules.

Section 5. Spalding's Official Rules in Baseball shall govern in baseball.

Section 6. No inter-school basketball games shall be played by players or schools prior to October 1 of each year nor after the last evening session of the State Final Tourney. Intra-mural practice and gymnasium work in basketball may be done prior to October 1 and after the final tourney. (The penalty is suspension.)

Section 7. The maximum number of games for the regular schedule of any team or any player in basketball shall be twenty. (The penalty is suspension.)

Section 8. Teams and players may play in two basketball tourneys in addition to the sectional, regional and final tourneys of the State Tourney and in addition to the twenty games on the regular schedule providing the games in one of these "two tourneys" shall be counted in the twenty games permitted for the regular schedule of a team or player. (The penalty is suspension.)

Section 9. The football season shall close November 30 of each year.

Section 10. No games shall be played with public High Schools of this State not belonging to this association. This rule does not prevent a member of the association from playing High Schools outside of the State nor from playing non-high school teams within the State, providing all players on the I. H. S. A. A. teams are eligible in every way and also providing there are no public High School students of Indiana on the opposing teams.

Section 11. All basketball tourneys other than the State Tourneys shall be held prior to February 1 of each year.

ARTICLE IX

ELIGIBILITY RULES SCHOLARSHIP

Section 1. Each contestant must have and be maintaining for the current semester, a passing grade in each of three or more studies requiring minimum of fifteen regular High School recitations per week, exclusive of rhetoricals, physical training, military drill and deportment; in his last preceding semester in school he must also have met the same requirements throughout the entire semester.

Section 2. Students enrolled for the first time must comply with the requirements of the rules, the average standing required for the preceding semester being obtained from the records in the last secondary school attended. Back work may be made up, providing that it is done in accordance with the regular rules of the school and becomes a matter of final record before the opening day of the next semester.

Interpretation—In each of the studies representing the minimum requirement of work specified above, the following shall govern; (a) For the current semester the average of the period grades up to the time of certification must be passing; (b) for the current or school grading period the average of the daily or weekly grades must be passing; (c) if the average of the period grades at the beginning of any grading period is below passing in any study, the pupil is ineligible as far as that study is concerned for the entire grading period.

ENROLLMENT

Section 1. No student, who has been enrolled as a High School student in any High School, shall be permitted to participate in any inter-high school contest as a member of another high school until he has been enrolled in such high school for one full semester, unless the parents of such student actually change their residence to the second school district. In the latter case, the student will be as eligible as he was in the school from which he withdrew.

Interpretation-

- (a.) A student enrolled in one High School of a city or school corporation shall not be eligible in another High School of the same city or school corporation until he has been enrolled in the other High School for one full semester, unless there are definitely marked school districts and his parents actually change their residence to the new district.
- (b.) Students finishing the courses offered in high schools maintaining less than four years of High School work are not bound by this section.
- (c.) The fact that a transfer has or has not been issued or that the student pays or does not pay his tuition, has no bearing on this section.
 - (d.) Parts of two semesters do not make a full semester.
- Section 2. No person, who has been enrolled as a student in an institution of college standing, and has done work which may be counted toward a degree in that institution, shall be eligible as a member of any athletic team under I. H. S. A. A. rules in any game with any other team, either within or without the State of Indiana.

Section 3.

- (a.) Any student who has been enrolled twenty (20) or more days between September 1 and December 1 for four times shall be ineligible for football.
- (b.) Any student who has been enrolled twenty (20) or more days between December 1 and March 1 for four times shall be ineligible for basketball, except a student who entered high school

for the first time during the second semester of a school year and who did not participate in any game during this semester, shall not be ineligible for basketball until he has been enrolled thereafter twenty (20) or more days between December 1 and March 1 for four times.

(c.) Any student who has been enrolled twenty (20) or more days between March 1 and June 1 for four times shall be ineligible for baseball and track, except a student who entered High School for the first time during the second semester of a school year and who did not participate in any game or meet during this second semester shall not be ineligible for baseball and track until he has been enrolled thereafter twenty (20) or more days between March 1 and June 1 for four times.

Section 4. A student withdrawing permanently from school within the first twenty days of a semester shall not be regarded as having an opportunity to engage in athletics that semester unless he has already played in one or more interscholastic games, in which case he shall be regarded as having engaged in athletics for that season.

Section 5. The eligibility rules of this association shall apply to students taking part in all contests, whether with schools inside or outside of the State of Indiana.

Section 6. In order to be eligible for athletic competition during any semester a student must have entered some public High School within the first twenty school days of the semester in which the contest occurs.

PARTICIPATION

Section 1. Any member of a High School athletic team who participates in an athletic contest as a member of any other similar team the same season, shall be ineligible to compete under these rules for the remainder of that season.

Section 2. A student, who has played in one or more inter-scholastic games in any season shall be regarded as having engaged in athletics for that season.

PARENTS AND PHYSICIANS' CERTIFICATES

Section 1. On and after January 1, 1927, a student, who participates in any interscholastic football, basketball or track contest, shall have on file in the Principal's office a certificate of physical fitness and a certificate giving the written consent of the father, mother or guardian for such athletic participation as is specified therein. The physical examination shall be made during the season of each of the three sports by a regularly licensed physician.

Previous to the participation, the Principal shall certify to the I. H. S. A. A. that the certificates required in this proposal are on file in his office.

REMUNERATION

Section 1. No High School student shall be eligible to participate in any inter-school contest under the rules of the Indiana High School Athletic Association, if it shall be shown that he, or any member of his family is receiving any remuneration, either directly or indirectly. to influence him or his family to reside in a given school district in order to establish eligibility on the team of said school, and any school permitting such participation shall, upon satisfactory evidence, submitted to the State High School Board of control, be suspended by them from membership in the I. H. S. A. A. for a term of not less than one year. This rule shall not interfere with the right of High School pupils to work during vacation or during out of school hours in order to earn their way through High School. It shall apply to the use of any funds created by gift or by subscription with the intent offering them or parts of them for the free use of the player or any member of his family as an inducement to get them to change their residence to the district of the said school and to maintain residence therein.

POST GRADUATES

Section 1. Post graduates are not eligible but students graduating from regular courses of less than four years in length shall not be deemed post-graduates.

Section 2. A student is a post graduate of a High School when he has completed the work required for graduation by that school and has received his diploma providing the school offers four years of work.

Section 3. Students meeting requirements for graduation in three and one-half years in a High School with a regular four year course shall be eligible to participate in school athletics the last half of the fourth year, providing they meet all other eligibility rules of the I. H. S. A. A.

AGE

Section 1. Students shall be ineligible for any athletic competition upon reaching twenty-one years of age.

AMATEURISM

Section 1. All contestants in the I. H. S. A. A. must be amateurs.

Section 2. Professionalism is defined in the I. H. S. A. A. as accepting remuneration, directly or indirectly, for playing on athletic teams, for officiating in athletic games or for managing athletic teams; or playing, officiating or managing under assumed names. Reasonable meals, lodging and transportation may be accepted, if accepted in service and not in any other way.

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INTERPRETATIONS AND SUGGESTIONS

First—When a contestant, official, game or decision is protested the game should be played as scheduled and the protest with evidence filed with the Board of Control for settlement later.

Second—Any student who carries at least 15 hours of regualr High School Work is a High School student.

Third—It is recommended that Principals take the proper measures to control the crowd and the players at all contests. Failure to do so shall be considered sufficient reason for suspension from the association.

Fourth—A game is an athletic contest entered into by a member of this association with players or teams not belonging to the member.

Fifth—As the Principal is the responsible party in High School athletics, it is recommended that he carry on all correspondence with the Board of Control and the Permanent Secretary.

Sixth—By passing work is meant work of such character that credit should be entered on the school records were credit given at the time of certification

Seventh—Mutual agreements to violate the rules of this association shall result in suspension of all schools concerned.

Eighth—Visiting schools shall be held responsible for the conduct of visitors from their home city regardless of the place of the contest.

Ninth—For athletic purposes the record at the end of a semester shall be final. Deficiencies in one semester can not be made up in a subsequent semester for qualification purposes during that semester. An incomplete or condition at the end of a grading period or semester counts as a failure. Back work may be made up and counted toward eligibility during the summer providing it is done and becomes a matter of final record prior to the opening day of the next semester.

Tenth—The baseball season is defined as beginning and ending with the school year.

Eleventh—The Principal of each school or a teacher in his school delegated by him in writing shall represent such school at all meetings of the Association.

Twelfth—Enrollment for any time is considered enrollment and students who do not pass in three regular High School subjects in any semester in which they are enrolled are ineligible until they have done so.

Thirteenth—Schools may have as many teams in the same sport as they desire, and all rules apply to all teams and all individuals on all teams.

QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS REGARDING THE I. H. S. A. A. RULES AND REGULATIONS


In order that the rules and regulations of the I. H. S. A. A. may be as clear as possible, it has been thought advisable to print for general distribution these questions and answers. The correspondence of the Permanent Secretary has been gone over carefully and has furnished these questions and answers almost entirely. The questions are real ones, as they have been asked by High School principals, coaches, superintendents, teachers and school board members, who are on the firing lines in their respective communities and schools. The answers have been given according to the rules of the association and the interpretations of the Board of Control. It is hoped that this bulletin will clarify our rules and regulations, as well as establish working ideals and policies for the I. H. S. A. A.

We must remember, however, that the letter of printed rules and regulations will not suffice. The following appeared in Bulletin VII, November 27, 1922, and is given here so that it may permeate all that we do:

"THE SPIRIT MAKETH ALIVE. The rules and regulations of the I. H. S. A. A. have been couched in words meant to secure loyal and fair-minded support of her members for clean sportsmanship, honest dealings and fair play, but these rules can be evaded if the spirit as well as the letter is not observed. School officials may grant credits for work not done, may neglect to investigate records, may mutilate and even destroy records, may change the regular schedules for the ending of one semester and the beginning of the next, and may do many other things without violating the letter of the rules and regulations of the I. H. S. A. A., but such can not be done according to the spirit of the high ideals of the I. H. S. A. A. No school official is a loyal supporter of the association who practices such things, and students in the care of such officials surely learn to live by fraud and deceit. The I. H. S. A. A. never attained its present high standing by such practices. If it were not for the fact that the large majority of the members of the I. H. S. A. A. live not only according to the letter, but also according to the spirit of her rules, she would die by suicide. We, as school officials, must be honest in our dealings, if we intend to secure honesty in boys and girls. Clean athletics follows clean coaches and clean school officials. Boys and girls deserve real leadership. There is no vitality in rules and regulations. The spirit alone maketh alive."

- Q. When is a student ineligible on account of age?
- A. A student becomes ineligible for any athletic competition upon reaching twenty-one years of age.

- Q. Is a student eligible for a game if he reaches twenty-one years of age on the day of the game?
 - A. No. The day preceding is his last day of eligibility.

3.

- Q. What is considered proof of age?
- A. One or all of the following documents in the order named:
 - (a.) Birth certificate.
 - (b.) Baptismal certificate.
 - (c.) Documentary evidence such as family record of birth in Bible, certificate of arrival in the United States, a passport or a life insurance policy of at least a few years standing.
 - (d.) Statement by Superintendent of Schools, public health physician, parent or guardian.

- Q. What should be done in cases of doubt as to age?
- A. Submit all evidence to the Board of Control after a complete investigation as outlined in three above has been made.

APPROVED OFFICIALS

1.

- Q. Who is an approved official in the I. H. S. A. A.?
- A. A person who has made application to and received the approval of the Board of Control through its Permanent Secretary.

Q. Must all officials be approved?

A. Yes. The major officials in all sports must be approved.

* * * *

Q. Is it necessary for a licensed teacher to be approved?

A. Yes.

* * * *

4.

Q. Are officials, who are certified in other states, eligible to officiate in Indiana?

A. No. Not until they have made application to the Permanent Secretary and have been approved in Indiana. * * * * * *

5.

Q. May a member of a High School team officiate in independent games without jeopardizing his standing?

A. Yes. Provided remuneration is not accepted directly or indirectly, and provided he does not use an assumed name.

6

Q. What is the penalty for using a non-approved official?

A. Suspension of the school usually, but cases are considered individually.

7.

Q. Are approved officials required for girls' games?

A. Yes. Girls are bound by the same rules as boys.

* * *

8.

Q. May a member of a High School officiate in High School games?

A. No. A High School student is not eligible for approval.

9

Q. Must an official be approved each year?

A. No. Approval is permanent providing the work of the official is good. $\begin{tabular}{ll} * & * & * \\ \end{tabular}$

10.

Q. Does approval in one sport give the right to officiate in other sports?

A. No. Approval is necessary for each sport.

11.

Q. What is the policy of the I. H. S. A. A. toward the decisions of officials?

A. The decisions of officials are considered final and binding.

* * * *

Q. Does the I. H. S. A. A. regulate the pay of officials?

A. The pay of officials in tourneys and meets arranged by the Board of Control is regulated. In single games the Principals and officials are expected to have contracts agreed upon prior to the games. The Board will adjudicate difficulties according to contracts.

BASKETBALL PLAYING

1.

Q. May students practice basketball before October 1 and after the date of the State Final Basketball Tourney?

A. Practice within the school in basketball may take place at any time.

2.

Q. Does the twenty-game limitation apply to the first team only?
A. No. Any team,—first, second, third, etc.,—may play twenty
(20) games and no more on its regular schedule.

* * * *

Q. May a student play in more than twenty games of basketball on the regular schedule on different school teams?

A. No. The twenty-game limitation applies to individuals as well as to teams.

* * *

Q. In how many tourneys may a team play in addition to the twenty games permitted on the regular schedule?

A. A team may play in the State tourneys,—sectional, regional and final, and in two other tourneys, provided the games in one of these "two other tourneys" are counted in the twenty games permitted for the regular schedule. This statement applies to individuals also.

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Q. May a High School have a complete schedule for the second team in any sport?

A. Yes. Each school team can and should be considered a representative team of the High School and, as such, be governed by all of the I. H. S. A. A. rules and privileges.

Q. Has the I. H. S. A. A. established the size of a regulation basketball floor?

A. No. But the I. H. S. A. A. strongly recommends 50x74.

7

Q. Is there a limit to the number of players a coach may use in a basketball game?

A. No. Except in games and tourneys arranged and managed by the I. H. S. A. A. Board of Control.

* * * *

8.

Q. When does the basketball season end for teams and individuals?

A. The basketball season for all teams and all players ends on the final day of the state final tourney or with the end of the season in the school if prior to the final tourney.

* * * *

Q. May High School players and teams play independent basketball in the interim between the sectional tourneys and the final tourney if the season in the school is closed?

A. No. Such playing would constitute a violation.

* * * * COACHES

1.

Q. Who may coach a High School team?

A. Qualified teachers in the grades or High School who are regularly licensed and regularly employed as such by the trustee or school board. Persons not employed by the trustee or school board, and who are not teachers, may coach providing all work is done gratis and under the supervision of the Principal.

2.

Q. Who is a paid coach?

A. Any person who receives directly or indirectly remuneration of any kind,—money, traveling expenses, gifts, etc.,—in return for services rendered in instructing or coaching any High School athletic team. See number one above.

3.

Q. Are paid coaches permitted in the I. H. S. A. A.?

A. No.

CONTRACTS

1.

Q. May a High School cancel a contract for an official or game without making settlement?

A. No. Contracts are binding and a settlement by mutual consent or according to the stipulations of the contract must be made.

2.

Q. Is there any penalty for an official cancelling a contract?

A. The I. H. S. A. A. expects all approved officials to abide by their contracts and will handle on its merits any case of violation by the school or official.

Q. If a school team disbands, would the school be responsible for contracts made?

A. Yes.

4.

Q. If contracts specify that first teams shall participate, can second teams be used?

 $\ensuremath{\mathrm{A.}}$ No. It is recommended that contracts specify the ranking of the teams.

* * * * 5.

Q. How may High School Principals secure contracts for games and officials?

A. By writing to the Permanent Secretary.

ENROLLMENT

* * * *

1.

Q. What is a five-year man?

A. Students who have been enrolled in High School for twenty or more days between September 1 and December 1, between December 1 and March 1 or between March 1 and June 1 for four times are ineligible for football, basketball and spring athletics respectively, with the following exceptions:

A student who enters High School for the first time at the beginning of semester II of any school year, may be enrolled four times of twenty or more days each between December 1 and March 1 following this first semester of his enrollment, and he may be eligible for basketball for these four seasons provided he does not play in any game during his first semester of enroll-

ment. A student, who enters High School for the first time at the beginning of semester II, may be enrolled four times of twenty or more days each between March 1 and June 1 following this first semester of enrollment, and he may be eligible in spring athletics for these four semesters, provided he does not participate in spring athletics during his first semester of enrollment.

Q. May a student, who has been in High School four full years, but who has not participated in any athletics, participate in athletics?

A. No. Enrollment rather than participation is the determining factor here.

3.

Q. Which is the determining factor in eligibility,—enrollment or participation?

Q. Neither. Both must be considered.

4.

Q. If a student changes High Schools, when is he eligible?

A. He is just as eligible in the new school as he was in the old school, provided his parents actually changed their place of residence to the new school district. If they do not actually change their place of residence to the new school district, he will be eligible after he has been enrolled one entire semester in the new school, provided no undue influences are used by any person to secure him as a student or his parents as residents.

-

5.

Q. When are students, who finish the work given in one High School, eligible in another High School?

A. Students finishing the work in a High School giving less than four years of High School work are just as eligible in a new High School as they were in the old High School.

.

O. What is a semester?

A. One-half of a school year constitutes a semester in the I. H. S. A. A., and parts of two semesters or a part of one semester does not make a semester in the I. H. S. A. A.

Q. When is a student eligible in school "A" if he withdraws from school "A," enters school "B" and later returns to school "A," his parents never changing their place of residence from the district of school "A"?

A. When the student has been enrolled one entire semester, provided he is eligible in all other ways.

* * *

8.

Q. How can a student gain eligibility in a High School upon entering from another High School?

A. By his parents actually changing their place of residence to the new High School district or by enrollment for one entire semester.

* * *

9.

Q. If a student withdraws within the first 20 days of a semester would he be considered a failure for the semester?

A. Yes, and he would not be eligible afterwards until he had been enrolled for one entire semester. Enrollment for any length of time in a semester constitutes enrollment for the semester.

GAMES

1.

Q. What is considered a game of basketball?

A. A game of any kind in the I. H. S. A. A. is an "inter" contest as distinguished from an "intra" contest. An admission fee is no part of a game and has no bearing one way or the other.

* * * *

2.

Q. May a member of the I. H. S. A. A. schedule and play games with teams and schools in Indiana not members of the I. H. S. A. A.?

A. Yes. Provided these teams and schools are not public High Schools and also provided the members of the I. H. S. A. A. observe all of the rules of the I. H. S. A. A.

* * * *

2

Q. What is the difference between a preliminary game and a regular game?

A. There is no difference as far as the I. H. S. A. A. is concerned, as the same rules and regulations govern,

A. Inter-"practice" games are regular games and must be counted as such. Intra-"practice" games are not counted as regular games. In fact, there are no such things as practice games in the I. H. S. A. A. There are practice games within the school.

5.

Q. Does the omission of an admission charge make any difference as to the designation of a contest as a game?

A. No. Games are "inter"-contests with or without admission charges.

6

Q. Is an alumni game considered a game?

A. Yes. Such must be counted as one of the 20 games permitted on the regular schedule.

7.

Q. What is considered an "inter" game?

A. Any game in which a High School team plays against students not belonging to the High School.

0

Q. What date marks the end of the football season?

A. November 30 of each year.

GIRLS' ATHLETICS

1.

Q. Are girls, as well as boys, bound by the rules and regulations of the I. H. S. A. A.?

A. Yes. All students on all teams in High Schools belonging to the I. H. S. A. A. are bound absolutely by its rules and regulations.

2

Q. May girls play basketball according to boys' rules?

A. No. Girls must play according to girls' rules by Spalding and the three-court plan shall be used, except as mutually agreed otherwise.

3 .

Q. Is the I. H. S. A. A. opposed to basketball games and tourneys for girls?

A. No. Special care should be used in such games and tourneys to know that girls are physically fit at all times.

4

Q. May men coach girls in athletic games?

A. Yes. It is recommended that women coaches be employed for girls. This applies to officials also.

-

Q. May girls' basketball teams play in state tourneys or national tourneys?

A. No.

PARTICIPATION

1.

Q. May a student play on any team other than a High School team?

A. A student becomes ineligible in High School for the entire season of that sport in which he participates as a member of any team other than the High School team.

2

Q. What is considered participation in a sport for a season?

A. Playing in a part of one game in a sport constitutes participation in that sport for that season.

* * *

Q. May member schools play against non-public High School, College, Y. M. C. A. and independent teams?

A. Yes, in single games but not in tourneys, meets and leagues. In single games the member schools must obey all of the rules of the I. H. S. A. A. and there must not be any public High School students on the opposing teams.

PRIZES AND AWARDS

1.

Q. Is a High School permitted to give sweaters to athletes?

A. Yes. The I. H. S. A. A. recommends that the giving of prizes, gifts, sweaters, etc., be kept within reasonable bounds at all times and that such as are given have a symbolic value only. All prizes should be given by the school.

Q. May schools give gifts to students for scholarship, sportsmanship and conduct?

A. Yes. And such may be accepted from outside sources if sanctioned by the High School Principal.

. . .

3

Q. What gifts, awards and prizes may athletes receive?

A. The I. H. S. A. A. recommends that the giving of awards, prizes, medals, etc., be kept on a reasonable basis at all times, and that such as are given have a symbolic value only and be given by and with the consent of the school authorities.

PROFESSIONALISM

1.

Q. What constitutes professionalism in the I. H. S. A. A.?

A. Accepting remuneration, directly or indirectly, for playing on athletic teams, officiating in athletic games or managing athletic teams, or playing, officiating or managing under assumed names. Reasonable meals, lodging and transportation may be accepted, if accepted in service and not in any other way.

2

Q. If a student violates his amateur standing in one sport, does he become ineligible for all sports?

A. Yes. A professional in one sport is ineligible for all sports.

3.


Q. Does a student become ineligible in all sports, if he plays on a team other than the High School team in one sport?

A. No. A student becomes ineligible only in the sport in which he participates as a member of a team other than the High School team, unless he violates his amateur standing and then he becomes ineligible in all sports.

4

Q. Are High School students permitted to play on teams that split the gate receipts among the players including the High School students?

A. No. This would be considered professionalism.

RESPONSIBILITY

Q. Who is the responsible party in I. H. S. A. A. athletics?

A. The High School Principal is the responsible party as far as the I. H. S. A. A. is concerned.

Q. Who is the proper official to sign contracts for games?

A. The High School Principal always. He may delegate this authority, but the Principal will be held responsible for contracts.

Q. Who may manage a High School team?

A. A High School Principal or teacher authorized by him. Student management is not permitted.

SCHOLARSHIP

Q. May back work be made up and counted toward eligibility?

A. Yes. Providing all work is done according to the regular rules of the school and such is made a matter of final record prior to the opening day of the semester in which the contest occurs. Back work can not be made up during a grading period or semester for eligibility during that grading period or semester.

Q. Would a student, declared ineligible by one principal, be ineligible under another principal?

A. Yes. If the student is ineligible according to the rules of the I. H. S. A. A. The I. H. S. A. A. has no jurisdiction unless its rules are violated.

Q. May a student, who receives his High School diploma, be eligible afterwards?

A. No. The granting and acceptance of a High School diploma makes a High School graduate.

Q. May an ineligible student practice with the regular team?

A. Yes. At home in regular practice, but ineligible students should not appear in athletic suits at games.

Q. Does the I. H. S. A. A. have a passing mark for scholarship?

A. No. The passing marks of the schools are usually honored.

6.

Q. Who is a post-graduate?

A. A post-graduate is a student who has finished his High School work and has received his High School diploma. Students who have completed sufficient work to receive a diploma, but who continue in school until commencement must be considered eligible or ineligible according to all other rules of eligibility, such as age, time in school, participation, work carried, etc.

* * * :

7.

Q. What constitutes the last semester in eligibility?

A. The last semester for any student is the last semester in which the student was enrolled in any High School for any length of time.

8

Q. At the end of the second grading period in a semester, is a student eligible if he makes passing grades in three regular High School subjects for this period?

A. In order to be eligible at the end of any grading period in a semester, a student must have passed in three regular High School subjects for the current grading period and his average grade in each of three regular High School subjects for all of the grading periods in that semester must be passing. A student must MAINTAIN his work in order to be eligible—weekly, by grading periods and by the semester.

0

 $Q.\$ Is a "condition" or an "incomplete" considered a "pass" in the I. H. S. A. A.?

A. No. The I. H. S. A. A. considers a "pass" to mean that all work has been done and has been made a matter of final record at the end of the grading period or semester.

10.

Q. Is a student, who carries three regular High School subjects and one or more eighth grade subjects, considered a High School student?

A. Yes. A student who carries fifteen hours of regular High School work is a High School student.

Q. Is a student, who has made sufficient credits to graduate at the end of semester one, eligible for athletics during semester two?

A. Yes. Provided he is eligible in all other respects and does not actually graduate at the end of semester one. Such a student must carry regular work during semester two.

10

Q. Are the same standards of eligibility required for intra-school games as for inter-school games?

A. No. The I. H. S. A. A. has no such requirements, but such is strongly recommended.

13.

Q. Is a student, who has been ineligible for a semester on account of scholarship, eligible for the night of the last day of the semester?

A. Yes. Provided he has passed in three High School subjects and his credits have been made a matter of final record prior to the contest.

* * * *

14.

Q. What constitutes scholarship eligibility?

A. In order to be eligible for a current semester a student must have passed in three regular High School subjects in his last semester of enrollment in any High School and he must be maintaining a similar amount of work for the current semester. This statement for semesters holds good for grading periods of the semester also.

15.

Q. If a student misses school for a few weeks in order to work is he eligible during this time and when he returns?

A. This is a school problem and must be answered by the consideration whether regular school work to the extent of fifteen hours is being maintained or not.

. . . .

16.

Q. If a student becomes ineligible on account of scholarship at the end of a semester, does this make him ineligible for one whole semester afterwards?

A. Yes. (See next question and answer.)

Q. If a student becomes ineligible at the end of a grading period when can he become eligible?

A. At the end of the next regular grading period, provided he passes in three regular High School subjects during the period and also provided his averages in each subject for all grading periods of the semester are passing in a similar amount of work.

Q. When is a student, who intends to enter High School, eligible?

A. When he actually enters, provided all other requirements have been met.

19.

Q. If a student becomes ineligible on Friday at the end of a grading period is he eligible for that night?

A. No. A student is ineligible whenever he becomes ineligible.

20.

Q. If a student becomes eligible on Friday at the end of a grading period is he eligible for that night?

A. Yes. A student is eligible whenever he becomes eligible. * * * *

21.

Q. When is a student maintaining his work during a semester?

A. When he is passing in three regular High School subjects during the current week, the current grading period, the last grading period and for all grading periods of the semester according to averages.

SENIOR AND JUNIOR HIGH SCHOOL TEAMS

1.


Q. May a ninth grade student play on the Senior High School team if he is enrolled in the Junior High School?

A. Yes, provided he is not a member of the Junior High School team also. Students in the 9th, 10th, 11th and 12th years of school work are considered eligible students in the I. H. S. A. A.

2.

Q. May a 9th grade student play on the Junior and Senior High School teams during the same season?

A. No. Not unless the student is duly promoted to the Senior High School at the end of semester 1.



Q. Are eighth grade students eligible for teams lower in ranking than the first High School team?

A. No. Eighth grade students are not eligible for any High School teams.

4.

Q. What students do the I. H. S. A. A. rules cover?

A. Students in the 9th, 10th, 11th and 12th years of school work are the eligible students in the I. H. S. A. A.

* * *

5.

Q. Does the I. H. S. A. A. have any jurisdiction over eighth grade students?

A. No. Not as long as they are really eighth grade students.

.

Q. What is considered a High School student?

A. Any student who carries as much as fifteen hours of regular High School work.

SUMMER BASEBALL

1.

Q. Does a High School student violate the rules of the I. H. S. A. A. by playing Independent Baseball during the summer?

A. High School students may play Independent Baseball during the summer months, when school is not in session, without jeopardizing their standing in High School, provided they do not accept remuneration directly or indirectly and also provided they do not play under assumed names. Reasonable meals, lodging and transportation may be accepted by such players, if accepted in service and not in any other way.

2

Q. Is a student, who plays on an Independent Baseball team during semester one, ineligible for High School baseball during semester two?

A. Yes. Such a student is ineligible for baseball for both semesters, as baseball is a school year sport.

1.

Q. Does summer school work in a school other than his home school jeopardizes the standing of a student?

A. No, provided the home school authorities recognize the work of the non-home school for credit and also provided the work does not count toward a College Degree. In fact, the I. H. S. A. A. recommends summer school work for students needing credits.

2

Q. If a student fails to pass in three regular High School subjects during semester two, may he count work done in summer school toward eligibility?

A. Yes. Provided all is done according to the regular rules of the school and is done and made a matter of permanent record in his school prior to the opening day of the next semester.

MISCELLANEOUS

* * * *

1.

Q. May a High School schedule and play games during the week?

A. The I. H. S. A. A. has no ruling in regard to this matter, but recommends that games be not so scheduled.

* * *

2.

Q. May students, who are ineligible for the first team, play on teams of lower ranking?

A. No. Ineligibility for one team means the same for all teams.

9

Q. Are Parents and Physicians' Certificates required in all sports?

A. No. They are required in football, basketball, track and field for all players,—boys and girls.

4.

Q. Does the I. H. S. A. A. stipulate any price for tickets to other than tourneys and meets held strictly under the supervision of the Board of Control?

A. No. Other than a recommendation that reasonable prices be made at all times for all games.

5.

Q. Is a student, who is expelled from High School one semester, eligible for the following semester?

A. The I. H. S. A. A. has no jurisdiction unless its rules and regulations are broken. Expulsion and suspension from school are usually not athletic matters at all. All rules of the I. H. S. A. A. are binding on a student under expulsion.

* * *

6

Q. May a High School support a grade team out of its funds?

A. Yes.

H

Q. May two or more High Schools combine to form one athletic team?

A. No. This is not permitted under any conditions.

* * * *

Q. Does the I. H. S. A. A. have a rule regarding the use of tobacco?

A. No. Other than that the I. H. S. A. A. considers the conduct of players as an element in their eligibility. This matter properly belongs to the High School Principal.

9.

Q. May the rules of a school be changed or special examinations be given in order to make students eligible?

A. The I. H. S. A. A. expects its members to observe not only the letter but the spirit of its rules and regulations. Changing of school rules and special examinations are not looked on with favor.

* * * * 10.

Q. Does wrestling come under the rules of the I. H. S. A. A.?

A. Yes. All "inter" athletic participation comes under the I. H. S. A. A.

* * *

Q. May High Schools belonging to the I. H. S. A. A. take part in a tourney, meet or game outside of Indiana?

A. Yes. Provided all of the rules of the I. H. S. A. A. are observed by the Indiana High Schools and provided all of the Indiana schools in the games, tourneys and meets are members of the I. H. S. A. A. Teams from other states must belong to their state associations.

- Q. May High School students take part in tourneys, games and meets held under auspices other than the High Schools concerned or the I. H. S. A. A.?
- A. No. Not during the school year. Students may participate in track and baseball during the summer months in meets and games held under non-High School or non-I. H. S. A. A. auspices, provided they do not violate their amateur standing in any way.

1

- Q. This question is often asked: "What will be the penalty for violation of such and such a rule?"
- A. Penalties in the I. H. S. A. A. are not assigned in advance, as this democratic organization is built on the idea that the observance of its rules and regulations is more to be desired than the enforcement of them. The I. H. S. A. A. believes that the essence of proper and willing observance is higher than enforcement and that we should resort to enforcement only when observance falls down.

* * * * 14.

- Q. What is considered the school year?
- A. A school year covers all time from the first day to the last day of the school year, including vacations.

* * * * 15.

- Q. Are tourney schedules drawn or arranged?
- A. All tourney schedules in the I. H. S. A. A. are drawn by lot by the Board of Control and no schedule has ever been arranged. * * * * *

16.

- Q. Who is eligible for election on the Board of Control?
- A. Any High School faculty member, principal or superintendent. ${*~*~*~*}$

17.

- Q. Who is eligible for election on the Legislative Body?
- A. Any High School faculty member, principal or superintendent.

10

- Q. Does the Permanent Secretary have a vote in the Board of Control and in the Legislative Body?
- A. The Permanent Secretary is not a member of either group and has no vote in any of their deliberations.

19.

- Q. May a married student be considered eligible?
- A. Yes.
