ADDRESS TO INDIANA HIGH SCHOOL ATHLETIC ASSOCIATION

(G. Warren Phillips)

The importance of a well balanced program of school activities has gained increasing recognition among educators since the turn of the century. Today every modern school gives serious time and attention to its proper direction. To say that the valuable outcomes of a school activity program will be proportionate to the proper selection of activities to be sponsored and to the intelligent direction of those selected is to express a self-evident fact. The broad educational policy of the school must permeate not only the scholastic curriculum but the whole activity program as well. Any activity which does not contribute to the established and accepted aims of education should be revised or discarded. To insist that final authority for the direction of any and all school activities rests in the hands of those responsible for the entire school program is only to insist that they be established on a sound educational basis consistent with the aims and ideals of the school. It has been the purpose of the I. H. S. A. A. since its inception to assist, as a voluntary educational organization, in the direction and control of inter-high school athletics as a part of the educational program of member schools. Basic rules and regulations consistent with sound educational principles have been made by the member schools to the end that athletics may contribute to the best ideals of the school. A thorough knowledge of these rules and regulations by every high school coach and principal is imperative. Proper dissemination of this knowledge to fans, teachers and students is im-

As we move forward new problems appear and must be met with our best thinking. By way of illustration, one of the more recent seems worthy of attention. Not so many years ago the problem of financing the athletic program in most communities involved the receipt and expenditure of little money. Athletic finances were of little concern except to those willing to donate. With improved athletic fields and more adequate gymnasia athletic receipts are receiving more attention from individuals and groups not otherwise interested in athletics. In many communities there is such an erroneous and exaggerated opinion regarding athletic income and expenditure that it is of concern to all. It has been the policy of the I. H. S. A. A. not only to exercise careful and judicious care in the management of its funds but also to place in the hands of its member schools each year a complete financial report. Many schools follow a similar plan in informing their own student body and community of local athletic finances. School newspapers, local newspapers, bulletins and bulletinboards are excellent media for dissemination of this information. Honest publicity will disarm much groundless suspicion and sinister criticism.

The I. H. S. A. A. has the heritage of a sound foundation laid by the clear thinking, vision and courage of its founders. Its past speaks for itself and is overshadowed only by the possibilities of even greater future service for the boys and girls of Indiana.

ANNOUNCEMENT OF SECTIONAL, REGIONAL, SEMI-FINAL AND FINAL BASKETBALL TOURNEYS, 1939

THE TWENTY-EIGHTH ANNUAL

The Board of Control has completed the details for the State Championship Basketball Tourneys and announces the scheme in full.

SECTIONAL TOURNEYS

March 2, 3 and 4

The following bases were used in selecting sectional, regional and semi-final centers:

(1) Location,—geographical and with reference to schools desiring to participate. (2) Transportation facilities. (3) General conditions,—attitude of local authorities, floors, seating capacities and entertaining facilities. (4) Rotation. (5) Success and satisfactory management of previous tourneys. (6) Invitations.

Schools have been assigned by counties with a few exceptions and these exceptions are clearly indicated. The name of your county locates your center unless assigned otherwise. The scheme is arranged to have no less than 8 teams and no more than 16 teams in each tourney and the assignment of all schools is given below. The Board of Control reserves the right to readjust the scheme if conditions arise making changes necessary or advisable. The numbers indicate the number of schools that probably will enter the tourneys. No doubt these numbers will be very nearly correct for this year. Correct information will not be available until the entry blanks have been received and accepted by the Board of Control. The numbers herein are tentative only. The winners will constitute the teams in the Regional Tourneys according to assignment. Entry blanks are necessary. An entry blank is enclosed.

MANAGEMENT—The exclusive control of these tourneys rests solely with the Board of Control according to the I. H. S. A. A. Constitution. Local arrangements have been delegated to the Center Principals. Officials for each tourney will be selected and assigned by the Board and every attempt will be made to choose none but fair, disinterested and competent men. Two officials will be assigned to tourneys having 8, 9, 10, 11 or 12 teams, and three officials will be assigned to tourneys having 13, 14, 15 or 16 teams. Two officials will work each game alternating as referee and umpire. Each official is obligated to be ready for work throughout the tourney. All schedules of hours, floors, teams and officials will be made out and printed by the Board. All schedules will be drawn by lot by the Board of Control in the presence of representatives of the Indianapolis Star, Times and News; Associated Press, United Press, and International News Service, and no changes will be made in them.

DECISIONS—The assignment of officials and the decisions of the officials will be considered final. Schools entering the tourneys enter with this understanding. Give this information to your students and fans now and as often as necessary.

TOURNEY REQUIREMENT—A High School shall not be considered eligible for entering a sectional basketball tourney in the I. H. S. A. A. in any year unless the team representing the High School has played eight (8) inter-scholastic games during that season. Schools holding less than full membership are not eligible.

ENTERTAINMENT—Teams are limited to ten men and these ten men may play. Twelve men may be certified but two of these men must be scratched prior to the opening game of the tourney. The Center Principals have contracted with the Board of Control to entertain twelve men (which must include the faculty manager) from each competing school according to the following scheme:

- Entertainment for all teams in all tourneys will end not later than 10:00 P. M., Saturday, March 4.
- 2. Entertainment for all teams will begin as follows:
 - a. In 8 and 9 team tourneys,-5:00 P. M., Friday, March 3.
 - b. In 10, 11 and 12 team tourneys,—12:00 Noon, Friday, March 3.
 - c. In 13, 14, 15 and 16 team tourneys,—5:00 P. M., Thursday, March 2, for teams playing on this evening and 8:00 A. M., Friday, March 3, for other teams.
- 3. In 8, 9, 10, 11 and 12 team tourneys, one extra round-trip transportation and one extra meal will be given to the teams playing Thursday evening, March 3.
- 4. All tourneys will begin at 7:00 P. M., Thursday evening, March 2. There will be no games Saturday morning in any tourney. There will be no games Friday morning or Friday afternoon in 8 and 9 team tourneys; and there will be no games Friday morning in 10, 11 and 12 team tourneys. Principals may arrange their school work accordingly.

Printed schedules will be sent to each competing school by the Center Principal in plenty of time to arrange for making the trip. Fairness by all parties must prevail in this matter of entertainment. Money spent for entertainment decreases the amount to be divided among the schools. All competing schools are requested to ask for no longer entertainment than is necessary.

The Center Principal may pay the participating schools for meals and lodging taken at home in lieu of such as would be necessary at the tourney center with the following understandings: (1) the Principals of the participating schools shall make definite arrangements with the Center Principal to this effect on or before Tuesday, February 28, (2) transportation only, one round trip, shall be paid in lieu of each night's lodging. The transportation here considered shall in no case exceed the amount for lodging should the Center Principal provide lodging, (3) no more than the regular tourney allowance shall be paid for meals taken at home, (4) rest rooms for the day, when lodging is taken at home by a school, shall be an expense of the school securing such and not an expense of the tourney, (5) teams arriving late or leaving a tourney early should not expect full tourney entertainment.

EXPENSES—An entrance fee of one dollar (\$1.00) for each team must accompany the entry blank, which money will go into the treasury of the I. H. S. A. A. to defray expenses of the tourneys incurred by the Board of Control. The Center Principals have contracted to make settlement out of the receipts of the tourneys according to the following scheme and in the following order:

(Economy will be exacted regarding all expenses)

- 1. All legitimate expenses, such as meals, officials, etc., except for transportation and lodging, shall be paid from the gross receipts if sufficient. If gross receipts are not sufficient, legitimate expenses shall be considered an obligation of the Center Principal.
- 2. The Center High School shall receive one hundred dollars (\$100).
- 3. The transportation shall be paid. (The Board of Control has decided on three (3) cents per mile per man for the round trip. Mileage should be considered as the most direct distance between the school building of the participating school and the gymnasium in which the tourney is held.)
 - 4. The lodging shall be paid.
- 5. The Center High School shall receive one hundred dollars (\$100).
- 6. The I. H. S. A. A. shall receive one percent (1%) of the fifth balance.
- 7. One-half of the sixth balance shall be divided pro-rata among the participating schools, the Center School sharing.

- 8. One-half of the sixth balance shall be divided on the basis of season ticket sales in the local communities on or before 4:00 p.m. Thursday, March 2. Season tickets sold after this hour and date can not be counted in finding the share of any one school. Keep the two lists separate at all times.
- 9. The Board of Control shall pass on all reports by the Center School and all reports by the participating schools.
- 10. The Center School shall furnish a complete financial report to the I. H. S. A. A. and to each participating school soon after the tourney.

Note—The amounts provided for the Center School shall not be divided among the participating schools as a bid for a tourney or in payment for the support of these schools. The expenses of a manager, if any, belong to the Center School and not to the tourney.

PRIVILEGES—All competing players, one Coach and one faculty manager for each team (twelve in all) shall be admitted free to all games.

ELIGIBILITY—The eligibility of each player must be certified by the Principal of the School sending the team. Certificates must be made on the regular blanks furnished by the Commissioner and all data must be given as indicated. Entries will close Friday, February 17. These blanks should be sent between February 9 and 16. Do not mail entry blanks later than February 16, 1939. Blanks mailed according to these instructions should reach the I. H. S. A. A. office in time to be accepted. All students must be eligible when they participate as well as when they are certified, so entry blanks should not be sent too early. Late entry blanks will not be accepted. The Board of Control has so ruled.

ADMISSION FEE—The admission fees to all tourney games shall be as follows:

Four-session tourneys—season ticket \$1.00, session ticket 35 cents; Five-session tourneys—season ticket \$1.25, session ticket 35 cents; Six-session tourneys—season ticket \$1.50, session ticket 35 cents.

Tickets shall not be sold for more or less than the prices here given. No more tickets shall be sold than the seating capacity of the house will justify. Standing room shall not be sold or used. All requirements of the State Fire Marshall and the City Fire Marshall shall be met in all tourneys.

PRIZES—No prizes of any kind are to be awarded to any school or individual from any source.

DISTRIBUTION OF TICKETS—An equitable distribution of season tickets shall be made among the competing schools based on distance, enrollment in High School and probable attendance from the competing schools. Season tickets should be ready for distribution on

Monday, February 27. Much ticket information can be secured prior to this date. Center Principals and participating Principals should communicate with each other on Monday morning, February 27. This responsibility is mutual. All Principals have duties in this matter. Any unfair methods or prices higher than those mentioned in this announcement should be reported to the Board of Control with evidence. The division on season ticket sales shall be made on the basis of such tickets being sold and paid for on or before 4:00 p. m. Thursday, March 2. All schools must observe this provision. Season tickets sold after this hour and date should not be credited to any one school in the sharing and should be reported separately.

An identification scheme will be used for Press representatives, who must be properly certified by their Managers at the time requests are made.

Tickets—All tickets will be handled through the I. H. S. A. A. office according to the following scheme:

- 1. Season tickets and these only will be sold prior to Saturday, March 25, 1939. In recent years all tickets were sold prior to this date. The price for a season ticket will be one dollar and twenty-five cents (\$1.25) and such a ticket will entitle the purchaser to attend the games in the afternoon and evening sessions of the tourney. If the capacity of the house is not sold in season tickets, session tickets at 75 cents each will be sold on the day of the tourney.
- 2. Tickets will be sold only through the Principals of High Schools belonging to the I. H. S. A. A. and having teams entered in the sectional tourneys, obligating them to distribute these tickets properly to persons in their own school districts before distributing any tickets elsewhere. Each Principal will be required to keep on file the full names and addresses of all ticket purchasers for the information of the Board of Control, should such be desired for checking purposes. Orders placed otherwise will not be honored. Tickets distributed by Principals in an improper way or at prices higher than one dollar and twenty-five cents per season ticket will jeopardize the standing of their school.
- 3. Tickets will be sold by mail order only. Telephone, telegraph and personal call orders will not be honored. A ticket order blank is enclosed with this bulletin. It is official and you should use it according to instructions. The I. H. S. A. A. does not agree to honor second orders. Principals should order their quota the first time.
- 4. Ticket orders must be specific as to number of tickets and a check for the correct amount of money made to Arthur L. Trester must accompany each order. Tickets purchased can not be returned. Please do not send money. The limitations below must be observed as given:
 - a. Orders for tickets having official Post Office stamp marks on the envelopes including and from Monday, March 6, to and including Wednesday, March 15, will be accepted if received not

later than Thursday, March 16, 1939. The I. H. S. A. A. reserves the right to check the mailing of all ticket orders and to act on their findings.

- 5. Each High School Principal, having a team entered in an I. H. S. A. A. Sectional Basketball Tourney for 1939, and each High School Principal holding a modified membership in the I. H. S. A. A., may order tickets to six (6) per cent of his High School enrollment as of September 19, 1938, and as submitted to the Inspection Office of the State Department of Public Instruction last September for the school years 9, 10, 11 and 12. Post graduates should not be counted. You were requested to preserve a duplicate copy of this report. Principals should carefully observe the limitation here placed. If there are questions, ask them now. All enrollments will be checked with the report herein mentioned. Be sure you are right.
- 6. All tickets remaining unsold after the High School Principals have ordered, according to the privilege of their enrollment quota, will be distributed pro rata among the Principals of the 64 sectional tourney winning schools if ordered by them. These Principals should state on their letter, ordering their quota of tickets according to enrollment, whether or not they will accept and pay for any tickets that may be distributed to them as sectional tourney winners. The check for these tickets should be sent upon receipt of the tickets only. No tickets, other than the tickets remaining after the enrollment quota orders are honored, are offered in this paragraph. There may be no tickets or only a few tickets so remaining. None are guaranteed. Tickets purchased can not be returned.
- 7. In order that all may know how ticket orders are filled, the following statements are made:
 - a. Ticket orders from Principals are due any time from March 6, to March 15, inclusive. Post office stamp marks will determine.
 - b. Upon receipt of ticket orders in the I. H. S. A. A. office, they are checked. All correct orders are arranged alphabetically according to the name of the school, numbered and filled in the order here given.
 - c. Incorrect orders are returned with instructions.
 - d. Orders will be filled by drawing the tickets as follows and in the order given: (1) Beginning with Section 9 and proceeding to the right around the 1st balcony in blocks with about 10% of each block in the front rows of the block; (2) Beginning with Section 1 and proceeding to the right around the bleachers, if there are available tickets, and (3) Beginning with Section 11 and proceeding to the right around the second balcony.
 - e. The method of filling ticket orders is a method entirely by lot and the scheme automatically assigns the seats. The location of seats of any particular school depends upon a number of things,—date of receipt of order, number of orders received in same mail, number of tickets covered by the orders received in

the same mail, alphabetical order of the school name among the orders received, accuracy of ticket order, station reached in the drawings determined by the orders received, etc.

WARNINGS—Entries are due Monday, March 20, and can not be changed afterwards. Special privileges will not be granted to anyone. Send all entry blanks to Arthur L. Trester, 812 Circle Tower, Indianapolis, Indiana. All data must be given. The management, protests and privileges will be governed according to the regulations pertaining to the Sectional Tourneys.

MISCELLANEOUS

- 1. All seats will be reserved and tickets sold to Principals will be drawn by lot.
- 2. Blocks of seats, when sold, will be arranged from front to back rather than around the playing floor, about ten percent of the number in each block being assigned to the front of the block.
- 3. No pass-out tickets will be issued. Holders of tickets may leave the Field House when they choose in any session, but they can not re-enter until the next session. The seats will be cleared between sessions.
- 4. All tickets will be printed in coupon form, carrying the statement that coupons will not be good if detached. The I. H. S. A. A. tickets will be printed in a way that will make duplication very difficult, but a warning is given against bogus tickets.
- 5. Ticket holders will be seated prior to the opening game in each session, between halves and between games only. All persons must remain seated in their own seats during the games. All games will be started on scheduled time and will be played in quarters of 8 minutes each.
- 6. Comfort accommodations will be found on each floor at each end of the Field House.
- 7. Tickets will indicate the Gate, Ramp, Section, Row and Number. As you approach the Field House look for the Gate Number above the door corresponding to the one on your ticket.
- 8. Two blocks of seats in the middle on the west side of the playing floor and two blocks in the middle on the east side of the playing floor having 650 seats to the block, will be reserved for the four schools whose teams are in the tourney until Monday, March 20. Twelve blocks of seats, immediately around the playing floor and with 150 seats to the block, will be reserved for the other twelve schools participating in the semi-final tourneys. The High School Principals whose teams are represented should get in connection with the I. H. S. A. A. Office on Monday, March 20, and make definite arrangements about these tickets or they will be sold to other parties. These blocks will be assigned by lot by the Board of Control.
- 9. First Aid Rooms will be located in the east end of the Field House. Look for sign. A physician and a nurse will be available.





GIMBEL PRIZE FOR MENTAL ATTITUDE

In 1917 Jake Gimbel of Vincennes presented to the I. H. S. A. A. Board of Control a proposal to give a prize each year at the State Basketball tourney to the boy among the teams represented that showed the best mental attitude throughout the tourney. Mr. Gimbel did not have in mind the quality of the playing of any boy on any team, but did have in mind the qualities that belong to a real gentleman. He clearly recognized the mental and moral strain under which the players play during the tourney and he also recognized the numerous opportunities for the players to lose control of themselves and


to do something not conducive to true sportsmanship.

The Board of Control accepted the proposal of Mr. Gimbel and the awarding of this prize known as the "Gimbel Prize for Mental Attitude" has been an annual affair, calling for much favorable comment. The prize and the things it represents are cherished by the players and schools of Indiana. The prize has meant much to real sportsmanship and self-control in the High Schools of the State and it is a prize sought for by all schools. The school to which the winner of this prize belongs claims the winner as their own and accordingly the whole school and the whole community are proud. In a number of cities similar prizes are being given to the players who show the best mental attitude within their own schools. The Gimbel prize and these other similar prizes have exalted in a very real sense the qualities belonging to a gentleman in the minds of our boys and girls.

NEW GYMNASIUMS AND STADIA

BERNE GYMNASIUM

The gymnasium unit is a part of a grade and high school building which was completed August 14, 1939, at a cost of \$121,800.00.

The gym is 86' x88', inside measurement.

The floor is 54' x86'. The playing court is 50' x 74'.

Permanent hardwood bleachers will seat 1000. There is room enough at the ends of the playing court for 150 more seats.

At present no stage is provided in the gymnasium. A Community Auditorium provides these facilities.

Boys' and girls' shower and locker rooms are provided under the bleachers on one side. Manual training rooms are located under the bleachers on the other side.

A ticket booth and a canteen are provided near the front entrance which opens into the first floor corridor opposite the front entrance.

All metal backboards are provided for the basketball court.

The floor is maple, finished with three coats of Seal-O-San. The bleacher seats have the same finish.

Four exits are provided for the convenience of the crowds.

The gymnasium has outside windows and ample electric lighting.

The brick used for the structure, both outside and inside, are buff in color.

The structure was financed by a bond issue and 45% Federal Grant.

HEBRON HIGH SCHOOL AND GYMNASIUM

The new Hebron school, built at a cost of \$182,000 for building and site of 13 acres, consists of 17 class rooms, an elementary play room, shops, laboratories, a separate auditorium seating 618, and the gymnasium. The building was financed by a P. W. A. grant and a local bond issue.

The gymnasium is $88' \times 75'$ with a hard maple basketball court $75' \times 48'$. The steel girders are 23' above the playing floor. Floor, wall and ceiling inserts provide for the suspension of nets and other equipment and makes possible the playing of many games. Universal Folding Bleachers and a small balcony provides a seating capacity of over 700. The floor is lighted with 8,000 watts. An electric score board is the gift of this year's Senior Class. The clock and bell system is a part of the central building unit as are the R. C. A. loud speakers and Microphone units. Two dressing and shower rooms are provided with basket and full length lockers. An instructors room is equipped with cabinets, table, scales, ventilator control and shower temperature control.

The athletic field of 10 acres adjoining the gym, when completed, will include one baseball diamond, three soft ball diamonds, two

speed ball and football fields, two tennis courts, two volley ball courts and a regulation 440 yard track.

MOORES HILL GYMNASIUM

We are building a new Gymnasium here in Moores Hill this year. It will be a one floor tiled construction with dressing rooms and showers in the basement. The floor in general will be 90'4 by 85'3, with the playing floor 50 by 70. The purpose will be for Phys. Education in general and the cost will be \$22,500. The method of financing was by selling bonds on Sparta Township Schools and is under the management of Elvin L. Manlief, Trustee of Sparta Township. The heating and wiring will bring the cost to \$35,000.

There are shower and locker rooms for girls, another for boys, and a shower and dressing room for visitors. It will also furnish class rooms, toilet rooms, office, ticket offices, and storage rooms.

SUMMITVILLE GYMNASIUM

Building dimensions 85-89. Dimensions of playing court, 50-74. Seating arrangement: cement bleachers with wooden seats attached to iron arm. Seats are along both sides. None at ends. Seating capacity 1,000. There is a stage at the end where new gymnasium connects with old building. This stage could be seated for 150 more spectators.

Dressing rooms: 3 underneath bleachers, 8 showers, toilets 4 in dressing rooms.

Cost of construction \$54,000, 55% of funds provided by P.W.A. funds.

Bankboards are steel and scoreboard is electric.




Dimensions of building: 89 x 130 feet. Dimensions of playing floor: regulation.

Accommodations and equipment: 5 shower rooms, 2 rest rooms near front entrance, steel lockers, glass back boards for basketball.

Seating arrangement: permanent seats on two sides and on one end, with bleacher seats on the stage.





MADISON TOWNSHIP (WAKARUSA) GYMNASIUM

MADISON TWP. (WAKARUSA) GYMNASIUM

The addition to our old building is 113 ft. x 114 ft. We have class rooms on both sides and between the class rooms is the gym. The gymnasium floor over all is 95'4" by 60'. The playing court is 50 x 74. There are thirteen rows of seats on each side and no seats on the ends. The seating capacity is 1700 on sides; with bleachers on stage about 500 more. The west end of the gym is a stage. We have a canvas to cover the floor at functions that we use it for an auditorium. A picture booth is built on east end of the building. We also have a new athletic equipment room and two new shower rooms and dressing rooms. This was a P.W.A. job and the cost of building, including a few minor changes in the old building, was \$87,000.

WASHINGTON STADIUM

The Washington High School stadium is being built with W. P. A. fund and it is costing approximately \$45,000. It will have a seating capacity of 1,800 and is lighted for night games with 60—1500 watt bulbs. The field is also used for any other activities which is possible. It is amply suited with dressing rooms and toilets. The heating is provided by the use of an individual heating unit separate from the main plant.

RICHMOND GYMNASIUM

Completion date—Summer of 1939.
Dimensions—Outside, 135 x 240; floor, 72 x 120.
Seating capacity—4,000 (bleacher type).
Cost—\$230,000 (P. W. A. 45%, Civil City 55%).
Maple floor.
Brick and concrete exterior, steel roof supports.
Will be used as public and school gymnasium and auditorium. Will be an integral part of new school plant and managed by the school city.

In addition to the items mentioned above, there will be: a large stage at one end, 72" x 35"; lockers for 600 pupils; showers, dressing rooms for gym classes; 4 separate team and locker rooms; 3 storage rooms; 2 director's offices.

FREMONT GYMNASIUM

The building was completed May 15, 1939. The outside dimensions are 124' x 132'.

The gymnasium floor is $55' \times 86'$, with the basketball court $50' \times 74'$. There are 1,000 permanent bleacher seats, with ample space for 600 movable bleachers.

This gymnasium is part of a unit containing; a vocational Agriculture Department, (classroom and farm shop); Vocational Home Economics Department, (foods laboratory, sewing room and living room); two class rooms; band room; stage 22' x 42' with dressing rooms; and two toilet rooms.

There are two locker rooms with showers, toilet and 168 lockers for boys' physical education.

The girls' locker room contains showers, toilets and 168 lockers. The varsity room contains 30 lockers, showers, etc., with an equipment room handily located. The equipment room contains various sized shelves, cabinets etc., for all kinds of athletic equipment.

The athletic director's office is located near the varsity room. The ticket windows, canteen and first aid room border on the lobby. Two permanent trophy cases are in the lobby.

Cost of entire unit and equipment-\$80,000.

P. W. A. contract.

The building is for Physical Education and Vocational Education. It is school property, under the direct control of the school.

LIBERTY H. S. PLAY FIELD

This field was acquired three years ago by Short High School of Liberty. At that time is was a cultivated field adjacent to the high school grounds, the latter being situated near the edge of town. Over a year was consumed in leveling it and in growing a sod on the field. Provisions already have been made for football, archery, basketball, two softball diamonds not shown in the picture, and the lighted one shown here. These have been so laid off that a quarter mile track and two hard surface tennis courts may be added in the future. The track will go around the other diamond and the tennis courts inside the other end of the oval. Volley ball courts and horse shoe pits will also be added in the near future. The field is used for many activities outside the regular school program. With the further developments complete it will become a real community recreational center.

ELKHART STADIUM

This stadium extends the whole length of the football field and seats approximately 6,500 persons. It is built of re-enforced concrete with red wood seat boards supported by cast-iron brackets. The materials were furnished by the High School Athletic Association and the labor was paid out of W. P. A. funds.

There is a large and well-equipped press-box and a public address system operated from the press box. The field has 48 lighting units of 1500 watts each and the electric score board will be operated from

the press box.


Beneath the stadium are dressing rooms for the students participating in the several sports and for the visiting teams, band equipment room, concession rooms and accommodation.

In addition to the seating in the new stadium, one of the old wood stands remains with a capacity of 2,400, thus making a total seating capacity of approximately 8,900.






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LIBERTY HIGH SCHOOL PLAYING FIELD

The above, together with a mile relay and a half mile relay, will constitute the events of the meets. Winning first place in any event in the final meet counts five points; second place, four points; third place, three points; fourth place, two points; and fifth place, one point. Winning first place in any event in the sectional meet counts five points; second place, three points; and third place, one point. Points

in the relays will be counted in determining the winning team, the points for each place in each relay to be double the points in each place in other events. In case of a tie in any event the points shall be divided and the places awarded by lot. No contestant will be permitted to enter or participate in more than three events, and no contestant will be permitted to enter or participate in both relay races. Do not enter the same boys in both relay races.

The order of events is as follows:

SECTIONAL TRACK AND FIELD MEETS

May 12 or 13

The following bases were used in selecting centers:

(1) Location—geographical with reference to schools desiring to participate; (2) Transportation accommodations; (3) General conditions—attitude of local authorities, tracks, fields, entertaining facilities, etc.; (4) Rotation.

Schools have been assigned by counties, and the accompanying scheme gives the Centers and the counties assigned to each Center. The name of your county locates your Center. The Board reserves the right to readjust the scheme if necessary. Entry blanks are

Management—The management of these meets rests solely with the Board of Control. Local arrangements have been delegated to the Center Principals. All meet officials will be selected by the Center Principal.

The Center Principal shall arrange a program for his meet from the list of entries sent to him by the Commissioner. All meets shall begin at 1:30 o'clock Saturday afternoon May 13 unless the Center Principal secures the consent of the participating schools in his meet to hold the meet Friday afternoon or Friday evening May 12. If such consent is secured the Center Principal will inform the I. H. S. A. A. and each Principal in his meet of the hour of starting the meet Places on the track must be assigned by lot. National Collegiate Athletic Association Track and Field Rules for 1939 shall govern

Open Contest—These meets are open to all members of the Association, except to schools holding modified membership.

Entertainment—Two men, if actual contestants, for each event, four men, if actual contestants, for each relay team and a faculty manager from each competing school will be entertained by the Center Principal. Entertainment shall consist of one meal at noon, dressing rooms, lockers and shower facilities. The meal provided by the Center Principal shall constitute the only meal allowed.

Expenses—There will be no entry fee. Traveling expenses must be paid by the competing schools.

Privileges—All actual contestants and one faculty manager for each team are admitted free to the meet.

Eligibility—The eligibility of each player must be certified to by the Principal of the school sending the team. The regular blank of the I. H. S. A. A. must be used and all data must be given. Entries positively will close Friday, May 5. This means that they must be in the hands of the Commissioner, complete in every detail, on that date.

Admission Fee—The admission fee to all meets shall be not more than twenty-five cents, but may be any amount less than twenty-five cents.

Prizes—Suitable ribbons shall be given to the winners of first, second and third places in each event, and to each member of the winning relay teams. No other prizes shall be given.

Warnings—Entries close Friday, May 5, and can not be changed afterwards. Special privileges will be granted to no one. Send all entry blanks to the Commissioner.

FINAL MEET SATURDAY, MAY 20, TECHNICAL HIGH SCHOOL FIELD, INDIANAPOLIS

Entrants—The winning relay teams and all men winning first and second places in each event in the Sectional Meets shall constitute the participants in the Final Meet. In case of a tie in first or second place in a Sectional Meet, the right to enter the Final Meet goes to the winner of the badge who will be determined by lot by the Referee of the Sectional Meet.

Entertainment—Entertainment for all teams in the Final Meet located within a radius of 50 miles of the Technical High School Field shall consist of no more than the noon meal and one additional meal on Saturday. Entertainment for other teams shall consist of no more than the dinner meal on Friday, lodging for Friday night and three meals on Saturday. The I. H. S. A. A. will serve the noon meal on Saturday and will not be obligated for meals taken elsewhere at this

time. No more than 60 cents for a meal and one dollar and fifty cents for a lodging will be allowed. All competing schools are requested and expected to ask for no longer entertainment than is necessary. Traveling will be at the expense of the competing schools. Since track and field meets usually produce little revenue, all schools are requested to be exceedingly careful in expenditures. Only actual contestants and one faculty manager from each school will be entertained. Fred R. Gorman, Technical High School (Phone Cherry 2949), and K. V. Ammerman, Broad Ripple High School (Phone Broadway 2408) are Assistant Managers of the State Meet.

Inner Grounds (Rule 16). No person shall be allowed inside the track, except officials. Authorized persons shall wear a badge. Competitors not engaged in the events actually taking place shall not be allowed inside or upon the track.

Time of Events—Trials will be held beginning at 10:00 o'clock Saturday morning in the following events: 100-yard dash, 220-yard dash, 120-yard hurdle, 200-yard hurdle, pole vault, shot put, broad jump and high jump. The afternoon events will begin at 1:30 o'clock.

Races—The following events will be run in two races in the afternoon: 440-yard run, 880-yard run and one mile run. Points will be given for first, second, third, fourth and fifth place winners in each of the two races for each event.

Privileges—All actual contestants and one faculty manager for each team are to be admitted free to the meet.

 ${\bf Admission~Fee} — {\bf The~admission~fee}$ to the meet shall be twenty-five cents (25c).

Management—The management, protests and privileges will be governed according to the regulations pertaining to the Sectional Meets.

Meals—The noon meal will be served in the Cafeteria of the Technical High School. There will be no need to leave the school campus after arrival until the meet is ended. The I. H. S. A. A. will serve the noon meal to actual contestants in the meet and to one faculty manager for each team. Other persons may purchase meals at reasonable prices.

Prizes—The I. H. S. A. A. will award the winning school a shield or cup; medals of gold, silver and bronze to the winners of first, second, third, fourth and fifth places in each event, except in the 440-yard run, 880-yard run and mile run, in which medals will be given for first, second and third place winners in each of the two races in each event; and medals to the members of the first, second and third winning relay teams. No other prizes shall be given.

Registration—All teams must be checked in at the Technical High School Gymnasium by the Coach or Principal. The check-in office will be open at 8:00 a. m. on Saturday. Principals are responsible for the proper registration of their teams on time. Late registrations will not be accepted. Correct expense statements must be filed at the time of registration. 


Medal Play—The tournament will be conducted as Medal Play and 18 holes will be played.



BASEBALL PLAYING

(Hard Baseball and Soft Baseball)

The following statements have been authorized by the Board of Control:

- a. High school students may play on independent baseball teams during the summer when school is not in session without jeopardizing their standing or the standing of their school in the I.H.S.A.A. provided they do not play under assumed names and also provided they do not accept remuneration, directly or indirectly, for their playing.
- b. Reasonable meals, lodging and transportation may be accepted by the students if such are accepted in service rather than in money or in some other material form. The I.H.S.A.A. expects all High School students to so conduct themselves at all times that they, their High School and the State Association will be honored.
- c. All such playing should be checked carefully and frequently. The requirements should be extended to all students. Managers of independent teams should be warned of the dangers of using High School boys on baseball teams. A professional in one sport is a professional in all sports as far as eligibility in the I.H.S.A.A. is concerned.
- d. High School students, who play on baseball teams other than their High School teams during the school year, make themselves ineligible for baseball in High School in that school year.
- e. High School students, who play on baseball teams other than their High School teams during the school year, must have written permission of their High School Principal on file in the I.H.S.A.A. office prior to the participation. The responsibility of securing and filing this written permission rests with the student, the manager of the non-High School team and finally with the High School Principal. See Note.
- f. The I.H.S.A.A. considers that a High School is entitled to the High School students in baseball during the school year and that participation in baseball elsewhere should not take place except by the written permission of the High School Principal in each case. See Note.

Note: Permission granted by a Principal to a boy to play baseball on a team other than his High School team during the school year makes the boy ineligible for the High School team in baseball. No permit can be issued to violate any of the rules of the I.H.S.A.A. The purpose of the permit is to keep the Principal informed about his students.

BRIEF HISTORY OF I. H. S. A. A.

The first attempt to organize the High Schools of Indiana in a single organization for the purpose of handling athletic activities was made in a meeting of the Northern Indiana Teachers' Association held at Richmond, in April, 1903. At this time there was a conference of High School Principals, and the conference ended with a body of suggested rules and regulations, called the Richmond Agreement. Due to the fact that there was no central organization having executive power, the Richmond Agreement did little more than point the way toward something better.

Principal J. B. Pearcy, of Anderson, issued a call for a meeting of High School Principals interested in a State Athletic organization for December 5, 1903. At this meeting a provisional constitution was adopted. At a similar meeting on December 29, 1903, a final constitution was adopted and a Board of Control of three members was chosen to administer the affairs of the I. H. S. A. A.

The first Board of Control was made up of Principal George W. Benton, Shortridge High School, Indianapolis; Superintendent Lotus D. Coffman, Salem, and Principal J. T. Giles, Marion. These men thought and planned well, and we are enjoying the fruits of their vision.

There were fifteen (15) High Schools belonging to the I. H. S. A. A., March 1, 1904, and now there are eight hundred and six (806) High Schools belonging. The membership has had a gradual growth through the years, and now the limit is recognized as the limit in the number of High Schools in the State.

A study of the men who have served on the Board of Control through the years will show clearly that the activities of the I. H. S. A. A. have been in good hands. The titles and addresses are given as they were when the men were board of control members. A complete list of the several Board members of the I. H. S. A. A. follows:

In the beginning, one member of the Board of Control served as Secretary, but it soon became very evident that this office furnished enough work for a special man. It was also seen that the future of the organization demanded that the office of Secretary be made more permanent than the office of Board Member. Accordingly, at the annual meeting in 1906 the office of Permanent Secretary was established, and Principal J. T. Giles was chosen by the Principals to be the first Permanent Secretary. Principal Giles resigned on December 26, 1912, and Principal Isaac E. Neff was chosen by the Principals to succeed him. Principal Neff resigned March 15, 1913, and the Board of Control appointed Principal Arthur L. Trester to serve as Perma

nent Secretary until the next annual meeting in December, 1913. At this meeting, Principal Trester was chosen by the Principals as Permanent Secretary.

The Board of Control consisted of three members, chosen by the Principals in their annual meetings, until the annual meeting of October 27, 1916. At this meeting it was decided to divide the State into five districts for administrative and representative purposes, and that each district should have one representative on the Board of Control, chosen by mail ballot from his own district by the Principals of his district.

In September, 1925, by a referendum vote the Principals passed a legislative body proposal calling for four members from each of the five (5) I. H. S. A. A. districts. The five members of the Board of Control and the fifteen other members elected by the Principals in a mail vote constituted this legislative body. Prior to this scheme all legislation was done at the annual meeting or by referendum voting by mail. This Legislative Body of twenty members passed on all proposals submitted by the High School Principals. It was the law making body of the Association. The scheme was considered a step in advance in state administration and legislation in athletic activities.

On December 13, 1930, the Legislative Body considered and passed without a dissenting vote the provisions for an Athletic Council. The scheme in full continued the five I. H. S. A. A. districts in the state and arranged for five representatives on the Athletic Council from each district by classes determined by enrollments in the High Schools, thus making the Athletic Council a body of twenty-five members representing all sizes of High Schools and all districts of the state at all times and elected by the High School Principals in the membership. A provision was included for the selection of a Board of Control from the membership of the Athletic Council by the membership of the Athletic Council. The Athletic Council took over the duties of the former Legislative Body and is considered the law making body of the Association.

The primary purpose of the organizers of the I. H. S. A. A. to manage and to foster High School athletics on a high plane has been held up as an ideal by the Association through the thirty-four years of the life of the I. H. S. A. A. New and advanced steps have been taken whenever conditions made them necessary. It became increasingly evident as time went on that the I. H. S. A. A. should assume a larger and larger initiative in real physical education for all boys and all girls, and that physical education should be interpreted in the light of other educational aims and ideals. Accordingly, the I. H. S. A. A. now has a program, not only for the managing and fostering of High School athletics, but for the stimulation of communities and schools to the end that real physical education be given all boys and all girls throughout the grades and the High School.

The title "Permanent Secretary," established in 1906, was changed to "Commissioner of High School Athletics" in October, 1929, by the Legislative Body, and the Commissioner was granted the powers and duties belonging to a Commissioner of Athletics.

MINUTES OF I. H. S. A. A. BOARD OF CONTROL MEETINGS

EVANSVILLE

Superintendent Irons presented information regarding some athletic questions in connection with the students that will enroll in a new Mechanic Arts School the second semester of the present school year. Students in this school will be students belonging to Central, Bosse and Reitz High Schools and who have completed the first two years of high school work. The last two years of high school work by these students will be done in the new school, but they will receive diplomas from their former schools respectively. The new Mechanic Arts School will have no inter-school athletics.

Decision—The enrolled students in the new Mechanic Arts School may be considered students in their former high schools, as far as inter-school athletics is concerned, provided the rules and regulations of the I. H. S. A. A. are observed in every way by the Principals of these former schools as they relate to eligibility, responsibility, liability, certification, etc. Prior to the opening of the new Mechanic Arts School a conference by Superintendent Irons, the Principals of the three high schools in Evansville and the Dean of the new Mechanic Arts School shall be held so that definite understandings and agreements may be reached. A copy of these understandings, agreements and methods of procedure shall be sent to the Commissioner, bearing the signatures of the individuals just cited. Specific and unforeseen questions shall be decided as they arise but prior to the participation in athletics of the students in question.

ELIGIBILITY CASES

Several situations in which ineligible students had participated in athletics were considered. Some of these violations were due to a lack of knowledge of the rules, some were due to negligence, some were due to inefficiency on the part of the teacher acting as an agent of the Principal, and some presented the appearance of a "get-by" attitude.

The Commissioner was authorized to follow in such cases the long-standing policy in the I. H. S. A. A. as indicated below:

1. Require explanatory letters to be sent by the erring Principal to the opponent Principals of games in which the ineligible student participated, forfeiting the games and requesting that acknowledgment of the receipt of the letter be sent to the Commissioner. Copies of the explanatory letters must also be filed with the Commissioner.

- 2. Require the erring Principal to declare the students ineligible for the entire semester of their enrollment following the semester in which they participated when ineligible. A statement to this effect must be filed with the Commissioner.
- 3. Require a hearing before the Board of Control in cases in which suspension might be the penalty for the school.

BEDFORD

Mark Caress moved with his parents to Cumberland in June, 1938. The boy entered Warren Central High School September 6 and remained a few days. The mother and the boy went back to Bedford September 10 and the boy entered high school there September 12, the opening day of school. The mother has taught in the Bedford schools for the past thirteen years.

Decision—Mark Caress considered eligible for athletics in the Bedford High School, as far as the change of high school rule is concerned.

CLAYPOOL

John Hathaway and Keith Hathaway entered the Claypool High School from Pierceton last March. While at Pierceton, they and their father lived at the home of their brother, Ray. Ray and his two brothers moved to Claypool but the father remained at Pierceton with another son.

Decision—John Hathaway and Keith Hathaway may be considered eligible for athletics in the Claypool High School, as far as the change of high school rule is concerned.

RUSHVILLE (Case 1)

Melvin Gray formerly lived with his grandmother near Glenwood and attended that high school. In January, 1938, the grandmother moved to Rushville, the boy going to live with his mother near Glenwood. On August 1, 1938, Melvin went to live with his grandmother at Rushville and entered that high school.

Decision—Melvin Gray can not be considered eligible for any athletics in the Rushville High School until he has been enrolled one calendar year. The change of high school rule is applicable in this case.

RUSHVILLE (Case 2)

Hugh Glore moved to Rushville with his father and entered the Rushville High School October 12, 1938. The mother, father and the children formerly lived at Middletown, Ohio. The mother and two daughters still live there.

Decision—Hugh Glore may be considered eligible for athletics in the Rushville High School, as far as the change of high school rule is concerned.

TOURNEY LIMIT DATE

It was ruled that Section 11, Article VIII reading, "All basketball tourneys other than the State Tourneys shall be held prior to February 1 of each year" applies to all member schools and to all high school students in all tourneys whether held under high school or other auspices.

WESTERN MICHIGAN RELAYS

The Commissioner was instructed and authorized to refuse a request for the approval of the Western Michigan Relays scheduled at Western State Teachers College, Kalamazoo, Michigan, for April 27, 1938, as far as members of the I. H. S. A. A. are concerned.

GIRLS' ATHLETICS

Some correspondence on file regarding this topic was presented by the Commissioner but consideration was postponed.

MISCELLANEOUS

The Commissioner presented the correspondence regarding some misdemeanors such as flag raising, painting, etc., by students, alumni or supporters in connection with athletic games. The long standing policy of the I. H. S. A. A. to investigate, check and act on the doings and settlements in such situations was approved. It was considered that the I. H. S. A. A. not only had the right to act in such cases but that it had the duty to act in order to protect clean athletics among the member schools.

The Board adjourned to meet at ten o'clock Saturday morning, November 26, 1938.

GIRLS' ATHLETICS

The topic of Girl's Athletics was considered and it was decided to introduce this topic for discussion at the next meeting of the Athletic Council.

MEMBERSHIP

The rule regarding membership passed by the Athletic Council at their last meeting was discussed. The Commissioner reported that, pursuant to the instructions of the Athletic Council, the rule had been worded to grant modified membership to public schools giving and maintaining less than three years of high school work and that

no change had been made in the other sections in the Constitution regarding membership. It was decided that all other rules and regulations of the I. H. S. A. A. would be considered binding on schools holding modified memberships.

MISDEMEANORS

The correspondence regarding some cases in which school colors were raised, some painting was done and accompanying misdemeanors were committed in connection with but prior to games was considered. It was decided to extend appreciation to the Principals who have shown co-operative attitudes and who have made careful investigations with proper settlements and provisions for prevention of such misdemeanors in the future. It was also decided to continue to check carefully the cases in which settlements have not been reached or co-operative attitudes have not been shown by Principals.

MEETS

It was decided to hold a Wrestling Meet at Indiana University and a Swimming Meet at Purdue University under the auspices of the I. H. S. A. A. and at the expense of the I. H. S. A. A. as far as reasonable medals and meals are concerned, provided satisfactory arrangements can be made with the two Universities.

AUDIT

Copies of the audit of the finances of the I. H. S. A. A. by Ernst. & Ernst for the year ended November 14, 1938, were given to the Board Members.

CHANGE OF HIGH SCHOOL RULE

It was decided to continue the policy of considering that a change of high schools by a student should correspond to the change of residence of the parents if eligibility of the student is desired.

BASKETBALL

1. It was decided to use the molded type of basketball in the sectional, regional, semi-final and final basketball tourneys for 1938-1939 and to consider the specifications in the Official Rules as binding in the selection of the ball.

2. Consideration and discussion were given to the arrangements, contracts and reports of the several I. H. S. A. A. tourneys. It was decided that the bonus for each participating school in the Semi-final Tourneys would be \$200.00 instead of \$150.00. Six hundred fifty (650) final tourney tickets were allotted for purchase to each of the four participating schools in the Final Tourney, and one hundred fifty final tourney tickets were allotted for purchase to each of the other twelve participating schools in the Semi-final Tourneys. It was ruled that reasonable expenses for help in holding tourneys should be paid out of receipts if sufficient, but that the management of a tourney should be an expense of the school inviting and holding the tourney.

The Board adjourned to meet immediately after the Athletic Council meeting Saturday, December 17, 1938.

It was decided to affirm the former decision of the Board in this matter.

GILBOA TWP. (Remington)

Eugene Musgrave was sent to the Boys' School at Plainfield from Rensselaer and was released April 26, 1938 to a family living in Gilboa Township, Remington. The parents are separated but live in Rensselaer. The boy is under the jurisdiction of the Juvenile Court of Jasper County and of the Boys' School. He will have been enrolled in the Gilboa Township High School one semester at the end of the present semester.

Decision-Eugene Musgrave may be considered eligible for athletics in the Gilboa Township High School, as far as the change of

high school rule in the I. H. S. A. A. is concerned.

CORYDON-AUSTIN

Superintendent Stapley, Principal Mossler, Coach Bulleit and player Stover of Corydon, and Principal Christie, Coach Manaugh and player McGinnis of Austin were present. There were some difficulties in connection with a basketball game at Corydon Saturday night, November 19, 1938. It was alleged that player McGinnis struck player Stover at or near the end of the game. The conduct of the fans was in question during and after the game.

Decision-Austin High School placed on probation in the I. H. S. A. A. until June 1, 1939 due to the unsatisfactory type of conduct displayed by some of the Austin fans during and after the game. The ineligibility of player McGinnis continued until January 1, 1939.

Some discussion was given to basketball tourneys and to swimming

and wrestling meet arrangements.

The Commissioner was instructed to invite the new members of the Board of Control to the next meeting of the old Board of Control at 2:00 o'clock Thursday afternoon, December 29, 1938.

The advisability of holding tourneys and meets with 9th grade or

9th and 10th grade students was discussed.

EMPLOYMENT OF COMMISSIONER

The Board of Control unanimously voted to continue the present contract of Arthur L. Trester as Commissioner of the I. H. S. A. A. until August 1, 1939, and to employ him for two calendar years beginning August 1, 1939 at the same salary and under the same considerations and stipulations as the present contract.

SHELBYVILLE

The parents of Roy Henson moved from Shelbyville to Waldron last September. The boy continued to live in Shelbyville until the middle of December, then went to live with his parents, continuing to attend Shelbyville High School.

Decision—Roy Henson considered eligible for athletics in the Shelbyville High School or he may be considered eligible in the Waldron High School if he enters there at the end of semester one in the Shelbyville High School, provided in each situation no undue influence is attached to the case.

CAMDEN-CUTLER

There were some difficulties connected with a basketball game between Camden and Cutler at Cutler on December 23, 1938. Letters from Principal Hunt of Camden, Principal Woodard of Cutler, Referee

Puett of Logansport and Umpire Medbourn of Logansport were presented by the Commissioner. The correspondence shows that (1) Principal Hunt apologized to Referee Puett and Umpire Medbourn; (2) Umpire Medbourn apologized to Principal Hunt; (3) Tom Price, a spectator, paid the doctor's bill of \$3.00 for services to Referee Puett, and (4) Referee Puett is satisfied with the settlement.

Decision—The Camden High School placed on probation in the I. H. S. A. A. until June 1, 1939 for the improper conduct of Principal Robert Hunt toward the officials from the sidelines during the game. Umpire Sam Medbourn of Logansport placed on probation as an official in the I. H. S. A. A. until June 1, 1939 for his improper language directed to Principal Hunt.

SWIMMING MEET

It was decided to accept the invitation extended by Principal Pointer of South Bend to hold the State Swimming Meet under his auspices Saturday, February 25, 1939, with the following understandings:

(1) The Center School, Mr. Pointer, Principal, to provide the pool, equipment, accommodations, officials and medals.

(2) The I. H. S. A. A. to pay each visiting school one dollar for each actual participant and the faculty manager within a radius of 80 miles of South Bend; and to pay each visiting school two dollars and fifty cents for each actual participant and the faculty manager outside a radius of 80 miles of South Bend.

(3) The schools in South Bend to receive no money from the I. H. S. A. A.

(4) The Center Principal to secure, check and send to the Commissioner soon after the meet a certified statement so that each school may be paid.

WRESTLING MEET

It was decided to hold the State Wrestling Meet Friday and Saturday, February 24 and 25, under the auspices of Indiana University, Z. A. Clevenger, Director of Athletics, the understandings to be the same as for the Swimming Meet.

CONTRACT OF COMMISSIONER

The Board Members and the Commissioner signed an Agreement in duplicate confirming the agreement and arrangement entered into between the Board of Control and the Commissioner as included in the minutes of the Board of Control as of December 17, 1938, covering the continuance of the services of the Commissioner.

EVANSVILLE

Principal Johnson of Spurgeon, under date of December 5, 1938, wrote that John B. Sadler of Evansville failed to appear to officiate a contracted game at Spurgeon November 18, 1938. The Commissioner wrote to Referee Sadler on December 7, 1938, December 20,

1938 and January 6, 1939 but received no answer at all although the letters were not returned.

Decision—John B. Sadler, giving his address as Evansville, disbarred as an approved official in the I. H. S. A. A. for his non-appearance at Spurgeon for a contracted game and for his non-cooperation with the I. H. S. A. A.

BROADCASTING

The request of Director Herbert Flaig of WLW, Cincinnati, Ohio, to do one or two fifteen minute programs on the day of the Final Basketball Tournament, playing up the highlights and the human interest side of the event, was carefully considered and it was decided that such would not comply with the Rules and Regulations adopted for the broadcasting of Tourneys in Indiana by the I. H. S. A. A. and the Radio Stations in Indiana.

STATE TOURNEY DATES

It was decided that the sectional tourney dates should be the days corresponding to the first week end in March of each year. This means February 29 and March 1 and 2, 1940, and February 27 and 28 and March 1, 1941.

The correspondence on Girls' Athletics was read and the letter of the Commissioner was affirmed.

LA CROSSE-TWELVE MILE

LaMoin Eurit entered the LaCrosse High School Wednesday, January 18. The parents moved to LaCrosse on Thursday, January 19. The Coach and three students of the LaCrosse High School drove to Twelve Mile Tuesday, January 17, and LaMoin returned to LaCrosse with them.

Decision—LaMoin Eurit considered just as eligible for athletics in LaCrosse as he was in Twelve Mile, provided no undue influence is attached to the case. The trip of Coach Thompson and the three students to Twelve Mile and the return of LaMoin Eurit to LaCrosse with them considered irregular.

CHAMBER OF COMMERCE

Membership in the Indianapolis Chamber of Commerce was carefully considered and the Commissioner was instructed to check this matter carefully then act on his findings or report to the Board of Control, if considered necessary.

MEETING DATES

The Board decided to meet on the following dates:

1. February 24, 1939—10:00 A. M., I. H. S. A. A. office.

2. March 25, 1939—Immediately after the afternoon session of the Final Tourney in the office at Gate 6, Butler Field House.

WEST POINT

This case concerned the playing of Ray Van Schepen when ineligible during semester one of the present school year. The letter of the Commissioner to Principal Neidigh affirmed.

CLEVELAND, OHIO, RELAYS

The Commissioner was authorized to withhold approval of the Indoor Relay Carnival on February 22 for Indiana High Schools.

The matter of inviting the donor of the Gimbel Prize to attend the Final Tourney at the expense of the I. H. S. A. A. was discussed, but

it was decided that this would not be done this year.

Senate Bill No. 68, now in the hands of the Education Committee, was discussed at length. It was decided to continue to watch this Bill and other similar Bills, if introduced, carefully and to continue to get in touch with Senators and Representatives. The Commissioner was instructed and authorized to call a meeting of the Board of Control or the Athletic Council by consulting with the respective Presidents in order to confer on any legislative matters concerning the I. H. S. A. A.

TOURNEY OFFICIALS

Careful consideration was given to the applications, recommendations, records, etc., of officials. A list of Regular and Reserve officials for the sectional, regional and semi-final tourneys was made and the Commissioner was authorized to send contracts to these officials. Each Board Member was requested to send to the Commissioner his suggestions regarding the assignment of officials next week. The Board adjourned to meet at ten o'clock February 24, 1939.

I. H. S. A. A. BOARD OF CONTROL MEETING

Indianapolis, Indiana, January 26, 1939.

Present: President G. Warren Phillips, Eugene O. Higgins, C. D. Manhart, John M. French and Commissioner Arthur L. Trester.

This meeting was called primarily to attend a hearing before the Senate Education Committee regarding Senate Bill No. 68 (Webb), a bill for an Act creating a state board of athletic control. An appearance before this Committee was made by the Board Members and the Commissioner. Facts, figures and information were given regarding the I. H. S. A. A.—its organization, constitution, method of legislation, management, finances, financial reports, tourney arrangements and tourney contracts and election of officers. Any and all questions asked were answered. The I. H. S. A. A. representation received a courteous reception from Chairman Arnold and the Senators present.

The Commissioner was instructed and authorized to call a meeting of the Board of Control in connection with any bills that may be presented in either House having to do with the I. H. S. A. A. It was the opinion of the Board that school officials and others should continue to be concerned about present bills in the Senate and House, and also to watch for future bills having an effect on the I. H. S. A. A.

It was decided that the Board of Control members at their discretion could attend the meeting of the National Federation in Cleveland on Monday, February 27, 1939, with legitimate expenses in attending such meeting to be paid out of I. H. S. A. A. funds.

Indianapolis, Indiana, February 24, 1939.

Present: J. L. Tierney, Eugene O. Higgins, C. D. Manhart, John M. French and Commissioner Arthur L. Trester.

Mr. Higgins was elected Chairman in the absence of President Phillips.

BASKETBALL TOURNEYS

Arrangements for the championship basketball series of tourneys were completed. The assignment of schools to centers and the assignment of officials to tourneys were made. The drawings of the sectional, regional, semi-final and final tourneys were made in the presence of representatives of the Associated Press, United Press, International News Service, Indianapolis News, Indianapolis Star and Indianapolis Times. The item of trophies and medals for the final tourney was discussed and the Commissioner was authorized to purchase these medals and trophies. The tourney bulletin regulation regarding flash-light pictures was affirmed. The matter of complimentary tickets for the final tourney was considered and the Commissioner was authorized to follow past policies. The hours and time of games in the schedules for the tourneys were affirmed.

PHYSIOLOGICAL EXAMINATION

Dr. Sid Robinson of Indiana University requested the I. H. S. A. A. to assist financially in a study proposed by him, having to do with the comparison of the physiological capacities of a number of men who participated in high school athletics fifteen to twenty years ago with the capacities of non-athletic men of the same ages.

The Board of Control and the Commissioner are in sympathy with investigations and studies having to do with the health and physical fitness of athletic participants but at date are not convinced that the proposed study would be valuable to the I. H. S. A. A. or to athletics in general. Accordingly, the Board is not convinced that the proposed study should receive financial assistance from the I. H. S. A. A.

MORAL TWP. (Fountaintown)

Chester Miller and Lester Miller, twins; exchanged shirts and numbers between halves of a basketball game and played all of the second half without the change being discovered by the Coaches, Officials or Scorer. Principal Harrell and Coach Copple brought the boys to the I. H. S. A. A. office February 12 and presented the situation.

The Commissioner had placed the boys on probation and the Board of Control continued the probation until June 1, 1939.

CASES UNDER CONSIDERATION

The Commissioner reported that considerable correspondence and data were on file regarding several situations but that complete information had not been received. The cases were considered briefly, then postponed to a later meeting.

STINESVILLE-SMITHVILLE

There were some difficulties following a game at Stinesville January 28, 1939. The evidence is clear that James Mobley, a player on the Smithville team, struck Coach Armstrong of Stinesville when the latter was attempting to prevent trouble. Principal Botkin states that Coach Armstrong's intentions were misunderstood by the boy.

Decision—James Mobley declared ineligible for any athletics in high school until June 1, 1939, and his name cancelled on the tourney entry blank.

PRIZES AND AWARDS

The policy of keeping the giving of prizes, awards, gifts, etc., to athletes at a minimum was affirmed.

MODIFIED MEMBERSHIP

A request that ten complimentary tickets be given to the members of a team belonging to a school holding a modified membership and hence ineligible to participate in a sectional tourney was considered.

The Board decided that schools holding modified memberships are not entitled to any complimentary tickets to any sectional, regional, semi-final or final tourneys.

GIMBEL MEDAL WINNERS

A request that complimentary tickets be granted to such Gimble Prize winners as desire to attend the final tourney was considered. The Board affirmed the long-standing policy in the I. H. S. A. A. that it had no authority to grant complimentary tickets to special groups.

INSURANCE

The continuance of a Larceny and Embezzlement Bond in the amount of \$80,000.00, covering Commissioner Arthur L. Trester, was authorized.

I. H. S. A. A. BOARD OF CONTROL MEETING

GIMBEL PRIZE SELECTION

Nominations were made for boys to be considered in the selection of the winner of the Gimbel Prize. After careful consideration and discussion, the Board unanimously selected James Myers of Bosse High School, Evansville, as the winner of the Gimbel Prize for Mental Attitude given in connection with the State Final Basketball Tourney in 1939.

PRIZES, GIFTS, ETC.

This topic was discussed at length. The Commissioner was instructed and authorized to give opinions according to the following regulations:

- (1) A suitable and reasonable gift, properly inscribed, may be given to the Coach and to each of the ten members of the championship basketball team in 1939, provided such are given by and with the consent of the Principal and school officials concerned.
- (2) The regulation in the Tourney Bulletin for sectional, regional and semi-final tourneys and reading as follows, "Prizes—No prizes of any kind are to be awarded to any school or individual from any source" applies to players, teams and schools requesting that trophies, medals, gifts, etc., be permitted to be given to tourney players or tourney winners.
- (3) The Sections and Articles in the Constitution regarding Prizes and Awards for players and Coaches are considered binding on Board of Control members as well as on others.

ROCKPORT, LUCE TWP. (Richland), CHRISNEY and GRANDVIEW

It was decided to invite the Principals and Coaches of the Rockport, Luce Township, Chrisney and Grandview High Schools to appear before the Board of Control in the I. H. S. A. A. office, 812 Circle Tower, Indianapolis, at 1:30 o'clock Saturday afternoon, April 8, 1939. This hearing will have to do with the playing of a basketball tourney on February 11, 1939.

LOOGOOTEE-PLAINVILLE

There were some difficulties between these schools during and after a basketball game during the season. Principal C. D. Manhart, an I. H. S. A. A. Board member, was authorized to invite the Principals and Coaches of these two schools to a hearing to be conducted by him at an early date, and to make a complete report to the full membership of the Board of Control at their next meeting.

The Board adjourned to meet at 1:00 o'clock Saturday morning, April 8, 1939.

Indianapolis, Indiana, April 8, 1939.

Present: President G. Warren Phillips, J. L. Tierney, Eugene O. Higgins, C. D. Manhart, John M. French and Commissioner Arthur L. Trester.

TRACK

Careful consideration was given to the following points with the decisions as indicated for the 1939 meets:

1. Scheme. Arrange 15 or 16 sectional meets and a final meet as last year. It was found that distances and scarcity of track teams in some parts of the state, together with large numbers of

teams in other parts of the state, prevented satisfactory arrangements for semi-final meets.

- 2. Centers. The Commissioner was authorized to secure and accept suitable invitations for the sectional meets. The facilities and accommodations at Butler University and Technical High School were compared and discussed, and it was decided to hold the final meet at Technical High School.
- 3. Admission. Use arrangement of last year for sectionals and charge 25 cents for final meet.
- 4. Expenses. Change entertainment provisions of last year by increasing lodging amount to \$1.50 per person and price of meals to 60 cents. Schools within the 50-mile area will receive one meal over last year's allowance.
- 5. Inner Grounds (Final Meet)—Rule 16 of the 1939 N. C. A. A. Track and Field Rules shall govern.

6. Relay Racing

- a. Starting lanes shall be reversed according to Official Rules in the Mile Relay in the sectional and final meets.
- b. Starting lanes shall not be reversed in the Half-Mile Relay in the sectional and final meets.

GOLF

The facilities and accommodations of the Speedway Golf Course were compared with some City courses in Indianapolis. It was decided to use the Speedway Course.

LOOGOOTEE-PLAINVILLE

This case concerned some difficulties following a basketball game at Loogootee February 17, 1939. On February 27th the Commissioner wrote to the Principals as follows: "Both schools are being considered on probation until the case is finally decided by the Board of Control." On March 25th the Board instructed Principal Manhart, a board member, to hold a hearing in this case and report to the full Board of Control. Principal Manhart held the hearing at Petersburg on March 31st and made a report to the full Board. Principal Young, Superintendent Haigerty, Coach Costello, teacher Jones, Principal Lowe, Coach Johnson, Professor Johnson and Scorer Bennington attended the hearing.

Decision.—The probationary period for the Plainville High School terminated. The probationary period for the Loogootee High School continued to January 1, 1940 due to lack of proper arrangements and mismanagement of the game and crowd.

ROCKPORT, CHRISNEY, GRANDVIEW and LUCE TOWNSHIP

These schools played a second team basketball tournament at Rockport February 11, 1939. Principals Hendrickson, Harris, Pruitt and Rue; and Coaches TeVault, Wilhelmus, Thrasher and Amy were present at the hearing. Each of these men reported that he was

either ignorant of the I. H. S. A. A. rule or he had forgotten it. They testified that they did not intend to violate the rule.

Decision—Rockport, Chrisney, Grandview and Luce Township High Schools placed on probation in the I. H. S. A. A. until April 1, 1940 for violation of the rule regarding the playing of tourneys out of season.

BASKETBALL TOURNEYS

The Commissioner submitted a detailed report covering the tickets and finances of the Final Tourney and a detailed report covering the food concession for the Final Tourney. These reports were considered correct and approved by the Board of Control.

Some consideration was given to the sectional, regional and semifinal reports, but lack of time prevented complete consideration which was postponed to next meeting.

Some injury cases were considered. The Commissioner was instructed to present them to the Insurance Company for settlement and to make settlement out of I. H. S. A. A. funds if the cases are not covered by insurance.

FRANKLIN

Dan Cravens enrolled on the last day of semester one for the second semester of the school year 1938-1939, then left for Florida. He remained in Florida five weeks, did school work under a private tutor, played in two invitational golf tournaments, then returned to Franklin. Principal Garrison requested information about the eligibility status of this boy for golf.

Decision—Dan Cravens considered ineligible for golf this present semester due to his participation in the two invitational golf tournaments and also due to the fact that he was not a member in attendance of the Franklin High School for the first twenty days of semester two of the present school year.

HAMMOND (Clark)

Wilbur Buerckholtz accepted an invitation to take a trip to St. Petersburg, Florida, as a guest of the St. Louis Cardinal Baseball Team. He was absent from school eight days and worked out with the Cardinal Team. Principal Miller says that his expenses were paid by the Cardinals in this manner, "He went from Hammond to St. Louis by automobile with Mr. Finch, a Cardinal employee. He was given a railroad ticket to St. Petersburg and return to Chicago by the Cardinal management. His meals and hotel expenses were paid by the Cardinal management." . . . "The purpose of the trip was to establish the probability of Wilbur being of sufficient calibre to take up professional baseball as a career."

Decision—Wilbur Buerckholtz considered ineligible for high school athletics due to his activities in connection with the Cardinal Professional Baseball management and also due to the obligations, verbal, written or implied, in these activities. The I. H. S. A. A. rules and regulations consider that a high school student belongs

to his high school in athletics but that he severs this relationship when he places his loyalty elsewhere. This boy was advised by his Principal before he went to St. Petersburg that there might be a question of his eligibility.

RULE BOOKS

The Commissioner was authorized to purchase 1,000 early copies of the 1939-1940 Official Rules in Basketball and distribute them among the member schools.

Discussion was given to several miscellaneous topics and the meeting adjourned to meet at 10:00 o'clock Saturday morning, April 22, 1939.

PROPOSED AMENDMENTS

It was decided that the Board of Control would propose the following amendments for the consideration of the Athletic Council at their next meeting:

- 1. Add to Section 10, Article VIII the following:
- (a) "No athletic contest shall be held with any high school of another state that is not a member of its state high school athletic association if eligible for membership therein."
- (b) "No athletic contest shall be held with any high school of any state other than Illinois, Ohio, Michigan and Kentucky, the states contiguous to Indiana."
- 2. Section 3, (e), Article VIII be dropped from the Constitution.
- 3. Necessary changes in the sections of Article XII in order that a part or all of the surplus of \$100,000 in the I. H. S. A. A. may be divided among the schools by the Board of Control.

BASKETBALL

The tourney scheme, dates, reports (financial, officiating and general), clinics, type of ball, etc., were carefully considered with the following actions:

- 1. Decision of January 21 regarding dates for sectional tourneys, February 29, March 1 and 2, 1940 and February 27 and 28 and March 1, 1940, affirmed.
- 2. Reports approved.
- 3. Purchase according to long-standing policy of Government Securities in the amounts of \$10,000 on March 22, 1939, and \$15,000 on April 6, 1939, by the Commissioner at the market price approved.

- 4. Financial report by Ernst and Ernst for year ending November 14, 1938, considered approximate budget for ensuing year as all items of receipts and expenditures are listed.
- 5. The molded type of basketball, tanned in leather color, shall be considered official for all I. H. S. A. A. Tourneys in 1939-1940.

SECTION 6, ARTICLE VIII

Several cases coming under the participation of students, particularly Seniors, after the basketball season had closed in their high schools, were considered. The correspondence shows that these students were informed and warned by their Principals prior to the close of the season about the I. H. S. A. A. rule, but that they participated because they considered themselves through with high school athletics.

It was decided to continue to hold Principals for the extension of information and warnings to all students prior to the close of the season, and to cover this whole matter in Bulletin No. I, 1939-1940 with a definite warning that probation or expulsion of schools will be the penalties given for violations.

State Clinic

The purpose and details of holding a general clinic on basketball rules sometime during the last two weeks in September, 1939, were discussed. It was considered advisable to invite representatives from the several voluntary associations of officials and the coaches' association to meet with the Board of Control and President of the Athletic Council with a view to establishing definite attitudes, practices and interpretations regarding the basketball rules for the high schools of the state to be extended in public meetings to the several associations of officials, coaches, and schools afterwards. It was decided to withhold publicity until the plans were perfected.

Discussion was given to the formation of a legislative organization in the I. H. S. A. A. membership so that immediately reactions could be secured regarding any bills that may be introduced in the State Legislature affecting the I. H. S. A. A., and it was thought that the present discussion groups among the High School Principals could be utilized to excellent advantage.

The Board instructed the Commissioner to attend at his discretion the N. E. A. convention in San Francisco next summer at the expense of the I. H. S. A. A. and ordered him to take an additional vacation of two weeks next summer. The commissioner reporting the illness of Miss Lucille Rector, secretary, and he was authorized to pay her regular salary for a reasonable time of absence, while getting well enough to return to work.

German Township (Marshall Co.)—Bremen, located in German Township, will abandon its high school at the end of the present year and will be turned over to German Township which is completing a new high school building. The High School students from Bremen and the high school students from German Township, who

have been transferred outside of the township will be required to attend the German Township High School next fall.

Decision—The Bremen High School students and the high school students whose parents live in German Township may be considered eligible for athletics in the new German Township High School under the change of high school rule, even if they have been transferred elsewhere in the past, provided they enter the new German Township High School at the beginning of school next fall.

The Board adjourned to meet at 12:00 o'clock Saturday, May 20, at the Technical High School, Indianapolis, cafeteria or at 10:00 o'clock on the same day in the I. H. S. A. A. office upon call of the Commissioner.

HAMMOND

Tom Clintis was present during the practice of the "Sons of Pericles" Basketball Team in Gary after the basketball season had closed in the Hammond High School. Manager Peter Chappas and the six other boys present at this practice filed affidavits that Tom Clintis did shoot baskets, but that he did not take part in any scrimmage and did not play in any game with this team.

Decision—The connection and the activity of Tom Clintis with the "Sons of Pericles" Basketball Team considered irregular and not in keeping with the spirit of the rules and regulations of the I. H. S. A. A., but was not considered a direct violation of the I. H. S. A. A. rule preventing actual basketball playing after the season had closed in his High School.

BASKETBALL CLINIC

It was decided to hold a State Basketball Rules Clinic Saturday and Sunday morning, if necessary, September 23 and 24, 1939, in Indianapolis. The Commissioner was authorized to employ Editor Oswald Tower of the Rules Committee to be the instructor in this Clinic, and to pay him \$125 for his services.

BASEBALL PLAYING

A letter by Vice-President Branch Rickey of the St. Louis National Baseball Club regarding Wilbur Buerckholtz of Clark High School, Hammond, was read and the letter by the Commissioner, in reply, to the effect that the I. H. S. A. A. believes that representatives of professional baseball clubs should not approach high school boys for pro-

fessional base ball, until these boys graduate from high school was sanctioned.

Wilbur Buerckholtz received a trip from Hammond to St. Louis, and then to St. Petersburg, Florida with expenses paid, to try out as a baseball player this spring with the St. Louis National Baseball Club.

GAME AUSPICES

The long-standing policy of requiring all athletic games, meets, contests, etc., to be held under the direct supervision of the I. H. S. A. A. or the high schools concerned, was affirmed. The immediate occasion for confirming this policy was the request for information from Michigan to permit I. H. S. A. A. students to participate in a relay carnival at Western State Teachers' College in 1940.

The Board of Control adjourned to meet at 10:00 o'clock Wednes-

day morning June 7, 1939.

STATE BASKETBALL CLINIC

The following arrangements were made for a State Basketball Clinic to be held in Indianapolis, Saturday, September 23, 1939, with Editor Oswald Tower as discussion leader:

- 1. Sessions Saturday morning and Saturday afternoon, and a session Sunday morning if necessary, the Saturday morning session to begin at 9:30 o'clock.
- 2. Representatives to be selected from the several voluntary officials' associations, the Athletic Council and the Coaches in the state.
- 3. Expenses of representatives to be paid as follows: Transportation four (4) cents a mile for the round trip, the noon meal on Saturday, and two (2) cents additional for the round trip if a Sunday morning session is held.
- 4. Discussions to be based on Official Rules and Official Play Situations.
- 5. The follow-up procedure shall include dissemination of results of clinic by representatives present with the payment of necessary expenses by the I. H. S. A. A.
- 6. The Commissioner was instructed and authorized to complete the detailed arrangements for the Clinic.

OUT-OF-SEASON PARTICIPATION

This whole topic and the rules and regulations of the I. H. S. A. A. were carefully considered. The rules, regulations and policies of the

Association were affirmed and the Commissioner was instructed to include an article covering this whole matter in Bulletin No. 1 for 1939-1940, with a statement that students and schools would be penalized for violations.

MODIFIED MEMBERSHIPS

Careful consideration was given to this topic and it was the unanimous opinion of the Board of Control that a school holding a modified membership in the I. H. S. A. A. is bound by all of the rules and regulations in the I. H. S. A. A. the same as a school holding a full membership.

AMENDMENT RESOLUTIONS

The Board of Control decided to present to the Athletic Council at their next meeting not only the amendments listed in the minutes of April 22, 1939, but also the following amendments:

- 1. Change of sections in Article XII having to do with the establishment of a surplus so that additional distributions may be made by the Board of Control.
- 2. Change of part "K", Section 3, Article III so that the Board may employ a Commissioner for a term not to exceed five years.

BASKETBALL TOURNEY SCHEME

By unanimous decision, after careful consideration of the correspondence on file and the results, financial, educational and otherwise, of the several tourneys in the State Championship Series in past years, the Board of Control decided on the following dates for the tourneys in 1939-1940:

Sectional—February 29, March 1 and 2.

Regional—March 9. Semi-final—March 16.

Final-March 23.

Carefully worded statements regarding this scheme were agreed upon as being correct and explanatory, and the Commissioner was instructed to include these in Bulletin No. 1, 1939-1940.

BASKETBALL REGULATIONS

It being understood that the Officials Rules will carry a provision that "the distance from face of backboard to end line has been made four feet, with proper allowance on courts where this distance is impossible", the Board affirmed the following regulation made by a former Board of Control, August 20, 1938:

"This provision may be used in single games by mutual consent prior to the game, but will not be used in I. H. S. A. A. tourneys."

The Board of Control also affirmed a regulation made by a former Board, August 20, 1938, regarding baskets other than the regular type of baskets reading:

"This provision may be used in single games by mutual consent prior to the game, but will not be used in I. H. S. A. A. tourneys."

TRACK AND GOLF

The Commissioner submitted reports and information about these meets. The Board of Control checked and passed as correct all reports, financial and otherwise.

The Board adjourned to meet at 10 o'clock Saturday morning, August 26, 1939, upon call of the Commissioner, provided there is work for the Board to do at that time.

PLAINVILLE

Principal Lowe had reported to the Commissioner on August 18th that he had used James Miller last school year in softball and basketball games. Mr. Lowe and the boy, upon invitation, appeared before the Board of Control. This boy attended the Washington High School during the school year 1937-1838, living with Mr. Roy Mendenhall in Washington. The step-father lived in Washington then and since. James lived with an aunt in Plainville last year and changed high schools without any change of residence to Plainville of anyone with whom he had been living.

Decision-1. James Miller, a Junior last year, considered ineligible for any athletics during his Senior year because he participated last year when he was ineligible under the change

of high school rule.

2. Plainville High School placed on probation in the I. H. S. A. A. until June 1, 1940, due to the failure of Principal Lowe to check carefully and to ascertain accurately the eligibility status of the boy, James Miller, who entered his high school from another high school.

3. Principal Lowe required to take the following steps at an

early date:

(a) Send an explanatory letter, containing a copy of the minutes of the Board of Control covering this case, to each of the Principals of the schools against whose teams James Miller participated in athletic games last school year and forfeit the games won by Plainville High School.

(b) Send a copy of his letters, as specified above, to the

I. H. S. A. A. office.

(c) Request the opponent Principals to notify the I. H. S. A. A. office that they are in receipt of such letters as specified

(d) Check with the I. H. S. A. A. office within a short time to find out if all opponent schools have notified the I. H. S. A. A. as requested.

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DATES FOR 1940

The following dates were set:

1. Swimming Meet-February 24. (To be held at Purdue University if satisfactory arrangements can be made).

2. Wrestling Meet-February 24. (To be held at Indiana University if satisfactory arrangements can be made).

3. Golf Tourney—May 18. (Place to be selected later).
4. Track Meet (State)—May 18. (To be held at Technical High School, Indianapolis, if satisfactory arrangements can be made).

AMENDMENT RESOLUTIONS

The Commissioner was instructed to include in the agenda for the next meeting of the Athletic Council the resolutions mentioned in the minutes of the Board of Control for April 22 and June 7. It was also decided to present to the Athletic Council for discussion the topics of membership of colored, private and parochial high schools, and All-Star vs. State Champion games.

BASKETBALL COURT

It was decided that the "Note" under Section 2, Article VIII should apply for courts using end lines 4 feet or any other distance behind the backboards.

BASKETBALL CLINIC

The arrangements for this Clinic on September 23 were discussed and completed.

The Board of Control adjourned to meet as follows:

BASKETBALL RULES CLINIC

The Board Members and the Commissioner attended these meetings and the luncheon. All of the fifteen official representatives were present and participated in the discussions under the chairmanship of Mr. Oswald Tower, Editor and Official Interpreter of the National Rules Committee. The Clinic was considered very successful by all present and plans were made to disseminate the results of the discussions by the official representatives, bulletins and sectional clinics. The Commissioner was authorized to select three of the representatives living near Indianapolis to serve as a special committee in assisting in wording the results of the Clinic.

ALL-STAR AND STATE CHAMPION CONTESTS

Careful consideration was given to this topic and it was decided to present it for discussion to the Athletic Council at their next meeting by presenting the following proposal:

"Participation, directly or indirectly, in the officiating, management, supervision, player selection, coaching or promotion of all-star high school teams, high school championship teams or similar teams in contests in any sport having definite seasons in the I. H. S. A. A. by member schools, by their school officials or by their teachers shall be considered a violation of the spirit and purpose, if not the actual wording, of these rules and regulations, and schools violating the spirit, purpose or wording of these rules and regulations as indicated herein shall jeopardize their standing in the I. H. S. A. A. for such length of time as the I. H. S. A. A. Board of Control deems advisable."

The Commissioner was instructed to secure additional information about the games of football and basketball played during the past summer in which high schools, high school coaches or high school students participated.

GOLF TOURNAMENT

The place for holding this tournament on May 18, 1940, was discussed. President Jackiel Joseph of the Indianapolis Park Board had been invited to the meeting but was unable to be present. Superintendent Sallee of the Park Board was present and extended an invitation to hold the next tournament on the Coffin Golf Course in Indianapolis, the green fees to be \$125.00 for the day.

No action was taken regarding the selection of the place to hold the tournament but Superintendent Sallee was informed that the Board of Control would make a decision after all conditions, invitations and proposals were considered.

OLYMPIC SWIMMING MEET

A request that a small fee for one football game at each high school be made and the amount be turned over to the American Olympic Committee to aid swimming was considered. It was decided that the I. H. S. A. A. should take no action along this line but that each school should be permitted to use its own discretion in this matter.

WEST LAFAYETTE

Clay Whiteaker attended Lafayette High School last year until his father and mother separated. The father and Clay moved to West Lafayette and the boy entered school there February 20, 1939. The mother and another son remained in the old home in Lafayette. A sworn statement by the father, Mr. Fred Whiteaker, to the effect that West Lafayette is his permanent residence, was placed on file.

Decision—Clay Whiteaker may be considered eligible for athletics in the West Lafayette High School, as far as the change

of high schoools is concerned, provided the change of residence of his father to West Lafayette was regular and bona fide in every way. The Board of Control reserves the right to re-open this case if evidence is submitted to prove the change of residence irregular and not bona fide.

WRESTLING TOURNAMENT

The Commissioner reported that arrangements had been completed to hold this tournament at Indiana University, Friday and Saturday, February 23 and 24, 1940, under the auspices and by the permission of the I. H. S. A. A.

SWIMMING MEET

The Commissioner reported that arrangements were being completed to hold this meet at Purdue University, Saturday, February 24, 1940, under the auspices and by the special permission of the I. H. S. A. A.

The meeting adjourned to meet immediately after the next Athletic Council meeting Wednesday evening, October 25, 1939.

EMERSON (Gary)

In checking the track entry blanks last May, it was observed that the date of birth of James Holman was given as April 13, 1918. Principal Spaulding was informed and the boy was considered ineligible. On May 10th Principal Spaulding wrote, "The date, April 13, 1918, seems the right date for the birth of James Holman." The 1937, 1938 and 1939 entry blanks, signed by Principal Spaulding, carry the same date of birth. On May 23rd Principal Spaulding wrote, "His mother assures us . . . that he was actually born in April of 1919. She says that she can secure a birth certificate stating that this date is correct. . " On October 2, 1939 Principal Spaulding wrote that from no source could a birth certificate be secured. Mrs. Holman, under date of September 13, 1939, certifies that the boy was born on April 13, 1919, and that this statement is based on the family Bible record. The records all the way back in the school give the birthday as of 1918. Eleven games of football were forfeited by Principal Spaulding at the request of the Commissioner.

Decision—The date of birth of James Holman considered to be April 13, 1918, as far as the I. H. S. A. A. is concerned, on the basis of the information in the school records of this boy in the grades and high school and on the basis of the certification by

Principal Spaulding for three consecutive years on the track entry blanks for his high school.

FINAL TOURNEY DATE

This topic was discussed and it was decided to present the requests to change the date from Holy Week in 1940 for the consideration of the Athletic Council.

SIX-MAN FOOTBALL

Managing Editor, Franklin M. Reck, of the "American Boy" requested that the I. H. S. A. A. Board of Control select or authorize the selection of players in Indiana high schools for a national honor roll to be published and known as the American Boy's Six-Man Honor Roll. The Commissioner had informed Mr. Reck that the I. H. S. A. A. did not look with favor on such proposals but that his request would be presented to the Board of Control for final action.

The request was carefully considered and the Commissioner was instructed to notify Mr. Reck that it would be a violation of an established policy of the I. H. S. A. A. to grant his request or to sanction his proposal. This I. H. S. A. A. policy is applicable to all high school sports and is not a new one in the Association. The Association itself does not have honor rolls in any sport.

SOUTHPORT

Ed White left the Southport High School last year and arrived at the Cortland High School. Principal Marshall of Cortland writes, "I have inquired about the boy and find that he came here to stay with his grandmother and enrolled here (according to one of the record books of the teachers) January 30, 1939 and withdrew February 3. I do not know why he left and I have no idea why his name was not recorded in the register." Mr. Thompson was Principal at Cortland last year. Principal Leedy of Southport says that Mr. Curtis, Principal last year, advised the boy to remain at Southport last year. The boy returned to Southport and the Commissioner had given his opinion that he is ineligible for one calendar year. A sanction or rejection of this opinion was requested.

Decision—Ed White considered ineligible for any athletics in the Southport High School until he has been enrolled one calendar year following his most recent enrollment therein. The change of high school rule in the I. H. S. A. A. Constitution considered applicable and binding in this case.

METZ

In Steuben County the opening day of school was Friday, September 1. Don Brunkhart, whose parents lived in the Metz school district last year and who live there now, attended Metz last year but attended the Scott Center High School on the opening day

(September 1) this year, then re-enrolled in Metz on Tuesday, September 5 (September 4 being a holiday).

Decision—Don Brunkhart may be considered eligible for athletics in the Metz High School, as far as the enrollment activities he entered into at Scott Center High School on Friday, September 1, known as organization day on which no class room instruction was given in that high school are concerned.

PAOLI

Philip Holaday is reported to be the adopted son of Mrs. R. L. Holaday, the grandmother. Last year the boy and his grandmother lived with the mother of the boy at Jeffersonville, the boy attending school there. Principal Anna Maris of Paoli writes, "At the beginning of school Philip entered school here and is staying in the home of a class-mate." Mrs. Holaday is a nurse and is now employed in Jeffersonville. She returned to Paoli last summer and remained there until September 18. The boy visited in Jeffersonville and spent some time in camp last summer.

Decision—Philip Holaday may be considered just as eligible for athletics in the Paoli High School as he would have been had he remained in the Jeffersonville High School, provided there is no undue influence connected with the case in any way by any persons in school or out of school.

BLOOMINGTON

Principal Simon, President of the Secondary School Principals' Section of the State Teachers' Association, requested the Board of Control to assist in the payment of the expenses of their annual meeting. The Commissioner was instructed and authorized to honor this request in an amount not to exceed fifty dollars (\$50.00).

SPEEDWAY CITY

Victor Tremor and family lived at Morristown for several years and his sons, Charles and James, attended school there. In June, 1938, Mr. Tremor, a surgeon, was transferred to the government hospital in West Virginia. The sons attended the Morristown High School in 1938-1939. In June, 1939, Mr. Tremor was attached to the Veterans' Hospital in Indianapolis and moved to Speedway City. The sons entered the Speedway High School at the beginning of semester one, 1939-1940.

Decision—Charles and James Tremor may be considered just as eligible for athletics in the Speedway City High School as they would have been had they remained in the Morristown High School, provided no undue influence is attached to the cases in any way by any person in school or out of school.

DECATUR

Leo Powierzza, known also as Leo Powers, is a ward of the Allen County Welfare Board. He attended the Libbey High School in

Toledo, Ohio, last year. The Welfare Board placed this boy in the home of his sister, Jeanette Gephart, a resident of Decatur, last summer and the boy enrolled in the Decatur High School at the beginning of semester one last fall. Letters are on file signed by the sister of the boy, Jeanette Gephart, and by Ora R. Kuhlman, Director of Public Welfare of Allen County.

Decision—Leo Powierzza, known also as Leo Powers, may be considered just as eligible for athletics in the Decatur High School as he would have been had he remained in his former high school, provided no undue influence is attached to the case in any way by any persons in school or out of school.

BLUFFTON

The Commissioner was instructed to invite Principal Willey of Bluffton to attend the next Board of Control meeting to give information and explanations regarding a "scrimmage" in football last summer between his high school football team and a team of alumni players.

The Commissioner reported that Rules Clinics in Basketball were being scheduled and held all over the state by the official representatives of the State Clinic held September 23, 1939, under the Chairmanship of Mr. Tower, Editor of the rules. These sectional Clinics are being attended in large numbers and the whole scheme is receiving much favorable comment.

The Board of Control adjourned to meet at ten o'clock Saturday morning, November 4, 1939.

FINAL TOURNEY DATE

Rev. G. H. Henninger, Rev. S. G. Fisher and Rev. E. Arnold Clegg of Indianapolis, were present upon invitation, and the whole matter of changing the date of the Final Basketball Tourney to some date other than during Holy Week was discussed. The Board of Control presented the difficulties in the way of making a change due to contracts made and schedules already arranged by schools but stated that additional and careful consideration would be given at an early date to the request for a change. The Commissioner was instructed to check with Butler University regarding available dates on which the Field House could be secured, and then report to the Board of Control at their next meeting. All of the correspondence regarding this topic was presented to the Board of Control by the Commissioner.

BLUFFTON

Principal Willey reported the following:

- (1) Eleven boys, graduates of his high school, visited the camp at Epworth Forest on Wednesday, August 30, and participated in a short scrimmage with his high school football team under the direction of Coach Templin.
- (2) This session was conducted with no thought relative to a game but only as an objective demonstration.
- (3) The camp is primarily for boys desiring to be taught and conditioned in football but a number of boys enroll who do not intend to play football.

Decision—Bluffton High School placed on probation in the I. H. S. A. A. until September 1, 1940. The long-standing policy of the I. H. S. A. A. affirmed that a "scrimmage" by high school athletic teams or students with or against athletic teams made up wholly or in part of players not belonging to the high school constitutes a "game."

BASKETBALL TOURNEY ARRANGEMENTS

The Commissioner was authorized to change from six to five the per cent used in the apportionment of tickets to each school for the State Final Tourney if the total enrollment of the high schools in the membership makes it necessary.

It was decided to schedule the games in the regional, semi-final and final tourneys at 1:30, 2:30 and 8:00 P. M.

Other regulations in the Tourney Bulletin for 1939 were sanctioned for 1940 with the exception of tourney centers and assignment of schools, which will be arranged later.

OUT-OF-SEASON GAMES

The Commissioner was instructed to invite to the next meeting of the Board the Principal and Coach of the Frankfort High School, the Principal and Coach of the Elkhart High School and the Principal and Coach of any other high schools that have used high school students in such games.

SILVER CREEK (Sellersburg)

Principal McBride reported that he used Walter Wilkinson in a softball game on Monday afternoon, September 18, 1939, when he was ineligible due to changing high schools from Henryville to Silver Creek without any change of residence of the parents. The boy entered Silver Creek from Henryville on September 18, 1939.

The Commissioner was instructed to invite Principal McBride and Coach Murr and the boy to the next meeting of the Board.

GARY

A letter from President G. Jane Reynolds of the Indiana Association for Health, Physical Education and Recreation, requesting the Board to consider a change in the meeting place of the I. H. S. A. A.

Annual Meeting from Manual Training High School to Technical High School, Indianapolis, was presented and discussed. The Commissioner was instructed to inform Miss Reynolds that the request would be filed for final consideration at the time arrangements were being made for the Annual Meeting next year.

EVANSVILLE

A proposal by Mr. E. B. Miller, writing for Mr. John H. Fendrick, to give a large trophy to the football champion of the city high schools each year, was discussed. The Commissioner presented the correspondence showing that he had stated that, in his opinion, the Board of Control would not approve the proposal. In a formal way the Board of Control decided that approval of the scheme would no be in line with the spirit and purpose of the rules and regulations of the I. H. S. A. A.

The correspondence of the Commissioner regarding several situations and cases was presented for the information of the Board. The Board adjourned to meet at 10:00 o'clock Saturday morning, November 18, 1939.

Indianapolis, Indiana, December 17, 1938.

The reading of the minutes of the last meeting was dispensed with, each member having received a copy of the minutes soon after the last meeting.

It was decided to require thirteen favorable votes to pass motions, and to vote by voice on all questions other than in the elections.

PRIZES, AWARDS AND GIFTS

The sections in the Constitution having to do with these matters were read and the proposal which was postponed at the last meeting of the Council was also read. GIRLS' ATHLETICS

It was decided that the I. H. S. A. A. should continue its authority, supervision and direction of inter-school athletics between and among its members for boys and/or girls, and that it should not change its long-standing policy of assuming no authority, supervision or direction of athletics within the schools. The Athletic Council was unanimous in its belief that the athletic activities desirable for girls and/or boys in the I. H. S. A. A. member schools can be best served under the rules and regulations of the I. H. S. A. A. as they now stand and as they are adjusted and executed by the Board of Control.

ELECTIONS

Members of the Board of Control were elected for the classes indicated below. In each case there was only one nomination, and the unanimous ballot of the Council was voted in each case.

Some discussion was given to the type of basketball to be used in I. H. S. A. A. tourneys and the question was left in the hands of the Board of Control.

The provision passed at the last meeting regarding I, H. S. A. A. membership was reviewed and the following changes in the wording were approved: (1) "Limited Membership" changed to "Modified Membership", (2) "Offer three or four years of work" changed to "offer and maintin three or four years of work."

G. Warren Phillips served as temporary Chairman and the Council selected him to serve as permanent Chairman of the meeting.

The reading of the minutes of the last meeting was dispensed with. It was decided to vote by voice and to require thirteen favorable votes to pass motions.

Instead of filling the vacancies in the Athletic Council, it was voted that the persons elected at the next election should take office upon election.

The following proposals by Principals were considered carefully and actions were taken as indicated:

"A bona fide change of residence by an orphan makes him eligible for athletics." TABLED.

"Our conference unanimously favors a rule in the I. H. S. A. A. prohibiting members of the association from playing non-members of their respective state who do not abide by the rules of the state high school athletic association." TABLED.

"No student, who has been enrolled as a school student in any school district, shall be permitted to participate in any interhigh school contest as a member of another high school until he has been enrolled in such high school for one calendar year." TABLED.

The following proposals by the Board of Control were considered and actions were taken as indicated:

"No athletic contest shall be held with any high school of another state that is not a member in good standing of its state high school athletic association, if eligible for membership. PASSED.

"No athletic contest shall be held with any high school of any outside state other than the states contiguous to Indiana." POST-PONED TO DECEMBER MEETING.

"Drop Section 3, Part (e), Article VIII having to do with records to be made for entering sectional track meets. PASSED.

"Change Part (k), Secton 3, Article III so that the Board of Control may employ a Commissioner for a term not to exceed five years." PASSED.

"Change the Sections in Article XII so that the surplus in the I. H. S. A. A. may be distributed to the schools and so that all I. H. S. A. A money may be handled as a working balance with distributions by the Board of Control of all money above the amounts necessary for administration" THE BOARD OF CONTROL WAS AUTHORIZED TO DISTRIBUTE APPROXIMATELY \$60,000.00 AMONG THE MEMBER SCHOOLS AND TO PLACE THE REMAINDER OF THE SURPLUS IN THE WORKING BALANCE OF THE I. H. S. A. A.

A Committee of Three was authorized by the Council to re-word the Sections now in the Constitution and to word any new Sections necessary to incorporate the meanings of the proposal. President Phillips appointed the following committee: K. V. Ammerman, Chairman, Eugene O. Higgins and J. W. O. Breck.

"Participation, directly or indirectly, in the officiating, management, supervision, player selection, coaching or promotion of all-star high school teams, high school championship teams or similar teams in contests in any sport, having or not having definite seasons in the I. H. S. A. A., unless under the supervision and auspices of the I. H. S. A. A. by member schools, by their school officials or by their teachers, shall be considered a violation of the spirit and purpose, if not the actual wording of these rules and regulations; and schools violating the spirit, purpose or wording of these rules and regulations as indicated herein shall cause their school to be suspended from the I. H. S. A. A. for such length of time as the I. H S. A. A. Board of Control deems advisable. Approved officials shall be suspended for promoting or officiating in such contests." PASSED.

Note: This action shall take effect upon publication in the next I. H. S. A. A. Bulletin.

Consideration and discussion were given to the following topics, and actions were taken as indicated:

Change of date of final Basketball Tourney from Saturday of Holy Week. The Board of Control was requested to hold a conference with some of the persons requesting such a change, then act in a final way on the question.

Membership of Private, Colored and Parochial schools in the I. H. S. A. A. This topic was given careful consideration but no action was taken.

The Council adjourned to meet at 10:00 o'clock December 16, 1939.

CONSTITUTION OF INDIANA HIGH SCHOOL ATHLETIC ASSOCIATION

PREFACE

This printing of the Constitution carries the rules, regulations, interpretations, standards, questions and answers of the I. H. S. A. A. These have been printed in official bulletins through the years and Principals are requested to read and observe the information contained in all I. H. S. A. A. bulletins as they are published. The Constitution as printed in the annual Handbook may not be up-to-date at all times.

The printed constitution together with the questions and answers immediately following the constitution, plus the information in current bulletins, will keep Principals completely and officially informed.

PURPOSE OF I. H. S. A. A.

(Copied from Introduction to first printing of Constitution in 1904.)

"The purpose of this organization is the encouragement and direction of athletics in the high schools of the State. No effort has been made to suppress or even to repress the athletic spirit that is everywhere in evidence in our schools. On the contrary, this organization gives recognition to athletics as an essential factor in the activities of the pupil and seeks only to direct these activities into proper and legitimate channels."

CONSTITUTION OF THE INDIANA HIGH SCHOOL ATHLETIC ASSOCIATION

ARTICLE I

NAME

The name of this association shall be the "Indiana High School Athletic Association." (The abbreviation of this name is understood to be I. H. S. A. A.)

ARTICLE II

MEMBERSHIP

Section 1. Membership in this association shall be limited to the public High Schools of the State and each school shall have one vote.

Section 2. Any public High School in Indiana, offering and maintaining three or four years of High School work, may become a member of this association by subscribing to these rules and regulations and by paying the annual dues of one dollar fifty cents (\$1.50) to the Commissioner on or before January 1 of each year. The Board of Control shall be Judge of all memberships.

Section 3. Limited membership may be extended to colored High Schools desiring to join the I. H. S. A. A. with the understanding that limited memberships shall extend to colored High Schools the privilege of participating in single athletic games and contests with other High Schools belonging to the I. H. S. A. A. but not in meets and tourneys in which more than two teams participate except in meets and tourneys in which only the teams from the High Schools of the same city participate.

Section 4. Modified membership may be extended to any public High School offering and maintaining less than three years of High School work with the understanding that modified membership shall extend the privilege of participating in single athletic games and contests with other schools belonging to the I. H. S. A. A. but not in meets and tourneys in which more than two teams participate except in meets and tourneys in which only the teams from the High Schools of the same city participate.

Section 5. All memberships lapse on January 1 of each year unless the annual dues are paid.

ARTICLE III

ADMINISTRATION AND LEGISLATION

Section 1. I. H. S. A. A. Districts-

For the purpose of administration only, the State shall be divided by counties into the following districts:

First District—Benton, Carroll, Cass, Fulton, Jasper, Lake, La-Porte, Marshall, Newton, Porter, Pulaski, Starke, St. Joseph, Tippecanoe and White.

Second District—Adams, Allen, Blackford, DeKalb, Elkhart, Grant, Howard, Huntington, Kosciusko, LaGrange, Miami, Noble, Steuben, Wabash, Wells and Whitley.

Third District—Boone, Clay, Clinton, Fountain, Hamilton, Hendricks, Marion, Montgomery, Morgan, Owen, Parke, Putnam, Tipton, Vigo, Vermillion and Warren.

Fourth District—Bartholomew, Dearborn, Decatur, Delaware, Fayette, Franklin, Hancock, Henry, Jay, Jefferson, Jennings, Johnson, Madison, Ohio, Randolph, Ripley, Rush, Shelby, Switzerland, Union and Wayne.

Fifth District—Brown, Clark, Crawford, Daviess, Dubois, Floyd, Gibson, Greene, Harrison, Jackson, Knox, Lawrence, Martin, Monroe, Orange, Perry, Pike, Posey, Scott, Spencer, Sullivan, Vanderburg, Warrick and Washington.

Section 2. Athletic Council-

a. For the purposes of election and administration there shall hereafter be five I. H. S. A. A. districts as at present provided, which may from time to time be modified by the authority of the Athletic Council of the I. H. S. A. A.

There shall be five classes of high schools in each I. H. S. A. A. District as follows:

Class I—Schools having enrollments of 76-120. Class III—Schools having enrollments of 76-120. Class IV—Schools having enrollments of 121-250. Class IV—Schools having enrollments of 251-600. Class V—Schools having enrollments of 601 up.

(The determination of the Class of any high school shall be based upon the enrollment reported to the State Board of Education in the last official report requested by that body.)

b. The twenty-five district-class units shall at all times be entitled to representation in the Athletic Council of the I. H. S. A. A. except as hereinafter provided. During the inauguration of this plan there shall be for a few years what shall be known as an "Adjustment Period," during which duplicate memberships in the various classes shall in certain cases necessarily be allowed whenever hold-over memberships from any district or districts shall happen to fall in the same enrollment class or classes. (County Superintendents who are hold-overs shall be considered "members-at-large" from their districts, and not be allocated to any class.)

c. As soon as practicable after the elections of December 10, 1930, the Legislative Body of the I. H. S. A. A. shall provide for special elections to be held as soon as convenient at which there shall be elected a new member of the Athletic Council from each unrepresented class in each I. H. S. A. A. District for terms of such length as will the soonest fit into the scheme on the accompanying table, which is to be considered an integral part of this amendment. These terms may be from one to five years, but they shall in no case exceed five years. When the scheme is in full operation all elective terms for Athletic Council members shall be for five years, or for the remainder of an unexpired term in cases of a vacancy.

d. Vacancies in the Athletic Council shall be filled by the Athletic Council, the appointees to serve until the successors chosen at the next annual election take office. Such persons must be from the same Class and District High School as the member originally chosen.

e. The Athletic Council shall choose a Board of Control of five members from the membership of the Athletic Council. All five classes of high schools shall be represented on the Board of Control, except as hereinafter stated for members who change their high school class after being elected. (During the Adjustment Period the Board of Control shall consist of the present hold-over members, together with such other members as may be necessary to provide representation for all five classes of high schools.) No member of the Board of Control shall serve more than three years, unless re-elected by the Athletic Council. Expiration of membership on the Athletic Council shall automatically terminate membership on the Board of Control. Temporary vacancies on the Board of Control may be filled by the Board of Control from the membership of the Athletic Council, but only until the next meeting of the Athletic Council, when the Athletic Council shall itself choose the successors.

Both the Athletic Council and the Board of Control shall choose its own presiding officer, who may or may not be the same individual. The duties of the Athletic Council shall be the same as provided in the present constitution for the Legislative Body, and the duties of the Board of Control shall remain the same as already provided, except as herein altered.

f. Any eligible person from a high school in good standing in the I. H. S. A. A. may have his name submitted, not later than November 15 of each year, on a nominating petition signed by five high school principals in his district, at least two of whom shall be in his high school class, to the Commissioner of Athletics for election to the Athletic Council from the district in which his school is located. Such person shall be from the class of high school from which the selection is to be made in that particular year. The Commissioner shall send printed ballots listing all such names to all principals of high schools in good standing in that district who constitute the electorate in the said district. The person receiving the largest number of votes shall be declared duly elected by the Board of Control, who shall constitute the canvassing board. In case of a tie, the vote shall be taken again, printed ballots listing only the names of those tied being sent out by the Commissioner, with a return date designated by the Board of Control.

g. Removal from an I. H. S. A. A. district, withdrawal from the teaching profession, resignation, suspension or expulsion of his school, or a lapse in membership of his school in the I. H. S. A. A. shall constitute a vacancy to be filled in the manner hereinbefore provided. A person elected to represent a certain class high school, who changes to a school of a different class or whose school changes from class to class due to a decrease or increase in enrollment, shall continue to serve out his term as long as he remains in his original district.

h. Each year on the third Saturday in December the Athletic Council shall meet to reorganize for the ensuing year. At this meeting there shall be elected members of the Board of Control to fill the places which will be vacated by retiring Board Members on the following January 1. The Athletic Council shall also meet on the evening prior to the Annual Meeting. At this meeting proposals by High School Principals will be acted upon and other business may be transacted.

i. All sections or parts of sections of the present constitution which are in conflict with the present amendment are hereby repealed and declared of no effect.

j. No member of the Athletic Council shall be eligible for a longer term on the Athletic Council than the one he is serving until the expiration of his term.

k. This Athletic Council may amend the Constitution and shall make the rules governing the I. H. S. A. A. Upon written petition signed by twenty (20) High School Principals from each of the five (5) I. H. S. A. A. Districts, the amendments and rules of the Athletic Council shall be subject to a referendum vote of the Principals in the membership.

- 1. The Commissioner of High School Athletics shall serve as secretary of the Athletic Council.
- m. The annual meeting shall be a meeting for the explanation and interpretations of rules and regulations, for inspirational addresses by recognized leaders, for committee reports and for con-
- n. All expenses of the Athletic Council shall be paid out of the I. H. S. A. A. funds.
- o. Minor details in connection with the workings of the Athletic Council shall be handled by the Athletic Council.
 - p. A majority of the members shall constitute a quorum.
- q. After the initial elections all elections shall take place each year between December 1 and December 10, all votes being mailed to the Commissioner on ballots prepared by him.
- r. All newly elected officers shall assume the duties of their office on the first day of January next following their election.

Section 3. Board of Control-

The Board of Control shall have the following powers and duties:

- a. It shall have general control over all athletic contests between and among the members of this association.
- b. It shall have exclusive control of the annual inter-scholastic tourneys and meets.
- c. It shall determine forfeitures as provided for in these rules.
- d. It shall give interpretations of the rules of this association.
- e. It may at the end of the athletic season and at its discretion issue a statement of its official opinion as to the relative standings of
- f. When charges are made in writing by a member of the association against another member for violation of these rules, the Board of Control, after giving due notice of the time and place for the school so charged to be heard, shall consider such charges and may suspend the offending school for a period of not exceeding one year.
- g. The Board of Control shall decide all protests brought before it with reference to qualifications of contestants to meets and tourneys.
- h. When any matter comes before the Board for decision which is of special interest to a school of which a member of the Board is a representative, the remaining members of the Board shall appoint another person to act in his place in that matter.
- i. The Board of Control of the I. H. S. A. A. shall have the power to initiate investigations regarding inter-school athletic activities participated in by the members of this Association and to make and enforce, with such penalties as this board may consider proper. the regulations deemed necessary by this board to make effective the spirit, the purpose and the wording of the provisions of the Indiana High School Athletic Association Constitution and Rules; and further, the said Board of Control shall have power to make and enforce with

such penalties as this Board may consider proper, temporary regulations deemed necessary by this board to handle emergencies and special conditions that may arise in the management of the inter-school athletic activities participated in by members of this Association.

i. The Board of Control shall execute the rules governing the I. H. S. A. A. in the spirit as well as the letter in which they are

made and shall make temporary regulations.

k. The Board of Control shall elect a Commissioner of Athletics at the regular meeting in December, said Commissioner to serve for a period not to exceed five years beginning on the first day of August following, at a salary to be determined by the Board of Control. He shall receive as compensation such sum and such allowance for expenses and clerical help as the Board may approve.

1. The Board of Control shall determine and set out the powers and duties of the Commissioner with the idea of giving the office of Commissioner the powers and duties of a Commissioner of Athletics, whose opinions and actions will be subject to review by the Board of Control upon appeal.

m. Three members of the Board shall constitute a quorum at any meeting.

Section 4. Commissioner of High School Athletics-

- a. The Commissioner shall file with the President of the Board of Control on or before December 1st of each year an estimate of the expense of I. H. S. A. A. for the ensuing year. Such budget to be approved by the Board of Control and become effective on January 1st following for the calendar year. The estimate shall include the following:
 - 1. Salaries of the Commissioner and Stenographer.
 - 2. Extra office help.
 - 3. Traveling expenses of the Commissioner.
 - 4. Office equipment and supplies.
 - 5. Insurance.
 - 6. Printing.
 - 7. Postage.
 - 8. Telephone and Telegraphic expense.
 - 9. Expenses of Board of Control and Athletic Council Members.
- b. Expenditures in excess of the budget shall be subject to the approval of the Board of Control.
- c. The Board of Control shall provide for the annual audit of the books of the I. H. S. A. A.
 - d. It shall be his duty to:
 - 1. Collect all receipts and funds and report same to the treasurer of the Board at the next regular meeting following their collection.
 - 2. Approve officials as provided in Article VI of the Constitution.

- 3. Collect and compile materials for the Annual Hand Book. The same shall be submitted to the Board of Control for approval at the regular meeting in January.
 - 4. He shall issue bulletins as directed by the Board of Control.
- 5. He shall prepare all official forms approved by the Board of Control for the use of the I. H. S. A. A.

6. To recommend to the Board of Control new standards, reg-

ulations and policies for the good of the I. H. S. A. A.

- 7. He shall initiate investigations, conduct hearings, collect information, render decisions and fix penalties based on the evidence, and in accordance with the rules and regulations of the I. H. S. A. A. Such decisions shall be subject to review by the Board of Control on appeal by the principal or principals of the member school or schools involved.
- a. In cases where the suspension of a member is involved the evidence shall be reviewed by the Board of Control before final decision.
- b. It shall be the duty of the Commissioner to keep on file a stenographic record of the evidence in all hearings conducted by the Commissioner. This is to be used by the Board in case of appeal.
- 8. He shall conduct correspondence for the I. H. S. A. A.
- 9. He shall furnish all proper information requested by the National Federation of H. S. A. A. and other State H. S. Athletic Associations.
- 10. Maintain contacts and relations between the I. H. S. A. A. and:
 - (a) State Department of Public Instruction.
 - (b) Colleges, Universities, Normal Schools.
 - (c) High Schools.(d) Service Clubs.
 - (e) Teachers' Associations.
 - (f) Press.
 - (g) Physical Education Groups.
 - (h) Coaches Groups.
 - (i) Junior High Schools.(j) City Superintendents.
 - (k) County Superintendents.
 - (l) Fans.
 - (m) American Legion and similar organizations.
 - (n) Colored Schools.(o) Parochial Schools.
 - (p) Principals of member schools.
- 11. He shall assist I. H. S. A. A. committees in their work by furnishing data and information requested by them.
- 12. He shall make detailed arrangements for all inter-scholastic meets, tourneys and events as directed by the Board of Control.

- 13. It shall be his duty to check all tourney reports and other financial statements, to reconcile discrepancies, if possible, and report the same to the Board.
- 14. He shall prepare and present at each regular meeting of the Board of Control a complete report of the activities of his office since the last preceding meeting of the Board.
- 15. He shall arrange the program and details of the annual meeting of the I. H. S. A. A. He may secure speakers subject to the approval of the Board and he may delegate speakers for athletic meetings elsewhere when requested to do so by school officials.
- 16. To have charge of the property and records of the Association.
- 17. To attend meetings of the Board of Control and serve as secretary.
- 18. He shall include the rules, amendments and regulations of the Athletic Council, as they are passed, in the Constitution of the I. H. S. A. A., harmonizing the related sections in the Constitution with the inclusions.

Section 5. Local Management-

- a. The Principal or his authorized representative shall accompany his team to all contests.
- b. The Principal of the school, or high school teachers authorized by him, shall be manager or managers of the teams representing the school.
 - c. No games shall be played without the sanction of the Principal.
- d. The eligibility of all contestants shall be certified to by the Principal of the school in accordance with the rules hereby adopted. Such statements shall be presented in writing within ten days before any contest. In case of disputes the principal must furnish the Board of Control the following data in regard to each contestant: The date of last enrollment; the number of years he has been a member of a secondary school athletic team; date and place of birth; average mark in each study for the last preceding semester in school; average mark in each study from the beginning of the current term and semester. A school which does not furnish this data shall be denied championship honors, and may be excluded from all games, tourneys and meets.
- e. The Principal has power and is advised to exclude any contestant who, because of bad habits or improper conduct, would not represent his school in a becoming manner.
- f. It is recommended that principals, in arranging for games, provide a forfeit of \$10.00 to be exacted should there be a failure on the part of either party to carry out the arrangements made. Should such forfeitures be stipulated and not be paid during the same season, the Board of Control, after hearing both sides, shall have authority to expel the delinquent school from the association. Notification of such expulsion shall be published in the papers with cause therefor.

ARTICLE V

COACHES

Section 1. Paid Coaches, other than those regularly employed as teachers by the trustees of the school, are prohibited. The expression "Paid Coach" refers to any person who receives, directly or indirectly, remuneration of any kind—money, traveling expenses, gifts, etc., in return for services rendered in instructing or coaching any High School athletic team.

Section 2. No High School shall be permitted to employ a coach or athletic director who receives any extra pay, salary, gifts, trophies, trips or presents from any outside sources.

ARTICLE VI

OFFICIALS

Section 1. The major officials in all inter-contests shall be on the approved list of officials in the I. H. S. A. A.

Section 2. Approval shall be secured by making application to the Board of Control through the Commissioner, and approved officials shall be given approval cards signed by the Commissioner.

Section 3. The Board of Control shall drop from the approved list of officials any persons who are palpably unfair and incompetent in their officiating or who do not serve the ideals and policies of the I. H. S. A. A. Disbarment cards shall be given to such officials and their names shall be published in the Bulletins of the Association.

ARTICLE VII

CONTESTS

Section 1. All inter-school athletic contests shall be subject to the rules of the I. H. S. A. A. and the Board of Control.

Section 2. All games, meets, tourneys and inter-scholastic athletic activities participated in by the High Schools belonging to the I. H. S. A. A. must be held under the direct supervision, management and auspices of the High Schools concerned or under the direct supervision, management and auspices of the I. H. S. A. A.

(Note—This rule applies to games, meets, tourneys and inter-school athletic contests within and without the state.)

ARTICLE VIII

RULES FOR CONTESTS

Section 1. Spalding's Official Football Rules shall govern in football.

Section 2. Spalding's Official Basketball Rules shall govern in basketball.

Note—Rule 1, Section 4 in the Official Basketball Rules for 1933-1934 was changed to read as follows by the Athletic Council on December 16, 1933, and it was voted that the change should go into effect upon information being extended to the Principals:

"The court shall be divided into two parts by extending the diameter of the center circle in both directions until it intersects the side lines; except, that, if the court is less than 80 feet long, it shall be divided by drawing two lines parallel to the end lines, each 40 feet from the farther line. If, however, this would cause these lines to be inside the free throw lines, the court shall be divided by extending the free throw lines until they intersect the side lines. These lines shall be painted in the same color. The line (or lines) described in this section shall be termed the Division Line."

Section 3. Spalding's National Collegiate Athletic Association Track and Field Rules shall govern with the following exceptions:

- (a) Rule 2, regarding a Games Committee shall be void.
- (b) Scoring:

Three places shall be counted in all meets except the state final meet and the places shall count 5, 3 and 1. In the 1924 annual meeting it was voted to score as follows in the state final meet: First, 5 points; second, 4 points; third, 3 points; fourth, 2 points; and fifth, 1 point. Places in the relay races may count for points. In case of a tie in any event the points shall be divided and the place awarded by lot.

(c) Events:

The events in all meets shall be 100 yard dash; 220 yard dash; 440 yard dash; half-mile run; mile run; 120 yard high hurdle; 200 yard low hurdle; running high jump; running broad jump; pole vault; putting 12-lb. shot; mile relay and half-mile relay.

(d) Order of Events:

Track: 100 yard dash trial; 120 yard hurdle trial; 100 yard dash final; one mile run; 440 yard run; 120 yard hurdle final; 220 yard dash trial; 200 yard hurdle trial; half-mile run; 220 yard dash final; 200 yard hurdle final; mile relay; half-mile relay.

Field: Running high jump; shot put; pole vault; running broad jump.

Section 4. Spalding's Official Basketball Rules for Women shall govern girls' games with the following exceptions:

- (a) The three-court plan shall be used unless there is mutual agreement to use the two-court plan.
- (b) Under no conditions may girls play basketball according to boys' rules.

Section 5. Spalding's Official Rules in Baseball shall govern in baseball.

Section 6. No inter-school basketball games shall be played by players or schools prior to November 1 of each year nor after the last evening session of the State Final Tourney. Intra-mural practice and gymnasium work in basketball may be done prior to November 1 and after the final tourney. (The penalty is suspension.)

Section 7. The maximum number of games for the regular schedule of any team or any player in basketball shall be twenty. (The

penalty is suspension.)

Section 8. Teams and players may play in two basketball tourneys in addition to the tourneys of the State Basketball Championship series and in addition to the twenty games on the regular schedule, provided the games in one of these "two tourneys" shall be counted in the twenty games permitted for the regular schedule of a team or player. (The penalty is suspension.)

Section 9. The football season shall close November 30 of each year. The penalty to a school for playing football after November 30 of any year shall be suspension, and the penalty for a student so playing shall be ineligibility for all inter-school athletics until March

1 of the following year.

Section 10. No games shall be played with public High Schools of this State not belonging to this association. This rule does not prevent a member of the association from playing High Schools outside of the State nor from playing non-high school teams within the State, provided all players on the I. H. S. A. A. teams are eligible in every way and also provided there are no public High School students of Indiana on the opposing teams. No athletic contest shall be held with any high school of another state that is not a member in good standing of its State High School Athletic Association, if eligible for membership.

Section 11. All basketball tourneys other than the State Tourneys shall be held prior to February 1 of each year.

Section 12. The I. H. S. A. A. deplores the action of anyone withdrawing a team from an athletic contest. Such action will jeopardize the standing of the school taking such action in the I. H. S. A. A.

Section 13. A High School shall not be considered eligible to enter a sectional basketball tourney in the I. H. S. A. A. in any year unless the team representing the High School has played eight (8) inter-scholastic games during that season.

Section 14. No games may be played prior to the opening of the school year in the fall.

(Note—This section refers to inter-school games and the opening of school as here used is defined as the first day of regular class room instruction.)

Section 15. Participation, directly or indirectly, in the officiating, management, supervision, player selection, coaching or promotion of all-star high school teams, high school championship teams or similar teams in contests in any sport, having or not having definite seasons in the I. H. S. A. A., unless under the supervision and

auspices of the I. H. S. A. A., by member sschools, by their school officials or by their teachers, shall be considered a violation of the spirit and purpose, if not the actual wording of these rules and regulations; and schools violating the spirit, purpose or wording of these rules and regulations as indicated herein shall cause their school to be suspended from the I. H. S. A. A. for such length of time as the I. H. S. A. A. Board of Control deems advisable. Approved officials shall be suspended for promoting or officiating in such contests.

ARTICLE IX

ELIGIBILITY RULES

Scholarship

Section 1. Each contestant must have and be maintaining for the current semester, a passing grade in each of three or more studies requiring a minimum of fifteen regular High School recitations per week, exclusive of rhetoricals, physical training, military drill and deportment; in his last preceding semester in school he must also have met the same requirements throughout the entire semester.

Interpretation-

The part of Section 1, Article IX, under Scholarship in the I. H. S. A. A. Constitution reading, "—a passing grade in each of three or more studies requiring a minimum of fifteen regular high school recitations per week" is interpreted to mean—"a passing grade in each of three regular high school subjects having a full semester credit value and for which a full semester credit is given." The combination of two subjects, not excluded in this Section in the Constitution, whose total credit value is equal to one full semester credit, may be counted toward eligibility for one and only one of the three regular high school subjects of full semester credit value, provided the two combined subjects remain the same subjects throughout the semester in which they are counted."

Section 2. Students enrolled for the first time must comply with the requirements of the rules, the average standing required for the preceding semester being obtained from the records in the last secondary school attended.

Section 3. Back work may be made up, provided that it is done in accordance with the regular rules of the school and becomes a matter of final record before the opening day of the next semester.

Interpretation-

In each of the studies representing the minimum requirement of work specified above, the following shall govern:
(a) For the current semester the average of the period grades up to the time of certification must be passing; (b) For the current or school grading period the average of the daily or weekly grades must be passing; (c) If the average

of the period grades at the beginning of any grading period is below passing in any study, the pupil is ineligible as far as that study is concerned for the entire grading period.

Enrollment

Section 1. No student, who has been enrolled as a High School student in any High School, shall be permitted to participate in any inter-high school contest as a member of another high school until he has been enrolled in such high school for one calendar year, unless the parents of such student actually change their residence to the second school district. In the latter case, the student will be as eligible as he was in the school from which he withdrew.

Interpretation-

(a) A student enrolled in one High School of a City or School corporation shall not be eligible in another High School of the same city or school corporation until he has been enrolled in the other High School for one calendar year, unless there are definitely marked school districts and his parents actually change their residence to the new school district.

(b) Students finishing the courses offered in high schools maintaining less than four years of High School work

are not bound by this section.

(c) The fact that a transfer has or has not been issued or that the student pays or does not pay his tuition, has no bearing on this section. (See undue influence rule.)

Section 2. No person, who has been enrolled as a student in an institution of college standing, and has done work which may be counted toward a degree in that institution, shall be eligible as a member of any athletic team under I. H. S. A. A. rules in any game with any other team, either within or without the State of Indiana.

Section 3.

(a) Any student, who has been enrolled twenty (20) or more days between September 1 and December 1 for four times, shall be in-

eligible for football.

(b) Any student, who has been enrolled twenty (20) or more days between December 1 and March 1 for four times shall be ineligible for basketball, except a student who entered high school for the first time during the second semester of a school year and who did not participate in any game during this semester, shall not be ineligible for basketball until he has been enrolled thereafter twenty (20) or more days between December 1 and March 1 for four times.

(c) Any student, who has been enrolled twenty (20) or more days between March 1 and June 1 for four times, shall be ineligible for baseball and track, except a student who entered high school for the first time during the second semester of a school year and who did not participate in any game or meet during this second semester shall not be ineligible for baseball and track until he has been enrolled thereafter twenty (20) or more days between March 1 and June 1 for four

times.

Section 4. A student withdrawing permanently from school within the first twenty days of a semester shall not be regarded as having an opportunity to engage in athletics that semester unless he has already played in one or more inter-scholastic games, in which case he shall be regarded as having engaged in athletics for that season.

Section 5. The eligibility rules of this association shall apply to students taking part in all contests, whether with schools inside or

outside of the State of Indiana.

Section 6. In order to be eligible for athletic competition during any semester a student must have entered some public High School within the first twenty school days of the semester in which the contest occurs.

Participation

Section 1. Any student of a High School who participates in an athletic contest as a member of any other similar team the same season, shall be ineligible to compete under these rules for the remainder of that season.

Section 2. A student, who has played in one or more inter-scholastic games in any season shall be regarded as having engaged in

athletics for that season.

Parents and Physicians' Certificates

Section 1. A student who practices for any inter-scholastic football, basketball, track, boxing, wrestling or swimming contest, shall have on file in the Principal's office a certificate of physical fitness and a certificate giving the written consent of the father, mother or guardian for such athletic participation as is specified therein. The physical examination shall be made prior to the first practice during the season of each of the six sports by a regularly licensed physician (M. D.).

Previous to the first practice, the Principal shall certify to the I. H. S. A. A. that the certificates required herein are on file in his office.

Remuneration

Section 1. No High School student shall be eligible to participate in any inter-school contest under the rules of the Indiana High School Athletic Association, if it shall be shown that he or any member of his family is receiving any remuneration, either directly or indirectly, to influence him or his family to reside in a given school district in order to establish eligibility on the team of said school, and any school permitting such participation shall, upon satisfactory evidence, submitted to the State High School Board of Control, be suspended by them from membership in the I. H. S. A. A. for a term of not less than one year. This rule shall not interfere with the right of High School pupils to work during vacation or during out of school hours in order to earn their way through High School. It shall apply to the use of any funds created by gift or by subscription with the intent of offering them or parts of them for the free use of the player or any member of his family as an inducement to get them to change their residence to the district of the said school and to maintain residence therein.

Undue Influence Rule

Section 1. The use of undue influence by any person or persons to secure or to retain a student or to secure or to retain one or both of the parents or guardians of a student as residents, may cause the student to be ineligible for High School athletics for a period subject to the determination of the Board of Control and shall jeopardize the standing of the High School in the I. H. S. A. A.

Post Graduates

Section 1. Post graduates are not eligible but students graduating from regular courses of less than four years in length shall not be deemed post graduates.

Section 2. A student is a post graduate of a High School when he has completed the work required for graduation by that school and has received his diploma provided the school offers four years of work.

Section 3. Students meeting requirements for graduation in three and one-half years in a High School with a regular four-year course shall be eligible to participate in school athletics the last half of the fourth year, provided they meet all other eligibility rules of the I. H. S. A. A.

Age

Section 1. Students shall be ineligible for any athletic competition upon reaching twenty years of age.

Amateurism

Section 1. All contestants in the I. H. S. A. A. must be amateurs. Section 2. Professionalism is defined in the I. H. S. A. A. as accepting remuneration, directly or indirectly, for playing on athletic teams, for officiating in athletic games or for managing athletic teams; or playing, officiating or managing under assumed names. Reasonable meals, lodging and transportation may be accepted, if accepted in service and not in any other way.

Conduct

Section 1. Any student, whose conduct or character is such, in the judgment of the Board of Control, as to reflect discredit upon his High School or upon the I. H. S. A. A., is not eligible.

Married Students

Section 1. Married students shall not be eligible for participation in inter-school athletic competition.

(Note—Students who have been divorced or whose marriages have been annulled are bound by this rule.)

ARTICLE X

Injunction Suits

The Athletic Council deplores the action of any individual or individuals in resorting to court action in seeking redress in High School athletic difficulties in the I. H. S. A. A. and unanimously decides that the Board of Control should secure legal advice and fight such cases through the Supreme Court of Indiana if deemed necessary.

ARTICLE XI

Prizes and Awards

Section 1. Only one sweater, jersey, jacket, blanket or similar article may be given in each sport to a high school student for participation in athletics in high school.

Section 2. The giving and receiving of prizes, awards, gifts and articles shall be kept within reasonable bounds and such as are given or received shall have symbolic value only.

Section 3. The giving and receiving of prizes, awards, gifts and articles shall be done by and with the consent and under the supervision of the high school principals concerned.

ARTICLE XII

Finances

- 1. There shall be the accumulation and establishment of an adequate working balance in the I. H. S. A. A. treasury, this amount to be established and maintained as a guarantee that existing obligations will be met; that expansions in the program of service may be made if thought desirable; and that any emergencies in the future may be solved.
- 2. There shall be a distribution on an equitable basis among the High Schools in the I. H. S. A. A. membership of the amounts accumulated above the adequate working balance and above the amount legitimately necessary for the running expenses of the I. H. S. A. A., these distributions to be made on October 1, 1932, and on October 1 of and for each three-year period thereafter.
- 3. There is granted power and authority to the I. H. S. A. A. Board of Control to make the financial adjustments in contracts for inter-scholastic games, tourneys, meets and athletic contests that are deemed necessary through the years and to administer, execute and control all receipts, expenditures and holding of moneys in connection with the I. H. S. A. A.

Interpretations

- 1. When a contestant, official, game or decision is protested the game should be played as scheduled and the protest with evidence filed with the Board of Control for settlement later.
- 2. Any student who carries at least 15 hours of regular High School work is a High School student, provided such a student has been promoted to High School in the regular way and according to good school procedure.

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- 3. It is recommended that Principals take the proper measures to control the crowd and the players at all contests. Failure to do so shall be considered sufficient reason for suspension from the association.
- 4. A game is an athletic contest entered into by a member of this association with players or teams not belonging to the member.
- 5. As the Principal is the responsible party in High School athletics, it is recommended that he carry on all correspondence with the Board of Control and the Commissioner.
- 6. By passing work is meant work of such character that credit should be entered on the school records were credit given at the time of certification.
- 7. Mutual agreements to violate the rules of this association shall result in suspension of all schools concerned.
- 8. Visiting schools shall be held responsible for the conduct of visitors from their home city regardless of the place of the contest.
- 9. For athletic purposes the record at the end of a semester shall be final. Deficiencies in one semester can not be made up in a subsequent semester for qualification purposes during that semester. An incomplete or condition at the end of a grading period or semester counts as a failure. Back work may be made up and counted toward eligibility during the summer provided it is done and becomes a matter of final record prior to the opening day of the next semester.
- 10. The baseball season is defined as beginning and ending with the school year.
- 11. The Principal of each school or a teacher in his school delegated by him in writing shall represent such school at all meetings of the Association.
- 12. Schools may have as many teams in the same sport as they desire, and all rules apply to all teams and all individuals on all teams.
- 13. A temporary regulation of the I. H. S. A. A. shall be understood to be a regulation having effect until the next meeting of the Athletic Council at which time it will be subject to the disposal of this body.
- 14. A High School that is suspended or expelled from the I. H. S. A. A. shall be considered as not belonging to this Association and subsequent membership in the Association shall be secured, if desired at the termination of the suspension or expulsion, according to the Sections in the Constitution and the rules and regulations governing memberships.
- 15. Students, whose parents change their place of residence during a semester, may complete the semester in the school in which they have been enrolled, then enter the new school in the district in which their parents reside with eligibility in both schools.

Note: The undue influence rule is applicable to the retention of a student as well as to the securing of a student.

QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS REGARDING THE RULES, REGULATIONS, INTERPRETATIONS AND STANDARDS OF I. H. S. A. A.

In order that the rules and regulations of the I. H. S. A. A. may be as clear as possible, it has been thought advisable to print for general distribution these questions and answers. The correspondence of the I. H. S. A. A. has been gone over carefully and has furnished these questions and answers almost entirely. The questions are real ones, as they have been asked by High School principals, coaches, superintendents, teachers and school board members, who are on the firing lines in their respective communities and schools. The answers have been given according to the rules of the association and the interpretations of the several Boards of Control. It is hoped that these statements will clarify our rules and regulations, as well as establish working ideals and policies for the I. H. S. A. A.

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AGE.

1.

O. When is a student ineligible on account of age?

A. A student becomes ineligible for any athletic competition upon reaching twenty years of age.

* *

2.

Q. Is a student eligible for a game if he reaches twenty years of age on the day of the game?

A. No. The day preceding is his last day of eligibility. See No. 1

above

3.

Q. What is considered evidence of age?

A. One or all of the following documents duly authenticated in the order named:

(a) Birth certificate, properly recorded.

(b) Baptismal certificate.

(c) Documentary evidence such as family record of birth in Bible, certificate of arrival in the United States, a passport or a life insurance policy of at least a few years standing.

(d) School records.

(e) Written and signed statement by Superintendent of Schools, public health physician, attending physician, parent or guardian.

4.

Q. How may a birth certificate be secured from the Indiana State records?

A. By writing to Chief, State Bureau of Vital Statistics, Indianapolis, giving complete information in your first letter.

5.

Q. If doubt exists regarding the age of a student should the student be permitted to participate in games pending removal of doubt?

A. No. The doubt must be removed prior to participation.

. . .

Q. What should be done in cases of doubt as to age?

A. Submit all evidence to the Board of Control after a complete investigation as outlined in three above has been made. If a certificate or document can not be secured a signed statement to this effect should be submitted by the proper official.

7.

Q. If, after all available data regarding the age of a student are submitted to the Board of Control, it can not be known definitely about the date of birth of a student, what step is taken?

A. The Board of Control will establish a date on the data submitted, subject to change should convincing evidence to the contrary be found later.

APPROVED OFFICIALS AND RE-REGISTRATION OF OFFICIALS

All approval cards and all re-registration cards issued prior to June 30, 1937 are void. A re-registration began on this date and

Principals should not use officials in games whose names do not appear in the printed lists or who can not show approval certificates issued later than June 30, 1937. Be sure to check all officials carefully and require identification in all doubtful cases. Read approval certificates carefully to know date issued, sports covered, etc.

1.

Q. Who is an approved official in the I. H. S. A. A.?

A. A person who has made application to and received the approval of the Board of Control through its Commissioner.

2.

Q. Must all officials be approved?

A. Yes. The major officials in all sports must be approved.

.

Q. Is it necessary for a licensed teacher to be approved?

A. Yes.

4.

Q. Are officials, who are certified in other states, eligible to officiate in Indiana?

A. No. Not until they have made application to the Commissioner and have been approved in Indiana.

. . .

Q. May a member of a High School team officiate in independent games without jeopardizing his standing?

A. Yes. Provided remuneration is not accepted, directly or indirectly, and provided he does not use an assumed name.

* * * *

6

Q. What is the penalty for using a non-approved official?

A. Suspension of the school usually, but cases are considered individually.

7.

Q. Are approved officials required for girls' games?

A. Yes. Girls are bound by the same rules as boys.

Q. May a member of a High School officiate in inter-High School games?

A. No. A High School student is not eligible for approval as an

official.

9.

Q. Must an official be approved each year?

A. No. Approval is permanent provided the work of the official remains satisfactory and also provided a re-registration is not required. A requirement for re-registration may be made in any year and, if so, will constitute a cancellation of the approval unless re-registration is made.

4.5

Q. Does approval in one sport give the right to officiate in other sports?

A. No. Approval is necessary for each sport,

* * * *

Q. What is the policy of the I. H. S. A. A. toward the decisions of officials?

A. The decisions of officials are considered final and binding.

19

Q. Does the I. H. S. A. A. regulate the pay of officials?

A. The pay of officials in tourneys and meets arranged by the Board of Control is regulated. In single games, the Principals and officials are expected to have contracts agreed upon prior to the games. The Board will adjudicate difficulties according to contracts.

12

Q. When was the approval scheme established in the I. H. S. A. A.?

A. In 1922.

14.

Q. When were approved officials last required to re-register?

A. June 30, 1937.

15.

Q. What is the difference between an approved and a re-registered official?

A. A re-registered official is an approved official who has re-registered with the Association.

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BASKETBALL PLAYING

1.

Q. May students practice basketball before November 1 and after the date of the State Final Basketball Tourney?

A. Yes. Practice in basketball within the school may take place at any time.

Q. Does the twenty-game limitation apply to the first team only? A. No. Any team—first, second, third, etc.—may play twenty (20) games and no more on its regular schedule.

Q. May a student play in more than twenty games of basketball on the regular schedule on different school teams?

A. No. The twenty-game limitation applies to individuals as well as to teams.

Q. In how many tourneys may a team play in addition to the

twenty games permitted on the regular schedule?

A. A team may play in the tourneys of the state basketball championship series, and in two other tourneys, provided the games in one of these "two other tourneys" are counted in the twenty games permitted for the regular schedule. This statement applies to individuals

* * * *

Q. Would a preliminary tourney and a final tourney count as one tourney or two tourneys?

A. Two tourneys.

also.

...

Q. May a High School have a complete schedule for the second

team in any sport?

A. Yes. Each school team can and should be considered a representative team of the High School and, as such, be governed by all of the I. H. S. A. A. rules and privileges.

* * * *

Q. Has the I. H. S. A. A. established the size of a regulation basketball floor?

A. No. But the I. H. S. A. A. strongly recommends 50'x74'. The state tourney floor has been 50'x74' for years.

Q. Is there a limit to the number of players a coach may use in a basketball game?

A. No. Except in games and tourneys arranged and managed by the I. H. S. A. A. Board of Control.

* * *

9.

Q. When does the basketball season end for teams and individuals?
A. The basketball season for all teams and all students ends on the final day of the state final tourney or with the end of the season in the school if prior to the final tourney.

. * * *

10.

Q. May High School players and teams play independent basketball in the interim between the sectional tourneys and the final tourney if the season in the school is closed?

A. No. Such playing would constitute a violation.

* * *

Q. May more than 20 games be played by a team by juggling the players so that no student plays more than 20 games?

A. No. The 20-game requirement holds for teams as well as students.

12.

Q. May an "A team" or "1st" team be designated as a "B" team and thus evade the rule?

A. No. The wording of the rule and the spirit of the rule are clear and binding.

* * *

13.

Q. Are vocational, agricultural and such teams and players bound by the rules and regulations of the I. H. S. A. A.?

A. Yes. All high school teams and players are subject to these rules and regulations.

COACHES

1.

Q. Who may coach a High School team?

A. Qualified teachers, in High School, who are regularly licensed, regularly employed and regularly paid as such by the trustee or school board.

Q. Who is a paid coach?

A. Any person who receives, directly or indirectly, remuneration of any kind—money, traveling expenses, gifts, etc., from outside sources—in return for services rendered in instructing or coaching any High School athletic team. See number one above.

. . .

Q. Are paid coaches permitted in the I. H. S. A. A.?

A. No. Any remuneration received by a coach must come from the school trustee or the school board from public school money and not from other sources.

CONTRACTS.

1.

Q. May a High School cancel a contract for an official or game without making settlement?

A. No. Contracts are binding and a settlement by mutual consent or according to the stipulations of the contract must be made.

. . .

2.

Q. Is there any penalty for the cancellation of a contract by an official?

A. The I. H. S. A. A. expects all approved officials to abide by their contracts and will handle on its merits any case of violation by the school or official.

0

 $\mathbf{Q}.$ If a school team disbands, would the school be responsible for contracts made?

A. Yes.

* * * *

Q. If contracts specify that first teams shall participate, can second teams be used?

A. No. It is recommended that contracts specify the ranking of the teams.

5.

Q. If game contracts do not clearly specify the ranking of the teams what ranking is understood as binding?

A. First team ranking.

Q. How may High School Principals secure blank contracts for games and officials?

A. By writing to the Commissioner.

ENROLLMENT

(See Undue Influence Rule. It Takes Precedence.)

1.

Q. What is a five-year man?

A. Students who have been enrolled in High School for twenty or more days between September 1 and December 1, or between December 1 and March 1 or between March 1 and June 1 for four times are ineligible respectively, for football, basketball and spring athletics, with the following exceptions:

A student who enters High School for the first time at the beginning of semester II of any school year, may be enrolled four times of twenty or more days each between December 1 and March 1 following this first semester of his enrollment, and he may be eligible for basketball for these four seasons provided he does not play in any game during his first semester of enrollment. A student, who enters High School for the first time at the beginning of semester II, may be enrolled four times of twenty or more days each between March 1 and June 1 following this first semester of enrollment, and he may be eligible in spring athletics for these four semesters, provided he does not participate in spring athletics during his first semester of enrollment.

2.

Q. May a student, who has been in High School four full years, but who has not participated in any athletics, participate in athletics?

A. No. Enrollment rather than participation is the determining factor here.

2

Q. Which is the determining factor in eligibility—enrollment or participation?

A. Neither one. Both are factors and must be considered.

4.

Q. If a student changes High Schools, when is he eligible?

A. He is just as eligible in the new school as he was in the old school, provided his parents actually, legitimately and correspondingly change their place of residence to the new school district and provided the student changes high schools at that time. Students, whose parents change their place of residence during a semester, may

complete the semester in the school in which they have been enrolled. If the parents do not actually change their place of residence to the new school district, the students will be eligible after they have been enrolled one calendar year in the new school, provided no undue influence is used by any person to secure them as students or their parents as residents. See "undue influence" rule.

5

Q. What is considered enrollment in a semester?

A. Attendance for any length of time or enrollment that may be considered attendance for any length of time.

* * .

Q. When are students, who finish the work given in one High School, eligible in another High School?

A. Students finishing the work in a High School giving less than four years of High School work are just as eligible in a new High School as they were in the old High School.

O. What is a semester?

A. One-half of a school year constitutes a semester in the I. H. S. A. A., and parts of two semesters or a part of one semester does not make a semester in the I. H. S. A. A.

Q. When is a student eligible in school "A" if he withdraws from school "A," enters school "B" and later returns to school "A," his parents never changing their place of residence from the district of school "A"?

A. When the student has been enrolled one calendar year, following his latest enrollment in "A," provided he is eligible in all other

ways.

* * *

Q. How can a student gain eligibility in a High School upon en-

tering from another High School?

A. By his parents actually, legitimately and correspondingly changing their place of residence to the new High School district or by enrollment for one calendar year.

10.

Q. Does the twenty-day enrollment requirement mean school or calendar days?

A. School days.

11.

Q. If a student fails in all subjects for a semester does this enrollment count as a semester?

A. Yes. Enrollment is enrollment and always counts as such.

15

Q. Is a student, who has been out of High School for a semester or more and who has played independent ball during that time, eligible when he enters school at the beginning of a semester?

A. Yes, unless he violated his amateur standing in some way by playing on the independent team and provided he is eligible in all other ways.

13.

Q. If a student transfers from a private or parochial high school to a public high school in the same city or school district, when is he eligible?

A. When he has been enrolled one calendar year in the new high school.

14.

Q. If a student transfers from a private or parochial high school located in one city or school district to a public high school in another city or school district, how is his eligibility determined?

A. By applying the requirements of the change of high school rule in the I. H. S. A. A. Constitution.

* * * *

15.

Q. Are legal guardians considered as parents in the I. H. S.

A. Legal guardians of some years standing may be considered as parents if the guardianship papers issued by an authorized Court are submitted and approved. The Board of Control reserves the right to check and act on the circumstances of the guardianship.

GAMES

1.

Q. What is considered a game of basketball?

A. A game of any kind in the I. H. S. A. A. is an "inter" contest as distinguished from an "intra" contest. An "inter" scrimmage is a game. An admission fee is no part of a game and has no bearing one way or the other.

2.

Q. May a member school of the I. H. S. A. A. schedule and play single games with teams and schools in Indiana not members of the I. H. S. A. A.?

A. Yes. Provided these teams and schools are not public High Schools and also provided the members of the I. H. S. A. A. observe all of the rules of the I. H. S. A. A.

3.

Q. What is the difference between a preliminary game and a regular game?

A. There is no difference as far as the I. H. S. A. A. is concerned, as the same rules and regulations govern.

* * *

Q. If a "practice" game of basketball is played is it to be counted

as one of the twenty games on the regular schedule?

A. Inter-"practice" games are regular games and must be counted as such. Intra-"practice" games are not counted as regular games. In fact, there are no such things as practice games in the I. H. S. A. A. There are practice games within the school only.

* *

Q. Does the omission of an admission charge make any difference as to the designation of a contest as a game?

A. No. Games are "inter"-contests or "inter"-scrimmages with or without admission charges.

* * * *

Q. Is an alumni game considered a game?

A. Yes. Such must be counted as one of the 20 games permitted

on the regular schedule.

* *

Q. What is considered an "inter" game or an "inter-scrimmage?" A. Any game or inter-scrimmage in which a High School team or players play with or against students or players not belonging to the High School.

* * *

Q. What date marks the end of the football season?

A. November 30 of each year.

* * * *

Q. May a member school of the I. H. S. A. A. schedule and play

single games with high schools of other states?

A. Yes, provided the high schools of these other states, if eligible for membership, are members in good standing in their state high school athletic associations. The Principal is obligated to check this matter carefully.

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GIRLS' ATHLETICS

Q. Are girls, as well as boys, bound by the rules and regulations of the I. H. S. A. A.?

A. Yes. All students on all teams in High Schools belonging to the I. H. S. A. A. are bound by its rules and regulations.

Q. May girls play basketball according to boys' rules?

A. No. Girls must play according to girls' rules by Spalding and the three-court plan shall be used, except as mutually agreed other-

Q. Is the I. H. S. A. A. opposed to inter-school basketball games

and tourneys for girls? A. No, but they are not recommended. Special care should be used, however, in such games and tourneys to know that girls are physically fit at all times.

Q. May men coach girls in athletic games?

A. Yes. It is recommended however that women coaches be employed for girls. This applies to officials also.

Q. May girl's basketball teams play in state tourneys or national tourneys?

A. No.

PARTICIPATION.

Q. May a student play on any team other than a High School

team? A. A student becomes ineligible in High School for the entire season of that sport in which he participates as a member of any team other than the High School team. There is an additional penalty for participation out of season as set out in the rules.

Q. What is considered participation in a sport for a season?

A. Playing in a part of one game in a sport constitutes participation in that sport for that season.

Q. May member schools play against non-public High School, College, Y. M. C. A. and independent teams?

A. Yes, in single games, but not in tourneys, meets and leagues. In single games the member schools must obey all of the rules of the I. H. S. A. A. and there must not be any public High School students on the opposing teams.

PRIZES AND AWARDS

1.

Q. Is a High School permitted to give sweaters to athletes?

A. Yes. The I. H. S. A. A. recommends that the giving of prizes. gifts, sweaters, etc., be kept within reasonable bounds at all times and that such as are given have a symbolic value only. All prizes should be given by the school. No more than one sweater in each major sport may be given to a High School student for participation in High School for the entire four years.

Q. May schools give awards to students for scholarship, sportsmanship and conduct?

A. Yes. Such may be accepted from outside sources if sanctioned and administered by the High School Principal.

Q. What gifts, awards and prizes may athletes receive?

A. The I. H. S. A. A. recommends that the giving of awards, prizes, medals, etc., be kept on a reasonable basis at all times, and that such as are given have a symbolic value only and be given by and with the consent of the school authorities.

When did the sweater rule go into effect?

A. September 1, 1930.

Q. May the sweater rule be evaded by giving coats, jackets or other gifts?

A. No. The Board has decided that this rule should not be evaded in spirit or intent.

1.

Q. What constitutes professionalism in the I. H. S. A. A.?

A. Accepting remuneration, directly or indirectly, for playing on athletic teams, officiating in athletic games or managing athletic teams, or playing, officiating or managing under assumed names. Reasonable meals, lodging and transportation may be accepted, if accepted in service and not in any other way.

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Q. If a student violates his amateur standing in one sport does he become ineligible for all sports?

A. Yes. A professional in one sport is ineligible for all sports.

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Q. Does a student become ineligible in all sports, if he plays on a team other than the High School team in one sport?

A. No. A student becomes ineligible only in the sport in which he participates as a member of a team other than the High School team, unless he violates his amateur standing or some general rule of the association and then he becomes ineligible in all sports. Playing out of season carries a penalty.

4.

Q. Are High School students permitted to play on teams that split the gate receipts among the players including the High School students?

A. No. This would be considered professionalism.

RESPONSIBILITY

1.

Q. Who is the responsible party in I. H. S. A. A. athletics?
A. The High School Principal is the responsible party as far as the I. H. S. A. A. is concerned.

2.

Q. Who is the proper official to sign contracts for games?
A. The High School Principal always. He may delegate this authority, but the Principal will be held responsible for contracts. It is recommended that this authority be not delegated.

3.

Q. Who may manage a High School team?
A. A High School Principal or teacher authorized by him. Student management is not permitted.

* * * *

SCHOLARSHIP

1.

Q. May back work be made up and counted toward eligibility?

A. Yes. Back work cannot be made up, however, during a grading period or semester for eligibility during that grading period or semester. Special privileges should not be granted to athletes. (See Summer School Work.)

2.

Q. Would a student, declared ineligible by one principal, be ineligible under another principal?

A. Yes. If the student is ineligible according to the rules of the I. H. S. A. A. The I. H. S. A. A. has no jurisdiction unless its rules are violated.

3.

Q. May a student, who receives his High School diploma, be eligible afterwards?

A. No. The granting and acceptance of a High School diploma makes a High School graduate.

* * * *

Q. May an ineligible student practice with the regular team?
A. Yes. At home in regular practice, but ineligible students should not appear in athletic suits at games.

5

Q. Does the I. H. S. A. A. have a passing mark for scholarship?
A. No. The passing marks of the schools are usually honored, but the Board of Control reserves the right to check the validity of grades and credits and to act on their findings.

6.

Q. Who is a post-graduate?

A. A post-graduate is a student who has finished his High School work and has received his High School diploma. Students who have completed sufficient work to receive a diploma, but who continue in school until commencement, must be considered eligible or ineligible according to all other rules of eligibility, such as age, time in school, participation, work carried, etc.

Q. What constitutes the last semester in eligibility?

A. The last semester for any student is the last semester in which the student was enrolled in any High School for any length of time.

* * * *

Q. At the end of the second grading period in a semester, is a student eligible if he makes passing grades in three regular High

School subjects for this period?

A. In order to be eligible at the end of any grading period in a semester, a student must have passed in three regular High School subjects for the current grading period and his average grade in each of three regular High School subjects for all of the grading periods in that semester must be passing. A student must MAINTAIN his work in order to be eligible—weekly, by grading periods and by the semester.

9.

Q. Is a "condition" or an "incomplete" considered a "pass" in the I. H. S. A. A.?

A. No. The I. H. S. A. A. considers a "pass" to mean that all work has been done and has been made a matter of final record at the end of the grading period or semester.

10.

Q. Is a student, who carries three regular High School subjects and one or more eighth grade subjects, considered a High School student?

A. Yes. A student who carries fifteen hours of regular High School work is a High School student, provided such a student has been promoted to High School in the regular way and according to good school procedure.

* * * *

Q. Is a student, who has made sufficient credits to graduate at the end of semester one, eligible for athletics during semester two?

A. Yes. Provided he is eligible in all other respects and does not actually graduate at the end of semester one. Such a student must carry regular work during semester two.

12.

Q. Are the same standards of eligibility required for intra-school games as for inter-school games?

A. No. The I. H. S. A. A. has no such requirements, but such are strongly recommended.

Q. Is a student, who has been ineligible for a semester on account of scholarship, eligible for the night of the last day of the semester?

A. Yes. Provided he has passed in three regular High School subjects and his credits have been made a matter of final record in the Principal's office prior to the contest.

14.

Q. What constitutes scholarship eligibility?

A. In order to be eligible for a current semester a student must have passed in three regular High School subjects in his last semester of enrollment in any High School and he must be maintaining a similar amount of work for the current semester. This statement for semesters holds good for grading periods of the semester also.

15.

Q. If a student misses school for a few weeks in order to work

is he eligible during this time and when he returns?

A. This is a school problem and must be answered by the consideration whether regular school work to the extent of fifteen hours is being maintained or not. Usually students who miss school work are not passing in their school work.

16.

Q. If a student becomes ineligible on account of scholarship at the end of a semester, does this make him ineligible for one whole semester afterwards?

A. Yes.

17

Q. If a student becomes ineligible at the end of a grading period

in a semester when can he become eligible?

A. At the end of the next regular grading period in that semester, provided he passes in three regular High School subjects during the period and also provided his average in each subject for all grading periods of the semester are passing in a similar amount of work.

18.

Q. When is a student, who intends to enter High School, eligible?
A. When he actually enters, provided all other requirements have been met.

19.

Q. If a student becomes ineligible on Friday at the end of a grading period is he eligible for that night?

A. No. A student is ineligible whenever he becomes ineligible.

20.

Q. If a student becomes eligible on Friday at the end of a grading period is he eligible for that night?

A. Yes. A student is eligible whenever he becomes eligible.

21.

Q. When is a student maintaining his work during a semester?
A. When he is passing in three regular High School subjects during the current week, the current grading period, the last grading

period and for all grading periods of the semester according to averages.

22.

Q. If a student fails to pass in three regular High School subjects during the last grading period of a semester but passes in three regular High School subjects for the semester, will he be eligible at the beginning of the first grading period of the next semester?

A. Yes, the books are considered closed at the end of the semester.

* * * *

Q. If a student passes in three regular High School subjects during the last grading period of a semester but fails in three regular High School subjects for the semester, will he be eligible at all for the next semester?

A. No, the books are considered closed at the end of the semester.

* * * * 24.

Q. How long may a student be enrolled in a semester then drop out without the semester being counted under the Scholarship Rule?

A. No time at all. Enrollment for any length of time in a semester counts as enrollment for the semester as far as the Scholarship Rule is concerned.

* * *

25.

Q. If a student is passing in three regular high school subjects when he drops out during a semester, may he be considered eligible under the Scholarship Rule at the beginning of his succeeding semester of enrollment?

A. No. Such a student would not meet the requirement of passing in three regular high school subjects throughout his last

semester of enrollment.

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JUNIOR AND SENIOR HIGH SCHOOL TEAMS AND PLAYERS

I. Junior and Senior High School Athletic Regulations

(These regulations were in force prior to the provision made in 1938 by the Athletic Council for modified memberships and they are still in force for schools and school systems having no modified memberships).

1. The Indiana High School Athletic Association covers the students (boys and girls) in the 9th, 10th, 11th and 12th years of school work.

2. The High School Principal in any high school belonging to the I. H. S. A. A. is considered the responsible party in athletics as far as the I. H. S. A A. is concerned.

3. The I. H. S. A. A. considers it the duty and responsibility of the Senior High School Principal or Principals to extend the rules and regulations of the I. H. S. A. A., with such explanations as may be necessary to all Principals in the school system having 9th grade students enrolled and whose schools do not belong to the I. H. S. A. A.

4. A High School student is one who carries at least 15 hours of regular High School work, provided such a student has been promoted to the High School in the regular way and according to good school procedure.

5. The I. H. S. A. A. requests Principals having 9th grade students enrolled to confer and co-operate with the Senior High School Principal or Principals regarding the participation of 9th grade students in inter-school athletics.

6. The I. H. S. A. A. does not attempt to determine or classify Junior High Schools and Senior High Schools. The State Organization is interested in the athletic activities of the 9th, 10th, 11th and 12th year students in inter-school games and contests.

7. A 9th grade student, in whatever type of school enrolled, is subject to the rules and regulations of the I. H. S. A. A. when participating in inter-school athletics.

8. A 9th grade student may participate on the Junior High School team or on the Senior High School team in a sport during the season, but he can not participate on both teams in a sport during the season.

9. A ninth grade student may participate on a team made up of 7th, 8th and 9th grade students, or on a team made up of 8th and 9th grade students, and these teams may play against similar teams from other schools provided the games are under the supervision of the responsible Principals. This statement covers only those 9th grade students enrolled in high schools not belonging to the I. H. S. A. A.

10. Students below the 9th grade are never eligible for high school teams whose schools are members.

11. The I. H. S. A. A. has no jurisdiction over students below the 9th grade.

13. The I. H. S. A. A. believes that a system of schools should have rules and regulations in inter-school athletics that are somewhat uniform. There are good reasons for introducing and requiring in the Junior High School rules and regulations in athletics required in the Senior High School.

14. The participation of a 9th grade student in inter-school games as well as his enrollment in the 9th year must be considered and evaluated in the same way whether he be enrolled in the Junior High School or in the Senior High School.

15. All 9th, 10th, 11th and 12th grade students must have been regularly promoted from the 8th grade in order to be considered eligible for athletics.

16. Ninth grade students, who are members of teams made up of 7th, 8th and 9th grade students, or 8th and 9th grade students, are not permitted to enter tourneys and meets in which more than two teams compete, except in play days, etc., held in same city school system. This exception shall not be interpreted as giving sanction to regular athletic tourneys and meets.

17. All I. H. S. A. A. supplies and publications will be sent to Junior High School Principals upon request.

18. See modified membership regulations immediately following.

II. Modified Membership Regulations

Section 4, Article II, reads: "Modified membership may be extended to any public high school offering and maintaining less than three years of high school work with the understanding that modified membership shall extend the privilege of participating in single athletic games and contests with other schools belonging to the I. H. S. A. A. but not in meets and tourneys in which more than two teams participate except in meets and tourneys in which only the teams from the high schools of the same city participate."

It must be clearly understood that a modified membership is a membership in the I. H. S. A. A. that requires the Principal to subscribe to all of the rules and regulations of the Association.

Some questions and answers regarding modified memberships follow:

1.

Q. What type of school may hold a modified membership?
A. A Public High School offering and maintaining less than three years of high school work.

Q. Is it necessary for a Junior-Senior High School, having grades 9, 10, 11 and 12, to secure a modified membership and a full membership?

A. No. A full membership meets the requirements.

* * * *

Q. May schools holding modified memberships use grade students on their athletic teams in inter-school games and contests?

A. No. Schools holding modified or full memberships are required to use students in the 9th, 10th, 11th and 12th years of school work.

* * *

Q. May schools holding modified memberships compete with Public High Schools who do not hold membership in the I. H. S. A. A.?

A. No. Permission granted members to compete with non-members eligible for membership would eliminate the argument for

membership.

-

Q. Are 6th, 7th and 8th grade students eligible for teams in schools holding modified memberships?

A. No. These students are not eligible for any teams in high schools holding any type of membership in the I. H. S. A. A.

* * *

Q. May a 9th grade student, who is enrolled in a Junior High School, participate on the Senior High School team?

A. No. If the Junior High School holds a modified membership. Yes, if the Junior High School does not hold a modified membership.

BASEBALL

1.

Q. Does a high school student violate the rules of the I. H. S. A. by playing independent baseball (hard or soft) during the

summer?

A. High school students may play independent baseball during the summer months when school is not in session without jeopardizing their standing in high school, provided they do not accept remuneration, directly or indirectly, and also provided they do not play under assumed names. Reasonable meals, lodging and transportation may be accepted by such players if accepted in service

and not in any other way. All such playing should be checked carefully by Principals.

(Note: This answer applies to other summer sports, provided other rules and regulations of the I. H. S. A. A. are observed).

9

Q. Is a student, who plays on an independent baseball team during semester one, ineligible for high school baseball during semester two?

A. Yes. Such a student is ineligible for baseball for both semesters as baseball is a school year sport.

* * * *

3.

Q. If a student plays on an independent team in either hard or soft baseball during the school year, does he make himself ineligible for both hard and safe baseball in high school?

A. No. He makes himself ineligible only in the sport in which he participates on an independent team, provided he does not violate his amateur standing in some way.

* * * *

Q. Are soft baseball and hard baseball considered separate sports?
A. Yes, except that an official who is approved in "Baseball"
may be considered eligible to officiate either soft baseball or hard
baseball.

SUMMER SCHOOL WORK

1.

Q. Does summer school work in a school other than his home

school jeopardize the standing of a student?

A. No, provided the home school authorities recognize the work of a non-home school for credit and also provided the work does not count toward a College Degree. In fact, the I. H. S. A. A. recommends summer school work of an approved type for students needing credits. (See standards and requirements of State Board of Education.)

2.

Q. If a student fails to pass in three regular High School subjects during semester two, may he count work done in summer school

toward eligibility?

A. Back work during the summer may be counted toward eligibility provided: (1) it be done according to the regular rules of the school and according to good school procedure (2) no more than two credits be given for work done during the summer months (3) all

work be done and the credits be made a matter of final record in the Principal's office prior to the opening date of the semester in which eligibility is desired (4) all work and credits be bona fide in every way and certified as such by the High School Principal. (See standards and requirements of State Board of Education.)

MISCELLANEOUS

1.

Q. May a High School schedule and play games during the week?

A. The I. H. S. A. A. has no ruling in regard to this matter, but recommends that games be not so scheduled and not so played except in emergencies.

2.

Q. May students, who are ineligible for the first team, play on teams of lower ranking?

A. No. Ineligibility for one team means the same for all teams.

* * * *

Q. Are Parents and Physicians' Certificates required in all sports?
A. No. They are required in football, basketball, track and field, boxing, wrestling and swimming for all participants—boys and girls.

. . .

Q. Does the I. H. S. A. A. stipulate any price for tickets to other than tourneys and meets held strictly under the supervision of the Board of Control?

A. No. Other than a recommendation that reasonable prices be

made at all times for all games.

* * * *

Q. Is a student, who is expelled from High School one semester,

eligible for the following semester?

A. The I. H. S. A. A. has no jurisdiction unless its rules and regulations are broken. Expulsion and suspension from school are usually not athletic matters at all. All rules of the I. H. S. A. A. are binding on a student under expulsion or suspension. See Conduct rule.

c

Q. May a High School support a grade team in the same school system out of its athletic funds?

A. Yes.

7.

Q. May two or more High Schools combine to form one athletic team?

A. No. This is not permitted under any conditions, unless they consolidate and become one school.

8.

Q. Does the I. H. S. A. A. have a rule regarding the use of tobacco?

A. No. Other than that the I. H. S. A. A. considers the conduct of players as an element in their eligibility. This matter properly belongs to the High School Principal.

"Any student, whose conduct or character is such, in the judgment of the Board of Control, as to reflect discredit upon his High School or upon the I. H. S. A. A., is not eligible."

9.

Q. May the rules of a school be changed or special examinations be given in order to make students eligible?

A. The I. H. S. A. A. expects its members to observe not only the letter but the spirit of its rules and regulations. Changing of school rules and special examinations are not looked on with favor. The I. H. S. A. A. recommends no spites and no favors for athletes.

10.

Q. Does wrestling come under the rules of the I. H. S. A. A.? A. Yes. All "inter" athletic participation comes under the I. H. S. A. A.

11.

Q. May High Schools belonging to the I. H. S. A. A. take part in a track meet or tourney games outside of Indiana?

A. All games, meets, tourneys and inter-scholastic athletic activities participated in by the High Schools belonging to the I. H. S. A. A. must be held under the direct supervision, management and auspices of the member High Schools concerned, or under the I. H. S. A. A. Inter-state basketball tourneys are forbidden by the National Federation to which Indiana belongs.

12.

Q. May High School students take part in tourneys, games and meets held under auspices other than the High Schools concerned or the I. H. S. A. A.?

A. No. Not during the school year. Students may participate in track and baseball during the summer months in meets and games

held under non-High School or non-I. H. S. A. A. auspices, provided they do not violate their amateur standing in any way, and provided they secure permission of their Principal. See regulations for baseball in this handbook.

13.

Q. This question is often asked: "What will be the penalty for

violation of such and such a rule?"

A. Penalties in the I. H. S. A. A. are not assigned in advance, as this democratic organization is built on the idea that the observance of its rules and regulations is more to be desired than the enforcement of them. The I. H. S. A. A. believes that the essence of proper and willing observance is higher than enforcement and that we should resort to enforcement only when observance falls down.

14

Q. What is considered the school year?
A. A school year covers all time from the first day to the last day of the school year, including vacations.

* * *

Q. Are tourney schedules drawn or arranged?

A. All tourney schedules in the I. H. S. A. A. are drawn by lot by the Board of Control and no schedule has ever been arranged or "fixed."

16.

Q. Does the Commissioner have a vote in the Board of Control and in the Athletic Council?

A. The Commissioner is not a member of either group and has no vote in any of their deliberations.

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17.

Q. May a married student be considered eligible?

A. No, see rule.

18.

Q. If a student is expelled from High School during a semester and does not finish the semester, could he be considered eligible for the next semester?

A. No. Such student is a failure for his last semester in High

School.

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A. In U. S. Government Securities.

20.

Q. How are these Government Securities protected?

A. Burglary and Robbery Insurance are carried on the bank vault box and the Commissioner carries a Fidelity Bond.

21.

Q. Who examines the financial books of the I. H. S. A. A.?

Ernst and Ernst, Public Accountants, the Board of Control and any High School Principal so desiring.

Who audits the financial books of the I. H. S. A. A.?

A. Ernst and Ernst, Certified Accountants.

23.

Q. How often is an audit made?

A. Annually. The same is printed in the annual Handbooks of the Association.

Who is eligible for election to the Athletic Council?

Q. Who is eligible for election to the Atmetic Council:
A. Any bona fide faculty representative of a High School belonging to the I. H. S. A. A.

25.

Q. How are Board of Control members selected?

A. By the members of the Athletic Council from their own membership.

Q. Do Board members represent districts?

A. Not necessarily. They represent enrollment classes of High Schools. 210

27.

Do Athletic Council members represent districts or classes?

A. They represent classes and districts.

28.

Q. When and how may Principals submit proposals for the con-

sideration of the Athletic Council?

A. Principals may submit such proposals at any time in a written way to the Commissioner who will submit them to the Athletic Council for consideration and action.



STATEMENT OF CASH RECEIPTS AND DISBURSEMENTS

The Indiana High School Athletic Association, Indianapolis, Indiana.

We have examined the statement of cash receipts and disbursements of THE INDIANA HIGH SCHOOL ATHLETIC ASSOCIATION for the fiscal year ended November 14, 1939, and have examined or tested accounting records of the Association and other supporting evidence by methods and to the extent we deemed appropriate.

The scope and nature of our examination are outlined in the follow-

ing comments:

Cash on deposit at November 14, 1939, in the amount of \$752.74, was verified by reconciliation with the amount reported directly to us by the Fletcher Trust Company, Indianapolis. Recorded cash disbursements for the year were supported by examination of purchase invoices or other data on file. Canceled bank checks, with the exception of those outstanding at November 15, 1939, were traced to the records of cash disbursements. Recorded cash receipts for the year were reconciled with deposits as shown by bank statements on file.

United States Treasury bonds on hand at November 14, 1939, as shown by schedule included herein, were presented for our inspection. Interest income from bond coupons maturing during the fiscal year

was accounted for.

Insurance in force at November 14, 1939, was as follows: Larceny and Embezzlement Bond—A. L. Trester, Com-

missioner \$80,000.00

Burglary and Robbery—safe deposit box—each risk. 112,000.00

Public Liability—owners, landlords and tenants. 20/100,000.00

Workmen's compensation and public liability. All Employees

The recorded minutes of the meetings of the Board of Control and of the Athletic Council were reviewed by us. The minutes of the Board of Control meeting of April 8, 1939, record the approval by the Board of the detailed report covering the ticket sales and finances of the state final basketball tourney, as submitted by the Commissioner and we did not further verify the recorded proceeds from this source.

Opinion

In our opinion, based upon our examination, the accompanying statement of cash receipts and disbursements correctly sets forth a summary of the recorded cash transactions of the Association for the fiscal year ended November 14, 1939.
