CREDENTIALS: The deadline for requests is **Thursday, February 23, 4 pm ET/3 pm CT**. Credentials will not be granted after that time. For media outlets intending to cover the boys basketball state finals, please apply for credentials by e-mailing your request (with name of individual to be credentialled) to IHSAA Sports Information Director Jason Wille at jwille@ihsaa.org. E-mail requests MUST originate from a recognized business account; e-mails from personal accounts (ie: yahoo.com, aol.com, gmail.com, etc.) will not be accepted. Please note that the boys basketball state finals require a specific credential. Any passes issued previously will not allow admission to this event. Credentials will not be mailed.

NO CHILDREN, PLEASE: With the exception of high school students representing their school's newspaper, yearbook, radio or television station, and who have a team participating, no young people or children will be issued media credentials or be allowed in the working media area.

MEDIA PARKING: There is no designated parking area for media for this event though there are multiple parking options throughout the downtown area that are within walking distance of the Fieldhouse. The Virginia Avenue Garage, which charges a fee and is located directly to the east of the venue, connects to the Fieldhouse from the third floor of the garage via a walkway over Delaware Street. The entrance to the Virginia Avenue Garage is located off of Maryland Street.

MEDIA WILL-CALL/ENTRANCE: To gain admittance, the 2016-17 IHSAA Boys Basketball State Finals Media Credential is required. The entrance is on the southeast side of Bankers Life Fieldhouse adjacent to Delaware Street. The door is marked for Employees and Media and is located at the opposite end of the building from the public entrance. Credentials may be claimed beginning at 8 am ET for the first session and at 4 pm ET for the second session. Please have identification available and be prepared to have bags and equipment checked by security officials.

MEDIA WORKROOM: The media workroom at Bankers Life Fieldhouse will be open all day and be available to working media members. The work area contains complimentary wireless internet access and hospitality will be available.

SEAT ASSIGNMENTS: Except where permanent lines have been installed for those that have ordered them, an open seating policy will be used along press row.

BROADCAST PHONE LINE (if needed): Phone service is available for installation at each broadcast location. Should your station require such service, fill out the form linked below and email it to AT&T to finalize an order for installation. [Order Form](#)

FIELDHOUSE WIFI: Complimentary wireless service is provided for all attending media. Please access the "BLF Wifi" wireless signal. No login or password is required. *Some older devices (2.4 GHz) may not be able to access this 5.0 GHz signal.* A successful broadcast connection will require use of the complimentary "BLF Wifi" signal, a dedicated phone line or a hard-wired Ethernet line. Hard-wired Ethernet lines are available at cost by contacting Kevin Messenger (kmessenger@pacers.com).

RESULTS & STATISTICS: Live stats for each game will be available on the IHSAA website. Stats and box scores will be distributed at the end of each quarter on press row as well as in the media work room.

LOCKER ROOM ACCESS: No one except tournament workers and team coaches and participants will have access to the locker rooms.

LIVE TELEVISION CUT-INS: News reports showing live game action are prohibited. Stand-up reports for newscasts are permitted from inside the building provided that no live action is shown.

POST-GAME GUIDELINES

With the exception of the IHSAA's Radio, Television, Internet and Photography partners, all media members are asked to remain off the playing floor and behind the ropes during the post-game awards ceremonies.

The post-game ceremonies order will be as follows:

- Mental Attitude Award presentation
- Runner-Up medals and trophy presentation
- Championship medals and trophy presentation
- Team Photographs by Champions Illustrated

Following the Class A, 2A and 3A awards ceremonies, coaches and selected players will be escorted to the Media Interview Room for a formal press conference which is located on playing floor level just off the media entrance elevator. We ask your assistance to use the press conference as the appropriate time to conduct interviews. The runner-up team's coach and selected players will go first followed by the championship team's coach and players.

Because of newspaper deadlines at the end of the 4A contest, no press conference will be scheduled and news media will be allowed to conduct interviews on and around the floor after the awards ceremonies.



RICK VANDERWIELEN TO BE HONORED WITH IHSAA MEDIA SERVICE AWARD

An accomplished entrepreneur whose vision for media broadcasting, has helped place the IHSAA at the forefront of state high school associations across the country, Rick Vanderwielen will be honored with this year's Distinguished Media Service Award for District 2.

Vanderwielen's contributions to education-based athletics will be recognized Saturday, March 25, at the IHSAA Boys Basketball State Finals. Commissioner Bobby Cox and Sports Information Director Jason Wille will make the presentation.

and the IHSAA Champions Network. From 2005 to 2013, Vanderwielen's companies produced the IHSAA baseball, softball and volleyball state finals for Fox, Comcast, IHSAA sports.org and eventually Hamilton County's HomeTown Sports Indiana.

Since his retirement in 2013, Rick has volunteered his time and expertise supporting the broadcasting efforts of the state finals as well as creating IHSAA.tv.org as a portal for IHSAA games of the week and sub-state tournaments in basketball and football.

"Rick has been instrumental in the planning, development and ultimately the creation of the IHSAA Champions Network," said Assistant Commissioner Chris Kaufman. "His innovative, forward-thinking style has helped the IHSAA to become a leader in high school video broadcasting throughout the country. There is no question his contributions have had a dramatic, positive impact on the IHSAA in establishing a broadcasting framework that will continue to serve our member schools into the future."

He has served on advisory boards at Purdue University, the Hamilton County Judicial Task Force, and the Riverview Hospital Board of Directors. He and his family are trustees of the "Vanderwielen Family Foundation" and "1 More Game" which have contributed scholarships to deserving organizations and individuals for 20 years.

Vanderwielen is a 1974 graduate of Lafayette Jefferson High School where he met his high school sweetheart, Nancy. The couple have been married for 40 years and have two children and six grandchildren. In high school, Vanderwielen was a three-year letterman in both track and basketball and was a member of the Bronchos basketball team that advanced to the IHSAA State Finals in 1974. He went on to earn his B.S. degree in Electrical Engineering Technology from Purdue University in 1978 and was later honored as a Distinguished Alumnus in 2005 by the University. He was also elected to the Jeff Hall of Fame in 2005.

AKRON'S KIRK ROBINSON NAMED OUTSTANDING BASKETBALL OFFICIAL

Each year, the Indiana High School Athletic Association honors an outstanding official in each sport during the State Finals Tournament.

Kirk Robinson, of Akron, Indiana, is the recipient of the 2016-17 IHSAA Outstanding Basketball Official Award. As a member of the Northern Indiana Officials Association, Kirk has been a licensed basketball official for the past 32 years where he has served as the president, basketball chairman, treasurer, and secretary for his association.

During his career, he's officiated 23 basketball sectional championships, 16 regionals, five (5) semi-states, and three (3)



state finals. In addition, Kirk is a licensed volleyball and girls' basketball official, and he has refereed the state finals for each of those sports as well (Seven volleyball finals and five girls' basketball finals).

Kirk was selected for this honor by a committee representing the official's associations. In Indiana, there are 24 associations made up of more than 7,000 men and women who give up much of their personal time to assist in providing wholesome, worthwhile, and healthy activities for the student-athletes in our state. Statewide, there are more than 8,000 officials licensed by the IHSAA in 11 sports.

Kirk is the owner and purchasing manager or Pike Lumber Company in Akron, Indiana, where he has worked for the past 35 years. He is very active in his community, serving as the President of the Akron Revitalization Committee, the former President and current board member of the Akron Chamber of Commerce, a member of the Akron Lions Club, and many others. Kirk and his wife of 37 years, Kim, have two children - Kyle (32) and Kara (27).

INAUGURAL AWARD NAMED FOR SENATOR RICHARD G. LUGAR

Senator Richard G. Lugar is the inaugural recipient for an award named in his honor in what will become an annual tradition at the IHSAA Boys Basketball State Finals.

At halftime of the 4A state championship game on Saturday night, IHSAA Commissioner Bobby Cox and Jim Morris, Vice Chairman of Pacers Sports and Entertainment, will present the Richard G. Lugar Award for Distinguished Service to Interscholastic Athletics.



A long-time supporter of the Indiana High School Athletic Association and education-based athletics, Lugar was instrumental as Mayor of Indianapolis in ensuring the new Market Square Arena was built large enough to host the IHSAA state finals which were played there from 1975-1989. Lugar attended each of the boys high school state championships and regularly attended many contests throughout the state tournament leading up to the state finals.

During his high school days at Shortridge High School in Indianapolis, Lugar participated in basketball, football and track and was involved in many other student clubs and activities and graduated first in his class in 1950.

A fifth generation Hoosier who left the United States Senate as the longest serving member of Congress in Indiana history (1977-2013), Lugar is recognized as a gifted local and state leader, as well as a respected national and international statesman.

- Ben Davis making its fifth appearance in the boys basketball state finals and first since churning out back-to-back titles in 1995 and 1996.
- Ben Davis enters Saturday's game riding a 13-game win streak after starting the season 9-5.
- Giants will face third top 10 foe this tournament when they face #4 North Side. Team defeated #7 North Central (Indianapolis) 47-44 in the regional semis after losing to them twice in the regular season, and then topped #8 Castle 74-71 for the semi-state trophy. Senior Josh Brewer's buzzer-beating three-pointer from the wing punched the Giants' ticket to the state championship game.
- Ben Davis has four double-figure scorers at its disposal led by junior forward Aaron Henry at 14.3 ppg, senior Datrion Harper at 11.5, Jalen Newsom at 10.2 and Josh Brewer at 10.0.
- The Giants finished tied for fourth in the Metropolitan Interscholastic Conference race with a 3-4 record this season.
- Head coach Mark James will be looking for his 100th win as Ben Davis coach on Saturday standing 99-47 in his sixth year at the school. He is 537-277 (.660) in his 35th year overall. His 537 wins are ninth-best in the state among active coaches.

ARTHUR L. TRESTER & RAY CRAFT MENTAL ATTITUDE AWARD RECIPIENTS

The IHSAA Executive Committee presents the Arthur L. Trestler & Ray Craft Mental Attitude Awards to the outstanding senior participant in each classification of the boys' basketball state finals. The recipients of these awards, who were nominated by their principals and coaches, must excel in mental attitude, scholarship, leadership and athletic ability in basketball. The Indiana Pacers and Indiana Fever, the presenting sponsors of the state tournament, donate a \$1,000 scholarship to each school in the name of the recipient.

The 4A, 3A and 2A awards are named in honor of the late Arthur L. Trestler who served as first commissioner of the Association from 1929 to 1944. Trestler helped Indiana high school sports and the IHSAA emerge from the Great Depression in a position of preeminence unmatched by perhaps any other state in the nation.

Beginning in 2016, the Class A award was re-named in honor of Ray Craft, the long-time associate commissioner who served from 1983 to 2008. Craft was involved at nearly every level of Indiana secondary education and interscholastic athletics during his career including administering the boys basketball state tournament for many years. He was also a starting senior guard on Milan High School's 1954 state championship basketball team.

From 1917 to 1943 the award was known as "The Gimbel Medal for Mental Attitude" in honor of Mr. Jake Gimbel of Vincennes, who awarded the medal each of those years until his passing prior to the 1943 tournament. In 1944, the award became known as the "IHSAA Medal for Mental Attitude". In 1945, the IHSAA Board officially named the award "The Arthur L. Trestler Medal for Mental Attitude".

Recipients were given a medal each year from 1945 through 1964, hence "The Arthur L. Trestler Medal for Mental Attitude." Since 1965, the award has been made in the form of a plaque with a copy of the original medal incorporated on the face of the plaque, hence "The Arthur L. Trestler Award for Mental Attitude."
